Dear Deborah,

Thank you for your email dated 28/07/21 regarding the vibrations caused by HGV traffic traversing the speed humps outside the School on Main Street, Newtown Linford. Can we take this opportunity to apologise for the delay replying.

The speed humps were put in some years ago with the intention to reduce speeds and to facilitate safer crossing for pedestrians near the school. We are not aware of any history regarding previous concerns over vibration and damage to properties. Main Street is also part of the zone of weight restricted roads as are all roads in Newtown Linford so HGV traffic should be minimal.

There has been a lot of research carried out into vibrations and its effects on buildings. This includes research carried out on behalf of Central Government on the effects of vibrations caused by traffic on adjacent properties. There are two types of vibration, ground propagated through the action of rolling wheels and airborne vibration, sound. The research concludes that sound waves do not cause any damage and there is an excerpt below regarding the effects of ground vibration.

6.4 Ground-borne vibrations are produced by the movement of rolling wheels on the road surface and can be perceptible in nearby buildings if heavy vehicles pass over irregularities in the road. It has long been a popular belief that such vibrations can lead to damage in buildings. Extensive research on a wide range of buildings of various ages and types has been carried out (TRL, Watts, 1990), but no evidence has been found to support the theory that traffic induced vibrations are a source of significant damage to buildings. Minor cracking of plaster may possibly occur at high exposure sites (ie, existing heavily trafficked roads with poor surfaces and subgrade conditions) but it is very unlikely that this would be distinguishable from cracking due to other causes. There was no evidence that exposure to airborne vibration had caused even minor damage.

I can confirm that colleagues in the Environment and Transportation Team of Leicestershire County Council have attended to measure the two speed humps referred to in your email, specifically, the measurement of the actual height of the speed humps and I can now confirm the following:-

Speed Hump outside 28 Main Street – measurements taken at various sections with a height showing 70mm or below.

Speed Hump outside The Bradgate – measurements taken at various sections with heights varying between 60mm to 80mm.

The Highways (Road Humps) Regulations 1999 states the maximum legal limit for a speed hump is **100mm** and I can therefore confirm that the height of the two speed humps above are within the overarching legal limit for speed tables.

If the Parish is in support of removal of these speed humps then we could consider removing them, however as I am sure you will be aware it would not meet our criteria for funding, the project would need to be third party funded from concept to installation/removal.
