The young woman stood on the doorstep. Was she ready for this? She'd rehearsed this moment in her head, but she still couldn't find the right words. She'd not seen him for years, not since all the harsh words and the storming out. She'd thought she was in the right, back then, but years had brought a different perspective. Perhaps he'd understood more than she'd realised, perhaps his warnings had her best interests at heart? After all, things hadn't exactly gone wonderfully since then. What would happen when he saw her, would he want to see her at all?

She plucked up courage, knocked on the door. When it opened, and that familiar set of eyes peered out, she began, 'Dad...'

She didn't get any further, pulled into the kind of embrace she remembered from childhood. 'Oh my child, oh my lovely child'.

I quite often talk to people about prayer, unsurprisingly. And two things come up relatively often. First, people don't know what to say. How do you pray? What words should you use? Second, a deeper, more personal question: would God want to hear from me? Maybe it's not that you've had a big falling out, maybe just silence for a number of years, or maybe you've never prayed before at all.

During June there is an international focus on prayer. Started by the Archbishops of Canterbury and York just a few years ago, 'Thy Kingdom Come' is a chance to remind ourselves of how to pray, and – more importantly – a reminder that God is longing to hear from us. The title of course is taken from that prayer that so many of us know by heart without realising, the Lord's Prayer. A prayer that right at the start encourages us that God is a Father who may not need all our practiced words, just waits for us to start, 'Our Father…'







#### The Woodland...


Feels soft, smooth, mossy,

## A PROGRAMME OF "HIT" CLASSICS WITH THE LOUGHBOROUGH ORCHESTRA!

On Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> June, the Loughborough Orchestra is presenting a programme at Emmanuel Church, in which every item was either declared outstanding at first performance or would later become a well-known "hit" of the classical music scene!

Local tenor, David Morris, the guest soloist, will be singing a great selection of popular operatic arias. There are many familiar tunes to please the ear, from titles such as The Magic Flute, Xerxes and Rigoletto.

David was a professional singer before becoming

Head of singing at Loughborough Endowed Schools. He is a popular soloist, with his easy, wide – ranging voice adding quality to any concert performance.

Schumann's "Rhenish" Symphony is the major featured orchestral piece. It was premiered on 6 February 1851 in Düsseldorf, conducted by Schumann himself. One record of the occasion says that members of the audience applauded between every movement, and especially at the end of the work when the orchestra joined them in congratulating Schumann by shouting "Hurrah"!

When he composed the piece, he had just taken a new job, and everything about the Rhineland intoxicated him – from the majestic sweep of the river itself, to the gothic grandeur of Cologne Cathedral. So he poured it all into his biggest and most ambitious symphony:

The concert starts with Rossini's Tancredi Overture. Rossini was an early starter on the opera scene, composing his first at the age of twelve! Three weeks before his 21st birthday, he struck gold with his ninth opera, Tancredi. A Rossini scholar is quoted as saying "No composer in the first half of the 19th century enjoyed the measure of prestige, wealth, popular acclaim, or artistic influence that belonged to Rossini"

As the first performance of Tancredi approached, Rossini realised he would not have time to write a new overture, so he re-used one he had composed previously! Rossini's earliest biographer, wrote that it was "high amongst the composer's masterworks" It quickly became a favourite with audiences is still a popular choice for orchestra performances.

## Newtown Linford Neighbourhood Watch - A member of the Parish Council



Well once again I say it has been a very quiet month with regard to crime. I am assuming that if anything has happened a resident will have notified me. I no longer expect to hear from the Police although they have said they will be sending a representative to our Annual Parish Council meeting and have in fact just sent their report. Since the Annual meeting comes before the Magazine is published, I can print it here.

A total of 65 crimes were reported during the period from April 2018 to March 2019, compared to the previous 12 month period where there was a total report 76 crimes. **This an overall reduction of 16.92%.** There were no specific or identified crime trends in these figures. A total of **16 burglaries** were reported during the same time period.

Anti-Social Behaviour has also reduced in Newtown Linford. Over the last year it has reduced by 60%.

**Bob Bown Playing Fields –** As reported last month the new double swing unit has been erected.

**Traffic Enforcement Officers -** The Easter period was extremely busy due to brilliant weather. The enforcement officers did attend as arranged. By the time this is published we will have had the May Bank holidays as well. At the time of writing the forecast is not as hot as Easter.

**VAS signs** – All three signs continue to function solely by solar power. overall they slow down traffic quite well. Chairman Sue will soon be publishing the statistics taken from the three signs. They record the traffic from both directions.

**Speed Limit on Roecliffe Road –** Notice has been given by the Leicestershire County Council to impose a 50mph limit on part of Shepshed Road, Charley Road and Joe Moores Lane that is to the left of the Roecliffe crossroads as the accident rate is higher than the national average. As stated previously, the Parish Council would like to have the speed limit reduced to 40 mph to the right of the crossroads further towards Hallgates. The records of accidents are not very high but the Council believes it is dangerous due to the parking of vehicles by people seeking to visit Swithland Woods.

**Cemetery on Groby Lane –** The extension has now blended in with the existing part and the trees planted by the Friends of Charnwood Forest have all taken and are growing well. If you wish to purchase an earthen grave or an ash plot, please contact the Clerk.

**Litter Picking in village –** The Council has been informed that a group of residents in the village are preparing to pick up litter.

**Bradgate Park Trust** – One of the Councillors raised the matter of the repairs to the outer walls of the park. (not the inner walls). There was uncertainty as to whether they should be drystone or wet stone using lime mortar. The Councillor and myself met with Peter Tyldesley on the Park who explained that the outer walls were originally wet stone but

over the years had incorrectly been repaired as drystone but were continually having to be repaired. Having realized this they are now repairing correctly with the lime mortar which stands out very white when first applied. It was agreed that something could be added to the lime to darken it and make it better on the eye. When this work was commenced it raised further queries from the Councillor and here is an explanation from Peter Tyldesley which could be useful for everyone to read.

There was a group of volunteers last week on site taking down the remains of the collapsed section of wall prior to sorting and stacking the stone ready for the contractor to rebuild it (using lime mortar), which I think is what has led to the confusion.

I am grateful to Rob and Pam for taking the time to meet me onsite so I could show you the original sections of wall that clearly demonstrate a lime mortar construction. To recap for the benefit of those not present, closer investigation of the original sections of wall demonstrate that this was not designed to be a dry stone wall for the following reasons:

- The ratio of the width of the base of the wall to its height a dry stone wall is built with an "A-shaped" profile to give it stability. The boundary wall is narrow at the base and its profile is more akin to a modern brick wall.
- The absence of "through stones", which are an essential part of dry stone wall construction in order to bind the wall together.
- The presence of historic mortar joints, often deeply recessed as a result of centuries of weathering, which can be found on numerous sections of the boundary wall.

The understanding of the boundary walls has not been helped by the practice in past years of rebuilding them as drystone walls. In fact, there are lengths of wall that have been rebuilt using sand and cement mortar for strength and stability, because dry stones walls built to this profile keep falling down, and then encased in a dry stone surround. Needless to say, this is a historically inappropriate practice that most definitely does not occur nowadays.
