



Himalayan Balsam-pulling

This summer, we'll again be pulling up Himalayan Balsam in and around the village, and we welcome people of all ages to join us. Himalayan Balsam is an invasive non-native plant which is extremely fast-growing. It thrives in damp habitats, such as river banks and ditches, and spreads rapidly, at the expense of other, native, flowers. It's very easy to identify, and also



to pull up. Last summer we noticed that in areas we'd worked on the year before, there were far fewer plants, showing that pulling them up can be effective. It makes for a fun family activity too! Watch out for the dates of HB-pulling sessions in next month's Magazine.

THE FRIENDS OF CHARNWOOD FOREST



Tuesday 8th August. Marilyn Upstone is leading a walk through the National Forest and part of the Ashby Canal at Moira, near Ashby-de-La- Zouch at 2pm. This will begin at Moira Furnace (parking available) with a description of this early nineteenth century iron furnace, now a Scheduled Ancient Monument, which was worked for a short time by Francis Rawdon-Hastings, Earl of Moira, to augment his depleted income. This was also where the mineral spring was discovered which became the basis for the spa at Ashby-de-La-Zouch. There will be an opportunity for anyone not doing the walk to visit the Furnace Museum (admission £3). There is a cafe and toilets nearby.

The Festival of Archaeology is running for the whole of July in Leicestershire, with some very interesting walks and talks. Information can be found on the website of the Leicestershire Fieldworkers, http://leicsfieldworkers.org. Some of these have to be booked in advance, so have a look soon!

Village Archive: The childhood of Lady Jane Grey

We have all just enjoyed the extraordinary spectacle of a modern day Coronation. How different it was in 1550, as related by Mr Waldron in his 1919 lecture on the childhood of Lady Jane Grey:

"Bradgate is particularly celebrated as being the birthplace and residence of this talented and virtuous lady. That her parents were severe even beyond the custom of the times seems clear. Roger Ascham thus speaks of her: On arriving at Bradgate (1550) he found Lady Jane alone, the rest of the party being engaged in hunting. She was reading Greek, a child of 13, which she explained by stating that "whatsoever I do else but learning is full of grief, trouble, fear and whole misliking unto me. When I am in the presence, either of father or mother, whether I speak, keep silence, sit, stand, or go, eat, drink, be merry or sad, be sewing, playing, dancing, or doing anything else, I must do it, as it were, in such weight, measure and number, even so perfectly, as God made the world, or else I am so sharply taunted, so cruelly threatened, yay, presently, sometimes, with pinches, nips, and bobs, and other ways (which I will not name for the honour I bear them), so without measure, misordered, that I think myself in hell".

Allowing for the compassion that most felt for one so young and unfortunate, we may gather from contemporary accounts, that she was sweet in mind and body, and for the age and the time in which she lived, a paragon of learning. She had the innocence of childhood, the beauty of youth, the solidity of the middle, the gravity of old age, the birth of a princess, the learning of a clerk, the life of a saint, and the death of a malefactor for her parents offences.

Had the Duke of Northumberland, whose son was Lady Jane's husband, not been so greatly disliked throughout the country, possibly her fate would have not have been so cruel.

She even refused to accept the Crown and decided to remain as she had hitherto lived. Overcome at last by the persuasions, rather than the reasonings of her relatives, she submitted, and was then proclaimed Queen, contrary to the general voice of the nation, who perceived that she would become nothing more than a tool in the hands of her father-in-law, who would in reality be the reigning king, and who was by no means a favourite with the people. She wore the Crown for a brief space of 10 days, when finding the nation against her, she willingly returned to a private life with far greater pleasure than she accepted the Crown.

Mary was then immediately proclaimed Queen. Northumberland was put under arrest and executed. Lady Jane Grey, with her husband, and several of their supporters, were at the same time thrown into the Tower.

The first commands of Queen Mary showed that she had no disposition to deal harshly with either Lady Jane or her father. Her imprisonment was made less vigorous and she was allowed to walk in the garden on Tower Hill. When the Spanish Ambassador urged that both Lady Jane and her husband must not be spared, Mary replied, that justice forbade that an innocent girl should suffer for the crimes of others.

Eventually, of course, Mary was persuaded otherwise.

Charnwood Borough Election.

I thought there may be interest in the result for the Forest Bradgate Ward in the Borough Election on 4th May 2023. This Ward covers the villages of Woodhouse, Woodhouse Eaves, Ulverscroft and Newtown Linford. Sue Monroe 203 votes, Josephine Razzell 126 votes, David Snartt 695 votes. The turnout was 41.31%.

Charnwood Borough Council has 52 Councillors across 24 Wards, all seats were up for election. Following the count, the political make-up of the Council is as follows: Conservative 23, Labour 20, Greens 8, Independent 1.

Charnwood Lifeline.

Charnwood Lifeline enables people to summon help at the press of a pendant, twenty-four hours a day 365 days per year. Pressing a pendant

connects the person through to a Lifeline operator and over the phone they can assess whether to call a family member or friend to help the customer or, if it's serious, the emergency services.

It is ideal for anyone, possibly elderly, frail or disabled who needs extra support to maintain independence at home. Lifeline is for anyone who wants to feel safe and secure knowing that help can be raised immediately. When Charnwood Lifeline gets a call from a new customer, they discuss the available options, send out an information pack which includes the sign-up paperwork for completion.

Currently a basic Lifeline package costs £56.16p per quarter, and there is a one-time installation cost of £15. All the equipment is hired, and the basic package includes the supply and fitting of Lifeline, a key safe for emergency access and the services of an on-call warden who can be called upon to check the customers welfare if the next of kin or emergency contacts are not available.

What are hate crimes and hate incidents?

A hate crime is any incident, which is a criminal offence, that the victim or anyone else thinks is motivated by someone's hostility or prejudice towards them or another person because of their race, religion, sexual orientation, disability or because they are transgender. Typically, hate crimes are verbal abuse, physical assaults or damage to property, a car or a home. Hate crimes include posting abusive or offensive messages online about a person or group of people.

A hate incident is any incident, which is not a criminal offence, that the victim or anyone else thinks is motivated by someone's hostility or prejudice towards them or another person because of their race, religion, sexual orientation, disability or because they are transgender. Typically, hate incidents include litter in the garden, dirty stares, or noise nuisance.

The victim does not need to perceive that an incident was motivated by hostility or prejudice; if another person, a witness or a police officer, perceives that it is, it will be recorded and investigated as a hate incident.

Anyone can be the victim of a hate crime or incident. For example, people may be targeted because someone thinks that they are gay even if they aren't, or because they have a disabled child. Someone can also be a victim 'by association', for example, if a friend is racially abused in your presence and you feel as if you're a victim of that incident as well.

Other personal characteristics

Some police services record hate incidents based on other characteristics such as age, gender (misogyny) or belonging to an alternative subculture. Incidents based on other personal characteristics such as these are not considered hate crimes under the law. These incidents can still be reported to some police forces, but they will not be prosecuted specifically as hate crimes by the police and the Crown Prosecution Service.

Emergency Alerts

The UK government's new Emergency Alerts system is now live.

The system will enable people to be contacted via their mobile phone when lives are in danger.

It will be used to warn you in the event of emergencies, such as severe flooding.

Emergency Alerts are sent to all compatible mobile phones within an area of risk. They don't track your location, need your phone number, or collect personal data. Only the government and the emergency services will be able to send them. If you don't have a mobile phone, you'll still be kept informed through other channels.

If you get an Emergency Alert on your phone, you'll hear a loud, siren-like sound. A message on your screen will tell you about the emergency and how best to respond. You'll be able to check an alert is genuine at gov.uk/alerts

If you receive an alert, read the alert carefully and follow the instructions.

You can opt out of receiving emergency alerts; for more information on how to opt out please go to gov.uk/alerts

Our congratulations go to Cllr. David Snartt who was re-elected as our Borough Councillor. Newtown Linford had the third highest turnout in Charnwood which was great.

What a fantastic day we all had at the Village Coronation Celebration on Sunday 7th May and weren't we lucky with the weather! Our sincere thanks go to Malcolm Brewin for providing us with a wonderful venue, to the Village Coronation Committee led by Dick Howard (you know who you are), to lan White of Bradgate Events and Jan Croft for taking some lovely photos for the Village Archive. Thank you also to everyone who attended and made it a really special occasion and congratulations to the Main Street Earls on their victory in the Village Tug-of-War.

On with the news....

Bob Bown Memorial Field

I was extremely disappointed to learn of negative comments and complaints following the recent works at the Bob Bown Play Park.

For many months, I have written articles in this magazine giving residents notice, detailing the works that would be undertaken and inviting comments. I also clearly stated that this would leave a gap in play facilities in the short term, until the Parish Council are able to afford further improvements, or were successful in an application for more grant funding.

I am also aware that there have been some comments relating to the equipment being too infant orientated. Over the last 4 years, I have continuously consulted residents and park users through our Facebook page, Village Magazine articles and in person. I have reminded anyone with an interest in the park, that I would welcome their thoughts and suggestions for improvements.

From these consultations, we received requests for a basket swing, infant modular play unit, a climbing wall, a see-saw and a zip-wire and the general feeling was that there was not enough provision for younger children. All of the items requested, with the exception of the zip-wire, have been installed over a two year period. If you respond to consultations, we listen!

At the same time, our annual inspections of the play park highlighted areas of concern and in need of attention. During the very hot weather last year, the timber trail split causing finger entrapment issues. In addition, wear and tear since the trail was installed in 2004 affecting the climbing section and beams was noted, as was the shrinkage of the wetpour surfacing which had become very slippery when wet. Wetpour surfaces suffer badly from shrinkage issues and many Councils are now moving to alternatives, as wetpour repairs are only guaranteed for a period of one year and would have cost similar to resurfacing the whole area in our new carpeted style, which came with an 8 year guarantee.

In total, over the last two financial years, NLPC has spent £39,681.98 on improvements and maintenance at the Bob Bown Memorial Field. To put that into perspective, the precept was set at £54,075 in 2021/2022 and £56,779 in 2022/2023 and therefore, this expenditure on the play park calculates to approximately 35 - 36% of our annual budget.

Nearby Anstey Parish Council, having set their precept to £309,361 in 2021/2022 and £320,284, are not comparable to Newtown Linford. They are a much bigger Town Council, with a precept cost shared between many more households and not surprisingly, they do have better parks!

The same applies for Groby and Rothley parishes; we are not comparable.

Newtown Linford Parish Council represents all members of the Parish and also maintains the Cemeterv. the Churchvard. own streetlights, VAS signs, defibrillator, planters, bins etc. We helped with a community grant towards the cost of the wonderful Coronation celebration we all enjoyed so much and as custodian trustee of the Village Hall, we pay an annual rent of £3000. Our budget has to stretch a long way and I think over a third of the Council's annual income on one play park, is more than fair.

In summary, I am very pleased with the works that have been carried out to date and the new surfacing and removal of the old timber trail **MARTIN ALLEN**
