are all confident in something, just not necessarily ourselves! I was not a confident teen – bullied at school when I moved up to secondary, I spent most of my teenage years and well into early adulthood with a lack of self-esteem. Even when achieving success I still couldn't believe I was capable of it. I would avoid situations where I felt vulnerable to failure – I didn't audition for the school play, try out for the college cricket team, ask anyone out. In fact one nickname I picked up at college was 'Tre-who-he?'. Gaining self-confidence was a slow process, trying to ground myself in facts that I could remind myself of when I doubted. It's something I still need to do from time to time.

onfidence. Some of us have it, some of us don't. Or rather, we

And I don't think I'm alone. My guess is that many people - not everyone, by any means – struggle more with self-confidence and self-image. More than we might imagine from appearances. Studies have shown this too – it's not just my instinct. Many of us project more outward confidence than we think we do.

Interestingly the Bible has a different take on how we might gain confidence and assurance. It's not in our own achievements – the problem being with this, as I've found, is that it only lasts as long as my next failure, and there's normally one of those just around the corner. Instead, we're encouraged to find our sense of confidence, that almost indefinable quality which allows us to step out and try new things, risk new encounters, in what God has done for us in Jesus. This is undeniable, unalterable: a sure thing, based on historical events and his interpretation of reality.

Confidence comes from being sure of something. If we can't be sure of ourselves, it's good to know that we have a source of strength, of surety, in what God has done for us, and continues to do in us, through his unchangeable love for us.





### Newtown Linford Gardening Club (www.newtownlinford,org,uk/gardening-club,html)

We began our year with a speaker who has attracted a lot of attention in her short career as a garden designer. Four years ago, Nicola Oakey was the only female finalist in the RHS Young Gardener of the Year competition. She completed her diploma in garden design nine years ago and yet, two years later, won her first gold medal at Gardeners' World Live. In 2018 she won the Pro Landscapers '30 under 30' award recognising her as one of the UK's up and coming garden designers. After working with Adam Frost for three years she has now set up her own garden design studio in Rutland. She described how she designed, developed, and constructed her award-winning garden at Tatton Park.

She showed us her initial designs for her ten metres square plot and how she chose the materials for her hard landscaping. Of particular interest was her innovative design for the pathway using oak blocks interspersed with concrete blocks each of which was marked with a design of leaves, seed-heads and similar garden features. She put in over 1200 plants as she needed to show intensity of planting with around 30 plants per square metre in the borders which surrounded a pond, decking and some larger trees. It took two weeks to construct the garden from an empty hole and her labours earned her a silver-gilt medal. Three days

after the show it had been dismantled and all that remained was the empty hole.

She is clearly a young lady with a very bright future, and we were fortunate to be able to welcome her before she becomes really famous.

Robert Barlow is our speaker on 28<sup>th</sup> February and he will talk about hostas. They are, at the moment, nowhere to be seen

but will begin to appear in a few weeks' time. They have such a wide variety of leaf colour and our members will be keen to discover and pur-

chase some new ones



### Hedgehogs

Probably all of us have memories of seeing hedgehogs in our gardens, but how many of us have seen a hedgehog recently? Their numbers appear to be in decline, both in urban and rural areas. What do we know about them, and what can we do about their decline?


Their name 'hedgehog' is descriptive as they build nests in hedges, bushes and shrubs and are known as 'hogs' because of the snorting and grunting noises they make. They hibernate in winter, usually in log or leaf piles.

Hedgehogs are one of the oldest mammals on earth with origins estimated to be around 15 million years ago. It is believed they have changed very little over this period.

They are solitary animals, only coming together to mate. Baby hogs may stay with their mother for up to 4 to 7 weeks. They commonly live from

about 3 to 5 years, although some have been known to live up to 9 years.

Their diet is mainly insectivorous, including worms, caterpillars and also some types of berries. They need a large area to gather their food and can travel up to two miles in a single night, although up to four miles has been known.



Does it matter that their numbers are in decline? Now, more than ever before, we are becoming aware of the interdependence of nature and its wildlife and our own human life. Putting it bluntly – if it's hedgehogs to-day – is it us tomorrow?

We need to use practices in our wider countryside that benefit all biodiversity, including hedgehogs, while there is much we can do nearer to

home. The British Hedgehog Preservation Society's website <a href="https://www.britishhedgehogs.org.uk/">https://www.britishhedgehogs.org.uk/</a> provides the following guidance on what we can do in our gardens:

- Avoid using pesticides and slug pellets which can harm hedgehogs and damage their food chain.
- Check areas before strimming or mowing. Check bonfires before lighting, especially before Bonfire Night.
- Dispose of litter in appropriate containers. Hedgehogs can get trapped or injured by discarded rubbish.
- Provide a shallow dish of fresh water (never milk, as hedgehogs are lactose-intolerant). Food, such as meaty cat or dog food, can be put out, especially during long, dry spells.
- Make sure ponds have gently sloping edges so hedgehogs can easily get out.
- Provide a hedgehog home which can also be used as a nesting box for a mother and her young.
- Create access to your garden by leaving a gap in fences and walls, large enough for a hedgehog to pass through. If neighbours can get together and do this, a 'highway' from garden to garden can be created.

Finally, hedgehogs are part of the chain of biodiversity that makes up the complex natural world. They are a boon to our gardens and a delight to our imagination. Let's do what we can to keep them going! Carole Longe





### Village Archive. Life in 1965 continued.

Last month I wrote about life in 1965. There is so much more in the Scrapbook and I thought I would share a little more of it with you.

It was the National Women's Institute Golden Jubilee year and 40th birthday of the Newtown Linford Branch. The motto for 1965 was "If you cannot be a star, you need not be a cloud". There were 150 members and as always it was extremely well organised. There were several Committees including those for Entertainment and the Flower and Produce Show. President that year was Mrs C Gibson. It was commented by one Speaker that seldom had she been to a happier or livelier Institute, which it was a tribute to all of the members who contributed to the numerous activities.

Country dancing was held, and a competition at Thrussington Village Hall in October, under the leadership of Mrs Marion Smith, who has sadly passed away recently.

A Neighbourhood Scheme was introduced into the village in the late summer with the village being divided into 10 sections. Helpers were appointed in each so that they could provide any assistance that was required.

Free quotations - Call Martin. 0116 2165107 martin@martinallen.co.uk The Parish Party was held in the Social Club and attended by 160 "Thoroughly happy people having fun in the best sense of the word" The village shop had recently been modernised, and become a selfservice store open all day six days a week. At the time it was located opposite the Church. Another shop was described as being in a cottage where "One steps into the parlour to buy cigarettes, sweets and ices". The village suddenly found itself without a Post Office after 40 years when Miss Kitty Brown finally gave up the position of Postmistress in February. A year or so previously, she had routed an armed intruder. The Post Office was then temporarily transferred to a converted old stable in Main Street, nearly opposite the church. However, this regime did not last for very long, and

it closed on 5<sup>th</sup> June as the duties were found to be too arduous. The closure of the Post Office was described as a great loss.

The 111th Leicester, Newtown Linford Scout Group was active. It opened in 1950 and had 10 members and 11 recruits. Meetings were held in the Sunday School Rooms on Wednesday evenings, when a-programme of instruction, games and competitions was organised.

The Tennis Club was very active and was described as "occupying a corner of the cricket field. The only way to get into the ground was to burrow under the wire netting. The door was padlocked for safety and the key left at the shop across the road, but somewhere along the line, the key got lost. And now the door was the only place where you couldn't get in. There were two grass courts and a kind of bus shelter effort that kept of the worst of the rain in an emergency. The grass was mown once a week through the summer, weather permitting. After a period of

wet weather. not only was the grass long enough to provide various cattle grazing. but the white lines were completely obliterated. Sometimes it happened that a ball went over or through the netting and into the river. The cost of tennis balls



being what it was there was only one thing to do -"Paddle after it." The writer went on to say that "No amount of practice on the Newtown Linford tennis courts is likely to do much to improve one's tennis but it is a very good way to develop the personality".

The tennis courts in 2023, have a very different and professional look which altogether shows the enthusiasm and dedication of the current membership.

### Information from David Snartt. Local Bus Service.

I note from the Leicestershire County Council's Cabinet Meeting Agenda, of 10<sup>th</sup> February, that there is reference to the recommencement of the review of all the Council's supported passenger transport services. This recommending a proposed programme of local focussed engagement and consultation to inform affected communities on the review outcomes and intended course of action.

I understand that it is intended to start a rolling programme of local focused engagement and/or consultation (where relevant) with affected communities in spring/summer 2023. The key purpose of this will be to inform communities of the outcome of the service reviews and the County Council's intended course of action. Engagement will not be undertaken where no changes are to be made to the current services.

The reviews are being undertaken in four batches. The first of which is nearing completion and is likely to result in changes to the services, including the likely withdrawal of some of them. I understand batch one includes the 125 service which runs through the Newtown Linford Parish. I am grateful to County Councillor, Deborah Taylor for keeping me informed about the current position with this review. Full details can be found on the County Council's website.

#### New Election Rules for 2023.

Residents in Charnwood Borough are being urged to check they have an accepted form of photo ID ahead of this year's local elections on Thursday 4<sup>th</sup> May 2023. The new requirement of showing photo ID at Polling Stations is being introduced by the UK Government and comes into effect for the first time this May. Voters across England will be required to show an accepted form of photo ID when voting at polling stations for local elections. Acceptable forms of photo ID include: Passport issued by the UK: Photographic drivers licence: A blue badge: Older person's bus pass: Disabled person's bus pass. For a full list of acceptable ID's please visit Charnwood Borough Council's website.

Residents without one of the suitable forms of ID will be able to apply for a free ID called a Voter Authority Certificate which can only be used for elections. Applications can be made on-line through the <u>GOV.UK</u> website via this link

https://www.gov.uk/apply-for-photo-id-voter-authority-certificate or completing a paper form. A paper form is available to download and print from Charnwood Borough Council's website. Alternatively, residents can request the form is sent to them via post by contacting the elections team by visiting <a href="mailto:electoral.services@charnwood.gov.uk">electoral.services@charnwood.gov.uk</a> or by telephoning 01509 634546.

Those residents who require a Voter Authority Certificate are being encouraged to apply as soon as possible. The deadline to apply is 5pm on Tuesday April 25<sup>th</sup> 2023. ### Climate Change Strategy.

Views are being sought on a Climate Change Strategy 2023-30 for Charnwood which is being delivered by Charnwood Borough Council. The Strategy sets out how the Council will help lead locally and work in partnership with communities, residents, organisations and businesses to reduce emissions and help look after the environment. It also references the Council's existing efforts to reduce its own carbon footprint. The Council has been playing its part in reducing carbon emissions for many years, reducing its own carbon footprint by over a third and has encouraged others to reduce their energy use. The Council has also been at the forefront of an initiative to see more trees planted across the Borough.

The Strategy's seven main themes include: Transport: Planning, land use and biodiversity: Buildings and heating (energy): Resources, including food and waste: Business and economy: Governance and finance: Partnership and communication.

Dr Philip Wilby from the British Geological Survey in Keyworth will update us on the fossil record of Charnwood Forest, following on from the talk by Jack Matthews on Charnia Masoni a couple of years ago. Dr Wilby was one of the discoverers in 2022 of what is thought to be the earliest known animal predator dating from 560 million years ago. The fossil was named *Auroralumina attenboroughii* after Sir David Attenborough. The first part of the newly discovered fossil's name *Auroralumina* is Latin for dawn lantern, in recognition of its great age and resemblance to a burning torch.

#### **Crime Prevention Advice**

### **Key Safes**

Key safes are used by many to allow access to their properties for a variety of reasons and we wish to issue the following advice for homeowners and family members to keep their homes as secure as possible.

Consider relocating key safes to somewhere away from the front entrance of a property, to avoid them being spotted by opportunist burglars.

Change the combination code for a key safe regularly and each time a person no longer requires access.

Avoid using easily memorable or guessable combinations such as birth dates or years.

Review and keep to a minimum, the number of people who have access to the key safe code.

Consider taking the key out of the safe when you know it will not be needed for access.

Install security lights, alarms and CCTV to further protect your home against burglary.

### Keep burglars out of your property

Burglars will use a variety of ways to avoid being noticed. They don't want to be seen or heard by a neighbour or passer-by because they will feel exposed and identifiable. Distraction burglars will pretend to be

someone they are not, so it's important you are aware of the common methods they will use to get you to let them into your property.

Here's some useful advice, firstly on helping to keep burglars out by giving them no hiding place and, secondly, on how to prevent a distraction burglary.

### Keep it visible

You'd think that it would be best to make a property less visible from the street, and to keep it hidden from prying eyes behind overgrown bushes, trees, high fences or walls. In reality, all that this serves to do is make it easier for a burglar to get close to a home unnoticed, and provide somewhere to hide while carrying out a burglary or theft from the property.

Lower fences at the front around one-metre high are preferable to high fences as they allow for a clear view over the top and don't provide cover for anyone wishing to hide.

At the rear and sides, taller fencing is recommended to prevent easy access.

Trellis, thorny plants, or a suitable anti-climb topping such as plastic spikes make it difficult for anyone climbing over a fence or gate.

Planting prickly or barbed shrubbery along boundaries and fence lines acts as an effective natural barrier.

Gravel driveways and paths will make sure you hear anyone approach.

### **New Mandatory Voter ID requirements**

From May 2023, all voters will be required to show an accepted form of photographic identification (photo ID) at a polling station before they are given a ballot paper.

This will affect all voters across Charnwood who vote in person or by proxy, at the next local election on Thursday 4<sup>th</sup> May, 2023. You are not required to provide photo ID for postal voting.

### Photo ID you can use

Voters must bring a suitable form of photographic ID to their polling station. Acceptable forms of photo ID will include:

- Passport issued by the UK, any of the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, a British Overseas Territory, an EEA state or a Commonwealth country
- Photographic driver's licence issued by the UK, Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, or an EEA state (including provisional)
- European Economic Area (EEA) photographic ID Card
- Biometric immigration document

- An identity card bearing the Proof of Age Standards Scheme hologram (PASS card)
- Ministry of Defence Form 90 (Defence Identity Card)
- A Blue Badge
- Older Person's Bus Pass
- Disabled Person's Bus Pass
- Oyster 60+ Card
- Freedom Pass.

Only original documents are accepted; scanned images or copies will not be accepted. However, if your photo ID has expired it will be accepted as long as the photograph is still a good likeness to you.

### No suitable photo ID?

Voters who do not produce a Voter Authority Certificates, or valid photo identification will not be allowed to vote on the day.

CBC will accept scanned copies of applications for Voter Authority Certificates via email to electoral.services@charnwood.gov.uk. Paper applications may also be posted or handed in to the Council Offices.

Alternatively, if you would like a paper copy of the application form sent to you in the post, please contact the elections team on electoral.services@charnwood.gov.uk or by calling 01509 634546.
