This month I start a secondment as the Acting Archdeacon of Loughborough, filling in for three months while Claire Wood is on sabbatical. I'll still be around in my Parishes on Sundays, and to help and support with particular issues – including the ongoing work towards the next phase of re-ordering in church – but by and large from Monday through to Saturday I will be covering the Archdeacon's work.

I blame Newtown Linford. When I arrived in the Combined Parishes eight years ago I had no intention of going anywhere near Archdeacons. My father, who some of you will have met when he's covered services locally, became one shortly before I was ordained and I never fancied the look of the work. However, both of my predecessors as Rector in Newtown Linford are now Archdeacons: Peter Hooper is Archdeacon of France, and I am looking forward to working closely with Richard Worsfold, who is Archdeacon of Leicester. Perhaps it was inevitable that I should follow in their footsteps – though I must emphasise this is only a temporary secondment and I will be handing back to Claire in January.

Archdeacons have been described as "being a good steward so that others are freed to be the worshipping, witnessing and ministering Church' (the Ven. R.L. Ravenscroft in 'The Role of the Archdeacon Today'). They work for the Bishop in supporting and enabling work in Parishes across the Diocese. Rarely in the limelight, theirs is often an administrative or governance role. They have a particular responsibility for buildings, including giving permission for many kinds of minor works, and for clergy, primarily in pastoral support and care but also in handling disciplinary matters. They work with Parishes in vacancy to help make sure ministry and mission continue, as well as guiding recruitment processes. And then there are the hundreds of questions which tend to come their way as they are often called in to help with all the odd and unusual things which arise across the Diocese.

I would appreciate your prayers as I take on this responsibility for the remainder of the year. Having been Assistant Archdeacon for 18 months I have dipped my toe in the water, but this will be full immersion! Here in the Benefice I am extremely grateful to the Wardens who agreed I should take this opportunity on, and to John and Pam, our retired clergy, who with other support will be continuing our ministry. The primary point of contact for enquiries will be the Churches Office, our administrator Hayley Moore (office@bradgatechurches.org.uk).

Newtown Linford Young Wildlife Artist of the Year – WINNER

Congratulations to Annabel Hancock, age 12, who submitted this drawing of a Painted Lady butterfly. The judges were impressed with her careful observation and attention to detail, even including the knapweed it was feeding on. Annabel wrote:

Painted Ladies like dry, open areas but can be seen anywhere in a good year Painted Ladies have a lifespan of 14-28 days They are the world's most widely-distributed butterfly

Annabel will be presented with her certificate soon, and her picture will be on display at our Open Evening on 29th October.

Colouring competition – WINNER Clara W., aged 6, was the winner of our wildlife colouring competition. In second place was Harriet H., aged 5. Congratulations to both.

New Hedgehog Monitoring programme

For the first time, a hedgehog monitoring programme has been set up, as a pilot,

which uses AI to accurately measure hedgehog numbers in different sites across the country. This programme started in 2023 when cameras were set up in 13 different sites. Over the next 2 years the cameras will be increased until 40 different sites are covered. It is planned that, after this 3 year pilot, the sites will be monitored annually and new sites added.

The programme has trail cameras to capture images of hedgehogs (and other wildlife) in different habitats. AI algorithms sort all the images captured, minimising the number of blank or human images and maximising the number of animal images for home-based volunteers, known as "spotters," to identify.

"Spotters" are needed to carry out this stage of the work, which is



described as easy, and involving looking at a sequence of images and tagging the species seen (at home on their own computer). Free training and ID guides are provided on-line. More information can be gained (including how to volunteer to be a "spotter") from <u>www.nhmp.co.uk</u>

It is hoped that this project will give an accurate measure of the numbers of hedgehogs in the different habitats surveyed and results in a robust national estimate. Research has already shown that hedgehog populations have declined by between 30% and 75% in different areas of the countryside since 2000. It is hoped that this monitoring programme will provide insights into the factors causing this decline and lead to practical conservation measures being identified.

Consider making your garden less tidy!

Gardening at this time of year often involves cutting everything back and having a good tidy up as plants die back and lose their flowers and leaves. But a few seed heads, hollow stems and low-lying foliage can provide important habitat with extra food and shelter for many animals over the colder months.


NEWTOWN LINFORD C. C. - END OF SEASON REPORT

I would like to start the end of season report by congratulating Sam Wood, who made his debut for Leicestershire in the County Championship versus Glamorgan at Sofia Gardens, Cardiff. He follows in the footsteps of Tim Mason (England Under 19's, Leicestershire and Essex) and our present captain, Sam Bates (Leicestershire), who have progressed through our junior ranks and into the professional game.

At Club level, success was achieved by both our Mid-Week XI and Under 13 XI. The Mid-Week XI being victorious, comfortably defeating Sileby by ten wickets in the final of the 'Joe Orton Cup'. The Under 13 XI, who won the County Cup, defeating Plumtree in the final.

The First XI had a reasonably successful season, finishing in the top half of the extremely competitive Premier Division of the Everards Leicestershire and Rutland Cricket League. Fred Foulds, a previous resident of the village and ex-player and captain of the Club, kindly donated two new individual trophies for the First XI. Village Archive

Markfield Lane

I have referred to this item on a previous occasion, but it is of such topical interest that I thought I would mention it again. I recently read the article by Councillor David Snartt in the September issue of the Village Magazine, where he states that he is devastated to read that the Planning Case Officer is currently preparing a report with a recommendation of approval for the 115 dwellings on the site adjacent to Markfield Lane.

In this connection it is interesting to read a letter of 26th July 1965 in the archive, from the Minister of Housing and Local Government, expressing a completely different conclusion. A planning application on the same site had been refused by the County Council, and the developers had appealed. The eminent Planning Inspector hearing the appeal said that -

"The area is a rural one and the impact of development on the scale proposed would be marked. There would be a material increase in the traffic both pedestrian and vehicular generated by and attracted to the area to the detriment of the rural character....the site is remote from any established village centre, and it would be wrong to attempt to build up into a community the straggling development which now extends on both sides of the A50".

The Inspector also referred to "a serious hazard involved in crossing, especially for children, on a motorway feeder road" in order to access local services, and he considered that there were "serious planning objections to the development". His conclusions were accepted by the Minister at the time, and the appeal was dismissed.

I understand that under the new application a proposed new entrance to the site would now bring all of the extra traffic on to Markfield Lane.

It seems that various building firms have been attempting to build on this site for 60 years!

Planning Application P/22/1031/2.

I have been corresponding with the Case Officer at Charnwood Borough Council about the latest position with the planning application for 115 dwellings south of Markfield Lane. The latest response I have received is that: Ongoing discussions are currently taking place about the pedestrian/cycle track and I do not have an expected Plans Committee date at the moment.

Kick Start Market.

A special market day set up for new traders and budding entrepreneurs is returning to Loughborough Town Centre on Sunday 20th October, 10am to 4pm. The initiative is being organised by Charnwood Borough Council's Markets Team. The successful pilot event held in May was aimed specifically at young people, but this time around, the upper age



limit has been removed to enable anyone to get involved.

Protect your bike from theft

If you've ever had your bicycle stolen, you'll know how upsetting it can be. Our practical tips will help keep your bike safe and out of the hands of thieves – and also advise on how to get it back if it is stolen.

The most important things to remember are, double lock your bike and register the frame number.

Ten ways to protect your bike

Follow these 10 tips to ensure your bike remains safe, secure and not a statistic.

1. Double lock it

Using two locks slows thieves down and makes your bike less of a target. Use two quality locks, at least one of which is a D-lock. Thieves are less likely to carry multiple tools, so use two different types of lock if possible.

2. Lock the lot

Lock the frame and both wheels to a secure cycle stand.

3. Secure it

Secure your bike as close to the stand as possible to give any thieves little or no room to manoeuvre.

4. Take removable parts with you

Take parts that are easy to remove with you, such as wheels, lights, baskets or the saddle. Or use locking skewers or nuts which can increase security by securing the bike's components to the frame permanently.

5. Park securely

Lock your bike at recognised secure cycle parking. It should be well lit and covered by CCTV.

6. Register it

Register your frame number on www.bikeregister.com approved by <u>Secured by Design</u>. The frame number is usually found underneath the bike between the pedals or where the back wheel slots in. If your bike is ever stolen and recovered by the police, it can be traced back to you.

7. Mark it

Get your bike security marked. It's a highly effective, visible deterrent to bike thieves. They know that if they are caught with a registered bike, the owner can be traced and they will be arrested. Security marking products can be found at <u>Secured by Design</u>.

8. Remember safety begins at home

Take the same care to lock your bike securely at home as you would on the street. Avoid advertising that you have a bike at home, for example, by removing car roof racks, and creating 'privacy zones' on apps like Strava to avoid disclosing your location.

9. Check ownership

Ask for proof of ownership and check the bike frame number on national bike registration databases approved by <u>Secured by Design</u>.

10. Act fast

If your bike has been stolen, contact us as soon as possible by reporting online at <u>www.leics.police.uk/ro/report/ocr/af/how-to-report-a-crime/</u> Give us your frame number, cycle database number, a photo and any other details and make sure you update the status on the cycle database where you registered it. The sooner we know, the sooner we can act, which might stop it being sold on.

It's been a busy month or so for the Parish Council and there's lots to update you on....

Land at Markfield Lane Bridge

You may recall NLPC had resolved to investigate the possibility of applying for Adverse Possession of a small piece of land at the Markfield Lane bridge, close to the junction with Main Street. The application process for adverse possession is complicated and required the advice of a solicitor.

Upon meeting with the Parish Council's solicitor, we were advised our application would take approximately 2 years to be considered and it was highly unlikely it would be successful. Alternatively, the Parish Council could consider registering the land as a Village Green. However, after further consideration, particularly in relation to the responsibilities of a riparian land owner, NLPC decided not to pursue the idea any further.

Village Hall Noticeboard

Following the temporary repairs to the much-dilapidated noticeboard outside the Village Hall, Councillors resolved to purchase a replacement aluminium noticeboard. Unfortunately, the price of noticeboards has meant a smaller 2 door version has been chosen, as the difference in price was considerable. The new noticeboard is dark green in colour and has a magnetic interior, eliminating the need for drawing pins. The 2 x A2 display cases will hold 8 x A4 posters. We hope the new noticeboard will be installed within the next two months. The cost is £815.

Tree Works

Tree works identified during our Duty of Care tree inspection carried out in May, will be taking place from week commencing 11th November. Our 3 yearly tree inspection identified 3 large ash trees all with ash dieback disease and in need felling. Our budget for tree works this year was £1000. However, due to the tree fells, this has come in at £2500 which is a considerable overspend for a small Parish but one that is necessary.

On with more news....

Bob Bown Memorial Field

- Due to budget constraints, improvement works to the Bob Bown Play Park have been halted. We hope to resume our programme of replacement park equipment next financial year, subject to a budget review in preparation for setting the precept in January.
- For now, the equipment in the park may be sparse since the removal of old apparatus but it is safe and that is our priority.

Cemetery and Churchyard

- Memorial Headstone Inspections have now been carried out at both the Cemetery and Churchyard. Thank you to everyone for your understanding.
- The good news is, the Churchyard is in very good condition and works were identified to just 6 memorials, all of which required immediate attention. You may have seen a cordon in place around one very large headstone and I'm pleased to say the work has now been carried out to make the memorials safe.

As expected, there were a large num-

ber of memorials at the Cemetery which failed the inspection. Out of respect to the families of loved ones buried at our Cemetery, no memorials were laid flat.

- In 2000, legislation was brought in requiring all headstones of a certain height to be fitted with a ground anchor to prevent toppling incidents. The issue of memorial safety was brought to a head following cases where memorials toppled over and caused injuries, sometimes fatal, to members of the public. In particular, the death of a child in Yorkshire in 2000 highlighted the problem of unstable memorials. As the burial authority for Newtown Linford, NLPC have a responsibility to ensure our Cemetery and Churchyard are safe places for the public to visit.
- The first section inspected this year, section A, holds the oldest memorial stones in the Cemetery, some of which date back to the 1960s and therefore, did not have ground anchors fitted. In total, 27 memorials were found to require ground anchors and 3 required recementing. Only a small number of the identified memorials have registered grave owners known to us, all of whom were contacted during the inspection, however, NLPC resolved at a



meeting to fund all repairs necessary and will also honour this decision when section B is inspected next year. The total cost of all repairs at both the Cemetery and Churchyard is $\pounds7904$ and this will come out of our general reserves.

Over the last 5 years, through careful planning, we have secured a general reserves level of 12 months running costs, which is the maximum a Council can hold and puts the Council in a strong position for situations such as this, where additional funds are required over and above the budget. The very minimum level the Council should hold in general reserves is 3 months running costs. I am currently in the process of preparing next year's budget and am confident we will carry forward 8 to 9 months running costs into the new financial year, despite these additional and in some cases, unexpected, costs.

Moving forwards and taking into account both legislative requirements relating to cemetery memorials and the impact ash dieback could have on trees in our care, we will budget an amount per year to earmark towards future memorial inspections and tree works etc. which occur once every 3 years or more.
