I've written before that September, even for those of us with little direct contact with schools and education these days, still often feels like the start of a new year. A chance to reset, to start again. And this year, more than most, it feels like we need a fresh start, to move on from the difficulty and frustration of the last 18 months (while, of course, realising that the pandemic is still with us).

Therefore a new pattern of Services is beginning on 5th September at All Saints'. After having a year of Services at a time and in parts a style deliberately different from the usual, we are re-launching with a new Service at 10am every Sunday.

This weekly Service, with an alternating pattern of Holy Communion and Morning Prayer, with regular Services which will involve the Brownies and will be particularly appropriate for families. They will be supplemented by a monthly midweek Holy Communion Service on the first Thursday of each month, starting on 7th October, and the ongoing weekly Morning Prayer on Tuesdays at 8.30am.

The Sunday Services will also be live-streamed on Facebook, replacing the pre-recorded services that have been our fare over the last year. I can't promise that no technological glitches will hit us – live streaming is more challenging than uploading videos in advance – but we have had several successful trials, not least with Michael and Marilyn's wedding back in June, so are hopeful that this will work well.

The eagle-eyed will have noted that there will no longer be an 8am Holy Communion every other week. The Book of Common Prayer will continue in use at All Saints – at the monthly midweek service as well as occasionally on Sundays – and there will be a Holy Communion service at our partner Church in Glenfield on those weeks when there isn't one in the village.

One thing we're working on is finding organists and pianists—during lockdown and just before, we have sadly had to say goodbye to some of those who have served the Church in this way previously. Some have taken other roles elsewhere, some are no longer able to continue because of their health. If you know one do let me know!.

Coffee & Cake News & September dates


The summer has been very kind to us enabling us to get together on various villagers lawns in person at last. I think meeting up with our friends

Reptiles and Amphibians in Newtown Linford

Toby Manning, of the Newtown Linford Biodiversity group, writes on reptiles and amphibians in the Parish.

The UK is home to 12 species of reptile and amphibians, and we are fortunate enough to have 9 of these living in our Parish.

Of the UK's 3 snakes, both grass snakes and adders can be found in Bradgate Park, and they sometimes wander into the neighbouring land. The adder is shorter (generally about 70 cm), greyish with a black zigzag down its back. The grass snake is longer - about 1 – 1.5m, greenish with markings, less distinct than the adder's, on its side but not on its back.

As a child I learned that "adders are poisonous"; this is an urban myth. An adder bite is not pleasant, but will not kill you. However, ad-

ders will only bite if they are threatened; their usual response to being disturbed is to escape and hide.

We also have 2 lizards in the Parish. The common lizard has been seen in Bradgate Park, but like the snakes is rare and difficult to find. The slow worm has no legs, and looks like a snake; it is shorter than an adder (40 cm), unpatterned and without an obvious head, which instead looks like part of its body. Of our

reptiles it is probably the one most likely to be found in your garden; it tends to skulk in compost heaps and underneath sheds.

Of the amphibians, the frog and the toad need no introduction. The toad is duller, "warty"

and tends to crawl, whereas the frog is bright and hops. Their spawn is also differ-

ent; frogspawn is laid in clumps in water, while toadspawn is laid in long strings wrapped round waterweed; each string is typically 1 cm in diameter.

Three newts are found in the UK. The Smooth Newt is widespread across the Parish,

while the rarer Palmate and Great Crested Newts have been reported from Bradgate Park. Newts again produce tadpoles; their eggs are laid singly underwater against plants.

All of these species like areas of "untidiness".

They need places to hibernate in the winter — ideally dry places where they will not be disturbed.

The reptiles need places to lay their eggs — compost heaps are ideal, provided it is undisturbed and amphibians need a pond in which to lay their eggs.

And the three species not found in the Parish? The smooth snake and the sand lizard are only found on heathland in southern England, while the Natterjack Toad is rare and found occasionally in mature sand dunes



Charnwood Draft Local Plan 2021-37.

Due to the Parish Magazine not being published for the month of August, I was sorry I was unable to give you this information whilst the public consultation for the Draft Local Plan was open. Charnwood Borough Council launched a six week consultation about its' new plan and vision for the area over the next 16 years. The consultation was for residents, businesses and other interested parties to submit comments about the 'soundness' of the Draft Local Plan, ahead of its planned submission to Government. That said, I did manage to have the detail printed in another locally distributed magazine and through the Parish Council.

The Council states 'the local plan is a key strategic framework for supporting future growth and developing healthy communities and environmental safeguards. It guides development and identifies locations for housing and employment land. The Local Plan also considers the impacts of climate change, infrastructure needs and protection of green spaces'.

At the Full Council meeting where Councillors agreed that the Local Plan 2021-37 should go out for public consultation, I spoke of my concerns and asked for further information about two areas of the Local Plan. Therefore, I abstained when the vote was taken. In my view, one of the sites for 600 dwellings to be developed in Anstey will have consequences for Newtown Linford Parish. I need to understand more fully the impact this will have. Anstey has already seen a large amount of development, with this extra proposal it will impact on the highway network and local services.

I will be submitting my comments to the consultation process, which I will share through the Parish Magazine. I am hopeful residents did manage to see the detail about the Draft Local Plan and respond to the Council before the closing date of 23rd August.

Plaque to Mark 800 Years.

A Charnwood Heritage Plaque has been unveiled to mark the 800th anniversary of the Royal Charters for Loughborough Markets and Fairs. The Plaque was unveiled during a ceremony at Loughborough Town Hall exactly 800 years to the day when the first fair was held in the town under the Charter.

In 1221 a young King Henry III granted a Royal Charter to Hugh le Despenser, the Lord of the Manor, to hold a weekly Thursday market and an annual fair in Loughborough. The fair is held in November, I know that residents from my Council Ward have enjoyed the fun of the fair over the

years. It was disappointing that the annual fair was cancelled last year due to the pandemic. This year's fair is planned for 10th to 13th November.

Electoral Register.

Make sure you are on the electoral register. Thousands of forms are being delivered across Charnwood Borough to ensure the electoral register is up to date. Every year the Council must check its electoral register is up to date, and letters are sent to all households asking people to confirm the details or inform the Council of any changes. The aim is to make sure that everyone who is eligible to vote is registered and can have their say in future elections and referendums. The Electoral Registration Officer needs the information to be able to publish a complete and accurate electoral register on 1st December each year.

Full details of how residents can complete the form on line, by telephone, via text or by post are all contained in the document sent to them. Any residents who have questions can visit www.charnwood.gov.uk/ electoralservices or contact the helpline on 01509 634546.

Village Hall News

Following the last 18 months of lock-down, the only users of the Village Hall have been the Pre-School which has been able to continue to operate under Government guidelines.

Computers and grass cutting

Recent hardware problems have left my "man-cave" library strewn with hard drives; CPU fans; RAM; bits of cases; SATA leads; Manuals; DVDs and all the paraphernalia associated with computer building. This is untidy because all these bits have homes, they're just not there. They're occupying space rightly reserved for my tea, cake, and sometimes feet

On the other hand, grass growing in the ground is at home. It is in exactly the right place showing the richness and beauty of life. Theologically one could say it is a ubiquitous expression of God's love; philosophically it is an affirmation of Essence over Existence.

To regard uncut grass burgeoning with life as untidy is perhaps to betray an addiction to the notions of tidiness of a long dead French King who decided he wanted the outside to be as organized as inside his palaces.

Few people regard trees as untidy yet they rarely grow in neat tidy lines. Some even lean, have branches missing and conform to their photo-dendritic growth pattern in only the most rudimentary way.

If a tennis court, picnic area, pathway is required, fine - cut the grass to

enable these features. Similarly road safety considerations should not be overlooked and appropriate action taken. It is with the notion that life expressing itself through growth is in some way "scruffy" that I take issue.

No-one who reaches the age of grand parentage can have any doubt that life is beautiful and good but that it is our messy and untidy living of it that creates unhappiness. To project our notions of disordered messiness onto the infinite variety of nature is, I contend, a mistake.

Please give life a chance.

Biodiversity Group: Results of Garden Wild- life Survey

Readers may remember that the April issue of the Magazine included a questionnaire on wildlife in the Parish. We had an excellent 73 responses, a response rate of approximately 30%, and we express our appreciation to all those who took the trouble to respond.



Like any survey where the responders are selfselected, we need to be careful about drawing any definite conclusion, but it is possible to identify some interesting trends.

Unsurprisingly, gardens tended to be large (70% were larger than a tennis court) although the figure of 44% having a pond or stream is more than might have been expected. 93% of gardens included trees or hedges – important as potential bird-nesting sites – and 60% had a compost heap, also important as it provides a refuge for hibernating animals such as hedgehogs and reptiles. 66% had a woodpile (a valuable wildlife resource for insects and other invertebrates) and 64% included a "wild area".

The village has a healthy population of mammals, although some of these are considered a nuisance (badgers, rats, etc.). Fully a third of respondents reported seeing muntjac deer in their gardens, 30% hedgehogs and 22% badgers. Two respondents claimed that badgers had resulted in the elimination of snakes and hedgehogs. We look forward to the regular reporting of otters!

The proximity to Bradgate Park, a known hotspot of both adders and grass snakes, meant that 11% of respondents reported snakes while a further 8% reported slow worms. Amphibians were numerous, as might be expected considering how many respondents reported water features: 58% reported frogs, 45% toads and 33% newts.

We were pleased at the very enthusiastic response to the part of the survey dealing with birds. A large range of birds were reported nesting in village gardens, including robins, wrens, house sparrows, blackbirds, magpies, wood pigeons, blue tits, great tits, coal tits, long tail tits, starlings, swallows, pied wagtails and dunnocks. Although robins, wood pigeons, magpies, blue tits and blackbirds were almost universal (reported in over 90% of gardens), house sparrows were only reported by 79% of respondents.

Gardens are a very valuable resource for nature, and we are pleased to say that Newtown Linford is no exception to this rule.

The Village Archive.

During the hot weather in June we received timely warnings against swimming in Cropston Reservoir. By coincidence I came across an article, dated 1965 and possibly from the Leicester Mercury, concerning the draining of the Reservoir. The draining was required for the purposes of a very big clean up and after being submerged for 90 years the ruins of the head gamekeepers house began to emerge. Before being demolished in 1870 when the Reservoir was constructed it was quite a magnificent building with stabling and kennels and where the shoots of the Earl of Stamford and Warrington were organised. Mr Joseph Reeves was the last head keeper to live in the house.

A card from the early shoots by the Earl, with a party of 11, related that in one day 838 rabbits and 234 hares were killed. During the next few days 1600 pheasants were shot.

There was also a warning that during the draining of the reservoir quicksand had been found around the edges and the public were advised to stay away.

Newtown Linford Neighbourhood Watch -A member of the Parish Council



This month's update starts with a warning sent in by resident, Pam McMorran, regarding a very convincing telephone banking scam. Pam says:

"This was so realistic I wanted to tell you about it.

Last week I received a call on my mobile phone whilst away on holiday. My mobile phone said this may be a fraudulent call in red on the screen before I answered it. They said they were my bank and they had picked up fraudulent entries on my debit account. The lady sounded English, just like the banking ladies on line normally do. She spoke clearly and concisely and Maurice was convinced she was genuine. I was very wary and asked about the entries. She listed three or four quite large amounts and asked if I had made them and I said no, I had not used that card for weeks and seldom did. She said they had stopped the entries but needed to send me something to my phone. She asked me for my date of birth and I refused to give it. A link to an Apple app arrived immediately and she asked if I had received it and said she wanted me to fill it in and make contact. When I refused to answer the questions, she kept going on hold supposedly to ask her senior person. Eventually, she abruptly cut off inferring it was because I was mistrusting.

I am now home and have telephoned my bank and have been told they did not make that call and my fears had been realised. Apparently, the scammers send this app to get your full information. I'm not sure if it is part of the scam but they accidently sent me the Apple app when I am on the Android system. She did not ask me which one I would need.

My bank have confirmed the scam takes this form, the scammers make the purchases contactless and then try and get the details to complete the transaction via the app.

It was very convincing.

Best wishes Pam"

Well done, Pam for being cautious. If ever you are in doubt regarding the credibility of a caller, please check the caller is who they say they are, by telephoning the company they represent but please remember not to use contact details they give you. A genuine caller won't mind you checking!

Neighbourhood Link have recently sent out the following information on

Crytocurrency Investment and Trading Scams:

"We have seen an alarming rise in the number of people investing in 'get rich quick' schemes, investing thousands of pounds which they will never get back.

Cryptocurrency is a digital or virtual currency designed to work as a medium of exchange.

How does this scam work?

Fraudsters will cold call victims and use social media platforms to advertise 'get rich quick' investments in mining and online trading in cryptocurrencies such as Bitcoin.

Posts often use fake endorsements from celebrities/TV shows such as Dragons Den and images of luxury items like expensive watches and cars. These then link to professional-looking websites where consumers are persuaded to invest. They will often have a prestigious City of London address but are more often than not be based outside of the UK.

Fraudsters will convince victims to sign up to cryptocurrency investment websites and to part with their personal details such as credit card details and driving licences to open a trading account. The victim will then make an initial minimum deposit, investors will then often be led to believe that their first investment has successfully made a profit.

The fraudster will then contact the victim to invest more money or introduce friends and family with the false promise of greater profits. However, eventually the returns stop, the customer account is closed and the scammer disappears with no further contact.

It is really important to know that certain cryptoassets, like Bitcoin and Ether are not regulated in the UK.

This means that buying, selling or transferring these cryptoassets falls outside the remit of the Financial Conduct Authority. The same is true for the operation of a cryptocurrency exchange.

Most firms advertising and selling investments in cryptoassets are NOT authorised by the Financial Conduct Authority. This means that if you invest in certain cryptoassets you will not have access to the Financial Ombudsman Service or the Financial Services Compensation Scheme if things go wrong.

If you've invested in unregulated cryptoassets, you may not have access to the Financial Ombudsman Service or the Financial Services Compensation Scheme and you're unlikely to get your money back.

If you have already invested in a scam, fraudsters are likely to target you again or sell your details to other criminals.

The follow-up scam may be completely separate or related to the previous fraud, such as an offer to get your money back or to buy back the investment after you pay a fee.

How to protect yourself

- Don't assume it's real, be wary professional-looking websites, adverts or social media posts don't always mean that an investment opportunity is genuine. Criminals can use the names of well-known brands or individuals to make their scams appear legitimate. A firm must be authorised by the Financial Conduct Authority to advertise or sell these products in the UK check the FCA register to make sure the firm is authorised. You can also check the FCA Warning List of firms to avoid, www.fca.org.uk/scamsmart
- Don't be rushed or pressured into making a decision a genuine bank or financial organisation won't force you to part with your money on the spot. Always be wary if you're pressured to invest quickly or promised returns that sound too good to be true.
- Stay in control avoid uninvited investment offers, especially those over cold calls. If you're thinking about making an investment, get independent advice and thoroughly research the company first.
- Do further research on the product you are considering and the firm you are considering investing with. Check with Companies House to see if the firm is registered as a UK company and for directors' names. To see if others have posted any concerns, search online for the firm's name, directors' names and the product you are considering."

Well, in the blink of an eye, we are in September and schools have reopened following the Summer holiday. I hope you have all had an enjoyable break.

Great news! Our application for a SHIRE Environment Grant has been successful and Newtown Linford Parish Council in partnership with Newtown Linford Biodiversity, have been awarded £591 towards the cost of supply and installation of bat, owl and bird boxes, hedgehog and insect hotels at the three Parish Council maintained sites. This is 75% of the total cost and NLPC will match fund the remaining amount.

We are very grateful for the support we have received from the Leicestershire and Rutland Ornithological Society and the Leicestershire and Rutland Bat Group, who will be installing the bat, bird and owl boxes for us.

Following on from the completion of the Traffic Management Scheme, LCC are carrying out a further informal consultation with residents of Upper Main Street with regards to identifying a possible solution for those properties with limited off road parking. All residents in this area have been given the opportunity to respond and the results of this will determine what happens next. We await to hear.


