But also remember to pray for your godchild, remember that the promise you made at baptism was a promise to help them discover and own Christian faith for themselves.

My best memory as a godparent is when my oldest godchild, fresh at university, let me know that she had decided, after some teenage hesitation, to follow Jesus. I hope Abigail's godparents get to have the same conversation one day.

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

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Newtown Linford Gardening Club (www.newtownlinford,org,uk/gardening-club,html)

We begin our year with a speaker who has attracted a lot of attention in her short career as a garden designer. Four years ago,

Nicola Oakey was the only female finalist in the RHS Young Gardener of the Year competition. She completed her diploma in garden design nine years ago and yet, two years later, won her first gold medal at Gardeners' World Live. In 2018 she won the Pro Landscapers '30 under 30' award recognising her as one of the UK's up and coming garden designers.

After working with Adam Frost for three years she has now set up her own garden design studio in Rutland.



We are fortunate to be able to welcome her before she becomes really famous.

In April we have secured the services of Jim Buttress who has national recognition for his work with the Royal Parks and Gardens including Hyde Park, St James's Park, Kensington Palace, Greenwich Park and Buckingham Palace. He has also featured on some television programmes including 'The Big Allotment Challenge'. He was due to come to us last year, but an accident prevented him from travelling. We are, however, delighted to be able to invite him back this year and, with a coronation due later this year, it is very appropriate to hear about the Royal Gardens.

These are but two of the exciting events we have scheduled for this year, and we have several interesting events still to look forward to.

Fertiliser and Compost.

We are again offering to members a chance to obtain Vitax Fertiliser at a discount rate to be delivered in early February. This has proved very popular over the year. The price this year will be $\pounds 6.40$ for a large bag. It is to be used sparingly so it will go a long way. You may place your order at the January meeting or by responding to this newsletter with an email or telephone call.

We are also offering, at a discount price, 50 litre bags of Sylvagrow which is a peat-free compost. This product has been recommended by some of our members as being much better than the Westland product we tried last year. These bags will be ordered for early April and will cost £5.40.

Markfield Lane and Groby Lane roadside verges

End of season conservation work has been completed on the wildlife sections of the verges - cutting the grass, waiting a few days for the wildflower seeds to drop on to the ground, and then raking up and removing the cuttings, or 'arisings,' which helps improve the conditions for wildflowers. We also decided to sow Yellow Rattle seeds in sec-





tions of both verges, and in the wildlife area on the fringe of the Bob Bown Field. Yellow Rattle is an annual which is semi-parasitic and 'feeds' on grasses, thus weakening them and giving other wildflowers a chance to get established.

Not mowing during

most of the growing season isn't just about wildflowers and helping bees, butterflies and other pollinators. As NatureSpot (https:// www.naturespot.org.uk/) says: "The taller vegetation means lots of insects and other invertebrates can now find a home in the moist and protected interior - providing vital food for hedgehogs, birds, frogs, small mammals and other creatures."

Land at the bottom of Markfield Lane

As you may know, the Parish Council is exploring the possibility of adopting a small area by the River Lin, next to the bridge at the bottom of Markfield Lane. This land isn't registered with HM Land Registry and they hold no records of its ownership. The Parish Council is interested to learn if anyone knows of any maintenance or management work that has previously been carried out there. If the P.C. does adopt this land, Newtown Linford Biodiversity has offered to manage it and would invite ideas from local residents on how best to look after the area, and improve it for people and wildlife.

Nest boxes

As previously reported, last year blue tits were seen going in and out of three out of the five nest boxes purchased by the Parish Council following the successful Shire Environment Grant application. When the box-

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es were taken down for cleaning – another task for the autumn - we discovered that all five had been used! Nests of most birds harbour fleas and other parasites, which can remain and infest young birds that hatch the following year. The R.S.P.B. recommend that old nests are removed in the autumn. after the birds have stopped using the

nests. They advise using boiling water to kill any parasites, and letting the box dry out thoroughly before replacing the lid. Insecticides and flea powders must not be used.

Young Farmers, Church, the local farming community and the local Annual Show to name just a few.

The family would like to thank everyone for their kindness welcoming her and Alan her husband to the village and their kind words of support on her passing

Village Archive. Life in 1965

Looking through the archive, I came across the Newtown Linford, Women's Institute, Jubilee Scrapbook, 1965. The scrapbook which was compiled with great care, and with many photographs, is absolutely fascinating. Sadly the authors are unknown but it must have taken many hours. There is great deal of information about all of the organisations in the Village at that time. The following is just a snapshot.

Church services on Sundays were attended on an average by between 70 and 80 people. Weekdays activities were well supported and included a Women's Fellowship Group supporting a hospital in Nigeria. There were 21 in the Church Choir, and more tenors were required (as today!)

The Brownie pack had restarted in May that year and the numbers in the scouts and cubs had grown steadily. The Sunday School was attended by 36 children and the noise is described *as "being terrific!"* The author goes on to say that all is quiet for the opening service taken by Mr J Ayling, and then the children are divided into four classes. Painting, crayoning, cutting up pictures and modelmaking were enjoyed while they learned a hymn or prayer.

"At harvest festival the children bring baskets of produce and harvest gifts to form a procession to the church and the service is popular with parents and children. One thing never fails to amuse on these occasions. The smallest child carries the largest basket! Tiny tots stagger, along with huge marrows and trugs of outsize onions, but the teenagers nonchalantly turn up with half a dozen eggs in a small basket or a bunch of flowers. However, woe betide any teacher foolish enough to try and share the load."

Property, sales and auctions are included, and record *"how great interest was raised as soon as one of the old cottages became vacant or put up for sale.* One large house (Heyday Hayes) was purchased with the intention of it becoming a hotel for older people. The scheme was approved but found unfeasible. Incidentally there was a public enquiry in June 1965 when the Parish Council supported the County Council in their refusal to allow building development on a large scale behind Markfield Lane.

The scrapbook also records "*remarkable changes having been made in*volved in turning the old sheep dip into a bungalow (Stone Cottage) and a single storey cowshed, 33 Main St, into an attractive house"

Butcher, Baker, Candlestick maker:-

"One butcher came to the village daily and another twice a week. 2 bakers brought bread etc on three days a week and a candlestick maker rang his bell to announce his arrival on a Tuesday and sold polish, paraffin powders and paints. Two milkmen and one milkmaid serve the village every day. Three laundries called for washing and a fishman came twice a week. A greengrocer called three times a week and the newsagent met the buses coming from Leicester sorting the newspapers in the living room of the cottage."

The grocers van came twice a week and the shop at 15 Main Street had recently been converted into a self service store.

A magazine for children was produced by Roger Gimson, aged 14, three times a year for the *"amusement of friends and relatives,* "Stoneywell Magazine" price 3d (about 9p) A copy is included in the scrapbook.

There is even a weather report and it seems to have been a gloomy summer. The hottest day was on 14th May - 26c. Rainfall was 33.65 inches (annual average 24.2 inches), Sunshine 1150 hours (annual average 1289 hours). The most snowy day was 20th March, when 4 inches was recorded. (all pre-metric).

There is so much more contained in this book and I would be delighted to share it with anyone who has an interest in the history of the village. Please give me a call and come and have a coffee with me (there may even be cake).

AGM. On 16th January we held our AGM in the Village Hall.

As the Drama Society is in the throes of closure (see page 42), Peter Upton, their nominee, has stood down from the Committee as also has Margaret Bloor, and we thank them both for their service. I am pleased to say that we have two excellent replacements: Jonny Appleton and Jason Hall. We welcome them both to the Committee.

The existing officers (myself, Peter Rose and Janet Brunton) were reelected respectively as Chairman, Treasurer and Secretary.

During the 3 months to 31^{st} December we had a net surplus of income over expenditure of £658. This included £548 from the successful Advent Christmas Fayre and £270 from the Choral Society's "Come and Sing". It was also unseasonably warm. Despite this, we remain concerned about

Information from David Snartt.

Planning update Markfield Lane.

I am pleased to see the latest submissions to the consultation process for the planning application P/22/1031/2 for up to 150 dwellings, on land south of Markfield Lane.

I note National Highways have now responded. They recommend that the application is not determined for a period of three months from the date of their notice (21st December 2022). It seems one of the reasons for this delay is to assess the cumulative impact of the other planning applications in the bigger area (which includes Anstey) on the Strategic Road Network.

You may recall this was one of my concerns, especially as there are proposals to develop a further 1,000 plus dwellings within Anstey. In my view, if all of these planning applications were successful it would certainly see extra traffic through the village to access the M1 and other locations to the north of the village.

I also note Hinckley and Bosworth Borough Council object to this application. In their submission they say, Markfield has a Neighbourhood Plan which allocates a substantial and sufficient amount of housing in the village. The Neighbourhood Plan meeting all the criteria of paragraph 14 of the National Planning Policy Framework.

Again, I alluded to the Markfield Neighbourhood Plan when I attended the appeal hearing for the other adjacent application for up to 93 dwellings adjacent to Ashby Road. I am still waiting for the decision notice from the Inspector.

Draft Budget For 2023/24

Charnwood Borough Council has produced a draft budget for 2023/24 which was considered by the Council's Cabinet on the 15th December. The Cabinet resolved to endorse the draft budget for consultation. This budget looks to spend around £20 million on services for the Borough. This does include a proposal to increase the Charnwood element of Council Tax by £5 across the year, or about 9p a week for a band D property. The Council does not want to raise even the small element of Council Tax, but the Council feels this is necessary to help protect front-line services as they continue to look for ways to operate more efficiently. Historically, Charnwood Borough Council has one of the lowest rates of Council Tax in the country.

The Council is responsible for a wide range of services including; col-



lecting recycling and refuse from more than 70,000 homes in the Borough; supporting homeless people; managing open spaces including the Outwoods; emptying dog bins, litter bins; street cleaning; food safety inspections; licensing of pubs, clubs and taxis; operating Loughborough markets; operating three leisure centres; handling planning applications and strategic planning and operating 24/7 CCTV system.

Charnwood Local Plan 2021 to 2037

Hearing sessions will resume at 9.30am on Tuesday 7th February 2023, Victoria Room, Town Hall, Loughborough. Matters, issues and questions have been produced by the Inspectors. These include any questions which have not been addressed during the hearing sessions which have taken place thus far and any supplementary questions stemming from the Inspector's consideration of the Leicester and Leicestershire housing and employment unmet needs. The updated programme and guidance note have also been produced for the resumed hearings.

The Inspectors have been appointed by the Secretary of State to examine the soundness of the Local Plan. The National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) makes it clear that, to be sound, a local plan should be positively prepared, justified, effective and consistent with the NPPF. There are three possible outcomes to the examination: The submitted plan is sound: The submitted plan is not sound but could be made sound by changes (known as main modifications), if necessary following additional work: The submitted plan is not sound and could not be made sound by changes.

As previously stated, I have sent my written submissions to the Inspectors, especially my concerns about the proposed developments within Anstey and the proposal to develop land close to Woodthorpe, which encroaches into the Woodhouse Parish.

National Garden Scheme Snowdrop Festival Leicestershire open gardens February 2023

We start the gardening year in 2023 with our Snowdrop Festival. These gardens are opened in February by our Snowdrop enthusiasts and we can see beautiful and rare varieties on display. Besides snowdrops, there are also many early flowers such as Aconites, Hellebores, and Cyclamen together with our



favourite winter shrubs including the lovely scented Hamamelis. There is something irresistible about snowdrops. With their delicate nodding flowers, they lift our spirits and tell us spring is coming.

Leicestershire National Garden scheme has 3 gardens which are part of the nationwide Snowdrop festival, starting with The Acers at 10 The Rills, Hinckley, LE10 1NA. This garden opens on Sunday 19th Feb from 10.30-4pm. The garden owner is a keen collector, having amassed over 200 varieties of snowdrops for visitors to see. There will be homemade tea and cakes and free admission for children.

On the other side of the County there are two gardens opening both Saturday and Sunday of the weekend of 25th and 26th February, from 11-4 on both days and with fabulous displays of snowdrops. Hedgehog Hall Loddington Road, Tilton on the Hill LE7 9DE opens a small garden full of snowdrops and early flowers, all carefully displayed on terraces, a great way to view snowdrops.

The second garden opening over that weekend is in Great Glen, at Westview 1 St Thomas's Road LE8 9EH. In addition to 300 varieties of snowdrops, there will be winter colour provided by cyclamen, hellebores, winter aconites, ranunculus ficaria, iris reticulata and early narcissus complimented by evergreen ferns, box and yew hedging

For this opening late in February the owners also expect there to be crocus, and the scented shrubs, Hamamelis, Sarcococca and Daphne, to be in flower providing colour and scent. Teas and cakes will be on sale, and the garden owners are also providing homemade soup and bread rolls to fend off any winter chill.

Visiting one of our lovely snowdrop gardens helps nursing and cancer charities. Thanks to the generosity of garden owners, our volunteers and garden visitors, in 2022 The National Garden Scheme donated over £3.11 million to our best loved charities, including Macmillan Cancer Support, Marie Curie, Hospice UK and The Queen's Nursing Institute.

I was pleased to welcome Craig Dawes, Neighbourhood Watch Multi Scheme Administrator & Development Lead for Leicestershire, to Coffee and Cake on Thursday 12th January. Many of those in attendance spoke to Craig and were given free, useful goodies such as personal attack alarms, number plate security kits, shed alarms and signage. Craig has promised to return and has sent the following update:

Leicestershire Neighbourhood Watch

"Welcome to you all, first off let me start by introducing myself. My name is Craig, I work for Neighbourhood Watch and I am the MSA (Multi Scheme Administrator) & Development lead for the whole of Leicestershire, which includes all the districts associated (Blaby, Central Leicester, Charnwood, Harborough, East Leicester, Hinckley & Bosworth, Melton, North West Leicestershire South Leicester, West Leicester & Rutland). My role is to provide support for all coordinators for each scheme, as well as other members that are part of NWN (Neighbourhood Watch Network). I manage the database of all members of neighbourhood watch, whether you are a coordinator or a member of a scheme. I also approve any new schemes that are registered on the system.

I started this role in the middle of November, so I am still working things out with the different areas, as well as other meetings. I am a family man and have 4 children of my own at the age of 33. I have undertaken numerous jobs in different sectors but my main interest is in computers. Friends and family describe me as approachable, so please do feel free to contact me about anything using the details further down.

I will be liaising with the Fire Service & local Police Beat Officers, as well as Community Safety Teams and Police Inspectors to see what support Neighbourhood Watch can provide, additional to what is currently in place. During these meetings, I hope to gain more information on the sort of jobs that the Police and Fire attend and to see if there is a pattern which then ourselves as Neighbourhood Watch can keep an eye out for and report them accordingly. I am in the process of having area coordinators who can target more local areas and can provide more of a local newsletter, which I hope will be more useful to people.

Join the community today!

If you know neighbours, friends or family that haven't joined up to Neighbourhood Watch, then why not get them to join today. Join the growing number of people who are signing up everyday. It takes just a few minutes of your time, from here you can join your neighbours in looking out for each other by joining a local scheme or if one isn't available, why not create your own scheme? You can do this by visiting www.ourwatchmember.org.uk to sign up.

What's next?

Over the coming weeks and months, I plan to meet with as many Parish Councils as I can, as well as arranging monthly meetings with the local Fire departments and local Police Beat Officers, to gain reports as to the types of crimes and fires that have happened over the previous month. I will then distribute this information to all of the coordinators that have signed up to the Neighbourhood Watch system. I will create a report for the whole of Leicestershire which I can then distribute to all members of Neighbourhood Watch in Leicestershire, so that all the crime figures for the whole year are compiled into one report. Greetings! Happy New Year to you all. I hope 2023 has got off to a good start for you and your families.

Firstly, I'd like to thank everyone involved in organising the Village Advent Event and to everyone who attended this wonderful occasion, which was held on Thursday 1st December. A good time was had by all and a whopping £549 was raised for the Village Hall to help towards the increased energy costs, which is amazing. Thank you to everyone for your support and due to the success of the 2022 Advent Fayre, it is definitely an event we wish to repeat. Special thanks go to Caroline Brewster, Janet Brunton and Margaret Bloor of the Village Hall Committee; the Preschool Team; Reverend Richard Trethewey, Marilyn Upstone, Ann Scrine and Judy Rowe for their help in coordinating the Christmas Tree Festival held at All Saints' Church; the Church Bellringers; Gary and Team at The Bradgate for serving delicious hot cobs; Newtown Linford Choral Society; Newtown Linford Primary School PTA; Malcolm and Sam Brewin for our wonderful Village Christmas Tree; Ruth Brutnall for doing a superb job again in coordinating the Village Advent Windows and of course. Santa and his Elves! Please accept my apologies if I have missed anyone!

Land at Markfield Lane

At a meeting of the Parish Council held on Wednesday 30th November, Councillors resolved to investigate the possibility of adopting the land by the bridge at the bottom of Markfield Lane. Following a land search through HM Land Registry, we know the land is unregistered and the opportunity has arisen for NLPC to apply for Adverse Possession if possible. Part of the process includes obtaining statements of truth from residents who have a knowledge of how this land has been maintained in the last 12 years. We are told residents over many years have, at times, cleared debris or trimmed trees and vegetation back and we would like you to get in touch please to see if you can help by making a statement to support any future application. There are a number of trees on this land which need attention and if possible, the Parish Council would like to create a new village amenity in liaison with Newtown Linford Biodiversity who have expressed an interest in the management of this land. Watch this space for future updates!

Speeding

Councillors continue to be concerned by the speeding problems experi-

enced around the Parish. Chairman, Sue Pritchard and Vice-Chairman Tim Porte, regularly download and analyse the VAS data, which has been previously shared through the Village Magazine.

To date, Leicestershire Police have conducted a number of speeding operations at various locations in the village, both high visibility and covertly and a speeding operation carried out on upper Main Street, found 18% of vehicles were exceeding the National Police Chief Council enforcement threshold of 10% +2mph.

This represents poor compliance with the limit and as such the Police Traffic Management Department were asked to coordinate some enforcement utilising Officers from the Local Beat Team and/or the Safer Roads Team. These are ongoing as and when Police operational constraints allow.

We also signed up to the Leicestershire Police Bin Sticker Initiative (you may have seen some residents bins labelled with 30mph/40mph signs, as a reminder to motorists to slow down). If you missed previous advertisements and would like a supply of bin stickers, please contact me via the details below.

Main Street, between the junctions with Markfield Lane and Ulverscroft Lane, is also registered with the LCC Community Speed Management Initiative upon the Parish Council's request and NLPC also enquired about having 30mph repeater signs along the highway. However, Direction 11 of the Traffic Signs Regulations and General Directions 2002 (TSRGD 2002), as amended, defines the requirements for the placing of speed-limit repeater signs, which states that speed-limit repeater signs cannot be placed along a road on which there is carriageway lighting not more than 183 metres apart and which is subject to a 30 mph speed limit.

Lastly, there have been previous attempts to get the Community Speedwatch initiative restarted but adverts in both the Magazine and on our Facebook page asking for volunteers, generated no response.

With that in mind, the Parish Council feels they have done everything within their power to try and resolve the speeding issues and the matter now lies with Leicestershire Police and enforcement operations. However, our longer term plan is to look at obtaining funding, perhaps Section 106 funding, to have average speed cameras installed along the length of Bradgate Road and Main Street, similar to those installed in recent years in Woodhouse. The cost of these is £100,000 and is not something the Parish Council can budget for without external funding. We also hope to purchase a mobile VAS unit which can be used in other locations of concern, such as the 30 and 40 mile per hour limits on Mark-

field Lane.

On with more news....

Bob Bown Memorial Field

Exciting news!! We have received final costings for the Bob Bown Memorial Field Play Park improvement works, which have now been ordered and will be installed late March/early April time. Here is a sneaky peek at the plans if you missed them last time....

Various new pieces of play equipment including a see-saw, climbing wall



and streetboard springie and improved surfacing to replace the existing wetpour, will be installed and the park will need to be closed to members of the public for a period of 3 weeks. Unfortunately, this mean the park maybe closed over

the Easter holiday.

The timber framed trail will be removed in its entirety to make way for the new equipment and a staggered approach to the improvement works will mean gaps in play facilities in the short term. This financial year, the Council has committed £18,500 for these initial installations. During the following financial period in 2024/25 (or before where possible), further new equipment will be purchased to fill the remaining gaps. It is hoped we might be eligible for some further external funding to help with the cost of replacing the old timber trail, which was first installed in 2004! Any new equipment which is not timber, will be painted in the similar colours to the infant modular play unit installed in 2021, which will be more in keeping with the surrounding area.

Cemetery and Churchyard

The self-set yew bush at the Churchyard has now been removed and we will be looking into the possibility of a new seating area in the same location once the weather improves.

The grass cutting schedule for 2023/2024 will commence mid-March and now includes a fortnightly cut of mown pathways through the wildflower verge on Markfield Lane, to encourage people to walk through and look at the wildflowers and wildlife. We hope to continue progressing this area as it develops under the management of Newtown Linford Biodiversity. It is hoped information boards could be installed sometime in the future.

Parish Precept

Councillors approved and set the precept for the Parish at the Parish Council Meeting held on Wednesday 11th January 2023. The precept has been set to £59.618 which is an increase of 4.6%. This equates to a 9p increase per week, per Band D property. Inflationary pressures across the board, an increase of almost 72% to the Village Hall rent and increases to energy prices affecting street lighting etc. are all factors in needing to raise the precept. However, NLPC will also need to use some reserves this financial year.

This year, Councillors will be considering LED con-

version for 39 streetlights which remain fitted with traditional lanterns, to try and reduce the energy costs associated with them, particularly as the payback time has reduced from 5 years to a 3 year period. Again, watch this space!
