The announcement of the measures to combat the spread of coronavirus by the Prime Minister has led to guidance from the Church of Eng-



land that **all public worship is now suspended**. That means that, until further notice, there will be no services held by All Saints' to attend, either on Sunday or midweek. This is true across the entire Church of England. Likewise, I am asking all Church activities to cease meeting in person for the time being – this includes groups like Jolly Tots and the bellringers – as non-essential activities.

So, we will no longer be able to gather to encourage one another in worship, teaching and prayer. This means we will not be able to celebrate the re-opening of the church building at Easter as planned. This will be deeply frustrating and sad. The service for Janet Neaverson in Holy Week has also been postponed.

But just as we do not cease to be the Church just because we don't meet in our own building, neither do we cease to be the Church if we cannot meet together at all for a time. As we explored in services before Christmas, we remain the Church wherever we are, scattered as well as gathered. We each have a Frontline on which to serve God, even if that is within the confines of our own house for a time.

We are looking at ways people can participate in this together from home. See the church Facebook page for more information.

May I also continue to encourage you, if you are able, to act to help those around you. We are called to love God and to love our neighbour. This is a time for that love of neighbour to be expressed, through reaching out to communicate, through what practical help we can give, and through praying for them.

The other week I visited a 'farm experience'. Largely aimed at children, there were lots of cute farmyard animals to coo over – and avoid being bitten by! Some big pigs to wrinkle your nose at. A few gangly calves to laugh at. Interestingly, though, there was no 4.30am alarm to get the cows in for milking of the kind my dad – who grew up on a farm – definitely experienced.

The main attractions were the new lambs. Now most of us have mixed feelings about lambs. On one hand they're terribly cute, especially when they're finding their feet and gambolling around the fields (does any other animal gambol?). On the other, they taste really good with mint sauce. We like to melt over their charm, but we also like the cheese to melt over our shepherd's pie. Are lambs for admiring, or eating? Or both? My second cousin, who spent her life on a sheep farm in the midst of Wales, called out at crazy times of the morning in lambing season, feeding some of the weaker lambs by hand to get them through the difficult early days, still loves her Sunday roast.



One of the names Jesus was known by was 'Lamb of God'. We sometimes have mixed feelings about Jesus – a good teacher, but perhaps a bit off the wall with some of his claims. The people of the time did too, some praised him, even worshipped him, others wanted him killed.

But at Easter that title, 'Lamb of God', is one we refer to regularly because at that time there was a third use for lambs: sacrifice. Lambs were killed so that people could be put right with God. Neither 'aah'ed over nor simply eaten, their purpose was a deeper one. Jesus replaced lambs for all time on the cross. And he did so in a way which gives us the chance to experience the full reality of life with God, not just a 'God experience'. Why not look this Easter into what calling Jesus 'Lamb of God' really means?



We took delivery of 85 bags of Vitax fertiliser a few days ago and distributed them to our members. This terribly wet winter weather will have washed away nutrients from the soil and they need to be replenished.



Our talk from Linda Smith about ponds last month was very much appreciated. Although not all our members have ponds, we learnt a great deal about newts and frogs and how to plant up to attract wild life including dragonflies and other winged insects. We did not realise that newts, frogs and toads all require different habitats to breed and thrive even in a normal sized garden pond.

Sadly, the coronavirus epidemic has affected the Gardening Club. Even though, at the time of writing, the disease is not prevalent in Leicestershire, we have come to the conclusion that a Village Hall full of people is not a good thing at this time. We have, therefore, cancelled the celebrity evening with Helen Yemm on 24th March for health reasons. Newtown Linford National Garden Scheme Open 25th May 2020

Come along and enjoy the six village gardens opening in historic Newtown Linford on Bank Holiday Monday, 25th May 2020, from 11am till 5pm. Stroll through the gardens (garden owners on hand for questions) and sit and relax with cake and tea at The Linford Club function room. Five are cottage gardens and one is a woodland walk. Several of the gardens have the River Lin running through the gardens or along their border. The entrance fee is £5 per person (children free) – that gets you into the six gardens. All proceeds, including teas, are for charity. Unfortunately the gardens are not accessible for some people with restricted mobility. There are steep slopes, stone steps, gravel drives and narrow paths.

The gardens are open under the National Garden Scheme. It was established in 1927 to fund District Nursing. It now donates to Macmillan Cancer Support, Marie Curie, Hospice UK and the Queen's Nursing Institute. There are about 3,700 gardens nationally which open, raising about £3 million each year. This is the fourth time Newtown Linford has opened, we raise from £4,000-£7,000 each time.

The gardens open this year on 25th May are: 107 Main St; Appletree Cottage (114 Main St); Pilgrim Cottage (97 Main St); Dingle House (94A Main St), Bank Cottage (90 Main St), Woodlands (86 Main St). All gardens are very close together at the Woodhouse Eaves end of the village. Gardens open will have a sunflower outside their front garden or for 117, at the bottom of their drive and further up. There is yellow National Garden Scheme signage off the main roads and for the parking, and maps will be provided to garden visitors. Parking is at The Linford Club which is nearest to 86 Main St, and weather permitting, in the field nearest to 97 Main Street, junction of Main Street and Ulverscroft Lane.

Visitors are also able to enter the NGS photographic competition. There will be a garden quiz. Homemade cake and teas will be available at the Linford Club, 66 Main St LE6 0AD, in their function room. There will be some plants, good second-hand books and old garden tools for sale. All proceeds are for charity. Our sincere thanks go to all those donating and to Claire at the Linford and Malcolm from Lenthill Farm for providing function room and parking.

Report from David Snartt Lady Jane Mobile Home Park.

The planning application for the erection of 5 two bed bungalows, 2 three bed bungalows and a replacement dwelling at 532 Bradgate Road has now been granted planning permission. I was pleased to see that the mix of bungalows was changed to 5 two bed from the previously submitted plans, which had included a small single bedroom which would not meet the size standard for a single bedroom. Therefore, this was amended to reflect the more appropriate use of the room as a study.

It has been suggested to the applicant that a gated access to the development would resolve the potential issue of visitors to Bradgate Park parking their vehicles on the site. There is also a condition placed that details are needed, as to how surface water will be directed away from the public highway and disposed of within the site.

I am pleased to see that the developer has proposed bungalows on this site, this was something I suggested during the early stages of the planning process to meet local housing needs. Full details can be found on Charnwood Borough Council's website under planning application P/19/2119/2.





THE FRIENDS OF CHARNWOOD FOREST



Chez Grey?

On Monday February 17th, Peter Liddle, the former County Archaeologist, gave a talk to the Friends of the Charnwood Forest about Bradgate Park, and in particular Bradgate House. Using old documents and numerous photographic illustrations he was able to reconstruct at least some of the history of that estate, starting with mesolithic occupants some 14,000 to 12,000 years ago, up to the present day. His main subject, however, was centred around the house itself in which digs have taken place over the last 5 years.

The first site was what was probably an old lodge or keeper's house. Here he expressed surprise at how near the surface the actual archaeology lay. As much of his work previously had been concentrated on sites in the city, where the interesting levels could be several feet below the present-day surface, it is not surprising that he was a little astonished.

The next year's dig was in the courtyard of the old house, where foundations were found of an older building. As the oldest document had termed the 'house' as a 'lodge', it could be that the present ruin was of a later date. Did Lady Jane Grey live in that 'lodge' or was the brick construction we know her home? Evidence is at present a little ambiguous. The 'new' house was abandoned in the mid nineteenth century, and the gable wall of the Great Hall collapsed in a gale in 1895. In the 1930s, when the park passed into public ownership, the council had the ruin 'improved', including the ruin of a tower which had not been there before.

The digging then moved to the stables, where various interesting finds on its layout were made, including a dump of old horse leg bones — these may be the left-overs from dogs' dinners. The building itself was still in use after the house was left to decay; its materials may have been taken finally to be used in other building works.

They went back to the house for the final year of the dig. Here there were restrictions as to how far down they could dig, for they were not able to move any floors they came across because the building is a

Scheduled Ancient Monument. In one place they did find a pit which was full of old pottery shards. In another they followed the foundations of an older building up to a modern wall. They also found numerous drains, one of which contained a plastic glove, and gave a clue to the work of the restorers in the 1920s.

One thing that was evident in the old documents which may have deserved a mention – in the first document it was titled Brodgate park; in the second Broadgate park, and as we call it, Bradgate park. It does

now look, however, both from the archaeology and from recently discovered documents, as if Lady Jane probably inhabited the stone house found in the excavations and that brick house mostly predates her short life.



FOREWORD

By Lt. Col. Sir Robert Martin

he county of Leicestershire has had its place in not a few of the notable events in the history of England, and in this year of the Festival of Britain, when we are encouraged by no less an authority than His Majesty the King to remind ourselves of what our people have achieved in many spheres of human endeavour, it is surely right that we should think of those who have graced the past of Leicestershire.

The city would doubtless claim its connection with Simon de Montfort and his parliament, Thurcaston with Hugh Latimer the Martyr, and Fenny Drayton with George Fox the preacher.

For us in Newtown it is Lady Jane Grey to whom our thoughts instinctively turn, when we have in mind the years behind us. The greater part of her short life was spent here, at the old house in Bradgate Park, until the ill-conceived ambitions of her family brought her to her death. Janet Neaverson

A Service of Thanksgiving for Janet's life was to have been held at All Saints Church, Newtown Linford on Wednesday, 8th April at 2pm conducted by the Venerable Richard Worsfold. Due to the current circumstances the Service will have to be postponed until later in the year

Janet was born in Leicester on 26th January 1933 and was the only child of hard-working parents who ran the Westcotes Post Office. She had a happy childhood and attended Dovelands School followed by Wyggeston Grammar for Girls and then on to London University. There she obtained a Nutrition Degree and a Diploma in Dietetics at Queen Elizabeth College (now part of Kings).

She then worked for Leicestershire Health Authority as a Dietician at the LRI, Towers Hospital and general dietetics in the Community with GP referrals in Melton Mowbray, Uppingham and Oakham. She married Peter Neaverson in 1958 and they lived in Birstall for the first few years of their married life before moving to Newtown Linford in December 1967. They were among the first residents in the newly built Grey Crescent and she described that first winter as living on a building site in a sea of mud! They soon settled into their lovely home and it wasn't long before Janet

became a much-valued member of the local community.

She was twice President of the WI and served on the Leicestershire Federation Committee for many years. She was a Parish Councillor for 40 years and was Vice Chair at the time of her retirement. She was also a Village Hall Committee member at various times and a Patron of the Choral Society. She was involved in the 1976 pageant and helped to make some of the costumes where



Janet's skills as a needlewoman were very welcome.

Janet had a deep faith and was a regular at the 8am Service at All

Saints. She loved flowers and was the organiser of the Church Flower Rota encouraging others with help and guidance to enlist.

Her other interests included playing Bridge and she was also very talented lace maker. She loved the Village and Park, enjoyed walk-



ing with friends and was part of the Rambling Group. For many years Janet was the archivist of the Village Record and diligently recorded local happenings and events. Sadly, her ill-health meant a gradual withdrawal from village life although she remained greatly interested in local affairs. She spent the last two years in the Cedar Mews Care Home We will miss her.

Newtown Linford Neighbourhood Watch - A member of the Parish Council



This month's article comes from Inspector Mark Botte, Commander of the Charnwood Neighbourhood Policing Area.

"Good morning,

I just wanted to pass an update for what has been going on locally over the past few weeks. I hope most of you are signed up to Twitter and have been following Charnwood Police progress.

It's been a really busy time for the station. On Wednesday this week, Leicestershire Police started a new operating model which is far more locally focused and has officers based at Loughborough Police Station able to respond to local incidents around Charnwood Borough. The teams have all settled in well, I'm really pleased with the officers we have working from Loughborough Police Station and I'm confident that you will all see more visibility around Charnwood.

Of note, overall crime is down now by 8% which is fantastic news, however, as always I don't want to stop here and I want this figure to go down even further. I understand that there will be local variations around Charnwood and we are working hard to understand why this is. Of note burglary, theft of and theft from vehicles is significantly down across the Borough, overall that's nearly 1000 less victims of crime.

I now have 10 Neighbourhood Patrol Sgts and 5 Neighbourhood Sgts working from Charnwood, all focusing on local issues as opposed to the wider Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland. Of course there will be times that we may have to support neighbouring police areas in the county, however, so far we have all managed to deal with our own demand.

Please can I encourage you all to speak to friends and neighbours and see if we can increase our Neighbourhood Link footprint. Charnwood Watch has been a real success with requests from all over the Borough for watch schemes to start up.

Finally some really exciting news for Charnwood, we are having the front office back at Loughborough Police Station which I hope will open early





next year. This will allow me to provide a more holistic policing function from the Station and hopefully, provide better access to the Police for local residents.

Thank you all for the continued support."

I am currently liaising with the Charnwood Watch organiser myself and will be receiving new signs for residents to display, should you wish to.



In other NHW news, I am sad to report that there was an attempted break-in on Grey Crescent recently, whereby criminals tried to force entry via the rear door, rear windows and side door and also tried breaking a lock barrel. Fortunately, they were unsuccessful but this has obviously left residents feeling quite unnerved.

I have been in touch with our local NPT who have contacted the victims to offer support and have increased patrols of the area.

Keep 'em peeled.

Bob Bown Memorial Field

Work continues in sourcing a new local supplier of playground equipment. As soon as arrangements have been finalised, the damaged Springer will be replaced. I'm sure you'll remember me quoting a figure for this. Unfortunately, the figure did not include installation charges and

when that was taken into account, a replacement with our previous suppliers was not viable.

I am also currently looking into replacement 5-a-side football goals of a standard size, which will negate the difficulties we have in obtaining correct sized nets.

If anyone has any comments or suggestions they wish to make with regards provisions on the Bob Bown Memorial Field, please do not hesitate in contacting me. I'd be particularly interested to hear the views of older children and teens. We can't promise anything but we will always do our best to accommodate reasonable requests.

Following on from a comment received, Parish Councillors agree that regular maintenance is required on the Churchyard Garden of Remembrance.

With immediate effect, this area will be tended to on a weekly to fortnightly basis, whereby wilting flower tributes will be removed and the area kept tidy. Hopefully, this will make a difference to visitors.

As previously mentioned, a number of trees have been planted in the wider areas of the Cemetery, by pupils and Mums of NLPS in a special Mother's Day Tree Planting Event. The trees were awarded to the Parish Council by The Woodland Trust. Our regular grass cutting and maintenance work has also commenced for the 2020 season.


