# Bradgate Group Parish



When were you last April Fooled? Did you get caught by the fake announcement of Prince Harry and Meghan Markle's wedding last year (don't worry, it's becoming true next month)? Or ten years ago when the BBC ran an item on the newly discovered flying penguin colony? Can you even remember back to the 1950s and the famous Panorama programme still cited as the best April Fool of all time when they ran a segment on the gathering of the harvest from spaghetti trees. I still remember watching the fight that broke out behind Des Lynam on Grandstand back in 1989 and half-believing it for a moment or two.

This year Easter Day falls on April 1. Plenty of people believe Easter and the news of Jesus' resurrection to be the historical equivalent of the penguin colony – some great deception practiced by his followers, though the reasons they might have done this remain unclear. What is clear though is that it definitely wasn't a hoax or an April Fool. The disciples believed it so thoroughly that they were prepared to go to prison or even be killed rather than deny it. No one else had any reason to manufacture the story, so what remains as a possibility?

The legal journalist, Lee Strobel, once decided to dedicate his time to proving it was 'fake news'. Having painstakingly looked into all the possibilities, he unwillingly had to come to the conclusion instead that it was true. His story can be read in his book 'The Case for Christ' or seen in a film of the same name released last year.

The events of Easter do seem a rather far-fetched, even foolish, story, in some ways – Paul, writing just a few years later said himself that 'the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are lost and dying'. But he goes on to say 'God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.' It's no deception, instead through the news of Easter we discover the most important truth of all.



### From the Park

As I am writing this on the day of the Spring (or Vernal) Equinox – much to the Editor's chagrin as she likes copy to be submitted by the  $15^{th}$  of the month, not the  $20^{th} - I$ would ordinarily expect to be waxing Wordsworthian about



daffodils and other signs of Spring. This year, however, there is still snow on the ground and the Bradgate Park Trust flag that I can see from my window is threatening to break loose from its pole with each gust of the relentless, biting, easterly wind.

Despite the absence of much in the way of green shoots on the Park, within the Trust we are seeing a number of new beginnings. Having been with us as a volunteer, subsequently as part-time Development Officer and then as project manager for 12 months of our Heritage Lottery Fund Transition project, Carolyn Holmes was appointed as Engagement Manager with effect from 1<sup>st</sup> April. Followers of our Facebook page will be aware of Carolyn's work as she has overseen its growth from 2,000 to 11,000 followers over the past two years and turned it into one of our most important tools for engagement with our visitors, friends and supporters. Carolyn also leads our fundraising work and has been

behind a number of our successful new initiatives in this area. Carolyn will be taking over this column from time to time to keep you informed of our engagement, volunteering and community activities.

An important part of our engagement agenda is the work we do around education and lifelong learning. The opening of the Visitor Centre in 2016 marked a step-change in our delivery of informal education and the Visitor Experience team has grown to take on guided tours of the ruins and regular viewing days at Old John. This year, after 18 months of development involving writing modules and running them by our Teachers' Panel to check the curriculum linkages and "school appeal" followed by a period of testing delivery with our volunteer "guinea pig" schools, we are pleased to announce the launch of the "Explore Bradgate" schools programme. The programme has an initial offer aimed at pupils in Key Stages 1 & 2 (Primary School Years 1-6) with modules covering Stone Age, Woodland Habitats, Minibeasts, River Live. "A Taste of Bradgate" " (Tudors) and Map & Compass Skills.

The Trust now has a new website – still at the previous <u>www.bradgatepark.org</u> address – that has been developed with the help of a grant from the Transform Foundation, a charity that exists to help charities achieve transformative change through better use of digital technology. The new site contains the usual visitor information along with integrated fundraising and online ticket sales as well as information on the wide range of volunteering opportunities that are available. The great advantage of integrating ticket sales into our own website rather than relying on third party providers is that there is no booking fee added to the ticket prices, so tickets purchased online will cost the same as tickets bought in person at the Park.

We have been taking a few, but important, steps to reduce the environmental impact of our activities. As a charity that exists in part "to advance the education of the public in the appreciation and care of the environment" it is extremely important that we practice what we preach. The problem of takeaway coffee cups and the lack of recycling facilities for them has attracted a lot of publicity in recent months. With the Government rejecting calls for a "latte levy", it seems that only consumer pressure will force a change of practice on the big high street chains. In the meantime, we have sourced a takeaway cup that is fully biodegradable and which can be composted where facilities exist. These cups cost an extra 2p per unit and this is a cost that we will be absorbing rather than passing onto customers. We are also re-launching the scheme where purchasers of a Bradgate Park thermal mug will receive a 60p discount on each drink that is served in it. Regrettably, as our drinks machines



dispense pre-set amounts, we feel that a "bring your own mug scheme" is not practical but the discount scheme will pay for the cost of a mug in ten refills. Once existing stocks have run out, we will be introducing waxed paper drinking straws instead of plastic ones as a small step towards addressing the problem of plastic pollution.

Our oldest Land Rover is due for replacement and we have opted for another 'Polaris' all-terrain vehicle which offers better fuel consumption and lower emissions as well has having less impact on the ground. I would love to see us introduce electric vehicles but we are worried about the interaction between a silent vehicle and pedestrians, especially on the main carriageway.

On a slightly different environmental note, this summer we will be introducing produce grown in the garden at Newtown Linford onto the menu at the Conservatory Tearoom which will offer the incomparable flavour of home grown vegetables together with very few "food yards" let alone "food miles".

I know I have said this before this year but, as spring finally makes its presence known, I look forward to seeing you on the Park.



### Give Our Birds an Eggcellent Easter

Easter is a time when many gardeners' like to tidy up and trim back, but this is the also when many birds start to build their nests and lay their first clutch of eggs. It only takes a moment to accidentally destroy a nest, so a few minutes carrying out some simple checks before starting any work could be the difference between life and death.

Garden favourites such as robins, sparrows and blackbirds are in decline and need all the help they can get, especially after a harsh winter, and they also help us by controlling aphids, caterpillars, snails, slugs and bugs.

Neil Pilcher of the Leicestershire and Rutland Wildlife Trust said "We ask everyone to be careful and to quickly check for nests just before starting work. Dense hedges such as Leylandii are popular nesting sites, but any hedge, tree, shrub and even ivy could be home to a growing family. If not doing the work themselves, householders should ask their contractor to check for nests too. If in doubt, the work should be postponed until the end of August when the breeding season is over".

All birds are legally protected under the Wildlife and Countryside Act whilst nesting, and protection starts the moment they begin building the nest until their young have fully fledged.

Give our birds a boost this spring – a little extra care could make all the difference to our feathered friends.

The Leicestershire & Rutland Wildlife Trust works to protect and enhance Leicestershire and Rutland's wildlife and wild places. The Trust is the largest non-

governmental organisation dedicated to the conservation of wildlife in the two counties.

His natural aptitude gained him entry to Wyggeston School where he enjoyed a great education, marvellous sporting opportunities involving a ball of the "right" shape and lifelong friends. An aircraft apprenticeship at RAF Halton followed, leading to a commission to the RAF Cranwell College in Lincolnshire where he graduated as a Flight Lieutenant. His passion for flying and his interest in anything that could be wiped with an oily rag became life definers. It was here that he met and fell in love with Marion the person who inspired him and kept him on his toes for the rest of his life.

Leaving the RAF and returning to his roots Keith and Marion settled in Anstey where, using his engineering skills learnt in the RAF, and taking advantage of the new technology of the time known as "The Television"... he founded his electronics business. His self-reliance, technical ability, intuition and force of personality built his business into a significant part of the local economy. As well as the obvious service the shop provided, it seemed to me there was also the less obvious but as significant side to it. I am referring to the social side. Keith was a very good conversationalist and story teller. Men would pop into the shop to buy a light bulb and would leave a couple of hours later. Wives would feed their husbands up to sustain them if they knew they were going to Keith Smiths. Keith's shop was one of his natural environments. I remember thinking as a youngster that my dad had the best job in the world, because he just seemed to chat all day about motorbikes, rugby and the iniquities of government. He eventually retired at the age of 75.

As the family and business grew, Marion and Keith built and moved into a new house in Newtown Linford which Marion still lives in. The marvelous thing about this was that Keith now had 'A GARAGE'. He could now indulge one of his great passions - that of collecting assorted performance cars and motorcycles. Keith would spend hours here, meticulously renovating and rebuilding his vehicles. Sometimes, oblivious to the order of domesticity an engine casing might make its way into the kitchen oven; phrases like 'long-suffering' come to mind but in fact the opposite was true; Marion was very tolerant and supportive of all Keith's endeavours and was always aware that her man was special. It was in the garage also that he provided some of his best mentoring to his sons on practical matters - A true gift and legacy.

Throughout his life, Keith's constant themes were Marion, his dogs and the outdoors. He looked most contented when he was in the mountains with Marion or interacting with his Labradors in Bradgate Park. This is where we will best remember him, and we are all grateful for his drive to take us and show us what he loved there.

There was another less well-known side to Keith; he loved poetry. Often an anecdote would be illustrated by a line from some appropriate literature. He had a marvelous memory. The last poem he quoted to me just before Christmas was the Welsh National Anthem - in Welsh and from beginning to end.

So that was Keith's life in a few short sentences. He will be missed, but we can also celebrate a full and fulfilling life, think of Keith's humour and character, and be pleased for his life and what it brought to us.

## **Stags Head Appeal**

A lot has been achieved over the last three months since starting the Stag's Head Appeal in mid December. The money has been raised and the sculpture started on 6th March. At the time of writing this, Peter Leadbeater, sculptor, has finished apart from applying the initial preservative on Tuesday 20th March. The safety barriers will be removed and the site tidied up. We will then be able to see his impressive and imposing carving in all its glory.

Peter has received much interest whilst



working on the project, from walkers, joggers, mums with youngsters, passing motorists, photographers and members of the Village. We should have a good record of the daily progress of the carving from the number of photographs taken, although not by myself as we were away during the second week.

Over the next few months several coats of preservative will be required as the tree dries out. Thereafter the preservative will need to be applied every 4 months. It is anticipated that the carving will last 30 to 50 years.

The balance of the fundraising appeal will be spent within the Village. On a positive note a replacement copper beech tree has been purchased and will be planted in All Saints churchyard in week commencing 19th March in the vicinity of the one that was felled in January.

#### Newtown Linford Neighbourhood Watch -A member of the Parish Council



We received a warning that our red telephone box might be targeted but were not sure how we could protect it. We guessed that those being targeted were those bought and dumped in people's front gardens and that ours will be safe.

Despite many warnings, several cars were spotted unattended with the engines running during the recent bad weather. Fortunately it was too cold for the criminals to come out.

Charnwood Borough Council is circulating the following which I in turn placed on Facebook and the Gmail system.

I wanted to update you all that Leicestershire Police is currently dealing with a significant number of serious and major incidents that have been reported widely in the media.

To ensure that the investigations and incidents are dealt with correctly with scenes secured, house to house enquiries are completed, recovery of evidence progressed, while maintaining staff to respond to normal 24 hours demand the Force has to use resources across the whole of Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland. The force is also seeking support across the region to manage the demands.

This means that our Neighbourhood Teams will be utilised or deployed away from their normal duties while these complex and tragic demands are dealt with. These are decisions made every day but the number and complexity of the demands currently being dealt with mean that it may be more obvious than normal.

I know you will support this decision and the Neighbourhood Teams may well have to realign or reorganise some engagements that are not critical. The community may well ask about visibility in some areas where staff presence is reduced during this period and I hope you can assist by providing the context. As soon as the demand is met teams will be returned to front line duties in their beats.





### How to contact the Police

All incidents are to be reported to the Police and by calling 101

They will then assess the situation and deal with the situation as they see fit. This may involve a vehicle from another area. If you wish also advise our NHW coordinator who will circulate if appropriate.

If you have any concerns please let your NPA Commanders know and thank you all for the supportive comments already provided.



Seven of us met opposite the Village Hall in Newtown Linford and drove to the public car park on Stamford St., in front of Glenfield Primary School. Then uphill through Station Park and via estate roads back to Stamford St. Cups of tea in the Forge Inn, in the historic centre of Glenfield, rounded off the walk.

The Chairman would like to thank the Clerk, most of the Parish Councillors, Higher Councillors, Peter Tyldesley and one resident for attending the February Council meeting in the terrible weather that night.

#### Village working Group: -

The residents who have offered their services are arranging a brief meeting by kind invitation of Casey Pearson. They will be appointing their own Chairman. This working group will have no powers as such but will report to the Parish Council with their recommendations. Briefly so far, Speed Assessment equipment is out there at the time of writing. Once this information has been reviewed Leics CC will tweak the recent Consultation and put out for reconsultation. The cost of this is already included in that paid by the Bradgate Park Trust for the original application. It is understood that the consultation may be shorter than the previous 28 days. Once the results of that have been analysed and implemented if appropriate then Fiona Blockley from Leics C.C. will meet with the working group and give them their remit.

#### **Bob Bown Playing Fields: -**

Repair work to the equipment will begin as soon as the weather is suitable. The moles have been treated. Our lead Councillor Sue Colebeck and Councillor Stuart Eyre are still concerned about rope and a metal frame being tied to equipment. It would appear from comments on our Facebook page that some parents think this is acceptable and safe but as the Parish Council we are bound by stringent safety inspections and this would not be acceptable as safe use of the equipment. Some parents say that young children will always have an adult with them and see they are not injured but again as the Parish Council we cannot make that assumption. Please help us to comply with our obligations to the community. Further investment in maintenance of the equipment and the playing field is planned by the Parish Council and a budget is to be set aside to cover the costs of repair and eventual replacement of the equipment in the future.

#### Cemetery Groby Lane: -

The hedge along the roadside has been trimmed to comply with the bird nesting season. The fencing between the two sections has been taken out and the small parking area and new paths will be going in soon. Additional planting will be carried out to separate the new area for immediate use from the meadow area set aside for the future. All the signs have been made for some time but due to inclement weather it has not been possible to erect them. The existing large wooden cemetery sign will be relocated at the new entrance and once these are all in the one-way system will be fully operational.

#### Churchyard: -

The moles and the badgers have struck again. The mole company has been instructed to deal with them. Unfortunately, we cannot legally touch the Badgers. The maintenance men have been working on clearing the brambles and ivy which have not been touched for some time. They have also dug out the Fig tree that has been growing out of a grave for quite a while. They will soon be commencing the first cut of the grass at all three sites.

**Tree carving:** - Peter Leadbetter is carving the Stags Head at the time of writing. He says it will be slightly smaller than he originally thought due to some damage in the wood. Enormous thanks goes to the Friends of Charnwood Forest who have made a donation of £1,000 and their members Dick Howard and Paul Day, former local Councillor and Mayor of Charnwood who have raised a further substantial amount from residents in and around our village. This has paid for the tree carving, the provision of a replacement copper beech in the Churchyard and several assorted coloured trees for the boundaries of the cemetery extension. Dick and Paul will personally be planting the tree in the Churchyard as soon as the weather is suitable.


#### Replacement trees on Bradgate Road :-

Many of the lampposts have signs under or on them so it has been decided the best clear one is the one by the telephone box which should be a much clearer option and show off the planter well.
