

The builders have moved in! As you can see from the photo, the renovation work in All Saints' is under way. The scaffolding went up, the covers have gone on and by the time you read this the serious work will be well under way.



Those who have seen earlier articles will know what is being done: there's a new dais (platform) going in at the front, to make it easier to host things like the Choral Society concert which filled the Church in December; the complete lighting system is being replaced, so we can see and appreciate the true colours within the building as well as doing our bit for the planet; a new AV system is being installed; and last, but not least, every accessible bit of wall is being painted. As many others have com-

mented, this work is not before time. The need for some form of redecoration has been evident for some time. What hasn't been quite so obvious is some of the more structural work which is underway – the replacement of old wiring for instance.

Sometimes our lives are like our buildings: we can recognise we need a bit of a renovation. Sometimes that can be something as (apparently!) simple as doing a bit more exercise. Sometimes it's about changing a career, or just a job. But sometimes we look at ourselves and realise that the renovation needs to go deeper than just changing some of the surface stuff – painting the walls, if you take the analogy. I have on my shelf a book called 'Renovation of the soul'. Sometimes, like the author, I look at my life and recognise that there are deeper issues which need attention, things which are there which shouldn't be, or things which I'm lacking which might cause a collapse. Things like an anger problem, or an addiction, or an envy problem.

Renewing a building is an incredible task – it takes hard work and great skill. The results are often deeply fulfilling. But the harder task is the renewal of a soul. For that we need help. In the book of Ezekiel, God promises: I will give you a new heart and put a new spirit in you; I will remove from you your heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh.

What renovation work does your soul need? God, and often only God, can help.





Recycling in Charnwood.

I thought it may be interesting to give details on one area of recycling carried out by Charnwood Borough Council: Battery Collections.

The Council operates a kerbside battery collection scheme. Batteries can be put in battery bags provided by the Council. You can put your bagged batteries out for collection on your recycling day, either on top of, or next to your green recycling bin, but not in it. They will be collected by the recycling crews and stored in a small pod at the side of their vehicle. To make the scheme more efficient the Council ask that residents save batteries until they have at least ten to present when a battery bag is collected. A replacement bag will be left, alternatively call 01509 634563 for some bags to be sent to you.

Types of batteries collected will be D, C, AA, AAA, 9v, button, rechargeable, mobile, I pod and hearing aid batteries. The Council cannot accept car or other industrial batteries along with e-cigarette batteries.

Fly Tipping. Fly tipping is the illegal dumping of household and trade waste. It is a criminal offence and can result in unlimited fines and, or five years imprisonment. To investigate, Charnwood Borough Council need as much information as possible. Any help you can give is very important. Please remember: Do not touch fly-tipped waste, it may contain dangerous items such as syringes, broken glass, toxic chemicals or other hazardous substances. There may also be evidence that could identify the culprits. Do visually inspect the waste. I would be grateful if you would let Charnwood Borough Council know where it is located and how much has been fly-tipped. Report any incidents of fly-tipping direct to the Council's Street Management on 01509 634564.

Lady Jane Mobile Home Park. I thought you would be interested in the latest information about the planning application to develop 7 bungalows and a replacement dwelling at 532 Bradgate Road, Newtown Linford. I have asked for this application to be determined by a plans committee, until I have a better understanding of the impact this will have, especially the two storey replacement dwelling, on the listed buildings, which includes Rose Cottage. I also stated the need for a mix of two and three bed bungalows. I have also raised the issue of vehicle parking on village streets whilst people visit Bradgate Park. Full details about this application can be found on the Charnwood website under planning application P/19/2119/2. I also note a tree preservation order has been placed on three trees on this site, located close to the south western boundary. These trees make a significant contribution to the visual amenity of the area. Therefore, it is considered appropriate to ensure that the trees are properly protected. **Councillor David.Snartt**

Information from County Hall

Following review of Services 120 and 155, these two services have been combined into one – Service 125 – with East Midlands Airport no longer being served.

Since the community engagement events held in October 2019, where details of the intended changes were shared, we have reviewed the comments received.

Please note, it is LCC's duty to consider the provision of passenger transport services for areas not served by alternative commercial bus or rail services, to enable them to access essential facilities and services such as food shopping and primary healthcare.

Despite addressing the following issues raised (which will be incorporated into finalised timetables), it will not be possible to meet all journey requirements:

• Last journey from Leicester to Coalville retimed to 17.45 (rather than the proposed 17:30)

Increased time between arrival and return journey in Coalville – Passengers travelling to Coalville on 10.15 journey from Castle Donington will have increased time in Coalville (from 2 hours to 2 hours 15 mins) before making return journey.

Please see attached, change notice containing finalised timetable for the new 125 service (Castle Donington – Leicester via Coalville & Bradgate Park).

This notice will be displayed on relevant buses and bus stops.

Please note, these service changes will take effect from **24**th **February 2020.**

Most Christians, and Christian sympathisers, admit to finding prayer difficult. Almost all, towards the end of their lives, say that they should have prayed more often and with more faith



In March, on four of the five Sundays (Mothering Sunday excepted), I shall try to open up this important subject during our relocated services in the Village Hall. There will be a talk about prayer, a time for questions, and a time to explore various methods of praying

We shall look first at the question of confession (why?) and giving thanks and praise (which CS Lewis, the writer of the Narnia stories, found particularly puzzling when he first became a Christian)

Secondly, we will explore the use of silence. Something much needed in our busy talkative world. Silence is seen by many as the key to prayer. Jesus is frequently recorded as spending long periods of prayer in lonely places.

Thirdly, we will look at the question of intercession. Why do some prayers get dramatically answered (like those of the trapped Chilean miner who taught all his comrades to pray while they waited for an unlikely rescue)? Why do others seem to receive an unwanted 'no' like those offered for my friend David Watson, a leading evangelist who led some IRA and Loyalists in the Maize prison to faith, who died of cancer at a very early age? Is it a waste of time praying for big world issues?

Fourthly, we will consider how to pray directly for other people who in the words of the Book of Common Prayer may be in 'trouble, sorrow, need, sickness or any other adversity'.

The last remaining copies of my book, *Thinking Clearly about prayer*, will be available (for a small donation to the Restoration Fund!).


Cedric Murray

THE FRIENDS OF CHARNWOOD FOREST



The last meeting of the Friends for this year took place at The Brand, Woodhouse Eaves, on 17th November, and was hosted by Colonel & Mrs Martin. The house is situated at the end of a longish drive just outside Woodhouse, and is nestled shyly amid a grove of trees. It was built in 1875 for the Ellis family. They, however, found it was too inconvenient for their interests in Leicester, so in 1888 they rented it to the Martin family. The Martins had resided in Anstey at a house named Anstey Pastures for over 400 years. However, Robert Frewen Martin, the then owner of Anstey Pastures, was suffering from ill-health, and as Anstey was being engulfed by the city, he had decided that The Brand was more suited to his condition. He finally bought the property, together with some cottages, from the Ellis family in 1892 for £11,000. One must ask – where could you get a property, save perhaps a rabbit hutch, for such a sum today?

In 1875 Robert Martin had founded the Mountsorrel Granite Company; his sons inherited the concern and between the wars the company had prospered; so much so, in fact, that the Martin family was able to assist in finance for the old Loughborough College – now the University – and in Bradgate Park. The present owner is the 23rd generation of Martins to live in the shire, so the internet tells me.

Unfortunately, due to the weather, there was no parking available at the house; members had to park along the road and walk the drive to reach the house, although a shuttle service was arranged for those who were not able to walk. On the walk one could admire three highland cows in an adjacent field. At the front hall we were greeted by a glass of wine. Members slowly spread out into sitting rooms; small groups stood for a while and then sat down. Much chatting then took place.

Then it was lunch time. In the dining room was a large table bowed under a lavish spread. It was so large that members often went round twice, though I admit I did not make a study of this. At the end there was still food on the dishes. All too soon it was time to go. We thanked Colonel and Mrs Martin for their hospitality, took the long walk down the drive and, feeling suitably refreshed, set out on the drive home.

Our following meeting was on 20th January, when Neil Pilcher gave a talk on "Charnwood Forest – A living landscape", at Woodhouse Village Hall

From The Records - 1954

Back in 1954 the Mercury looked back on the Christmas present given to the people of Leicester & Leicestershire 28 years previously - when on December 29th 1928 Bradgate Park was bought by Mr Charles Bennion.

The man who had looked after the park since then was Mr Edward Haslegrave. He has worked amongst the bracken and granite of Bradgate Park since 1913. Mr Haslegrave came to Leicestershire from Yorkshire where he had started his apprenticeship at the Temple Newsam Estate at the age of 16. When he was appointed estate agent at Bradgate soon after his arrival in the Midlands, the parkland which belonged to the Greys of Groby then covered 9,000 acres. By 1954 it covers 1,044 acres under public ownership - 896 of them the original Bennion gift.

Mr Haslegrave was particularly interested in the deer during the December months. He felt they had not had an easy time in the recent years, after a couple of previous good years. When he had first come to the park they had been too domesticated and fed too often with all sorts of food. "You never found the deer in the places where their natural food was. Their natural food all lies in the park, but they were being fed on hay, maize and beans". This year however the deer are in fine spirits: in fact they are, in Mr Haslegrave's opinion, "healthier than ever before".

Mr Haselgrave did not know how many deer were roaming the bracken but checks took place. When the park is in the grip of winter and the deer have difficulty in finding enough food, Mr Haslegrave introduces the winter feeding arrangements and once the animals have become accustomed to their eating places and to the estate workers who looked after them, their number would be counted.

Mr Haslegrave's open air life contained mornings, lots of hard work and plenty of good brisk exercise. In the old days there were horses for transport. These days it is "shanks pony". Motor cars are no use to me he said "can't drive and can't be bothered". "they just don't appeal to me". And no wonder to see Mr Haslegrave striding out over the bracken and up to Old John you wouldn't guess he was 80 on his last birthday.

Roll forward 66 years - he would not believe how many cars come to the park and Village, and the three car parks serving the main Park. Instead of a queue of buses to take families to and from the Park, the residents of Leicester would only have 2 buses a day to take them to the park (the other two being too late for visitors to use).

Michael Pitchers, late of Grey Crescent, Newtown Linford, died peacefully at the New Wycliffe Home on 2nd December 2019, after a long struggle with Alzheimer's dementia.

He and my mother, Sonia, had lived in the Village since the late 1960s and Dad never recovered from Mum's sudden death in 2014. They had been married for 69 years! In happier times Dad was known as a keen dinghy sailor, photographer and aero-modeller and for a time was chairman of Leicester Aero Model Club. He also had 'green fingers', providing the family with a wonderful variety of vegetables. After retiring, he indulged his passion for aviation and earned his Silver Certificate flying full-scale gliders at Husbands Bosworth.

He will be greatly missed by his daughter Julie, his grandchildren Eleonore, Edward, Ben, Sarah, Becky, James, Nick and Joanne and all their families. Mike will also be missed by the many friends that he made in his 96 years.

Newtown Linford Neighbourhood Watch - A member of the Parish Council



In late November, I received a report from a resident who'd had their catalytic converter stolen from their vehicle. This happened overnight and whilst it was parked on their driveway!

This isn't a new crime but catalytic converter (CAT) thefts rose dramatically during 2019 and owners of any vehicle fitted with a CAT, are being warned to take precautions.

What is a catalytic converter? A catalytic converter is part of a car's emissions control system. It cleans up the exhaust gases by breaking them down into less harmful substances and water vapour, before they are expelled from the car through the exhaust pipe. All cars sold in Europe since 1993, have had to be fitted with catalytic converters by law. Catalytic converters are located in a box on the exhaust pipe under a car. In order to steal it, thieves slide under the car and use high-powered cutting tools to detach the box from the pipes around it. It can take less than three minutes!

CATs are a target for thieves as they contain precious metals such as rhodium, platinum and palladium and therefore, their value is high. There are between 3-7 grams of platinum group metals in a standard catalytic converter but the amount varies based on vehicle manufacturer and model. Those that are most often targeted are cars with a higher chassis, such as a 4x4 or an SUV and hybrid vehicles.

As hybrid cars have two power sources, the CAT is used less frequently and therefore, the metals are less likely to have corroded, meaning they are worth more.

This isn't an isolated incident in our area and PS Roderick Smart of Charnwood NPA, reported an increase in CAT thefts back in October 2019, via the Neighbourhood Link crime update. His advice is as follows:-

- Park your car in a locked garage where possible but if this isn't an option, then park it in a well-lit and well-populated area.
- Park close to fences, walls or a kerb with the exhaust being closest to the fence, wall or kerb to make the theft more difficult.
- Avoid parking your vehicle half on the pavement and half on the road, as this may make it easier for thieves to access the catalytic

converter.

- If parking in a public car park, consider parking alongside other cars and facing your bonnet towards the wall if possible. With the catalytic converter positioned at the front of your vehicle, this will make it harder for thieves to get close enough to steal it.
- If there is a fleet of vehicles, park the low clearance vehicles to block the high clearance vehicles. This will obstruct access underneath.
- If your catalytic converter is bolted on, you can ask for your local garage to weld the bolts to make it more difficult to remove.
- Alternatively, you can also etch a serial number on the converter.



 You can even purchase a 'cage clamp' which is a cage device that locks in around the converter, to make it more difficult to remove.

If you see someone acting suspiciously under a vehicle, report it to the Police. Obtain as much information as possible, including any vehicle registrations.

At the time of writing this, we are into the second week of a New Year and of a new decade. I'm sure 2020 will be an exciting and productive year ahead for Newtown Linford.

Reports have been quieter over the festive period. However, what has remained busy is the number of fly-tipping incidents that have occurred within the Parish and continue to do so.

I am pleased to report that Charnwood Borough Council have now deployed CCTV cameras across the district, specifically to target fly tippers and posters have been displayed around the wider area to promote this.

Please, if you see any incidents of fly-tipping and you have any details that might identify those responsible, such as a vehicle registration number, report it to me in confidence, as CBC will take action against those littering our beautiful countryside and Village. Not only can it pose a danger to the public but also to wildlife and the time and cost implications on Local Councils in clear-up operations is draining.

Good news! Charnwood Borough Council have given NLPC a supply of flood defence 'Hydrosnakes' that can be used in the event of flash flooding, as witnessed back in October 2019. These are to be stored in central locations within the Village, that are easily accessible and details will be shared with you once all locations have been identified.

On with the news....

Bob Bown Memorial Field – I was disappointed to receive a report on 30/12/19 reporting an incident of damage to playground equipment. Upon inspection, one of the infant Springers had had a rather large part snapped off and the item had to be cordoned off for safety reasons. The Springer toys are intended for use by 3-5 year olds and although I don't believe the damage was intentional, it could have been innocently caused by an older, stronger user, playing on it with some exuberance and having fun (we've all done it at some time in our lives, I'm sure!). Sadly though, the cost to replace the broken part is substantial at £336, which the Parish Council will have to fund. For now, the Springer is unsafe to use and is easily identifiable by the red and white barrier tape covering it.

Churchyard -On the very chilly morning of Saturday 14th December, Dick Howard, Scott Raynor and David Rigg formed a working party at the Churchyard and planted between 200 and 250 spring bulbs, which had been kindly donated by Parish Council Chairman. Sue Pritchard. A big thank you goes to Dick, Scott and David for giving up their free time and


