Surely they deserved more – they'd been there all day, after all! It isn't fair!

Jofra Archer's inclusion in the final squad upset some people – it just didn't seem fair that he came in and took that spot at the last minute. Jesus' story seems to be a bit unfair too.

But Jesus is saying that it's a good thing God isn't fair! We don't always get what we deserve, instead we get what he is generous and kind enough to give us, which is far more than we deserve!

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From The Park

Whilst the rain in June seems to have been relentless, so has activity by staff and volunteers.

Our work at Swithland Wood continues, with the constant work to get the messages across about the conservation value of the Wood. The Young Rangers have



also been working in the wood adding new 'natural' benches and seating, and this will continue. It looks great and we have received support from the Leicestershire Ramblers for this in addition to the support of Swithland Show for the work of the Young Rangers in general.

The Ranger team have been working with Leicestershire County Council's Rights of Way team to remove stiles and improve access with new gates. When this project is complete, we will have created stile-free walking routes from Newtown Linford to Anstey, Cropston and Swithland, which is of huge benefit to those walkers of a certain age who are reasonably fit but struggle to get over stiles like we used to. This has already had great feedback on social media from local visitors.

The Park has seen a great few months of work, with drystone walling and conservation tasks by Rangers and volunteers moving our Parkland Management Plan on. The Plan can now be found on our website, along with the Woodland Management Plan.

We have had a lot of interest in the media about the Park and Wood. This has included not just local but national coverage. Journalists are admitting they are looking for non-Brexit news. It has been a way for us to get conservation messages across around historic ways of restoring boundary walls, potential damage that can be caused by den-building and fire, and also increasing anti-social behaviour in car parks. We have also had many positive stories such as Wildlife Weekend, our Poet in Residence, Heart Safe Park and events.

Our events continue to enjoy a strong profile with most selling out. Our feedback is great online and from visitors on the day. We are getting great visitor engagement and with volunteers now contributing to our Facebook feed through the #ExploreShareInspire project. We are finding people across the Globe commenting on how they appreciate this. We are also seeing more regular online donations – a case of every little helps.

And finally...

I have been Director of the Bradgate Park Trust since October 2012, only the fourth person to do the job (and the first to have that title) since the Trust was founded in 1928 and the time has now come to move on to pastures new. It has been a huge privilege to lead such a dedicated team of staff and, since 2015, volunteers. During the time that I have been here, the Trust's income has increased by 70%, tearoom income has more than doubled and parking income has increased by nearly 40%, despite all-day parking and season tickets being cheaper than they were in 2001. Our grants and fundraising income has grown from nothing to over £70,000 per year and the value of our venison sales has more than trebled. The staff team has nearly doubled in size and we now have a professional senior management team and a coherent staffing structure. Over the same period, our Council funding has declined by 76% but we have achieved the transition to financial self-sufficiency. In 2017 we published the Trust's first ever Strategic Plan. On the Park, the dominance of bracken has been addressed leading to measurable improvements in biodiversity, and our remarkable collection of veteran trees is getting the care and attention it deserves, almost entirely from an upskilled Ranger team. The opening of our remarkable Visitor Centre by Sir David Attenborough in 2016 has led to a revolution in the way in which we engage with our visitors, and the work of our Community Champions means that the Trust has now extended its work beyond the Park gates. The support of the Heritage Lottery Fund has enabled us to develop an education programme that is able to offer more children than ever before some truly memorable experiences, and the #ExploreShareInspire and #BradgateInspires programmes have delivered high quality learning and creative activities to adults, children and families. The development of our first holistic Parkland Plan in 2014 included a series of archaeological surveys that led to the excavation in 2014/15 of one of the most important Late Upper Palaeolithic sites ever discovered in the UK and to the University of Leicester's Bradgate Field-School, which has transformed our understanding of the Park's past and the ways in which we talk about it to the public.

I know that there are those who wish that these changes had never happened and that the Park had remained like it was in years gone by. That is simply not possible for two reasons. Firstly, the cost of running the Park, even without all the additional activities we now do, far exceeds the funding we receive from local government and in conservation and land management grants. Our local authority funding has declined in real terms by 95% since its peak in 1995 and by 76% since I arrived in 2012. It has been one of those situations in which doing nothing simply is not an option. The Trust has had to move from a position in 1995 where 54% of its income came from local government to the situation today where the Councils contribute less than 2% of the total and 80% of our income comes from our visitors.

The second reason is more philosophical: Charles Bennion established the Trust in 1928 and charged it with "the provision of a public park and recreation ground, and the maintenance and improvement thereof, for the benefit of the inhabitants of the County of Leicestershire, and of visitors thereto, with the object of improving the conditions of life for such persons". There is no justification in these words for keeping the Park for the benefit of a select few and not welcoming all who wish to visit. Obviously with an attraction that welcomes in excess of 500,000 visitors a year there are going to be unwanted side-effects. This is where our local authority partners could reasonably be expected to take more of a leadership role. Figures we commissioned last year show that Bradgate Park generates over £11 million each year for the local economy and supports the equivalent of over 140 full-time jobs. That is an awful lot of local tax revenue, some of which could be reasonably spent in sorting out issues like on-street parking once and for all.

On a personal note, I am off to Wales to take up a new challenge as Chief Executive of the Centre for Alternative Technology. As well as being a remarkable visitor attraction, the role at CAT offers the opportunity to take a leadership role in the fight against climate change and to get involved in more media work, lobbying and activism, all of which suit someone with an inability to keep his mouth shut.

As I sign off for the last time, I should like to thank you for welcoming me as part of the Newtown Linford community and wish you all the best for the future. I should particularly like to thank Carole Heubeck, who produces this wonderful, vibrant Magazine each month, for making space available for my ramblings and for putting up with my somewhat haphazard approach to deadlines for the past six-and-a-bit years. **Peter Tyldesley, Director Bradgate Park**

Newtown Brownies - Teddy Bears Picnic


On the 3rd of June all of the Brownies went to Brown Owl's house for a Teddy Bear's picnic. I took two teddy bears which were called Ding and Dong.

Climate Change

On Wednesday 5th June Newtown Linford's Church Bible Study Group met to discuss how Christians should respond to climate change. As I have been an environmental enthusiast since 1997 (22 years) I was asked to lead the meeting.

Climate change has recently become a newsworthy topic and the meeting began with a lively discussion on the causes of climate change, moving on to some Biblical references of God as the creator of the world and humans as stewards of that creation. Much of the following animated discussion was concerned with what we should be doing about the effect of the warming climate. The following ideas were put forward.

Energy – change to green energy, turn the thermostat down, don't waste heat- close doors and windows, change bulbs to LEDs and don't keep unnecessary lights on, dry clothes outside, less grass cutting, turn standby off.

Transport - travel less and walk or cycle more. Fly less.

Consumption – buy less, buy second hand, repair, buy without plastic bags.

Food – Don't waste food – eat everything you buy, eat less meat, home grown veg, think where your food is coming from (avoid food using air transport)

Population - Reduce family size.

These ideas and many more need further exploration. If anyone in the village is interested at looking at how we can change our behaviour in response to climate change I would be happy to run a 7 week course (Footpaths) which I helped to write with others from Transition Leicester 8 years ago.

Butterflies of Charnwood Forest

On Monday 29th May, Prebendary Canon John Woolmer gave a superbly illustrated talk in Woodhouse Eaves Village Hall on the butterflies which can be found in Charnwood Forest, in our gardens and a bit further afield in the Midlands. He apparently rediscovered a childhood interest in butterflies when taking a group of non-cricketers from Winchester College, where he taught mathematics, to a woodland area, and has been studying them ever since. John's wife Jane, one of Newtown Linford's churchwardens, had among many other things taken a photographic course, and they combined their skills to photograph butterflies in many parts of the world (usually where John was doing some short term mission work invariably good places for butterflies - rural Zambia, much of East Africa, Argentina and Papua New Guinea). They have photographs of all English species (not all photographed in UK) and many European species.

His talk began with a series of images dealing with the development sequence of butterflies, from eggs through caterpillars to pupae and then the insects. His images of butterflies emerging from the chrysalis were amazing. John dealt with most of the species that can be found in the Forest and then in our gardens – it seems to be essential to cultivate nettles for many species! We learnt that global warming has one positive advantage in that some species are moving northwards and more varieties of butterflies can now be seen round here than used to be the case. John has published widely and had copies of his book *The Grand Surprise* – *Butterflies and the Kingdom of God* available for sale to raise money for Newtown Linford Church.

Please note that John is giving a similar talk as part of a celebratory weekend, Butterflies and Flowers, in the Village Church on Friday 5th July, which will also include teas on Saturday and Songs of Praise on Sunday. If you missed his talk, do come along then.

Visit to Kirby Muxloe castle

Our guide was Pete Liddle, the very knowledgeable former county archivist for Leicestershire, who had made a study of the castle. Not only was he able to detail the history of its building, but, with the help of the building accounts, actually knew the names of the workmen who were involved. In those days, when a thousand pounds was considered a sum which we today would equate to a billion, master craftsmen were paid 8d a day, whilst labourers got 4d. Some things never change.

The politics of the day seems to have been clouded by personalities, perhaps even more so than today. Rather than political parties, it was a question of families and one's loyalty to which family which governed your position and prospects. As long as 'your' family was in the ascendency you were OK and could even prosper. If not, the consequences could be dire, exile being the least you could expect. Pete Liddle found from the accounts that building work on the castle had not stopped the day that the owner, William, Lord Hastings, was dragged from a council meeting and beheaded in 1483, but continued for another two years, until the money ran out.

The site of the castle was originally occupied by a manor house dating from two centuries before the castle was conceived. There is evidence that, even while the castle was being built, the old house was being repaired, which suggest that the 'castle' was a sort of more advanced fortified manor house in a way. Despite the lose of the head, it is possible that the Hastings family continued to occupy the site for two more centuries, judging by surviving correspondence. Unfortunately the record of the progress of the work stops with the accounts, and, with the destruction of much of the works over the years after the dwelling was abandoned, it is now not possible to say how much of the fortifications were completed, and how much moth-balled for future work which never took place. The one thing which we know to have been complete was the moat, home now to flotilla of Canada geese.

The decline of the castle after it was disposed of by the Hastings is not well documented. At one point it was part of a farm. By the twentieth century it was in the hands of officialdom, which carried out essential repairs. One of these repairs obscures a magnificent vaulted ceiling of brick in the main entrance, which is still the old gate-house. Other places clearly show up in modern brick. However, the chief point of interest these days seems to be the arrangements for the disposal of human 'waste', which was funnelled into two small chambers beside the moat, into which their contents had to be shovelled, presumably by miscreants.

One last point – the gun 'port-holes' even now guard the bridge, in the site of the old draw-bridge. It may still be unwise to invade the place. **Dr D McNeil**

July is a great time to visit gardens when they are in full bloom. Every time you visit a garden which opens under the National Garden Scheme, you are donating to nursing and cancer charities. Last year over £3.1m was donated by the NGS .

Opening at the beginning of the month on the 3rd July, also the 10th,

17th.24th and 31st is the lovely garden at Stoke Albany House (LE16 8PT) 4 acres of country house garden with sweeping lawns, mature trees and colourful herbaceous borders. In July many of the scented roses will be in bloom. There is also a parterre, Mediterranean garden, heated greenhouse, water gardens and plenty of relaxing places to sit and enjoy the garden views.

The weekend of 6th & 7th July is busy for Wigston gardeners (LE18) a



group who open their very varied gardens starting with the unique wildlife garden at 7 Little Dale on the 6th. It is a maturing wildlife friendly garden with a meadow lawn, and a new wildlife pond. Entry to this garden includes a visit to the nearby 28 Gladstone Street, a town garden divided into gardening rooms, including a pond, unusual perennials, David Austin scented roses, a shade garden and Hosta theatre.

On the 7th July 7 Little Dale opens again together with 40 Rolleston Road, a nearby town garden with a willow arbour, mixed beds, a scented archway and borders packed with colourful plants. Both of these gardens are wheelchair and dog friendly.

Take a look at allotments and get tips on how to grow your own veg by





visiting the Harborough Allotments (LE16 9BB) opening on the 7th July. There are two allotment sites: Stevens St with over 130 plots growing all types of veg, fruit & flowers, ponds, wild life area & small orchards. Northampton Rd is has 50 plots with polytunnel. There will be a demonstration of compost making and chance to meet with allotment holders who are

happy to give advice. There are some unusual veg on display such as cucamelon. different types of squashes, older and heritage varieties of vegetables together with companion planting. In addition there is a community Poly tunnel with shared planting. There are



wide paths and the sites are wheelchair accessible.

There are a total of 7 Gardens opening on the 7th July at Willoughby (LE8 6UH) with many different gardens to enjoy. Farmway is a mature plant lover's garden with views across Leicestershire. John's Wood is garden designed to attract a wildlife including wild flower areas and a large pond, all are a haven for butterflies. 1 Church Farm Lane is a well-stocked, medium sized garden, with lots of interest including mixed borders of trees, roses, shrubs, herbaceous perennials and climbers. Tubs, troughs and baskets add a splash of colour and summer colour.

2 Church Lane also has fruit and vegetable areas. Kapalua has colourful borders backing onto open land with lovely views and this lovely lush planted seating area.

High Meadow garden has mixed perennial borders, a lovely shepherd's hut, quiet seating areas and a backdrop of open views. Nearby 3 Orchard Road is a pretty south facing garden.

These are just a few of our open gardens which offer many different gardening experiences to our visitors. There is tea and homemade cake on sale and you can be assured of a warm welcome.

Bob Bown Playing Fields – As with the cemetery mentioned later in this copy the Councillors are considering additional cuts to keep the grass tidy. Maintenance work has been carried out to secure one of the waste bins.

Traffic Enforcement Officers – The officers continue to attend as arranged. This being paid for by the Parish Council and the Bradgate Park Trust.
