# Bradgate Group Parish



#### May 2019

The Church of England has its own calendar, of a sort. Rather than including things like Bank Holidays and those obscure dates you sometimes get noted in paper diaries from WH Smith (you know the kind of thing: 'Commemoration of the sheep-dippers (public holiday in Yurgistan)') it gives particular individuals or groups of individuals a day on which to be remembered.

Sometimes those are relatively well-known people like May 24: two brothers of the name Wesley, John and Charles. If you're not sure who they are, ask at Glenfield Methodist Church. Sometimes they're quite obscure. 16<sup>th</sup> May for example is Caroline Chisholm, who I've just had to look up and who, perhaps, deserves to be less obscure for her humanitarian work in Australian in the 19<sup>th</sup> century.

Some of them are a bit ambiguous: 4<sup>th</sup> May is given over to the English Saints and Martyrs of the Reformation Era. Of course, at that time both Protestant and Catholics persecuted and killed their opponents, so that could cover either or both camps depending on where your sympathies lie!

On 14<sup>th</sup> May we are asked to remember Matthias. Now there's a slightly obscure figure if you want one. Chosen shortly after the first Easter to replace Judas amongst the twelve of Jesus' closest friends and followers, no sooner do we hear of him than he disappears and makes no further appearance in the Bible. Yet in another sense he is an excellent example of all the people who appear in this calendar and in fact the potential we all have, whether we end up with a day dedicated to our memory or – like most of us – not. He isn't there because he was the most remarkable person, or because his achievements were so great. He's there because of his faith in Jesus, his willingness to get close to him, his desire to follow him (even when others turned against him). In the end, that's the quality which brings about true greatness and long-lasting, even eternal, distinction.

#### From the Park

I am aware that I write about the weather a lot, but it really is a preoccupation, bordering on an obsession, with anyone involved in the management of an outdoor visitor attraction. At the time of writing, the Met Office are forecasting a dry and sunny, if not particularly warm, Easter weekend; by the time you read this you will know how accurate or otherwise that prediction was.

Easter is traditionally the start of our busy season and we have been gearing up in preparation for it. Extra deliveries of seasonal goodies for the tearooms have arrived, the toilets have been deep cleaned, the outdoor furniture has been spruced up and staff and volunteers have been participating in pre-season training (not quite as physically arduous as it sounds).

The majority of our visitors love and cherish the Park as much as we do but unfortunately there is always a minority who cause trouble, whether deliberately or through ignorance and carelessness. We have a blanket ban on barbecues because the Park's sensitive habitats are very vulnerable to fire, which can spread very quickly through dry grass in summer and in dead bracken at any time of year when it is dry. Unfortunately, we had a fire on the Park on 30th March, which led to the Fire Service being called to back up our staff in putting it out. This was caused by a barbecue and, despite the publicity following that incident, we recovered another discarded barbecue the following weekend. On 4th April, a young fallow buck had to be put down after getting a plastic bag stuck on its head. This led to more media attention and our wonderful Monday morning litter picking volunteers were featured on East Midlands today. I know that many of our neighbours and regular visitors do their own informal litter picking when out for a walk and we are really grateful for your help in combating this plague on the countryside. People often tell me how tidy and litter-free the Park looks, and I always make the point that this is not because nobody drops litter but rather because we have an army of hardworking people who pick it up again and dispose of it properly.

May is the month when we host a number of traditional events on behalf of other organisations. On 1<sup>st</sup> May (Wednesday this year), the Leicester Morris men dance at Old John, starting at 7am, to welcome in the Spring. On Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> May, St Leonard's Church, Swithland hold the annual Bluebell Service starting at 3pm and on Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> May it is the Leices-

tershire Yeomanry Frezenberg Memorial Service in All Saints' Church, Newtown Linford at 11am, followed by the wreath-laying ceremony at the memorial at the top of the Park.

On Sunday 19<sup>th</sup> May, we will again be holding our Emergency Services Day on the Deer Meadow next to the Deer Barn. At that event we will be launching our Heart Safe Park initiative in conjunction with the Joe Humphries Memorial Trust to raise awareness of the existence of the three defibrillators we have on the Park – on an external wall of the public toilets at Newtown Linford, Hallgates and the Deer Barn.

As a result of an agricultural tenancy coming to an end, we will have additional grass overflow parking at Hallgates, which will double the capacity of that car park and hopefully help with congestion in the village on busy weekends. As I have written before, both the Parish Council and Bradgate Park Trust are funding the provision of additional traffic warden patrols in the Village on Bank Holiday weekends this year.


Our adders are getting a bit of publicity at present, with the Leicester Mercury running an article about a lady whose dog was bitten by one. We are doing some survey work this year in order to better understand the size of the population and how it is responding to pressure from visitors and to our habitat management work.

The Ruins will be open every weekend this summer with guided tours taking place on weekdays. We are trying to achieve a balance between giving the maximum number of people the chance to visit the monument with protecting it from that minority of irresponsible visitors who cause damage.

As a result of a partnership with a local firm of tea importers and blenders, we are launching a range of speciality teas inspired by, and named after, some of the Ladies of Bradgate including Elizabeth Woodville, Lady Jane Grey and Kitty Cox. These will be available to enjoy by the pot in the Conservatory Tearoom and to purchase from the shop.

As the bluebells come into full bloom and the chill goes out of the air (I hope), I look forward to seeing you on the Park.


Exploring a badger sett along the way, we climbed up to the top of the hill, where we enjoyed good distant views. The photograph shows the ramblers next to one of the many rocky outcrops: the 'Pillar Rocks' - a Site of Special Scientific Interest, due to the uncommon lichens growing on them. After the photocall, we explored the rest of Benscliffe, a mixed woodland, several sections of which have been felled and subsequently replanted in recent years.



From Benscliffe Wood, we crossed over to the other side of the road and took a short stroll in Rough Hill Woodlands – a pleasant mixture of wooded and meadow land accessible to the public.

Afterwards, most of the ramblers joined us for tea and scones at Markfield Lane (with the co-leader of the walk thankfully being home in plenty of time to watch Man. United!).

# Looking to the future of All Saints'

Everyone agrees that the Church really needs repainting. Most people agree, on reflection, that while you're up there with ladders and scaffolding the lights could do with replacing, and maybe we could sort out the sound system so that more than one in three speakers works most of the time. When hosting concerts, while really appreciating the space at the back of church for refreshments, people often comment that more flexibility at the front wouldn't hurt either.

Different people see different challenges and different opportunities in the current set up of All Saints'. It is worth noting, of course, that the Church has looked like this for only about a century. For most of its life it would have appeared very different. Pews are a relatively (!) recent addition, here for just the last couple of hundred years at most. The Chancel was added at the turn of the last century. Before that, the Church ended where the pulpit is. Once upon a time there would have been a gallery for the musicians before an organ was installed at the same time as the Chancel

The PCC has taken some time to carefully consider the needs of the Church into the future - not just what works well now, or even the most obvious current needs, but what will enable the Church to continue, to flourish and to grow. Because we recognise this building, wonderful as it is, is not the Church itself. It is rather the home of the Church in Newtown Linford and as with all homes when the family grows or reaches a new stage, you have to ask questions: what do we need next? Why? Previous generations have had to do this, now it's our turn.

The *draft* plans now on display at the back of the Church reflect an important stage in that 'why' and 'what' thinking. They will no doubt evolve and change as we think and consult further about them. They are not 'a done deal' nor have many of the details been ironed out – we haven't had quotes for a number of aspects for example. We are very interested in everyone's comments and feedback on them. If you have any ideas, questions or thoughts, please do use the comment cards available at the back of the Church. If you wish someone from the PCC to get back to you, please include your contact details. The PCC will meet in the week starting 12th May to reflect on them, but if you miss that, don't worry, there will still be time and opportunity to contribute.

The specific plans will probably change but the PCC's guiding convictions will not change. We believe God intends the Church in Newtown Linford to grow and flourish. This building has played an important and ever-changing role in the past and we believe it will continue to do so in the future.



# THE FRIENDS OF CHARNWOOD FOREST



On the 15<sup>th</sup> April at the Woodhouse Eaves Village Hall, The Friends of the Charnwood Forest had a talk on Stoneywell Cottage, and, in particular, its gardens. Mr Roy Mitchell started the story of Stonewell's history with a list of personalities and some statistics. Apparently the Cottage came into existence when, through an arrangement with a local farmer, the land was exchanged for a farm house designed and built by the Gimsons. Later an adjoining patch of wood was purchased.

The Gimson family were part of the Arts and Crafts movement which was a reaction to the industry of Victorian Britain.

The original setting of the Cottage was intended to be wild, although a few trees were planted and paths were landscaped. It was intended as a summer retreat only (plus Christmas), which is as well as the pantry regularly flooded in winter. In the 1950's Donald Gimson and his family used it as a full-time residence. He and his wife were keen gardeners; she kept meticulous notes on the garden. By 2013 it had become too much for him, and control passed to the National Trust. It seems that this transfer was somewhat irregular financially.

The talk finished with a series of pictures taken though the year which showed some of the garden's floral highlights. Incidentally, with the help of those notes, the garden is maintained by 200 volunteers.

The National Garden Scheme Leicestershire Gardens open in May The National Garden Scheme is a charity and in 2018 we donated £3.1 million to various charities. This money is raised by volunteers who open their gardens for a small admission fee and from the sale of tea and homemade cake.

There are 13 gardens open in Leicestershire during May and full details including, opening times and post codes, can be found at <a href="https://www.ngs.org.uk/find-a-garden/">https://www.ngs.org.uk/find-a-garden/</a> and in the National Garden Scheme booklets. Many gardens are dog friendly, there are no admission charges for children, and some gardens have wheelchair access and plant sales on site.

In May Westbrook House in Little Bowden will have its bluebell woodland on show, and this year has an additional amazing 7000 new tulips which should be in flower for the May opening. Within the 6 acres of garden are a perennial, colour themed border and hiding somewhere in the garden is "Sid the Stag". There is a working vegetable garden with raised beds, and a recently redesigned lower garden which features perennial borders, a summer house, slate water feature and rill.

Burrough Hall was built as a hunting lodge in 1867 and is surrounded by mature gardens and magnificent views across the Leicestershire country-side. There is also the added interest of a small collection of classic and vintage cars on display.

Opening together in May in the lovely old village of Grimston are The Yews Farm and Fourwinds, and both gardens are around 1 acre. Four Winds has traditional borders, long lawns with mature trees, shrubs and flowering borders. The Yews Farm is thought to be the oldest house in the village, with mixed flower borders, a kitchen garden including an old Bramley apple tree and greenhouse. Within the garden are two old Yew trees thought to be about 500 years old and a mature Wisteria. In Tilton on the Hill Hedgehog Hall opens which is a plant lover's para-

In Tilton on the Hill Hedgehog Hall opens which is a plant lover's paradise with a lavender walk, herb garden, themed colour borders and bee friendly plants. There is also a walled courtyard with hostas, ferns, wisteria and climbing hydrangea.

Thorpe Lubenham Hall extends over 15 acres including areas of lawns and mature trees for a relaxing walk combined with a more formal borders and shrub planting. There are various water features including a walled pool garden with raised beds.

Several people knew about the incident but were not prepared to give me the children's names. I understand that was a difficult call for them but it meant the Police could not find the records and give me any advice to publish.

There really is only one advice. Do not encourage your children to go out of the house with knives because whatever their original intentions are if something blows up they will react and perhaps not correctly.

The working party set up early last year after the Public Meeting will be meeting soon to follow this up.

**Speeding Traffic on Roecliffe Road towards Hallgates** – due to the increase in visitors to Swithland Woods more and more cars are parking on the verges and traffic is failing to slow down to avoid them. The Councillors recently voted to request the speed limit be reduced. They wrote to Thurcaston and Cropston and Anstey Parish Councils to request their support. Anstey declined but Thurcaston and Cropston agreed to support us although they pointed out that they
