# Bradgate Group Parish



## April 2019

By the time you read this, 29th March will either be imminently upon us, or past. So Brexit, whatever shape we're going to get, will either have happened or will have been deferred – from what I can see – almost indefinitely. At the time I write, in early March, it's almost impossible to know with any confidence what on earth is going to happen in the next fortnight.

I don't often write about overtly political subjects despite having studied it at university, not least because I know it is entirely possible for faithful Christian people to have contrasting views on political issues. In my last Church we had a Conservative Cabinet Minister in the congregation, in the one before that someone who is now a Momentum activist!

So what should I say about Brexit?

One thing is that whether we believe it is a good thing or not, Christians should always be concerned about the effect on the poorest and most vulnerable in our society. When even the most ardent Brexiteers say it may be 50 years before we see the full economic benefits of Brexit, we need to be prepared to help those who will suffer from the inevitable short-term losses.

Another thing is that whether we agree with them or not, Christians are called to respect and pray for our political leaders. Since 2016 I have been dismayed at the loss of civility in public debates. We have a long and honoured tradition of political satire in this country, so mocking politicians is fair game, but we have now moved beyond that to a corrosive lack of confidence, of hatred and even violence. How can we regain the necessary trust in people who, by and large, I believe are in politics with an aim to serve with integrity?

Thirdly, whether Brexit happens or not, Christians are called to believe first not in the sovereignty of Parliament or Brussels but in the reign of Jesus: a just and good power which as we celebrate this month at Easter is victorious even over death and beyond. That's where our ultimate hope is, however important current events are.



## From the Park

Whenever I sit down to write one of these pieces, I always look back to see what was happening at the same time in previous years. For a start, I note that I am writing April's column four days earlier than I did last year, so I hope the Editor appreciates this (especially as I am



doing so in the office on a Saturday morning). Readers may remember the spring snow we had in 2018: I recorded on 20<sup>th</sup> March that there was snow on the ground, and we had a further snowfall on the 27<sup>th</sup>. I noted at the time that there were no signs of Spring to be seen. Fast forward to 2019 and the daffodils were in full bloom at the end of February and, despite a short-lived flurry last weekend, we have had practically no snow at all this winter. Last year, I enjoyed a couple of days of April skiing at Glenshee on some of the best snow I have seen in Scotland in nearly 30 years; this year this Scottish mountain resorts are closed for want of snow.

Year-on-year fluctuations in weather are entirely natural and cannot be used on their own as evidence of a changing climate but there is no doubt that we are seeing increasingly dramatic swings in conditions with many months in each year being either the best or worst on record when it comes to our visitor numbers, the biggest driver of which is the weather. Looking at the last 12 months, March and April were damp squibs, May was good, June was the best on record, July was mediocre, August was poor, September was the worst on record (does anyone remember the heatwave and drought?), October and November were middling. Since then, December, January and February have all been the best on record and March has seen us battered by wind and rain with barely a visitor to be seen on many days. I always say that Dante missed out a Circle of Hell when he wrote The Inferno because there is one reserved for mortal sinners who are condemned to run outdoor visitor attractions in England.

The practice of naming storms in the UK only started in 2013, itself a response to the increased frequency and severity of weather events. In the past few weeks we have been battered by Storm Gareth and I am not certain whether the wind currently howling around the Deer Barns represents the tail-end of Gareth or the vanguard of Hannah who, according to the Met Office website, will be the next named storm, to be followed by Idris, Jane and Kevin with scope to go as far as Violet and Wyn if things get really rough. Whatever the name of this particular instalment, this

Facebook Page ajbceramics www.ajbceramics.co.uk week has seen us lose a number of trees across the Park and in Swithland Wood, although I am pleased to say that the roof is still on the Lodge (at the time of writing anyway).

Because the Park is criss-crossed by public footpaths, one of which runs along the main carriageway, we cannot ever lawfully close the Park without going through a lengthy legal process. When the weather gets so bad as to, in our view, represent a real safety risk to the public, we post notices on the gates and on social media strongly advising people not to enter the Park or Wood. All the parkland trees are subject to a safety inspection regime and are in as safe a condition as we can reasonably ensure. We do not, therefore, post such advisory notices lightly and I would strongly recommend that people take heed of them when they appear.

Despite the mad March weather, we have had some notable wildlife sightings in recent weeks including a pair of peregrines, a red kite and otters on the river, captured by one of our trail cameras put up to investigate what we were worried might have been evidence of mink along the riverbank.

The stags have started to cast their antlers and in April the fallow bucks will do the same. Generally speaking, the largest animals lose their antlers first, which leads to the usual hierarchy being turned on its head as they are bullied on the feed lines by the smaller, but still intact, males. The drive-through scheme for Blue Badge holders will run again this season, starting on Thursday 4<sup>th</sup> April. As last year, users will need to book a 'slot' in advance to enable us to manage the number of vehicles in the Park at any one time. In a change from previous years, to gain admission users will have a to purchase a Pay & Display ticket; the old system of requesting donations was not raising enough money to cover the costs of operating the scheme and we feel that the new approach is fairer and less ambiguous.

Our first Venison Tasting Experience held on 5<sup>th</sup> March went very well so we will be repeating this event on at least one occasion next season. On the subject of venison, a reminder that the season is about to end, so stock up now or go without until September!

Assuming that it is safe to venture out, I look forward to seeing you on the Park. **Peter Tyldesley**

## The Resurrection of Jesus Christ

The Resurrection of Jesus Christ (cAD 30) is the cornerstone of Christian belief. Without it, as St Paul writes (c AD55) eloquently in 1 Corinthians 15:19 'we are of all most to be pitied'. So why do Christians believe in the Resurrection? Is it just a pious hope that we have been taught since childhood? When my eldest daughter was about six, one Easter evening she said 'Daddy, is the Resurrection really really really true....?'

I, as a trained Mathematician, have always believed in the historical truth of the Resurrection. Even when I have doubted God, been horrified by the scandals and failings of various churches, been puzzled by some seemingly unanswered prayers, I have never doubted the historic truth of the Resurrection? Why? Am I deluded? Here are some reasons for this seemingly unscientific crazy belief......

1- The written evidence is very early. St Paul (whose extraordinary faith was based on an encounter with Jesus and led to his martyrdom in Rome) wrote some of his letters as early as the AD 40s. He wrote 1 Corinthians in AD 55 about 25 years after the event. The Gospels followed a little later.

2- The Gospels tell us that the brave people at the crucifixion, and on the first Easter morning, were largely women - amazingly led by a woman called Mary Magdalene who had been released from seven evil spirits (Luke 8:20). Anyone 'inventing' a story to convince the sceptical Greek and Roman world could hardly have chosen a less credible witness. The Gospels tells us that the tomb was empty (the grave clothes neatly folded like the empty chrysalis of a butterfly - John 20:7). No one has ever produced the body (the only credible alternative is that Jesus' body was thrown into a pit with other common criminals)

3- Consider the state of Jesus' disciples on the evening of the first Good Friday. They were in hiding. Only John had even been brave enough to attend the crucifixion. Their leader had denied all knowledge of Jesus, one of their number was about to commit suicide. Yet a few weeks later, they were preaching with extraordinary effect, performing miracles in the name of Jesus and taking the unlikely news of a crucified carpenter, who had risen from the dead, all over the known world and especially to its dangerous capital city - Rome. What had inspired them?

4- Think about James, Jesus' eldest half-brother. In his life time, Jesus'

family had been sceptical. Mark 3:20-21 implies that they thought he was mad; John 7:5 bluntly tells us that his brothers didn't believe in him. Yet in the Acts of the Apostles (written by St Luke who was present at many of the later events recorded there), we find Jesus' brothers and his mother Mary at prayer with the disciples (1:14), we find James the Lord's brother (not James the brother of John who had already been killed by one of the delightful Herod family see Acts 12:2) as one of the leaders of the early Church (see Acts 15:13). He is often mentioned by Paul in his letters. He is mentioned by the Jewish historian Josephus (writing in the 1st century) as having been martyred for his faith cAD 62. What had changed James?..... Read 1 Corinthians 15:7 'Then he appeared to James'. James encountered Jesus, risen from the dead, what else could change a sceptical half-brother, who despite Jesus' miracles, didn't believe in him, into a martyr?

Space prevents my offering any more evidence. But people ask - what form did Jesus' resurrected body take? Clearly he wasn't a corpse come

to life. His body had a unique quality - more like that of an angel. Jesus taught (Mark 12:25) that our bodies, after death, will be like those of an angel. And there is plenty of credible evidence for the existence of angels even in today's sceptical world but that, as they say, is another story....



The implications are huge.

If the Resurrection story is true, it profoundly affects each one of us. We cannot evade its implications for our life - *neither in this world nor the next!*

## Charnwood Borough Council Elections.

Charnwood Borough Council elections will take place on Thursday 2<sup>nd</sup> May 2019. The Council has 52 Councillors across 28 Wards and all seats are up for election. Borough Councils must hold a whole Council Election every 4 years. This is a chance for people to vote for someone to represent their Ward on the Borough Council.

To vote in the local elections on 2<sup>nd</sup> May this year, you need to be on the Electoral Register. If you are not on the Register, you will need to register by Friday 12<sup>th</sup> April. Although this is the last date to apply, if you leave it until the last minute and there are any issues with your application, then you may not be registered in time to vote in May's local elections. If you do not believe you are on the Electoral Register, please contact the Council on 01509 634546. Deadline for receipt of postal vote applications 5pm 15<sup>th</sup> April Deadline for receipt of proxy vote applications 5pm 24<sup>th</sup> April

Polling Day 7am to 10pm 2<sup>nd</sup> May Counting of votes 3<sup>rd</sup> May.

There is a change to the usual polling station for Newtown Linford and Ulverscroft. This will now be at the Linford, 66 Main Street, Newtown Linford. The change has taken place because the old venue had issues relating to disability access and parking. There are no other changes to the other two polling stations within Forest Bradgate Ward. Our visit will start by sharing



## The National Garden Scheme in Leicestershire April Gardens



The National Garden scheme is a charity which last year raised £3.1m donated to Macmillan Cancer Support, Marie Curie, Hospice UK and The Queen's Nursing Institute. The

Leicestershire branch raised £60,606, and we are hoping to raise more money this year for these important charities.



In April we have two gardens open with a great display of spring flowers. Tresillian House, at 67 Dalby Road, Melton Mowbray LE13 0BQ which is over 2/3<sup>rd</sup> of an acre supporting two ponds and a bog garden, which are sure to be full of activity with frog spawn and perhaps an appearance by the local ducks. There will be a host of spring flowers blooming, Daffodils, Tulips, Hellebores, Primroses, and late flowering Camellia. Tresillian House has many trees which will be turning green and Laburnums, making for a lovely spring display.

44 Fairfield Road, in the heart of Market Harborough, (LE16 9QJ) is a wildlife friendly garden of 1/3 acre packed with interest including a small copse, a pond which supports various amphibians, and an abundance of spring flowers including Narcissus, Violets, Bluebells and the unusual Snake's Head Fritillary. Both of these gardens are open on Sunday 28<sup>th</sup> April.

We have, in addition to those gardens above, another four gardens open by arrangement for group visits. This is an ideal day out for a society or group to enjoy a spring garden and all gardens have excellent refreshments on offer including Tea and Homemade cakes. Open by arrangement is Goadby Hall at Goadby Marwood Leicestershire LE14 4LN an impressively large garden, over 10 acres including 5 lakes, a woodland walk, and interconnected walled gardens. Westview at 1 St Thomas's Road Great Glen LE8 9EH which is a smaller walled garden with many unusual plants and features including formal herb parterre, an auricula theatre and wildlife pond. Also open by arrangement is Barracca in Earl Shilton, Mary's Garden in Hinckley, and Ravenstone Hall, Coalville all of which have colourful spring flower collections. You may remember that year last we were forced to remove an item of equipment from the play area due to inappropriate and dangerous use, with rope and other such items being tied to it. Since its removal the situation had sufficiently improved that we were considering its reinstatement. However, it is with regret that this month our Councillors found yet more blue nylon rope tied to equipment on the field - presumably from the same source as before. This has now been removed as it is an entanglement hazard.

#### It is totally unacceptable



that the safety of our equipment is compromised in this manner. The equipment is inspected weekly which, when used normally, is sufficient. However, we do not have the resources to keep checking that no-one has been irresponsible enough to endanger others by attaching these ropes etc. Please, if anyone sees such occurrences, let our Parish Clerk know as soon as possible so that the danger can be addressed. If you know who may be responsible for this rope, we should also like to know so that measures can be taken to stop this happening.

Serving the people of Newtown Linford

The May meeting on Tuesday 14<sup>th</sup> May will be our Annual Meeting of the Parish and Annual Parish Council Meeting. At the first meeting reports are usually given by the Chair of the Parish Council, the Clerk, the Chair of the Village Hall Committee, a member of the Police Beat Team and the Head of the Village School. At the latter meeting the Chair and Vice will be elected for the coming year. Councillor Holly Cross from Roecliffe Road will not be standing for election and therefore her last attendance will be the meeting on Tuesday 2<sup>nd</sup> April. On behalf of all residents we express our thanks to her for her service over the last few years. Councillors are elected for four years and this year all Councillors must be reelected. At the time of writing Tim Porte also from Roecliffe Road has indicated his intention of standing for election.

**Bob Bown Playing Fields**:- The junior double swing has been waiting to be repaired for several weeks and when they went to carry out the work it was found to require more attention than expected. Under the circumstances the Councillors have elected to replace it with a whole new swing which will be carried out in the next few weeks. Our Chair has written a separate article on behalf of the Councillors elsewhere in the magazine regarding safety issues.

### LCC energy bill for the street lamps owned by the Parish Council:-

This has increased by £127.58 for the coming year.

Solar VAS signs:-These are now installed and working on Sharpley Hill and Roecliffe Road. Some very useful statistics are now being downloaded and will be available for viewing soon.



The third sign will soon be erected to cover the hill on Bradgate Road.

**Roecliffe Road Traffic:-** In view of the increase in obstructive parking along Roecliffe Road and down by Hallgates and taking into account the speed of the traffic, the Councillors have elected to explore the possibility to changing the speed limit from 50 to 40 mph. They have written to Anstey and Thurcaston and Cropston Parish Councils asking for their support. The faded yellow lines in this area have been reported to LCC and they are currently considering whether they are sufficiently faded for them to be repainted.

**Planters on Lampposts:-** As it is now difficult to find lampposts that pass the safety test to hang the planters on the Councillors are considering placing a two tier round planter outside the Village Hall on the spot where the Christmas tree is placed. Everards have provisionally given their permission for this but we await confirmation.

**Parking on Grey Crescent:-** Following the parking consultation some time ago LCC has now written to the residents in Grey Crescent who fit the criteria offering them elongated H's. At the time of writing they are half way through the allotted four weeks allowed to reply. When these are in place and it can be seen what the situation is like, then the Village Working Party are expected to resume their meetings and be able to work out what the next stage should be. It may be that another consultation will be called for.
