# Bradgate Group Parish



This July sees the usual release of summer blockbusters – a new Ice Age movie, Star Trek, Jason Bourne and a reboot of the classic Ghostbusters. And as usual, the thing they all have in common – beyond making a profit for the studio and being a good night out – is a sense of threat: in Ice Age it's an approaching asteroid, in Star Trek an unknown new alien race, in Bourne a new shadowy agency, in Ghostbusters, well, duh. All of them feature heroes who, despite their own issues and occasional disagreements, will pull together and overcome the external enemy. It's a winning formula, connecting with something very profound in each of us, the sense of danger and the desire to defeat it.

But the most recent film in the Marvel universe – Captain America: Civil War – explored a slightly different angle: what if the threat, what if the danger, doesn't come from the outside but is within us? No new bad guy is introduced, just the consequences of disagreement and conflict within the team. Just as in Superman III, they discover that 'the worst enemy you can meet will always be yourself' (Nietzsche).

Often we can deal in life with the threats that come from the outside. They're identifiable and though difficult, we can see how to tackle them. It's the difficulties that come from the inside which floor us. The unforeseen illness, the habit which becomes an addiction, the flaw which threatens to overshadow and undermine all the good we manage to do.

In films, there is always a saviour. Not always the obvious one, but someone who rescues themselves and others from the source of danger. In life, we can call on people to protect us from the external risks – the police, the government, our colleagues, our families. But who can help us, if the threat is internal? Who is able to rescue us from ourselves?

We all need help in life with things that come from the outside and inside, and the greatest and most profound help, the only one who can truly deal with all the dangers and enemies we face is someone who can forgive any wrong done in the past, help us change and grow in the present and give us real hope for the future. Jesus.

weather was inclement all week, as the numbers attending grew, it became apparent that an indoor wet weather plan was not going to be easy.

The street of Grey Crescent was granted a road closure permission by the Council and 30 trestle tables with bench seating for the children and chairs for the elderly were erected, with bunting flowing all the way down, an amazing sight.

2pm - The Vicar welcomed everyone to the event and said a few words about the commitment of the Queen at 90 years of age and how she had said her strong faith had played a huge part in guiding her. It had started to drizzle but still more of you arrived. The National Anthem and Happy Birthday were sung by all.

All the food arrived on a 'bring and share' basis and it just kept coming. Thank you to everyone

who baked cakes and made sand-wiches, the Newtown Linford Buffet was fabulous with many going home with food for the rest of the week. As the Village sat down to eat the rain stopped!







Children played on the bouncy slide after tea and made crowns or drew the Queen at the craft table. Adults chatted to those they had not seen for a while and those they had never met before over a cup of coffee or tea and an odd glass of wine!

Traditionally in the Village, a street Tug of War takes place on big occasions and everyone gathered at Joe Moore's playing field to witness the competition for the Village Trophy. There had been rumours that Markfield Lane (current champions and twice before winners) had been practising. All the rounds pulled in good competitive humour, some coming to watch and being dragged in to pull for a team that was short. The final between Markfield Land and Grey Crescent was tense with both teams winning a pull each, Grey Crescent just managed to muster up the extra strength to win the final pull and the trophy.



## Guided walk by Neil Pilcher of Herbert's Meadow and Ulverscroft Woods

There was a good turnout on Wednesday 8th June for a guided tour led by Neil Pilcher of Leicestershire and Rutland Wildlife Trust (LRWT). 30 members of Friends of Charnwood Forest (FOCF) had a fascinating walk through lands cared for by the Trust with much information from Neil Pilcher.

Herbert's Meadow is a site of about 8 acres, managed by the Trust. The Trust also manages several nearby sites, owned by itself and the National Trust. The meadow is managed on a five year cycle, with grazing and this year a hay crop.

The meadow is ablaze with wild flowers. There are many varieties of orchid; Common Orchid, Bee Orchid, Fragrant Orchid and many other plants. Neil showed us various grasses and other plants and explained the cattle's choice of their favourite foods, which necessitates careful control.

The Trust has the management of old oak woods and work on Sites Of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI). Members are free to visit but otherwise advance permission is necessary.

Councillor Paul Day, Chairman of FOCF, thanked Neil Pilcher and presented him with a cheque for the Trust's funds.

#### **Brewin Memorial**



This memorial was recently built for the residents to enjoy by Malcolm Brewin. It is in memory of his parents Horace and Lil Brewin who lived at Lenthill Cottage on the Main Street. The Cottage and various lots of land purchased by were his grandfather in 1925 when every property in the village was sold at auction by the Grey family. It also commemorates those fallen in both world wars as listed in the Church. Malcolm has said that he will maintain it during his lifetime but cannot speak for his successors although I would not be surprised if they do. The photo shows it just after completion on the day of the NGS open



gardens in that area. Malcolm had appropriately planted it out in red, white and blue for the Queen's Birthday.

For the benefit of newcomers to the Village - here is a reprint of an article from the June 2009 Magazine (see previous page for a photograph of Horace and Lil). Horace passed away before our present Magazine began. Lilian Maud Brewin was born Lilian Maud Frith on 11th March 1913 in the Markfield/Stanton under Bardon area. She passed away at the age of 96 on 10<sup>th</sup> April and a Service in Joyful Memory and Thanksgiving for her life took place in All Saints on 29th April 2009. As a testament to her popularity, and no doubt that of her son Malcolm as well, the Church was full of family and friends from the Village. The Cortege led by John Wright of Anstey and District Funeral Services, the family and neighbours walked the length of the Main Street to the Church and again to the Cemetery on Groby Lane for her burial. The retiring collection was given to LOROS and I know that this was a substantial amount for which LO-ROS are very grateful. The Service was taken by the Revd. Richard Worsfold and the reading was given by Betty McChrystal her close neighbour.

Lil as she was known, was one of eleven children who survived their childhood. Fred, Dick, John, Grace, Glad and Margaret still survive her Olive having already passed away. The family moved to Poultney Farm before moving to the lower end of Markfield Lane. At that house the six boys slept in one room and the five girls in another in double beds 'top and tail' as they say. Lil worked in the hosiery trade at Rowleys Hosiery and after a spell in an isolation hospital through TB she worked in service to a family on Gynsill Lane. She met Horace who was an apprentice builder at Anstey for Disney and Toone and they married in 1945. Horace passed away in 1998. They moved to the present house on Main Street in 1947 where Malcolm was born in 1950. That cottage and the adjoining cottage had been bought by Horace's parents John and Alice in 1926 for around £160. A full history of these cottages before 1926 can be read on page 91 of Joan Stevenson's book The Old Buildings and their Occupants. Lil and Horace sang in the Choir at All Saints for 40 and 68 years respectively. Lil loved cooking but spent most of her time working on the farm of which there was 35 acres. There were the cows to be milked and plenty of mowing and haymaking to be done. She delivered milk to the village firstly by jug and then by their own bottling. I can remember one resident on Main Street telling me that if you were not about Lil would put your milk in your fridge for you. Those were the days when doors where never locked.

#### From the Records


April and May 1968 provided us with some interesting news. The Rev Hargreaves announced that he would be retiring in July. He had been our Vicar for 19 years so it was quite a change. If you look at the boards at the back of the Church it tells us of the changes that came. He was replaced by the Rev Harris-Evans

There is a mention of the Bluebell Service in the May Church Magazine - this service still happens today. The Rev John Woolmer took the Service this year and he tells me that there were about 150 people present. In May 1969 a newspaper cutting shows about 200 (this year there are photos on the web site). The articles states that it was fine for the Service, organisers had kept their fingers crossed and the rain showers stopped for the Service. There were choirs from Swithland, Newtown Linford, Woodhouse Eaves and Quorn and the band of the Salvation Army played the accompaniment. The service was conducted by the Rector of Swithland. Also present were Bishop Stuart Smith, Vicar of Woodhouse Eaves, Rev Rankin and the new Vicar of Newtown Linford Rev Harris-Evans who gave the address.

We have had lots of Royal Celebrations this year including the parade of the Order of Garter Knights though the grounds of Windsor Castle . The threat of a downpour meant that the spectators saw a series of limousines bring the Royal Party and the Knights to St Georges Chapel. The records contain a ticket for the bearer to attend the Lower Ward in Windsor Castle for this celebration on Monday 17th June 1968. The ques-

tion I want to ask is was it fine, did it take place and who was the lucky Newtown Linford Villager who attended? It is very sad that there is nobody alive to tell me or is there? Names of participants are so important for the records - can you help?

#### **Boule**

On a hot and humid evening at the Blue Bell at Hoby twelve veteran boules players from the village did battle. It was an opportunity to hone our skills in what was our first game of the season, the previous month we were forced to play skittles due to the rain.

ner Michael Upstone who won the final two man shoot out.

#### **Boule Facts 2**

Boules, or Pétanque (meaning fixed feet), evolved from new rules written by Ernest Pitot, a cafe owner in la Ciotat, Provence, in 1910. In this revised version the length of the pitch was reduced by around half and the player had to throw from a fixed circle. The reason for the change, previously you could run three steps, was to allow a local man,

Jules Lanoir, whose rheumatism prevented him from running, to play. This change rapidly spread across France and quickly became part of the established game.

Boules were originally played with wooden balls made from a very hard wood such as boxwood. By the late 1800's the availability of cheap mass produced nails allowed the boules to be covered in nails, called boules cloutees. After the First World War hollow metal balls were introduced. To find out why read next months Boule Facts.

Our next game is Tuesday 5th July.

Our Annual Meeting of the Parish was held on Monday 23<sup>rd</sup> May when reports were given by the Vice Chair of the Parish Council, The Police Beat Team, Village Hall Committee and The Clerk. This was followed by the Annual Parish Meeting when the Councillors unanimously voted for Dr. Sue Pritchard to be the Chair and Councillor Sue Colebeck to be Vice Chair. Two new Councillors were elected to the Council these being Vicky Lightfoot and Rob Haylock both from Bradgate Road. Our other new Councillor Tara Pickles had been elected at the April meeting. All of the Councillors are pretty evenly spaced around the village and if you wish to contact your nearest Councillor go to the Parish Council website for their details. One Councillor has to be contacted via the Clerk due to confidentiality with her work.

Bob Bown Memorial, The Churchyard and the Cemetery - We have written to the contractors expressing our concern over the lack of maintenance on all three and have received the following reply: - I have seen these areas and agree they are in a poor state - I am truly sorry! This is not the standard we aim to provide and am very disappointed to see a site that we have successfully maintained for many years look such a mess. The season is in full swing and the grass is growing rapidly but there is no excuse as we are much better than what presented its self today.

Please let me assure you that by the end of next week we will have re serviced these areas again to bring it back within the required specification. Once we have it back to how it should be I will make sure that are its no dip in standards again.

Councillor Sue Colebeck is our new liaison person for the Bob Bown Memorial Field. She inspects each month but if you see anything untoward in the meantime please let her know on 242985. The damage to the netting in the fence near to the goal post is currently being repaired. We are wondering whether a second Dog Bag Bin is required as we are not quite sure how often the bin is emptied by Charnwood (we are trying to find out). Your comments would be appreciated.

Two old gravestones have been laid down in the Churchyard as they were deemed unsafe by the stonemason. It is to be decided whether to reinstate them or place them round the walls as other old stones have been.

**Highways, footpaths and traffic: - Parking** in the village continues to be a major problem in fact it is getting worse. We continue to discuss this at Council meetings and are in contact with our Borough and County Councillor David Snartt who is in discussions on our behalf. There is no easy answer but one probably good suggestion for Bradgate Road is to put in passing bays. We are also exploring the idea of employing a Traffic Warden for more hours than we are allocated. We hope to discuss this with the Bradgate Park Trust.

**Tree Warden: -** Brian Anderson of Markfield Lane a long time resident of the village has kindly agreed to be our Tree Warden. If you would like advice about your trees and bushes he is happy to come and have a chat. He will also visit you if you make an application to Charnwood. I have put a link to Charnwood's advice sheet on our website. You can download an application form direct from the Charnwood B.C. website. Brian can be contacted on 242432.


