I believe that they should still be called 'Marathon' bars, and 'Opal Fruits', and frankly, it should still be 'Lilt' too.

There's a proper name for that human phenomenon of believing that how things were when we were young is how they should always be: not nostalgia but 'anchoring bias'. Our earliest encounters form the anchor which holds something in place, leading us to find any alteration uncomfortable. So, for instance, if we remove pews from church, it does little good for me to point out that for most of the history of church buildings in this country they wouldn't have been there (for many churches, only the last couple of hundred years – a while, but a fraction of the age of most church buildings!). They were there when we were little, so we don't like them being taken out.

It's just one contributor of the many human propensities to try to avoid change. But sometimes we have to acknowledge, however unwelcome. that change is necessary. The Church of England, and our own Diocese of Leicester in particular, have reached that point. The system of 'one parish, one vicar' which seems so much a part of our heritage (although the historical picture is more complex than that) has, in reality, long disappeared. So now is the time to explore what way of organising ongoing mission and ministry in each locality should look like.

It's uncomfortable – it's change – but the current process which our church is taking part in, known as Shaped by God Together, is an attempt to find a new way of churches - and schools and chaplaincies working together, called Minster Communities. You can find more information on the diocesan website at: https://www.leicester.anglican.org/ about-us/sbgt/

The outcome is not entirely clear yet – everyone is invited to contribute, so it's not all sewn up - but it will undoubtedly be different from what we were used to when we were young. Yet, just as 'Snickers' still has peanuts and chocolate, and 'Starburst' fruit-flavoured chews, the new way of doing things in the church will still preserve the key factors: worship, prayer, loving service of our communities, and witnessing to Jesus, the good news yesterday, today and forever.

We held our AGM in April and the Committee Members were re-elected to continue the series of events which are planned for the coming year, which include some well-known speakers, interesting visits and our traditional Summer and Christmas social evenings.

Our scheduled speaker was rushed to hospital only a few days before he was due to come to us and we were very grateful that Karen Gimson was able to bring forward the date of her visit to fill the gap.

The title of her talk was '365 days of colour' and she showed us how we could keep our gardens interesting all the year round. Especially striking was the range of ways we could have interest, even in the depth of winter, with foliage and seed heads prominent but also a group of shrubs which flower during these otherwise barren months. We can also look out for the arrival of snowdrops and other early flowering plants to herald the arrival of spring before our gardens burst into colour during the summer.

There were almost 100 members in the room and her talk was much appreciated. We ended the evening with an Irish Raffle which sees every number in the bag drawn, until there is only one left and that one wins the prize.

May Wildlife Walk

Groby Lane verges, track, hedgerows, woods, rocky slopes and pastures

Our wildlife walk on the afternoon of Saturday 4th May went to the rocky woods and pastures off Groby Lane. It was quite sunny, but still wet underfoot in some places due to the recent long rainy spell. This is why we changed the original plan, and will visit low-lying Ulverscroft Valley another day. After looking admiringly at the uncut parts of the Groby Lane verge, and seeing Blue tits in the nest box, we took what I have heard called the 'Donkey Track' towards Groby Pool. The hedgerows and field borders along the track were rich with Garlic Mustard, Greater Stitchwort, Lady's Smock, Bluebells, Hawthorn blossom and much else. On reaching the rocky outcrops and slopes we saw Bluebells and Broom flowering abundantly. The scent of our native bluebells, though in flower for some time now, still pervaded the dense woodland. The hedgerows

and open ground were most rewarding for species variety. In total we identified 19 herbaceous species flowering.

We heard much birdsong: Chiffchaff, Robin, Wren, Skylark, Blue Tit among those of the 12 species we identified. Early flying butterflies were somewhat in evidence; we had good views of Orange Tip, Large White, Green-veined White, Peacock and Comma. We lack knowledge at present to



identify many more interesting insects. Finally, passing by small overgrown quarries on our return, we saw the lovely Comma butterfly (in Jan Croft's photo) and a dog-sized Muntjac deer running towards the track.

Toadlets

Later on this month and into July, young toads (toadlets) emerge from the waters where they were born. Since they hatched in spring, they've transformed from wriggling vegetarian tadpoles to meat-eating mini toads. Like fledgling birds, they face many predators and threats. In some places thousands can be seen emerging en masse from ponds, often after heavy rain. If you do go looking for them, be careful where you tread as they're good at hiding in the long grass. Surviving toads will spend their days hunting mini-beasts under the cover of darkness before hibernating for winter. Then, next spring they return to the same pond to start the cycle all over again.

Tip to help wildlife:

Encourage bats in your garden by planting flowers (e.g. honeysuckle) that release their scent in the evening.

These will attract moths and, ultimately, bats looking for an insect-meal. For further information, ideas for the best plants to grow and other ways to encourage bats, visit the Bat Conservation Trust website (www.bats org.uk)



Danuta Klein

Danuta was born in Lachowicze, Poland (now part of Belarus) in 1938.

Her father was the first leader of the Home Army Partisans, and was murdered by the Soviets, his body never recovered. Her mother and sister (aged one year) both died of TB. Danuta was left orphaned at the age of 5, raised by a succession of relatives Her childhood was one of complete poverty, sleeping on top of the stove for warmth in winter with no toilet facilities, only owning her first pair of shoes at the age of 9. Ever resourceful, she taught herself to knit, using the spokes from a bicycle wheel in place of needles

Eventually, Danuta moved to Wrocław in the South West of Poland where she trained to be a nurse.



In 1959, she was able to travel to London to stay with an uncle on a 3 month visa. She enrolled onto English classes, and along with listening

to the radio and watching television, her knowledge of the English language flourished.

She met and married Henryk Klein (also Polish) in 1960, and they settled in Newtown Linford, where their daughters Evey and Kathy were raised.

Danuta was a natural homemaker, and soon discovered she had an affinity for gardening (something she would never tell you herself; modesty and shyness were the core essence of her gentle and unassuming character). Several of the firm friendships she fostered within the village became the lucky recipi-



ents of her tomato and bedding plants on a yearly basis, though her generosity extended to beyond just those she knew personally. Harris' hardware store of Anstey, sadly no longer around, along with a similar shop in Ratby, received a weekly supply of her bedding plants all through the growing season. She enjoyed spending time with Wyn and Dennis Juba, formerly of High Tor, Billy Rigg, Lydia and John Knott and Kathy and Peter Watson to name a few.

Sadly, in 1988, her husband died, leaving her a widow at 49. She began to make a daily routine of walking through Bradgate Park, never deterred by the weather and often bumping into someone she knew for a chat.

Danuta was a marvellous baker and jam maker, and visitors to the house always found a sweet treat on offer with their morning coffee or afternoon tea. She did all her own decorating, gardening and home maintenance up until the age of 80, never deterred by the height of a ladder or falling off a wall (which did happen!!)

When her two grandchildren arrived, she felt that life was complete, and loved every aspect of being a 'nana'.

In 2018, Danuta and her family took a trip of a lifetime and returned to


the hamlet where she was born, (the first time she had returned since 1959). It was an emotional visit and gave her the opportunity to reunite with her closest school friend, and a cousin she had last seen at the age of 11.

Sadly, it was late 2019 when the first evidence of dementia became apparent. Though the disease stole so much from her, we are grateful for the fact that she never forgot who we were, and we too will continue to fondly remember her for the incredible woman she was. Her journey with dementia ended on the 10th of May, and she died in the comfort and familiarity of the beautiful home she nurtured for so many years.

Leicestershire National Garden Scheme Open Gardens June 2024

There are 14 gardens open to visit in Leicestershire during June, with many different styles and size of garden there is something for everyone to enjoy.

Opening the weekend of 1st and 2nd June 11-5pm is 28 Gladstone Street LE18 1AE. A town garden, divided into rooms bisected by a bridge and pond. The planting includes many unusual perennials, David Austin scented roses and a Hosta theatre.

Opening every Wednesday in June, 5th, 12th, 19th, 26th from 2-5pm is Stoke Albany House, Desborough Road near Market Harborough, LE16 8PT. A large 4 acre country house garden with traditional style planting including a Nepeta walk, parterre with box and roses, Mediterranean garden, greenhouse, water feature and sculptures.

On Saturday 8th and Sunday 9th June, two gardens open together in Wymeswold at 88 (LE12 6TU) and 109 Brook Street (LE12 6TT) from 2 -5pm and one admission fee covers both gardens. The garden at 88 Brook street has colourful planting of clematis, geraniums, globe this-

tles and roses 'Goldfinch', Kiftsgate, Albertine and Francis Lester. Water features, a stream, mini beach, and a 'champagne' pond, and an impressive display of two topiary elephants. Enjoy also the orchard, and wildflower and the garden's wildlife of frogs; toads; common and great-crested newts; grass snakes; hedgehogs; and bats.

Nearby 109 Brook Street has a garden of about an acre with many mature trees. Lots of herbaceous planting plus a rose and clematis patio, a raised bed kitchen garden and an orchard. The garden features a wild area and both a fish pond and wild pond, with water lilies, and a wild flower meadow fringe. Vibrant planting in the hot garden has exotic plant species in raised beds with a splash water feature to cool the air on a very hot day. There is an extensive rainwater harvesting system that includes 5000 gallons of storage operated by solar power. There will be a home raised plant sale.

The Secret Garden at Wigston Framework Knitters Museum LE18 2BA opens on Sunday 8th June 11-5pm. A Victorian walled garden approx. 70'x80' with traditional cottage garden planting. The garden is managed by volunteers with much replanting during past 3 years. The garden is located in the grounds of a historic museum, (an extra charge applies). A unique garden in the centre of Wigston which still retains an air of tranquillity.

If you want to enjoy roses and Clematis, Dairy cottage, LE9 4JN has over 300 on display together with herbaceous borders full of Alliums, Poppies, Salvias, Dieramas, Hollyhocks, and Rodgersia. The garden opens on Sunday 9th June from 11-4pm when this traditional cottage garden will be in full bloom.

Opening every day on 11th – 16th June inclusive 12- 4pm is Neville Holt Hall near Market Harborough LE16 8EG. A large 10 acre garden designed by a Chelsea gold medal winner and features 3 distinctive walled gardens. Looking good in June will be the roses in the Italian walled garden throughout the garden and the long herbaceous borders full of colour with geranium, Nepeta, Sissyrinchium, and Artemisia.

The Old Rectory Newbold Verdon LE9 9NN opens from 12-7pm on Sat 15th and Sunday 16th. The garden surrounds the Georgian Old Rectory. It contains many species of trees, ranging in age from centuries-old to very young saplings. In June the rose garden will be in full bloom, and there is also a pond, many Hostas, woods, greenhouse, a box parterre and sculptures.

The Secret Garden at Glenfield Hospital LE3 9QP is a hidden gem of peace and tranquillity. Opening on 22nd June from 10-3pm it provides patients and visitors with a lovely garden space set within the grounds of

the Glenfield Hospital. It is 1 acre in size, and in June will feature Roses, Lavender, Salvias, Penstemon, Sweet Peas, Erigeron Daisies, Geraniums, ornamental grasses and Wild Flowers. Also on show there will be a fine selection of fruit trees and brushes, herbs and vegetables. There will be a variety of Arts and Crafts Stalls together with a plant sale and (Story Telling), tales from The Secret Garden.

On Sunday 23rd Westbrooke House Market Harborough LE16 8AX opens from 10-4.30pm. The gardens comprise 6 acres approached through a tree lined driveway of mature limes and giant redwoods. Key features are a walled flower garden, walled kitchen garden, fernery, lower garden, wildlife pond, spring garden, lawns, woodland paths and a meadow with a wildflower area, ha-ha and hornbeam avenue. There is a collection of over 270 miniature and very small Hostas.

Opening on 23rd June from 11-4pm is 15 The Woodcroft DE74 2QT About a ½ acre garden with mature choice trees and shrubs, old and modern shrub roses, fern garden, wildlife garden, alpine troughs and mixed herbaceous borders. There is a comfortable gazebo overlooking a recently planted wildlife pond. New for 2024, a large border at the bottom of the garden has been restyled.

Brickfield House near Market Harborough LE16 8XS opens on Friday 28th June from 12-4pm. The 2 acre garden enjoys stunning views overlooking the Welland Valley. It has been developed from a sloping brickyard rubbish plot and now features a kitchen garden, orchard, herbaceous borders filled with roses,

perennials and shrubs, paths

and many pots, filled with succulents, herbs and colourful annuals.

If you love pots and container gardening, a visit to Oak Tree House South Kilworth, LE17 6DU opening on Sat 29th and Sunday 30th will be an ideal day out. This extensive 2/3 acre

garden features large herbaceous borders, many clematis and roses, vegetable plot, greenhouse, and ponds, also has a collection of over 300 pots filled with various perennials, succulents, alpines and annuals all of which add colour and interest.

Tresillian House, Melton Mowbray, LE13 0BQ opens on the 30th June from 11-4. A quiet secluded garden, it features specimen trees, a pond, natural bog garden and koi carp pond and many different unusual plants for differing seasons. There is a working vegetable garden and heated and cold greenhouses. For the June opening there will be live Jazz, and a small art exhibitions by local artists.

Thanks to the generosity of our garden owners and visitors the National Garden Scheme donated a record of £3,403,960 to some of the UK best-loved nursing and health charities, which included £76,000 raised by Leicestershire.

WhatsApp group chats are targeted by fraudsters

WhatsApp group chat members are being warned that they could be targeted by criminals, as Action Fraud reveals it has received 636 reports from victims of the messaging app this year.

The fraud often begins when a member of the group receives a WhatsApp audio call from the fraudster, pretending or claiming to be another member of the group. This is done to gain the individual's trust, and often the scammer will use a false profile picture and/or display name, so at first glance it would appear to be a genuine member of the group.

The fraudster will tell the victim they are sending them a one-time passcode which will allow them to join an upcoming video call for group members. The criminal then asks the victim to share this passcode with

them so they can be "registered" for the video call.

Once the fraudster has access to the victim's WhatsApp account, they will enable two-step verification which makes it impossible for the victim to regain access their account. Other members of the group, or friends and family in the victim's contacts, will then be messaged asking them to transfer money urgently as they are in desperate need of help.

How to secure your WhatsApp account:

Set up two-step verification (2SV) to give an extra layer of protection to your account. Tap Settings > Account > Two-step verification > Enable.

CALL. If a family member or friend makes an unusual request on WhatsApp, always call the person outside of WhatsApp to confirm their identity.

Report spam messages or block a sender within WhatsApp. Press and hold on the message bubble, select 'Report' and then follow the instructions.
