

oin the sona Why is it that some things stick in our memories? I cannot claim to have the greatest memory in the world - I am shortly off to a re-union of the staff of the hotel I worked in thirty years ago. I am very tempted to suggest we all wear name badges as I am certain that I won't be able to remember half the names, let alone put them to the very changed faces. But there are some things which stick; for me, sometimes completely random facts and or information. And sometimes songs. Recently our community hosted nostalgic evenings of music. Why is it that we can forget a name or a face, yet seem to remember the melody and lyrics of a song from 30 years ago without flaw?

I find that with hymns and songs at Church. There are Sundays when trying to choose something both appropriate and familiar seems impossible, 'we haven't sung that for a year!' comes the complaint, 'We don't know it!'. Yet all we need to hear is the opening chord of 'Hark the her-

ald angels' or that solitary voice with the first note of 'Once in royal David's city' and the whole carol is there entire with us, despite the twelve months that have passed since it last was on our lips.

Something about these carols finds deep roots in us. Maybe partly it is iust the repetition – some of them have been sung every year of our life. Or maybe it is that they contain such profound messages of meaning which is often absent from our day-to



-day life, of peace and hope and joy, of a Saviour, a God who loves us enough to give himself to us and for us, that we cannot help but join the song of the angels: a Saviour is born! Peace on earth, goodwill to all. So make sure this year you take the chance to join the song at a Carol Service, Crib Service, Christmas Communion, online or onsite. Happy Christmas!

The visit from our celebrity in October gave us a wonderful evening. There was a packed house to hear Troy Scott-Smith tell us about the wonderful gardens with which he has been involved. We welcomed over 30 visitors from other local Gardening Clubs and entertained them with glasses of wine and soft drinks.

Troy told us about the projects in which he has been involved at three famous gardens. The first was at Courts Garden in Wiltshire which he helped to renovate for the National Trust to bring it up to standard for visitors to enjoy. From there he moved to be head gardener at Bodnant in North Wales. The most major task he faced was to renovate the famous laburnum walk which is a cascade of yellow in the spring. It required major work to deal with trees which were tired and needed renovating and a structure to support them creating the long pergola through which visitors can walk.

The final garden was the one with which he is most associated, Sissinghurst in Kent. The challenge he constantly faces is keeping the garden faithful to the legacy of Vita Sackville-West and Harold Nicholson while also adapting it to the modern age. Again, this involved major structural work and the redesigning



of the Delos Garden which Vita and Harold created after spending time on the island of Delos in Greece.

This was an excellent way to draw our season to a close with only the Christmas Party in December to come and then, of course, to look forward to our programme for 2024.

Open Evening

Our guest speaker, Dr Jack Matthews, delivered a fascinating presentation about Charnwood Forest Geopark, and explained why the geology of Charnwood is so special and globally-significant. The region is home to a number of rare fossils, including Bradgatia linfordensis, which represent some of the oldest evidence of animal life in the world.



It was an absorbing and informative talk. Thank you, Jack, and all who came along to the event. There was an opportunity afterwards for people to have a chat over refreshments, purchase greetings cards and look at photographs and other material illustrating the work of the biodiversity group in the parish.



He was going to use the Village Hall for a quick pit-stop. Hannah asked that the details were not posted to social media and only shared locally with fellow residents. Vernon ran/walked 116 miles over 4 days between Leicester's Victoria Park and Bolton.



It went very well with the school and residents who came out to cheer him on his journey.

Vernon said "The best part of the challenge has been seeing everyone out on the streets, whooping and cheering, that has just been amazing." He has raised more than £5 million so far!

Gardening Volunteers Opportunity at Newtown Linford Primary School

We are hoping to set up a Gardening Group of volunteers to work with the school staff and children to help us with the gardens at school. This is a long term project for the ongoing planting, upkeep and maintenance of the gardens and we are looking for some volunteers to help us with it.

Who Can Volunteer?

Anyone can volunteer to help - it could be parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles - anyone who is able to help with planting, weeding, watering and the ongoing care of a vegetable garden, a wildlife area and lots of planters. We are also extending this out to the community, so if you have a neighbour or friend who may be interested please let them know.

What Are The Requirements?

People with a few hours to spare in school time to assist with the maintenance, watering and weeding, this doesn't have to be consistent each week as some weeks there might not be much to do. Ideally we will be able to form a core of regular volunteers and a group of occasional weeders & waterers. We would like a few people who would like to be a bit more involved to help with planning and sourcing items. You don't have to be involved with the planning elements if you would prefer to be a weeding & watering volunteer, everyone will be welcome.

What Will I Be Doing?

The Volunteer Gardening Group will work with the Children's Gardening Group and the school staff to create and maintain the areas around school. This won't include mowing the grass, cutting the hedges or maintaining the trees! You could just help on either the vegetable plot or flowers if you prefer to focus in one area. We would like to plant a mixture of flowers, bulbs, vegetables and fruit. The vegetables and fruit will be harvested by the children and used in cookery lessons, they will be able to bring the food they make home. THE FRIENDS OF CHARNWOOD FOREST




This month's talk to the Friends of the Charnwood Forest was entitled 'Keeping our River Clean; the Work of the Trent River Trust', given by two members of that Trust, which is a charitable organisation. They were Louise Richmond and Nicholas Wilding. Louise started by giving us a general overview of the problems which the trust was addressing. Generally, these fell into two categories – pollution and flooding, the latter being responsible for soil erosion as well as distributing polluting chemicals widely.

The most common pollutant from farming activity was triallate, which is used on corn, followed by meloprop and flufenalet, the last being a rat poison. This last peaked in January and has increased rapidly in the last few years. Of the large number of pesticide pollutants, glyphosphate was probably the most easy to remove, and metaldehyde among the more difficult. Advising farmers of methods to improve a more even distribution of pesticides and to reduce ploughing improved the situation, rainwater being responsible for washing topsoil and the pollutants into the rivers. Soil erosion was a serious problem – it takes years to form and can be washed away in minutes.

To improve biodiversity, grasslands, margins and banks provided areas for flowering plants, whilst particular crops improved bee and bird feeding habitants in the autumn, and bird food in the spring. Drought resistance was also a good thing. Farmers' co-operation saved money on purification.

Nicholas then took us through various methods, well illustrated, of reducing floods. Essentially there were three methods he described; these were a sort of dam, wetlands and ponds which held water back and stopped extra large volumes getting into rivers after heavy rainfall. He emphasised that the methods were natural processes and were coping with increases in bad weather recently, due to global warming. He illustrated his point with the picture of a tractor driving through a flood, causing a bow-wave which flooded local houses. Planting willow trees along the banks of rivers bound the soil and stopped it being eroded. Ponds, either connected directly to a river, or not, could hold large quantities of water, which reduced the flow in the river, and collected sediment. Constructed ponds about one metre deep could act as pasture land for cattle when the water had dried out or was removed by a drain.



Wetland could be formed by lowering the riverbank at certain points. Straightening channel did reduce the danger of flooding in some places by removing water more quickly, but may then cause flooding further downstream. Weirs and dams prevented fish migrations and were being removed where practical, though under licence.

He described various places and works in which the trust had been involved. One particular example he gave, was a fallen tree across a brook. If the sides of the brook were dug out and the trunk lowered, it would act as a breakwater. There would be a gap under the trunk for water and fish to pass through, and one or more trunks above to hold flood water back. Also, a pond could be constructed to the side of the breakwater to hold excess. It was a very informative talk.



Information From David Snartt. Charnwood Borough Councillor - Forest Bradgate Ward.

Planning Application for Solar Farm.

I have now received information about a proposal to construct a 49.9MW Solar Farm with battery storage, facility with associated access, land-scaping and infrastructure, on land adjacent to Charley Road, Ulverscroft. I understand at this time of writing the planning application is invalid, but already over 100 representations/objections have been received by Charnwood Borough Council.

From the information supplied, the proposal will see the installation of photo-voltaic panels, energy storage container units, transformer/inverter units and a control/substation building. Photo-voltaic panels will generate electrical energy for export to the national grid.

I have had concerns raised from residents about this application, especially the impact this will have on the landscape at this sensitive area of Charnwood Forest. If you are minded to submit your representations about this proposal, the information can be found on the Charnwood Borough Council's website under planning application P/23/2029/2. I will keep you updated as this application progresses through the planning process.

Charnwood Forest Geopark.

After attending meetings about Charnwood Forest becoming a Geopark, I thought you may be interested in a few details, especially about the new website. I am grateful to Dr Jack Matthews, Geo Heritage Officer, who provided the information to share with residents

Geoparks are areas of outstanding geology that are used by local communities, alongside their cultural and natural heritage, to promote sustainable economic development, conservation and education.

Charnwood Forest has a geological story that dates back nearly 600 million years and home to



some of the oldest animal fossils ever described. The Charnwood Forest Geopark, supported by the Charnwood Forest Landscape Partnership Scheme, will be working with partners, communities and businesses across the region to celebrate and promote learning about our unique heritage, support sustainable geotourism and protect local sites. It is hoped that in the coming years an application will be submitted to become a UNESCO Global Geopark.

Right Stuff, Right Bin.

A campaign has been launched to help Charnwood residents recycle more. Charnwood Borough Council, which collects recycling from 77,000 homes in the Borough, has launched 'Right Stuff, Right Bin', a campaign to help residents increase their knowledge around recycling to ensure their efforts do not go to waste. Around 40 tonnes of waste are ending up in the wrong bins each week in Charnwood, sometimes this can lead to recycling going to landfill.

The campaign will share key information and offer top tips to give residents the confidence to recycle right. The campaign will also highlight some of the common items in the household which end up in the black bin but are recyclable. Items include: Clean aluminium foil: Empty aerosol cans: Clear plastic bags (including bread and vegetable bags): Plastic cellophane and cling film.

Each week, around 325 tonnes of recycling is collected. However, on occasions a lorry load of recycling can be rejected due to it being contaminated by non-recyclable and dirty materials such as, food, nappies and textiles.
