

Last month I began to muse on the subject of the Coronation, focussing on the throne. Since then my attention has shifted a little, from what the King will sit upon to what he will be given to hold.

The crown of course is what gives the whole ceremony its name, but it's only one of the things with which the King is invested during the Service. There's a whole set, including spurs and all kinds of things, but it was the items which he holds which caught my eye. For years I have imagined that there are just two: an orb and a sceptre, but I discovered just the other day that there are actually two sceptres, so the Monarch has to put down the orb to hold the two together. One represents their governance and power as the head of the State. It derives, I imagine, from the rods which Roman rulers used to carry to show their power. The other, with a dove at the head, represents their moral and spiritual role. Despite the similarity in shape, this is supposed to balance the other, demonstrating mercy as well as judgement.

Both are adorned with Christian symbolism, doves, crosses, and the like, which are intended to remind us, as is the orb representing the world with the cross surmounting it, that in accepting the crown, the King or Queen of this country is accepting that actually they hold it - and all the power and responsibility which goes with it – under the rule of someone else. Later in May, on the 18^{th} , we mark Ascension Day – which slightly flies under the radar of Christian Festivals, mainly because it's a Thursday rather than a Sunday. It's the day in which we recall Jesus ascending to heaven after his Resurrection, and the words with which he leaves his friends: 'all authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me'. So as we acknowledge the beginning of the rule of Charles III, we also have the chance to recognise and respond to the rule of one whose reign is eternal, full of mercy, justice and peace: Jesus Christ.

Newtown Linford Gardening Club (www.newtownlinford,org,uk/gardening-club,html)

Our speaker in March was Don Witton from near Sheffield. He is a retired schoolteacher who has become a horticulturalist of some note. He holds the national collection of euphorbias on a large allotment near his home and he grows them along with many other flowering plants which he sells to local people and to Gardening Clubs where he delivers his talks.

His talk, this time, was about spring flowering perennials and euphorbias which flower from now until the end of June. To assist us, he distributed a list of the plants he would feature in his talk, so we could make notes and then go to his stall to buy them for our gardens. He also showed us which plants would be at their best during the different months of spring, so we could consider our planting strategy to ensure a continual display of colour.

Some of the plants he suggested were well-known ones which many of us would already be growing in our gardens such as hellebores, geums, lupins, geraniums and oriental poppies. However he did introduce us to some more unusual ones, which would enhance our traditional borders.

In April, he suggested erythroniums, trilliums and epimediums, all of which come in a wide range of colours depending on the variety you choose. In May, of particular beauty was corydalis 'Tory MP,' which is a striking blue colour but which he found difficult to grow, because of its name! It also sold well in some areas of the country but not at all in others!!!! He also recommended polemoniums and erodiums. June brought us fresh varieties including campanula glomerata, many beautiful peonies, a blue mecanopsis and astrantias.

He could not resist moving on to his main passion of euphorbias, which are especially lovely through the spring. He did, however, warn us to take care when handling these plants. The sap contains a potent irritant, which, if got on to the skin, would cause a high level of pain. He recommends they always be handled wearing gloves.

Our May speaker is continuing this particular theme. Justin Harrison is showing us a wide variety of plants which will be at their best during the summer months and we will also have the opportunity to buy.

After that, we will embark on our traditional summer activities visiting gardens of interest, both local and further afield and holding our Summer Garden Party.



Information from David Snartt.

Climate and Nature Pact.

Charnwood Borough Council has signed up to the Climate and Nature Pact with other Councils and organisations in Leicestershire.

The Pact is based on the principles of the Glasgow Climate Pact, signed by the UK Government in November 2021. It supports national and international efforts to tackle climate change and bring together the businesses and private sector, voluntary, community and social enterprises, universities, the education and research sector, the public sector and the people and communities of Leicestershire, to drive local action and work towards a number of shared environmental aims.

The core requirements of the Pact include the need to act quickly on reducing the impacts of climate change, reducing carbon emissions to net zero, halting ecological decline, supporting climate recovery and working together to deliver effective action on climate change.

Included in the first 18 signatories to the Leicestershire Climate and Nature Pact are Charnwood Borough Council, Loughborough University and The National Forest.

Charnwood Borough Council has reduced its own carbon footprint over the years, with more to be done. The Council are also drawing up a new climate change strategy which sets out how they will help lead local communities, residents, organisations and businesses to reduce their impact on the environment and climate change.

4th May Election.

I have previously communicated details on the new requirement to show photo ID when voting at the Borough Election on 4th May 2023. I thought it was important to remind voters that photo ID will be necessary before you will be able to vote in person at the polling station. The most common forms of photo ID are a driving licence (including provisional driving licence) passport, bus pass, and blue badge. You can still use your photo ID if it is out of date, so long as you can be identified from the photograph.

Over the last six months I have many regular customers who save their medical blister packs and give them to me for recycling. If you are taking tablets you don't need to throw the spent packs away in your black

bin because they are mixed materials. I am quite happy to collect them and have them recycled. They end up at Superdrug in Loughborough and I am told that the blister packs are ground into a fine powder and the aluminium is removed by electrostatic separation. Both the aluminium and the plastic are then reused.

You can bring the blister pack to the village coffee morning or drop them off at my house. We have saved a vast quantity that would otherwise have ended up as landfill. Thank you. **Dick Howard**

Village Archive

In the archive, I came across the text of a lecture delivered by a Mr W J

Waldron at the reauest of the Groby Women's Institute and delivered in November 1919. The cost of a copy was 9 pence. The following are extracts from the text.

"Bradgate was formally in-



cluded in the manor of Groby. The name appears to be derived from the Broadgate, which was in early times the principal entrance of the Earls of Leicester into the forest, and which stood on the spot now called Hallgates but anciently the Oldgate. The road from Leicester Castle to the ancient forest would to have been through Thurcaston.

Bradgate Park – there never was a village of that name – forms one of the belt of parks, which almost encircled the forest and to which they owed the origin, either as offering freer hunting than the thick woodlands allowed, or as furnishing additional protection to the Forest itself. This belt was formed by the four parts of Groby, Bardon, Whitwick, Gracedieu, Garendon, Burleigh (two), Beaumanor, Quorndon, Swithland and Bradgate. Groby and Bradgate from their nearness to Leicester were probably the first to be enclosed.

In 1247 an agreement made between Roger de Quincy and Roger de Somery makes regulation for their hunting in Charnwood Forest and Bradgate Park

The Park itself contains 820 acres and is surrounded by a wall 4 1/2

miles round. The house which is now in ruins was built (according to Leland) out of the materials of the Manor House of the Earl of Warwick, whose estates were forfeit to the King on the defeat and death of the Earl at the Battle of Barnet 1471.

The house was first begun by Thomas Grey, afterwards created Earl of Huntingdon, and Marquess of Dorset by his stepfather, Edward IV and finished by the second Marquess of Dorset. Henry Grey, third Earl of Dorset, was created Duke of Suffolk in 1551, probably as a compliment to his wife Frances, whose mother was a daughter of Henry VII. She had previously married Louis XII of France to please her brother, Henry VIII. Lady Jane Grey was a daughter of this marriage and a direct descendent of Henry VII although her connection with royalty undoubtedly proved a curse. Bradgate is particularly celebrated as being the birthplace and residence of this talented and virtuous lady. That her parents were severe, even beyond the custom of the time seems clear...."

This beautiful 2-acre garden has excellent views across a wide area of Charnwood countryside. Near the house are patios, a water feature, flower and shrub beds, a fruit cage, fruit trees, greenhouses and vegetable plots. Lawns slope down to a large wildlife pond with a waterfall, a gravel garden and three small areas of woodland with pleasant walks through many species of trees. The lower two thirds of the garden have been created since 2004, with over 200 conifers and deciduous trees planted. There are several places to sit and relax around the garden. Adding further interest, for all ages, there are also about 50 garden ornaments and statues around the garden.

There will be some stalls to browse and tea & cakes to be enjoyed.

May starts with a new garden opening on Bank Holiday Monday 1st from 11-4pm, at 2 Manor Farm Mews, Main Street, Queniborough LE7 3EA. A beautifully designed garden of ¼ acre, with borders filled with a variety of bird, bee and butterfly-friendly planting, surrounding formal lawns, topiary, hedging and a small woodland shady retreat.

On Sunday 7th Burrough Hall. Somerby Road, Burrough on the Hill. Melton Mowbrav. LE14 2QZ is open from 2-5pm. Originally a hunting lodge, the house has a large established Wisteria covering the front of the Hall. An extensive mature garden with fantastic views of the Leicestershire countryside.

Opening both days of the weekend 13th & 14th May there are four gardens opening Hedgehog Hall, 8 Hinckley Road, Mountain Ash and Westview.

Hedgehog Hall, Loddington Road, Tilton on the Hill, LE7 9DE opens between 11-4pm and is ½-acre garden which is an organically managed plant lover's garden with a walled terraced border filled with shrubs, perennials and bulbs. There is a lovely patio seating area where you can enjoy far-reaching views over the valley.

8 Hinckley Road at Stoke Golding, Nuneaton, CV13 6DU opens from 12 -4pm (Sat) and 12-3pm (Sun) This south west facing garden has a water feature and borders filled with colourful shrubs and perennials. Many of

the garden perennials are represented in the plant sale.

Opening from 11-5pm **Mountain Ash** 140 Ulverscroft Lane, Newtown Linford, LE6 0AJ benefits from stunning views over Charnwood forest. An extensive garden includes patios, water features, fruit trees, greenhouses, soft fruit cages and raised vegetable beds. Lawns slope down to a large wildlife pond with a waterfall, a gravel garden and three small areas of woodland with pleasant walks through many species of trees.

Westview at 1 St Thomas's Road, Great Glen, LE8 9EH opens both days from 11-4pm. This is a small, walled cottage garden is stacked full of interest and unusual planting. The garden includes a formal box parterre, a courtyard garden, a small wildlife pond, a greenhouse, and productive fruit and vegetable garden. The garden is managed organically and benefits from a restored Victorian water-saving system which collects rainwater from the roofs of outbuildings. Quirky garden ornaments, some made from recycled materials, add to the interest. Garden owners are beekeepers and welcome visits from fellow apiarists as well as plant enthusiasts.

On 20th May **Goadby Marwood Hall**, Melton Mowbray, LE14 4LN opens from 10.30-5.30pm. This is a large garden with a chain of five lakes (covering 10 acres) with swans and flowering spring blossom trees. There are several ironstone walled gardens all interconnected and a lovely lakeside woodland walk and a C13th church nearby.

The last garden to open in May is **Westbrooke House** on Sunday 28th from 10-4.30pm at 52 Scotland Road, Little Bowden, Market Harborough, LE16 8AX. The gardens comprise 6 acres in total with a tree lined driveway of mature limes and giant redwoods. There is a walled flower garden, walled kitchen garden, fernery, lower garden, wildlife pond, spring garden, lawns, woodland paths and a meadow with a wildflower area, ha-ha and hornbeam avenue.

Enjoy visiting one of our gardens knowing that at the same time, you are also donating to nursing and cancer charities. In 2022, thanks to the generosity of garden owners, our volunteers and garden visitors The National Garden Scheme donated over £3.11 million to our best-loved charities including Macmillan Cancer Support, Marie Curie, Hospice UK and The Queen's Nursing Institute.

Crime statistics for March 2023 were received from PC Greg Moore:

Local Beat Officers have upped patrols around the area of the Cemetery following the damage and theft of 2 x 3ft Christmas Trees.

The last speeding operation carried out was 2-3 months ago and in one hour on Markfield Lane, local officers caught nearly 50 drivers going over 30mph – all had been sent warning letters. Further speeding operations will be conducted in the Parish in the near future.

What is heritage crime?

Heritage crime is any offence which harms the value of heritage assets and their settings.

Some heritage assets are protected by specific legislation to prevent harm caused by damage or unlicensed alteration. However, other crimes such as theft, criminal damage, arson and anti-social behaviour offences can also damage and harm heritage assets and interfere with the public's enjoyment and knowledge of their heritage.

Heritage assets are sites which are considered to have a value to the heritage our country and include:

Listed buildings Scheduled monuments World Heritage Sites Protected marine wreck sites Conservation areas Registered parks and gardens Registered battlefields Protected military remains of aircraft and vessels of historic interest Undesignated but acknowledged heritage buildings and sites.

What is being done about heritage crime?

Historic England, together with the National Police Chiefs' Council (NPCC), the Crown Prosecution Service (CPS) and a range of partners

across the heritage and law enforcement sectors, including Neighbourhood Watch, have set up the Heritage Crime Programme.

These three main organisations, have signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) which sets out their responsibilities for tackling heritage crime. A growing number of other organisations, such as local and national park authorities have also joined this coordinated effort. The aim of this MOU is to deliver a programme of preventative measures and enforcement activities that are realistic, efficient and deliverable.

Neighbourhood Policing has been established to tackle local crime and anti-social behaviour and also provides a useful model for tackling heritage crime. Everyone is very welcome.

I am privileged to have been appointed by CBC as one of two Poll Clerks for Newtown Linford. Please don't forget to bring your photo ID if you are voting in person. Even if I know you and you know me, we will still need to see photo ID, otherwise you will not be able to vote.

In case you missed it in the last edition of the Village Magazine, here's a reminder of the new mandatory voter ID requirements for the elections in May:

New Mandatory Voter ID requirements

From May 2023, all voters will be required to show an accepted form of photographic identification (photo ID) at a polling station before they are given a ballot paper.

This will affect all voters across Charnwood who vote in person or by proxy, at the next local election on Thursday 4th May 2023. You are not required to provide photo ID for postal voting.

Photo ID you can use

Voters must bring a suitable form of photographic ID to their polling station. Acceptable forms of photo ID will include:

Passport issued by the UK, any of the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, a British Overseas Territory, an EEA state or a Commonwealth country

Photographic driver's licence issued by the UK, Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, or an EEA state (including provisional) European Economic Area (EEA) photographic ID Card Biometric immigration document An identity card bearing the Proof of Age Standards Scheme hologram (PASS card) Ministry of Defence Form 90 (Defence Identity Card) A Blue Badge Older Person's Bus Pass Disabled Person's Bus Pass Oyster 60+ Card Freedom Pass

Only original documents are accepted; scanned images or copies will not be accepted. However, if your photo ID has expired it will be accepted as long as the photograph is still a good likeness to you.

No suitable photo ID?

If you do not have any of the accepted photo ID, and you want to vote at the polling station, you will need to apply for a free Voter Authority Certificate. This is a free photographic identification document specific for the purposes of voting.

You will be able to apply for a Voter Authority Certificate in person, by post or online through GOV.UK. CBC recommend that you apply for a Voter Authority Certificate in good time. The deadline to apply for a Voter Authority Certificate in time for the local elections in May 2023 is 5pm on Tuesday 25 April 2023.

Voters who do not produce a Voter Authority Certificates, or valid photo identification will not be allowed to vote on the day.
