Lent begins on Wednesday 14 February. It's going to be a slightly difficult day for some Christians who will be torn between the desire to keep the tradition of Lent as a time of giving up things, and the almost equal tradition of marking Valentine's Day with food and chocolate!

So let me offer you an alternative. Rather than giving up something for Lent this year, why not try a different kind of discipline: doing something good or kind for someone else, every day? There are 40 days of Lent, ending on Good Friday, 30 March. So over the seven weeks you could help over 40 people if you did something kind each day. I must confess this isn't my idea. There's a website devoted to helping people do exactly this, www.40acts.org.uk

Here's an example of an idea from last year:

We've come to expect bargains. And we love a 'two for one' or a 'buy one get one free'. But how often do we use them as an opportunity to share with others?

Choose how you'll complete today's act:

Head to the supermarket, stock up on BOGOFs, and start handing them out to everyone you see: 'Hey, I just got this for free and I don't need it — want it?' A bar of chocolate, a bottle of water, a newspaper, a concert ticket, gift vouchers for the cinema — take your pick.

Don't wait for the offer; buy it yourself. Get the next person in line a coffee/sandwich/pint along with your order. Or, pay for a bus ticket for the person behind you.

It does us good sometimes to give up something we've come to rely on – whether that's coffee, or chocolate, or alcohol – but sometimes what will help us grow isn't giving up things, it's doing something new. What I keep coming back to is this thought:

God has been generous to me, all that I have comes from his kindness. What am I giving to other people? How do I reflect the kindness I see in God through Jesus?




NIGHT OUT!



From the Park

As I write this, the days are beginning to get perceptibly longer as we approach the old pagan festival of Imbolc at the beginning of February (celebrated by Christians as Candlemas) which marked the half-way point between the shortest day and the spring equinox. Having had the disruption



Despite the poor weather, the deer are in good shape with a generous fat cover seen on the carcasses of culled animals. In this respect deer are unlike sheep and cattle, where fat is 'marbled' through the muscle tissue and a fat animal yields fatty meat. No matter how fat a deer is, venison is always a remarkably lean meat as all the fat lies on the outside of the muscle and can be trimmed off. We have traditionally fed the deer hay in winter alongside their high-energy concentrated feed but this year we have changed to silage as a result of the experience of other deer parks and this seems to have gone down well.

The wet weather has affected our woodland work and we have had to bring the horses from Total Tree Services back to Swithland Wood to extract timber from areas where it has been impossible to take a tractor without causing serious damage. Our volunteers have been busy clearing brambles from recently cut coppice areas and around the new trees that have been planted to thicken the understorey in these areas and will soon move onto planting this year's quota of trees, which are being provided by the Woodland Trust.

On the Park, the usual winter job of tarmac repairs on the main carriageway has been taking place, once again emphasising how varied the life and skill set of a Park Ranger is.

We are aiming to publish the 2018 Events Programme in time for February half-term. This year's highlights will include the Bradgate Proms on Saturday 18th August with the Folk Picnic on Sunday 19th. Early Bird tickets for both these events were released at the beginning of January and are selling fast.

Having worked with Chapterhouse Theatre since 2013, this year we will be trying something different in the form of outdoor cinema as part of the Summer Nights Film Festival that takes place across some of the finest historic locations in England.

Following the success of the 2017 Queen of Bradgate season and capitalising on the interest in Lady Jane Grey stimulated by the recent three-part BBC4 documentary, we will once again be running a series of Queen of Bradgate events to celebrate Leicestershire's other royal con-

nection.

As usual, the first event of the season will be the annual Bradgate Lecture, which this year will take place on Wednesday 21st February in the village hall when Peter Liddle will talk about the exciting archaeological discoveries made during the latest season of the Bradgate Field school. The lecture starts at 7.30pm and admission costs £3 for adults and £1.50 concessions.

There is a Public Meeting in the Village Hall on Thursday 1st February to discuss the issues around parking in the Village. Having recently discovered an article that I wrote for this magazine in 2014 in which I said "If the new restrictions are approved - and then enforced – there is no reason why traffic congestion caused by visitors to the Park should not be a thing of the past." It is clear that my optimism was perhaps a little premature but I am still firmly of the view that the solution to our parking problems lies in a comprehensive approach to parking restrictions backed up by effective enforcement. We are not in a unique situation in Newtown Linford: there are examples all over the country of large visitor attractions and rural communities existing side-by-side without residents' lives being blighted by illegal and inconsiderate parking.

As the days lengthen and the snowdrops push their heads towards the low winter sun, I look forward to seeing you on the Park. **Peter Tyldesley**

STAG'S HEAD SCULPTURE

Hopefully, by now, you will all know that the old dead oak tree stump on the left hand grass verge, when heading towards Anstey, will be carved into a tasteful and symbolic Stag's Head.

At the Thursday coffee and cakes morning on 11th January Peter Leadbeater, the sculptor, explained to over 40 villagers how the tree will be carved, and he also answered questions. You can see on the sketch how imposing the stag's head will appear in profile, and it will be looking slightly towards Anstey. The actual sculpture will be influenced by the grainflow and a couple of soft spots will need to

Peter, and his assistant, are planning to start the carving in the second week of March. The outer surface will be treated with preservative and it is recommended that this treatment is repeated on a four monthly cycle. With good care the carving will last from 30 to 50 years.

I have a target of £2700 of which £2500 is the cost of the sculpture. Thank you all for your donations and enthusiasm for the project. We have also received a generous donation of £1000 from the Friends of Charnwood Forest and together with the £124 from the raffle we are now within £400 of the target. All the prizes

at the coffee morning raffle had been donated, thank you for making it such a successful and friendly event.

Our next fund raising event is "Music and Puddings" at the Village Hall on Friday 9th February at 7pm with music by the N'Ukes, Leicester's Premier Ukelele Group. Tickets are only £8 and available from myself Dick Howard 01530 245373. This will be a good fun, café style evening. Please support this final push to reach our target.

GONE WITH THE WIND; the lost Windmills of Leicestershire

TALK BY Mark Temple

MONDAY 19th February 2018 WOODHOUSE EAVES VILLAGE HALL at 7.30pm

At one time every family's diet included bread which relied on a constant supply of fresh flour. So virtually every village had a mill of some sort, a watermill if there was a suitable stream, or if not, a windmill was placed on an elevated position where its sails could catch the wind. At their peak in 1835 there were believed to be 152 mills in Leicestershire, and many were locally such as Woodhouse Eaves, Markfield, Mountsorrel, Shepshed etc. Mark has tried to gather together all the photographic images that have survived and has also made a collection of milling stories. He knows of the existence of many mills but as far as he knows their images have been lost.

From The Records

There have been many discussions regarding the current traffic and parking problems in the village. Some have said it is due to the expanding range of events the Park now has to hold to attract visitors to cover running costs, others the sheer growth of the population, number of visitors and the growing popularity of exercise, not just walking, but increasing numbers running, jogging and cycling in the Park.

Thinking of the present traffic proposals and our public meeting, over 30 years ago, the Parish Council was informing us in the Church Magazine (August 1986) that their recommendations for parking restrictions had been accepted by the County Council with one alteration. After consultation with the Police, the County Council felt that it would be more practical and effective if the restriction line on the Groby Lane service road is on the side of the houses with parking against the wall.

Ironically almost 30 years later, yellow lines were put down apart from a few parking bays with 30 minute parking restrictions, because residents had difficulty driving out of their drives due to vehicles parked opposite on such a narrow road. 9 months later, in May 1987, the Parish Council noted that we were a step closer to parking restrictions on Sundays and Bank Holidays. We have been fighting for parking restrictions/parking bays now on Grey Crescent for almost 2 years and at this stage are not much further forward. Lets hope things can move forward soon.

In the May edition was also the Vicar's Dilemma

If his address is a few minutes longer than usual: He sends us to sleep

If its short: he hasn't bothered

If he raises his voice: he's shouting

If he speaks normally: you cant hear a thing

If he is away: he's always on the road

23 If he stays at home: he's a stick in the mud

If he is out visiting: he's never at home

If he's in the vicarage: he never visits his parishioners

If he talks finance: he's too fond of money If he doesn't: nobody knows what he is up to

If he organises a bazaar: he's wearing everybody out

If he doesn't: the Parish is dead

If he takes time with people: he goes on and on

If he's brief: he never listens

If he redecorates the Church: he's spending too much money

If he doesn't: he's letting everything go If he is young: he lacks experience

If he is old: he ought to retire

And if he dies? ... Well of course: Nobody could ever take his place.

Rev Harry Fletcher who was a much loved Vicar here in Newtown Linford died just over 30 years ago in 1987 and is still fondly remembered by villagers who knew him .

He is seen here in a picture taken for the local paper in March 1987 going for his regular jog. He used to run at least 10 miles a week around the Parish. In his youth he was a cross country runner. Harry was a popular figure in the village and his articles in the Church Magazine showed he really knew his 'flock'.

Harry left the Foreign Service after a long career serving largely in the Middle East. He was ordained in his early 50s, served as an Assistant Curate in Loughborough, and settled happily into the parish life of Newtown Linford for 13 years until he died suddenly of a heart attack at the age of 70, the day after taking Sunday services and going for a run in Bradgate Park. His wife Doreen moved away after Harry's death but when she died in



2010, a service of thanksgiving was held for her, here in All Saints Church, and she was laid to rest with her husband in the cemetery on Groby Lane.



Recent consultation by Leicestershire County Council re parking proposals

Dear Villagers

We, as Grey Crescent residents, were concerned about the new parking restrictions proposed by the County Council.

Knowing the affect of the extra parking that transferred to Grey Crescent, after the yellow lines were put down on Groby Lane, we distributed a form to residents of Grey Crescent and the top part of Main Street who we felt may not be aware of the proposals as they did not receive any notification from the County Council as "it did not directly affect them". We wanted residents to be aware of our concerns: removing the option of parking outside our own homes; how it would affect areas up Main Street that are narrower and the surrounding country lanes; the need to build larger drives etc. We desperately want designated parking spaces and to stop visitors to the village from parking across our drives but feel a whole village approach is required.

We would like to thank the 20 residents who returned forms which we submitted within the deadline to the County Council. Copies were sent to the Clerk to the Parish Council, Charnwood Councillor Mr David Snartt and County Councillor Deborah Taylor.

Parking in the Village - Crisis point?

Whilst writing this article in time for the Magazine deadline, I am aware that events may well overtake the statements therein as this matter will have been discussed at the January Parish Council meeting, and possibly a wider public meeting, before this Magazine has arrived through your doors.

We, as a Parish Council and as a village, are increasingly concerned and worried by the danger and inconvenience caused by inconsiderate and illegal parking by visitors to the village, the majority of whom are visiting Bradgate Park. Visitor numbers have been and are continuing to increase as the Bradgate Park Trust seeks to increase its' income stream to offset the major reductions in funding from Leicestershire County and City Councils. With the stated aims of the trust over the next 10 years (http://www.bradgatepark.org/wp-content/uploads/2017/04/Strategy-forwebsite-April-2017.pdf) our parking problems seem only destined to increase.

The situation between Newtown Linford and Anstey along Bradgate Road, where parking reduces the road to a single lane, has been highlighted as presenting a particular danger, as well as preventing residents from accessing their drives. Bradgate Park Trust is funding the consultation by Leicestershire County Council (LCC) and any subsequent paint-

ing of double yellow lines in sections along this road. This seeks to provide passing places as total yellow lines along this road was felt by Highways to be likely to dangerously increase traffic speeds within the 40 mph limit. Within this consultation exercise there are proposals for limiting the on-road parking within Grey Crescent. Parish Council requests for a residents only parking scheme have been turned down LCC bν (apparently the small number of spaces make it uneconomical even with a £50 annual charge for a space). White lines and parking bays are unenforceable by law so the additional double yellow line scheme has been put forward for consultation. All residents have been encouraged to sub-ที่จit their views on these proposals

and LCC will be reporting their decision on Bradgate Road and Grey Crescent in the near future.

However, as we have seen, yellow lines are only effective if those that park on them know they have a good chance of being fined! After the chaos of a recent Sunday (when numerous cars were parked along the yellow lines outside the Park within the 30mph zone without a single ticket being issued (!)) we have requested that the matter of enforcement (ie 'Traffic Wardens') be discussed urgently at Charnwood and Leicestershire County Council level.

Although the potential yellow lines along Bradgate Road are a start the Parish Council are very much aware that a 'whole village' solution is going to be needed. Park-

ing along Main St and the road by Old John car park will only get worse as the number of 'free' parking spaces reduces. We desperately need a solution to this problem and Bradgate Park Trust and LCC must acknowledge their responsibilities and be 'brought to the table' to explore all potential options to prevent the gridlock that occurs on popular weekends. Plans are being made for a Public meeting where these issues can be discussed and the Parish Council welcomes suggestions and ideas from residents that can be put to Bradgate Park Trust and LCC. Everyone will have their views but everyone will be wanting the same outcome......

It is right that the legacy of Charles Bennion should be enjoyed by the 'inhabitants of the County of Leicestershire and of visitors thereto'; it is not right that this should endanger and cause vexation, harassment and distress to the residents of Newtown Linford
