# Dorset Apple Tray Bake (to use up those cooking apples)

#### Ingredients

225g butter, softened, plus extra for the tin

450g cooking apples (such as Bramley) ½ lemon, juiced

280g golden caster sugar

4 eggs

2 tsp vanilla extract

350g self-raising flour

2 tsp baking powder

Demerara sugar, to sprinkle

#### Method STEP 1

Heat the oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4. Butter and line a rectangular baking tin (approx 27 x 20cm) with baking parchment. Peel, core and thinly slice the apples, then squeeze over the lemon juice. Set aside.

#### STEP 2

Put the butter, caster sugar, eggs, vanilla, flour and

baking powder into a large bowl and mix well until smooth. Spread half the mixture into the prepared tin. Arrange half the apples over the top of the mixture, then repeat the layers. Sprinkle over the Demerara sugar.

#### STEP 3

Bake for 45-50 mins until golden and springy to the touch. Leave to cool for 10 mins, then turn out of the tin and remove the paper. Cut into bars or squares.

#### Information from David Snartt.

#### Parking Restrictions.

I understand that the consultation for the proposed new parking restrictions for the Parish of Newtown Linford will be distributed to residents by the end of November. In my view, this is a final chance to try to help reduce the impact of on-street parking issues that exist today. I have again made the Council aware of the recent difficulties with illegal parking, and stressed again without effective enforcement by Street Wardens the parking issues will continue to be an issue.

May I ask that residents do respond to the consultation, it is important to have as much information as possible before final decisions are made.

#### Mayor of Charnwood.

It was a great personal honour for me to take part in this year's Loughborough Remembrance Service at the War Memorial. If this was a normal year, we would have all come together across the Borough to remember those who served and many who made the ultimate sacrifice for their country.



I was pleased that we were able, albeit in limited numbers, to honour all

past, present serving members and their families within our armed services community - especially the ones who have been involved in many conflicts around the world, making sure we have made a safer place for our children and future generations.

Due to the Covid-19 restrictions, it was with disappointment that the 799<sup>th</sup> annual Loughborough Fair was not able to take place this year. Over the years, local residents have attended this street fair, enjoying the unique atmosphere, and the various rides for young and old, along with the various types of food on offer.

I did stand in front of the Town Hall to read the Charter which allows the fair to take place. In my view, it was important to carry on the tradition of reading the Charter in full. I do hope that we are in a better position next year for the 800<sup>th</sup> year of the Loughborough Fair. I am sure everyone involved will aim to make it the best yet.

As we approach Christmas I released the Mayor's Christmas message. I thought I would share with you part of my message.

Turning to my thoughts for Christmas, I write this message without knowing what restrictions will be in place. I do hope though, as this is the time for families to traditionally come together to celebrate the Festive Season, we can all in some way be together, even if, for this one year, by modern virtual technology.

For many years now, I have attended a Christmas lunch gathering organised by local volunteers. This brought together people who would normally be on their own on Christmas Day. I am sure there are other events like this across the Borough which have given companionship, fellowship and good food on this special day. This may not be able to happen this year. Therefore, please look out for your neighbours who are elderly and living on their own, it can be a very lonely time for them over this Festive Period.

Since becoming the Mayor of Charnwood in June, it has been a difficult time for us all, many making personal sacrifices during the year. I write along with the Mayoress, with hope and optimism, looking forward to a brighter future, through next year and beyond.

Take care and stay safe. **David Snartt**.




#### **Village Advent Windows**

#### Helping wildlife in winter

As well as putting food out for the birds, conservation and gardening organisations, including the Royal Horticultural Society and the R.S.P.B., suggest some more ways to help wildlife in our gardens over the winter:



- **Leave some dead leaves,** perhaps under shrubs or hedges, for overwintering small mammals, amphibians and insects.
- An insect or bug hotel in a sheltered but sunny position gives creatures, such as ladybirds and lacewings, a place to live.



- Leave some herbaceous and hollow-stemmed plants unpruned until early spring to provide homes for insects over the winter. Bamboo canes are ideal too.
- Grow trees and shrubs which produce berries or other fruit (e.g. holly, ivy, apple, cotoneaster, pyracantha) which help feed birds. The **seed heads** of some plants (e.g. teasel) can also be left over the winter for birds to feed on.
- Piles of stones or logs make excellent habitats for a variety of overwintering creatures.
- Provide a shallow container of water at ground level for other garden wildlife which needs to drink, as well as birds.
- Melt a hole in the ice on ponds to allow wildlife to drink, and to enter and exit the water. Fill a saucepan with hot water and sit it on the ice until the ice melts. Don't hit or crack the ice as this can send shockwaves through the water which can harm wildlife.



- **Compost heaps** can be the winter resort for frogs, toads and other creatures, so take care when turning.
- Check bonfires for sheltering and hibernating animals before lighting.
- Clean out bird boxes in late winter so they are ready for use in spring.

#### From the Village Archive:-Village Farm 1962 & Grey Cres Development 1967





The photos opposite were taken in 1962, and show Village Farm which is sited opposite the Primary School on Main Street. Village Farm dates back to at least 1838 and boasted a duck pond, orchards and a field of cowslips. In 1962 it was owned by Mr Herbert (Sandy) Harrison who sold it to Jelson Builders. A road (Grey Crescent) was then built on the farm land to link up with the already existing Grey Close (since renamed Grey Crescent). The new houses on Grey Crescent were built in 1967, with Swithland slate roofs and local stone frontages to help them blend in with other houses in the village.

The original development plan for Grey Crescent shows that a mixture of houses and bungalows were to be built on the right-hand side, and only 4 properties on the left. Detached bungalows were priced at £6,300, and houses at £8,800 - how times have changed! The Village Farm buildings were remodelled to become the houses on Main Street.

The new residents moving in to Grey Crescent soon became active in the Village Community, and included Janet Neaverson (Chair of the Parish Council), Roger Kendall (organised the Church Choir) and Sonia Pitchers (leading light in the WI).

Grey Close mentioned above had been built just after the Second World war on land known as the Pingle, originally a pound for stray animals. Some of the Pingle had been bought by the Parish Council to be the village playing field, and some was used to build the Grey Close houses.





### Newtown Linford Neighbourhood Watch A member of the Parish Council



I was saddened to hear of a resident who had fallen victim to burglary at the end of October. Some items were taken from the property and the family vehicle was stolen from the driveway.

Sergeant, Steve Kilsby, sent out the following message on Neighbourhood Link, which includes some valuable advice for Charnwood residents:

"Just a message to share some of the good work the team have been up to over recent weeks and months and to re-iterate that you have very approachable and dedicated officers in your area.

PC 907 Laura Hobbs, PCSO 6051 Tom Vaughan and PCSO 6532 Katrina Hallmark are the dedicated officers for Rothley, Mountsorrel, Woodhouse, Woodhouse Eaves, and Quorn areas and the team and I are supported by the 24/7 response officers based at Loughborough.

The team have held regular beat meetings in public locations across the Village and beyond and have continued to drive down anti-social behaviour and crime. Some of you may have had the chance to speak with them at these events.

In addition, PCSO Vaughan and I have set up a rural watch scheme. In addition to dealing with crimes you are reporting to us, we will:-

Conduct pro-active, high visibility patrols around the rural areas of Charnwood

Utilise response officers to patrol and conduct stop checks on vehicles in and around the rural areas at night and in the early hours of the morning.

Provide crime prevention advice around rural crime.

Work with partner agencies to arrange tool/plant marking

Please get in touch with us regarding any issues you are experiencing. We have a dedicated email address for contacting the Rural Crime Team.

I can also confirm to you all, that crime in the villages is very low in comparison to other areas and that regular patrols take place in all locations (even if you may not always see us - the team are out and about!), but now is a good opportunity to remind people of some general crime prevention advice as the Winter months come in.

The force traditionally sees a seasonal rise in burglaries around the time the clocks go back, with offences often rising through December and January.

The winter months can make it easier for burglars to go unnoticed and also makes unoccupied homes easier to spot. The force is encouraging residents to review their home security and take a few simple and inexpensive precautions to protect their homes.

One of the easiest things you can do is to leave a light on when you go out. You can use an automatic light timer to switch lamps on in your home when you go out for the evening or when you go away, to give the appearance you are home.

There are lots of other things you can do to make your home more secure including:

- Keep doors and windows locked at all times and remove keys from the lock
- Keep valuables, bags, cash and keys out of sight and keep them in a safe place
- Don't keep large quantities of cash and jewellery in your home
- Avoid leaving packaging from expensive items outside your house take it to be recycled or put it in the bin
- If you have a house alarm make sure you remember to set it before leaving the house
- Check your outdoor security lighting is in full working order
- Prevent easy access to the back and sides of your home with locked gates and fencing
- · If you're going away, don't advertise this on social media
- Ask a neighbour or relative to collect post and open and close curtains while you're away

In other NHW news, there has been an increase in Catalytic Converter thefts in the Charnwood area.

#### **Catalytic Converter Theft Protection**

- Park your car in a locked garage where possible, but if this isn't an option, then park it in a well-lit and well-populated area
- Park close to fences, walls or a kerb with the exhaust being closest to the fence, wall or kerb to make the theft more difficult
- Avoid parking your vehicle half on the pavement and half on the road, as this may make it easier for thieves to access the catalytic converter
- If parking in a public car park, consider parking alongside other
  cars and facing your bonnet towards the wall if possible. With the
  catalytic converter positioned at the front of your vehicle, this will
  make it harder for thieves to get close enough to steal it
- If there is a fleet of vehicles, park the low clearance vehicles to block the high clearance vehicles. This will obstruct access underneath
- If your catalytic converter is bolted on, you can ask for your local garage to weld the bolts to make it more difficult to remove
- Alternatively, you can also etch a serial number on the converter
- You can even purchase a 'cage clamp' which is a cage device that locks in around the converter to make it more difficult to remove
- Speak to your car dealership about the possibility of adding a tilt sensor that will activate the alarm, should any thief try to jack the vehicle up to steal the converter

 If you see someone acting suspiciously under a vehicle, report it to the Police. Obtain as much information as possible, including any vehicle registrations

Tony said, 'I am honoured to receive the unpaid volunteer award. I spent a lot of time at Beaumont Hall visiting my wife and the care team became


like a second family for me. I am very grateful for all of the wonderful care they gave my wife, and for supporting me by allowing me to continue to be a part of the team I had come to cherish'.

#### **Traffic Regulation Order (TRO) Update**

At the time of writing this, we find ourselves in another lockdown and in recent weeks, have again seen a huge increase in the numbers of visitors to the Parish.

This in turn has brought more traffic chaos to roads surrounding the three Bradgate Park entrances, with vehicles parked dangerously and obstructively, particularly along Bradgate Road, Roecliffe Road, Sharpley Hill/Hunts Hill and on upper Main Street. We have also witnessed many violations of current parking restrictions around the Village and residents have reported abusive and anti-social behaviour.

This is unacceptable and Parish Councillors wanted to reassure residents that the matter is being addressed and your comments and complaints have been documented and passed to the authorities where appropriate.

The Parish Council have been working alongside Councillor Snartt and Councillor Taylor, LCC Highways, Leicestershire Police and Charnwood Borough Council to address the problems of being a 'honeypot' village for

several years. Since the start of the first lockdown back in March 2020, our problems have become particularly acute (and much more frequent) and have highlighted the unacceptable levels of inconsiderate and dangerous parking.

Proposals for a permanent Traffic Regulation Order have been drafted and a public consultation will commence on 26<sup>th</sup> November 2020. LCC has offered 50% funding towards the design, consultation and implementation of the new proposed restrictions, pending the imminent consultation and the Parish Council feel so strongly that these restrictions are required, they have themselves

potentially committed £15,000 (plus £5,000 additional funding applied for), to the total estimated cost of the works.

The proposed restrictions include double yellow lines with and without loading bans both near the park entrances and within the village, parking bay time restrictions where there are currently none in place and additional H-bar markings for some unprotected driveways. Full details of the TRO proposals will be available through the consultation from 26<sup>th</sup> November 2020.

All properties directly affected by the proposed new restrictions, will receive official notification of the consultation and ALL residents are invited to respond. If you are in SUPPORT of the TRO proposals, please respond to the consultation. If you OBJECT to the TRO proposals, please respond to the consultation.

It is vital all resident comments are submitted, whether you are in support or against the proposals. If anyone requires help in doing so, please contact me via email or by telephone and I can assist you.

This opportunity, which is fully supported by the Parish Council, will enable us to have measures put in place to protect the Parish from the parking atrocities we have seen of late.

Once restrictions have been reviewed and agreed, we expect implementation before the end of March 2021.

In the meantime, we have requested traffic cones are deployed to Bradgate Road, Roecliffe Road and Sharpley Hill/Hunts Hill and we await a response.

I have also spoken to the Officer in charge of Civil Enforcement at CBC and have asked if patrols can be carried out later in the day, once BPT car parks are at capacity and when parking violations are at optimum levels.

If you witness any examples of parking that may endanger members of the public, for example pavement parking where pedestrians are forced out into 60mph roads and where there is no alternative footpath, please report to Police on 101.

As we find ourselves in lockdown again and cases continue to rise, it is important we all keep protecting each other by following Government guidance.

The message is clear; we must Stay Alert, Control the Virus and Save Lives and remember, 'Hands. Face. Space'.

It is expected Charnwood will return to the High COVID Alert Level at the end of the current lockdown on 2<sup>nd</sup> December.

On a brighter note, Ruth Brutnall has been busily coordinating the Village Advent Windows initiative and I am very excited to see everyone's creative festive scenes beginning on Tuesday 1<sup>st</sup> December. Further details of those households taking part is on page 13 and photos will be published on the Parish Council Facebook page.

Following on from my article in the October edition of the Magazine, I have been liaising with the Leicestershire Police Road



Safety Unit, regarding resident concerns in relation to speeding vehicles.

As a result, a covert speed survey was carried out on upper Main Street between 28<sup>th</sup> September and 6<sup>th</sup> October. During this time, 18% of motorists were found to be exceeding the National Police Chief Council's enforcement threshold of 10% plus 2mph.

This represents poor compliance with the speed limit and the Police Traffic Management Department will now coordinate enforcement operations, utilising officers from the Local Beat Team and the Leicestershire Police Safer Roads Team.

In addition to this, Leicestershire Police supported by the Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland Road Safety Partnership and Local Authorities, are promoting a 'Bin Sticker' Campaign across the area to remind drivers to stick to the speed limit.

I have requested a supply of speed limit stickers which can be attached

to wheelie bins and these will be available by the beginning of December.

I think this a great idea, as they will be visible each week/fortnight on bin collection days only and will therefore, not lose their impact.

If you would like a bin sticker, please get in touch via the usual channels. It is unclear at the moment whether the stickers are available for 40mph limits as well as 30mph but we'll see when they arrive. I will post an update to the Parish Council Facebook page in due course.
