Bradgate Group Parish



John Newton has long held a place in my imagination. I think it was reading a book emblazoned with the title 'Slave Ship Captain!' at an impressionable age.

You may know something of his life story. Born in the early eighteenth century to a sea-faring family, press-ganged into the Navy, he ended up crewing slave-ships. After a period as a slave himself, ended up as captain on several voyages between Africa and the West Indies. It was during his time in the slave trade that he became a Christian – converted after he began to pray during a severe storm. He went on to be a vicar in Buckinghamshire and then London. He became a leading light in the campaign for Abolition, as well as – in his spare time – writing hymns we still sing today. His life, which ended in 1807 just as abolition was passed by Parliament, gives us an intriguing perspective to examine many strands of our current situation.

Black Lives Matter. Much of the anger and pain – and injustice – which underlies this campaign dates back to that 'infernal trade' in which Newton was so involved. It's impossible for us to fully comprehend the scale and complexity of the problem unless we reckon with the damage done by this traffic. Newton later wrote: "a confession, which ... comes too late ... It will always be a subject of humiliating reflection to me, that I was once an active instrument in a business at which my heart now shudders." As Christians we believe that all people, whatever their colour, are dignified by being made in the image of God and deserve respect and fair treatment.

As I write, much ink is being expended on the rights and wrongs of a statue toppled in Bristol. Like Newton, the subject was a beneficiary of the slave trade, who used his wealth to endow public works. Can his legacy be accepted, given his wrongs? How about Newton, should we still sing 'Amazing grace' given his history? We might want to consider the important role of repentance – that transformation that led Newton to spend decades fighting for the end of slavery in the British Empire.

And we might therefore want to reflect on Newton as a model for those of us who benefit, whether we acknowledge it or not, from being on the 'right' side of the historical inequality. Whether we have the guts to recognise our errors and failures, whether we accept – as he did – our need

for 'Amazing grace', for forgiveness, from God and from those we have wronged, whether we are willing to work for positive change, as he did. Richard Trethewey

All Saints' church renovation

In theory, by the time you read this, the renovation work in the Church should be essentially complete! Work begun almost exactly six months ago, delayed due to entirely unforeseen circumstances, finished at last.

So, in theory, we may now open up the building for private prayer. The government guidance permitting it makes clear that this is a very limited re-opening. It excludes any kind of gathering within the building, even of just a few people, certainly services as we know them are still suspended. 'Sight-seeing' is also still disallowed. People may only enter the building to pray on their own or with members of their own household.

In practice, we may still be some time away from even that. As everyone who has had building work done knows, it takes a while to clean up after the builders have gone! As all schools and shops know well too, to reopen while coronavirus is still an active threat requires substantial work to prepare buildings for safe access. As a Church community we face challenges in that. Many of our congregation are in groups the government identifies as vulnerable. National advice limits their ability to participate fully in the required work.

So we're in a bit of a bind! Obviously some members of the community, including the clergy, will be doing all we can to prepare for a limited reopening for private prayer. We're hoping to open, when possible, for a couple of hours twice a week. The PCC is working on the planning and preparations needed and we will publicise the details as soon as we can.

But we could do with some assistance. We need people able to help with the cleaning and sorting of the building, working under risk-assessed conditions. Could you help? You may be able to offer just a couple of hours to wipe down the pews, or to help re-hang the millennium triptych of the village. It would be most appreciated. And you'd get a sneak preview of the new interior in the process...

Street Parking Issues.

Since the re-opening of Bradgate Park, I have received complaints about the amount of vehicles parked sometimes dangerously and inconsiderately around the Parish, not only in the centre of the village, but on Roecliffe Road and the top of Sharpley Hill.

I have been working with the Parish Council and County Councillor, Deborah Taylor to put forward a plan which incorporates the findings of the Parish traffic survey that was completed by over 90 residents. These recommendations along with ones outlined by the County Coun-

cil are now with the County Council to be approved for installation, subject to the finance being raised.

I have also received many complaints about problems with social distancing adjacent to the main entrance to Bradgate. This was generally around the attendance of an ice cream van parked in the restricted parking bay area. I understand measures will be in place soon to overcome the difficulties that have recently prevailed.

Fortnightly Brown Bin Collection.

Charnwood Borough Council announced garden waste, brown bins, have returned to the usual fortnightly collections from Monday 15th June. I hope the first 'back to normal' collection went smoothly on Thursday 25th June for the Newtown Linford Parish. From now on, residents will need to leave their bins out on their normal garden waste collection days, making sure they are out by 6am on the day of collection.

I am so pleased that we have an excellent number of volunteers within the Parish, who look out for their neighbours, especially the most vulnerable in our community, during this difficult time.



Newtown Linford Choral Society

For the past 20 years the Choral Society has presented a Summer Concert of light hearted singing at this time of year. It has proved to be such a popular social event that tickets for all three nights have usually been sold out. This year the concert had to be cancelled because of the pandemic, and It has not been possible for the Choral Society to run its usual weekly rehearsals.



Singing and socialising together at rehearsals, and performing at concerts is the life blood of any choral group.

However, faced with advice that singing in a group in an enclosed space is a hazardous activity during the current pandemic, it has been important to find other activities to keep the Choir together until such time as the crisis comes to an end.

Our director, Sue Ford, has worked hard to find a solution, and has arrived at a successful formula. She now produces a weekly video lasting around 45 minutes, which is circulated to choir members by email and used by them to rehearse at home. The video includes contributions by two friends of the Choir - Ella McNamee, who has graduated with a music degree specialising in singing, and her brother Matthew, who also is a very accomplished singer. They help us with singing techniques, and with the notes of new pieces of music that are introduced each week. In addition we have moved with the times to have online rehearsals each Thursday evening using Zoom (with thanks for the technical expertise of our member Paul Holden), in which Sue directs the choir and we are given the opportunity to talk to other choir members.

We will look forward to getting together again in the Village Hall, but for the time being the Choral Society is still thriving in spite of all the difficulties!

Newtown Linford garden to open for the National Garden Scheme and their 'Help Support Our Nurses' campaign.

With the easing of some of the restrictions of the coronavirus lockdown, what better pastime than to stroll around a beautiful garden set in glorious Charnwood countryside.

Mike & Liz Newcombe's 'Mountain Ash' garden, situated halfway along Ulverscroft Lane between Newtown Linford and Ulverscroft, will be open

again to the public on Saturday 18thand Sunday 19thJuly from 11am to 5.45pm.

The 2-acre SW facing garden benefits from excellent views across a wide area of Charnwood countryside.

Near the house are patios, water features, flower and shrub beds, fruit trees, greenhouses, soft fruit cage and





raised vegetable beds. Lawns then slope down to a large wildlife pond with a waterfall, a gravel garden and three small areas of woodland with pleasant walks through many species of trees. The lower two thirds of the garden have been created since 2004, with over 200 conifers and deciduous trees planted. Adding interest for adults and children, there are about 50 statues and ornaments around the garden. There are many places to sit and relax all around the garden. More photos on the NGS website.

NGS have only just recommenced allowing gardens to open for them and are placing several restrictions on the way we must operate:-

- All visitors must pre-purchase tickets on www.ngs.org.uk –
- All visits are for a specific 90 minute timed slot starting at either 11.00hrs, 12.45hrs, 14.30hrs or 16.15hrs.
- Only 40 visitors will be allowed in the garden during each time slot and there will be 15 mins between each slot.
- We will not be allowed to serve refreshments.
- Even with restrictions on payment methods and not handling items before purchase, we still hope to have a plant stall with payment into an honesty box.
- A toilet, with exterior access from the garden, is available Admission for adults is £5, children are free (but still have to be prebooked and count towards the 40 visitors in each timed slot). Dogs on







Village WhatsApp?

One of the benefits of being a volunteer in the Village at the moment is the Community Action WhatsApp where we share information. This was set up by Hannah and the Parish Council to help villagers who were vulnerable and needed to self isolate. Hannah quickly had a lot of volunteers who were willing to help and who joined the group and app.

Initially it was queries such as: How long is the queue at the chemists to pick up prescriptions or could anyone pick up certain items of shopping if they saw it at supermarket and was useful for villagers who self isolated and might need some assistance etc but it has gradually expanded to also become a useful app to share village information.

The other day we lost power on all our plug sockets, close neighbours did not seem to have a problem but on checking a little later on the WhatsApp I discovered the problem had also affected others across the Village. Other instances were when the flooding happened and when the bins weren't emptied at normal times. Volunteers were initially reassured to hear that no bins had been emptied at that point and then later, that the bin men were on their way! We have used it to ask questions, get recommendations and it is instant response from one of the App Users.

This got me thinking that this was a resource that others in the Village might wish to use as a way to share information instantly with anyone who was at the other end of the mobile phone and a shame it was limited to just the volunteers when some of the information was useful to all.

Such a WhatsApp would only be for villagers who reside in Newtown Linford (and Hannah). We can set it up and run it with volunteer administrators with clearly defined rules of use.

If this is something you would be interested in please get in touch by text with your name and where you live i.e. Grey Crescent, Main Street etc. Membership would obviously be an opt in and will be restricted to over 18years of age (villagers could opt out at any time).

I contacted a couple of people re this idea, Carol Ann and Hannah (Parish Clerk) who thought it would be a good idea. Hannah and Sue (Parish Chair) both thought this was a good idea for the village as a whole but not one that can be run by the Parish Council due to data protection but they were able to offer advice over how it might be run.




JOHN MORAN



From the Records From a position of lockdown and keeping our distance from neighbours - I thought I would look back at Issue 1 of the Village Magazine and see how busy the village was back in February 2003!

Issue 1 was February 2003 with the new format having changed from just the Church Magazine to one free for all villagers. It consisted of only 24 pages which rapidly increased over the years. The first page was a welcome introductory letter from Ken Waterfall Chair of the Parish Council and the Rev'd Richard Worsfold Team Rector (now Archdeacon of Leicester Cathedral). This explained how it was a new venture supported by the District Church Council, the Parish Council and advertisers. It would mean that

it would be delivered monthly free of charge to every home in the village not something that the Village had at that time! How things change.

It was a slightly different format to the present in that it was all black and white. We were proudly announcing that the Village was now on the web! We gained our own Village website, which was being co-ordinated by Michael Upstone, which included a village diary and would shortly include the Gardening Club, Parish Council, Choir and Village Newsletter.

There had been 3 thefts in November 2002 (one a motor vehicle, the other two window broken in a motor vehicle and mobile phones stolen (not something I imagine happens much now!). December 2002 saw 3 burglaries, 3 thefts and one possession of drugs in Swithland Woods. We are very lucky there are less thefts/burglaries reported now.

The Village Hall was running keep fit classes, computer studies, French, yoga and Ballroom Dancing Classes. It also had various clubs which used the facilities which included the Flower Club, Youth Club, Women's Institute Ikebana, Gardening and Badminton Club which were regular events at the time. For February 2003 the Choir had an evening with Handel's Messiah .The Village Hall was putting on a set of dancing classes in the afternoon which would lead to a Tea Dance in April!

Des Bates put an appeal out to see if there was enough interest to arrange a few games of Boules during the forthcoming summer.

The Women's Institute had seen Iris Heaps retire as president and Janet Neaverson elected for the president in 2003. Their February meeting was a Mrs Dinsdale whose talk was entitled 'Exotic Dancing" (belly dancing). This made me smile as Roxanne is a friend of mine and last year one of her talks was cancelled as the Church Hall where she was doing a talk and demonstration thought it might be too risqué for a Church Hall. She is a very good after dinner speaker, which includes a mixture of the history of the dance, funny stories that have involved her dancing and demonstrations where the audience are invited to participate Sometimes she brings along her python and also does fire eating - quite exotic for a wife/mother of two adult boys from Groby!

The school shared their news - they had recently been to De Montfort Hall to see Joseph the Technicolour Dream Coat, with several of the children acting as roving reporters! These included Alicia Pakenham, Sam Watson, Max Turner and Annbelle Harris.

A mum was interested in setting up a parents and babies coffee group.

The Parish Council had asked the Women's Institute if they would prepare a Welcome Pack for new village residents which would include the updated and reissued popular Village Guide (which is just being updated at the moment!)

A Bridge Drive was organised for the end of February in the Village Hall which for £6 would also include a superb afternoon tea and raffle organised by Sue Howard.

In the Sunday School Rooms, All Saints Fellowship was looking forward to welcoming Mavis and Howard Lockley who had produced a video of their travels in Japan.

At the Cricket Club AGM, at The Linford, Robert Wood was re-elected as First Team Captain and David Wood to continued in his role as president.

The Bradgate had new Mine Hosts, Keith and Gill Mowlem with their three children who had moved to the village from Swindon. They were getting very involved in village life and had offered the use of their car park for parents to pick up and drop off children on the school run.

Hopefully life for some is returning to normal and we are hopeful at time of printing that the pub, club and cafes will be able to open in July

I am pleased to report that a shift of Police Response Officers, working within the Charnwood area, have been tasked to look at highlighted problems. This should mean you will see an increase in visible Police presence within the area.

PC Rachel Chapman moved to a town centre beat team in Loughborough from 3rd June and has been replaced by PC 907 Laura Hobbs. We send Rachel our very best wishes and look forward to working with Laura.

Crime statistics for May 2020 have been received. There was one burglary recorded and three incidents of vehicle crime.

In the last month, reports had been received by LCC Trading Standards Service of rogue traders currently working in the area.

These traders have been offering to carry out work on properties including, jet washing, sealing driveways and work to roofs. A verbal price is agreed for a cash payment which may then increase. The work is often of little value, if required at all.

Please ensure that if you are wanting work carried out on your property, you obtain at least three quotations, do not agree to any work on your doorstep, obtain full details of the company, the work to be undertaken, a price in writing and never pay cash.

To report an incident of rogue traders or for advice, please call 0808 223 1133.

Speeding continues to be an issue, particularly late in the evenings. Please continue to report any incidents to Police on 101. Registration plates and dash cam footage are useful in identifying those dangerously driving through the Village.

Information received from PCSO Mitch Jarvis 12/06/20:

Crime Prevention advice

Since February 2020, the National Fraud Intelligence Bureau has identified 21 reports of fraud where Coronavirus was mentioned, with victim losses totalling over £800k.

Of the 21 reports, ten were made by victims who attempted to purchase

protective face masks from fraudulent sellers. One victim reported losing over £15k when they purchased face masks that were never delivered.

We have also received multiple reports about coronavirus-themed phishing emails attempting to trick people into opening malicious attachments or revealing sensitive personal and financial information.

One common tactic used by fraudsters is to contact potential victims over email purporting to be from research organisations affiliated with the Centres for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the World Health Organisation (WHO).

They claim to be able to provide the recipient with a list of coronavirus infected people in their area. In order to access this information, the victim needs to click on a link, which leads to a malicious website, or is asked to make a payment in Bitcoin.

Reporting numbers are expected to rise as the virus continues to spread across the world.

Protect yourself

Watch out for scam messages:

Don't click on the links or attachments in suspicious emails and never respond to unsolicited messages and calls that ask for your personal or financial details.

Shopping online:

If you're making a purchase from a company or person you don't know and trust, carry out some research first, and ask a friend or family member for advice before completing the purchase. If you decide to go ahead with the purchase, use a credit card if you have one, as most major credit card providers insure online purchases.
