



If you're like me, you've spent the last few months getting emails and letters from various organisations, charities, societies all asking consent to keep contacting us. This is all because of a big change in the law coming in May which will much more tightly control the information that people are able to keep on us and the privacy of our data. Companies now need explicit consent from us for many things they could just do before.

While it's a bit annoying sometimes to field these various requests, in many ways it's about time this happened. You may have seen some of the recent news stories about how some companies involved in election campaigning have used, or misused, data supplied by Facebook to gather all kinds of information about individuals.

But it isn't just internet users who are affected. Do you have a Co-op membership card? You'll be surprised how much they know about you. Or know how secure the information kept by the local council about you is? In this day and age, every action or transaction can be known about and tracked by someone. At least now we can have a bit more confidence that what is being kept is only what is necessary or what we have agreed to.

There is an old stereotype of God, of a man in sky who's keeping track of everything you do or say. And on one level it's true: God knows everything; he watches over the world as a loving Father, concerned about everything and everyone. But he got there first on consent too: Revelation 3.20 says 'I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in'. In other words, he doesn't force us or tell us, rather he asks us: can I come in? Am I welcome?

While dealing with all the other requests for consent this month – there will be many! – maybe remember that Jesus is asking consent too: would you welcome him into your life? He has so much to offer – love, joy, peace, forgiveness and hope among many others – but you have to agree and invite him.

A bit of information about myself.

I am a cradle Anglican; baptised in a tiny flint Church in Norfolk, educated at a CofE Primary School, member of the choir at All Saints, Lubenham, confirmed in York, and married to John at St Dionysius', Market Harborough. We've lived in West Leicester since 1982. Our two children were baptised at Holy Trinity, Leicester and confirmed at Church of the Martyrs, Westcotes Drive. I was Warden and Reader at the Martyrs, a Church which has supported and cared for us as a family and given us space and encouragement to grow in faith and love.

My conscious decision to follow Christ came whilst studying at York University, after hearing David Watson preach on "Building your house on the rock". I felt the draw towards ordination after becoming a Reader in 2012. Preaching and leading worship were exciting but I felt that God was nudging me towards a deeper joy and service. After a year of thought, prayer and discernment with others, I was recommended for self-supporting ordained Ministry in 2016.

I've had a variety of roles and careers. Since 2004, I have worked as a Health Care Professional. I'm now coming to the end of two years of training at Queen's Theological College, whilst continuing to work part-time. I am looking forward to having more time to get fit and to nurture our allotments. Glenfield and Newton Linford are on familiar jogging and cycling routes.

As unknown visitors to the Churches of St Peter's and All Saints, we were made very welcome. I am looking forward to seeing and being part of all that God is doing, after many years in city centre Churches.



Village Ramblers

We were fortunate to have a bright sunny day for our April walk, following weeks of almost incessant rain. It proved difficult to choose a walk due to muddy conditions almost everywhere. Our choice seemed promising at the outset but we soon encountered some very muddy trails.

Setting off from Cademan Woods car park on Swannymote Road Whitwick, we followed the muddy paths (made worse by recent mountain bike tracks) to the Gracedieu trail. under the viaduct of the old Charnwood forest railway and along part of



the old Forest line canal into the picturesque ruins of Gracedieu Priory, a 13th century nunnery dissolved in 1538 by Henry V111. This was later converted into a private manor house. The site became a romantic ruin after 1696 when most of the manor buildings were demolished.

We continued to walk by a pretty stream through Gracedieu Woods with banks covered in wood anenomes and celandines to Warren Lane where we came upon a lovely little "Fairy house "at the foot of a tree.

From here conditions were still difficult through muddy fields and Swannymote Woods back to Cademan Woods and the car park. Much cleaning of boots to follow!!

The next walk is on Saturday May 12th and will be led by Christine Hall.

News from The Park

This is the week that Spring finally arrived. Of course, by the time you read this that may have all changed but, for the time being, the sun is shining, the birds are singing as they begin building their nests and my lawn desperately needs mowing. The woodland Spring flowers – wood anemones and celandine, shortly to be followed by the bluebells – are blooming and the whole of the Park has the air of Nature trying to make up for lost time. The deer are midway through casting their antlers and the biggest stags, which are always the first to cast, are already sporting new antler buds on their denuded heads.

One of the most hated jobs of the summer round – the strimming of the edges of the car parks to keep them neat and tidy has started. We have steadily reduced the use of strimmers over the past few years and allow vegetation to grow wherever we can but there are a few areas that just have to look smart. Another really good reason (if more were needed) for cleaning up after your dog is what happens when a strimmer encounters an unexpected 'offering' lurking in the long grass…

May is the month when we host a number of traditional events on behalf of other organisations. On 1st May (Tuesday this year) the Leicester Morrismen will be dancing at Old John starting at 7am so get up early, washyour face in the morning dew (to ensure a youthful complexion) and come and welcome in the Spring!

Sunday 6th May sees the Bluebell Service taking place in Swithland Wood. All are welcome at this event organised by St Leonard's Church,





Swithland. Follow the signs from the Swithland Wood car parks and the service starts at 3pm.

Sunday 13th May is the Leicestershire Yeomanry Memorial Service, commemorating the members of the Yeomanry who fell at the Battle of Frezenberg in Flanders in 1915, will be held at All Saints Church, Newtown Linford at 11am. There will be a wreath-laying ceremony afterwards at the Leicestershire Yeomanry War Memorial at the top of the Park, which is the only time that cars are allowed to Park inside the Park at Hunts Hill.

Sunday 20th May is our Emergency Services Day, which pays tribute to the work of the emergency services and the work they do with us to help keep visitors safe. There will be enough fire engines and other emergency vehicles, both vintage and modern, to keep small boys of all ages happy, along with a supply of firemen for big girls who like that sort of thing.

The Trust has been awarded funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund to help us develop our education work with schools and this has been supplemented with generous donations from the Edith Murphy Foundation and other charitable trusts.

We are working with the Joe Humphreys Trust to make Bradgate a 'Heart Safe Park' by installing defibrillators at Newtown Linford car park, the Visitor Centre and Old John and we hope to have at least some of these in place before the summer holidays. With so many visitors, sadly there will statistically be the occasional person who suffers a heart-related issue and defibrillators are proven to dramatically increase the chances of survival in the vital period before an ambulance arrives.

Tickets are now on sale for our first outdoor cinema weekend. As part of the Summer Nights Film Festival, we will be showing The Greatest Showman on Friday 20th July and Dirty Dancing on Saturday 21st July in the ruins of Bradgate House. Doors open at 7pm at the film starts around 9.45pm. Further information and tickets are available via the festival website www.summernightsfilm.co.uk

In the expectation, or at least hope, that Spring is now finally here, I look forward to seeing you on the Park.



Betty Blythe

I knew Betty was part of many people's lives but the number who came to her service at Newtown Church was incredible. Thank you all for coming and sharing together a celebration of Betty's life.

Betty was born on 21st January 1941 in Huddersfield, West Yorkshire, God's Own Country. She had loving parents and enjoyed a happy childhood. Aged only 8, two events were to influence the rest of her life.

- Betty realised she wanted to be a teacher and was for 45 years.
 She taught all age ranges and eventually be came Head of the County SEN peripatetic service
- 2. The family moved from Huddersfield to West Melton, South Yorkshire. A typical small mining community. Betty lived here until we were married on August 8th 1964.

Born and bred a Yorkshire Lass Betty was generous, showed Yorkshire grit, never dodged a problem and was at her happiest when helping others in any way she could; a simple hug, a shoulder to cry on, giving her time and advice or simply listening. She had a God given gift to be able to relate to people of all ages within minutes of their first meeting. She was honest, firm but fair, intolerant of bullying and ALWAYS fought for the underdog. Full of energy and ideas with a wicked sense of humour. She never sought praise. A thank you and knowing that she had helped someone is all she asked for.

I learnt very early during our marriage of 53 years that the unexpected was to be expected. With her students she would say:

If you still don't understand, it was my fault and we will find another way" Especially at exam time when the students were a bag of nerves Betty would say:

"you can only do your best, BUT YOU MUST DO YOUR BEST"

For Betty, every child was unique and special. She formed such a strong bond with them, that during her illness and especially in the last few days I have been totally overwhelmed by the number of heart felt messages of support and sympathy. So many people have thanked Betty that without her support they would not be where they are today. I have to include myself in that sentiment.

For the first five years of our marriage we lived in Harrogate, North Yorkshire, but my job brought us to Leicestershire. Betty followed me on the

strict understanding that after 2-3 years we would return to Gods Own Country. Well here we are, 46 years later. Sorry I broke my promise. We first moved to Loughborough and then to Woodhouse Eaves where Betty designed and created the most wonderful garden. However, completely out of the blue came the words "I am bored. Why?" The garden is finished, we need to move". That is how we came to live at 58 Groby Lane, Newtown Linford

Betty as ever quickly threw herself into village life, a founding member of the Gardening Club. For years she provided and planted the flower troughs in the village.



She joined the Linford Club because one should support the community. She was attracted to the Village School like iron filings to a magnet. Any excuse and she was at the School. Scarecrow Weekend was a special occasion, working alongside David Snartt on the BBQ stall. Betty selling the hotdogs, just a bit faster than David could make them. When all the burgers were sold Betty would then mingle with all the parents and visitors urging them to spend, spend, spend.

She became Chair of Governors supporting staff and children in any way she could, always with the children's best interest at heart.

The height of the social calendar was the Brownies Jumble Sale. Before

the great day, Betty would take car loads of books, toys and Bric a Brac to Brown Owls Mums. On the day she was in the Village Hall helping prepare a clothes stall. During the actual jumble sale she bought back most of the stuff we had taken in the first place.

Betty loved the arts and literature. She read Shakespeare, Wilbur Snmith and Rupert Bear. For 50 years she bought me a Rupert Bear annual but purposefully, with her wicked sense of humour did not read it correctly so I stopped her!

Betty was a shuffle bum, too much energy left even when we went to bed and I wanted to turn off the light to recharge my batteries ready to start a new day at 6am. Betty was still reading at 1am or 2am and gave me strict instructions not to make any noise before 10am! I often woke to find she had turned 180 degrees with her feet at my head. Often after I had closed my eyes I would get a dig in my ribs and be told she wanted to sleep on my side tonight!

Betty loved the theatre and we were sponsors of the Christchurch Theatre Club which produces wonderful musicals at Loughborough Town Hall. We are also members of The Curve. During a production of Shakespeare's Mid Sumer Nights Dream, whilst Titania Queen of the Fairies was speaking, I heard this chattering nose in my ear. Turning to Betty I asked what did she want? In fact she was reciting Titania's speech. Betty had played this part at school almost 60 years earlier.

Betty was a patron of the Newtown Linford Choral Society. We attended all the summer and Winter concerts except the most recent one because of her illness. Sue Ford, a dear friend and musical director made and gave me a CD of that concert. Todays recession is taken from that concert. We always sat on the front row and at the end of the concert, Betty would jump up to give a standing ovation. She would turn to the rest of the audience and in true teacher fashion made sure the rest followed and did as they were told.

I have so many happy memories of my privileged life with Betty. She only cost me 7 shillings and 6 pence in old money for the marriage certificate, the best investment I have ever made.

I could go on and on but we all have our own memories of an incredibly kind and loving person.

The village Working Group has been working very hard over the Easter Holiday period. They formed a rota and went out every day over the fourteen-day period of the RTO order and recorded the weather, how many Bradgate car parks were open, all the offending cars and plenty of other information including photographs. The RTO was put in place because of the closure of Cropston Road in Anstey over the same period which if the weather had been good would have resulted in more traffic coming through the village than normal.

Traffic enforcement – The Council has applied to LCC at its own cost for an enforcement officer to visit the village on the following four Sundays April 15th, 22nd and 29th plus May 6th which is the May Bank Holiday and the Village Open Gardens.
