Those of you with a link to schools will know that for the past five years they have had a duty to promote 'British values', identified in the guidance as: democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty, and mutual respect and tolerance of those of different faiths and beliefs. So nothing about playing cricket, rugby or football. That'd explain a lot.

In recent months the following question has really begun to trouble me: what happens when those values begin to break down? Of course this is partly about Brexit, where democracy exercised in different spheres seems to be in conflict (whether in the referendum or in Parliament, for example), where the rule of law – indeed what the law actually is – is contested, where this is a matter of collective action rather than individual choice, and most particularly where the mutual respect on which we could pride ourselves for so many years is disappearing fast. But it is also about the wider context of our society. I am not one for claiming any disagreement is intolerance, but it does appear that we are – on social media if nowhere else – losing the ability to agree to disagree.

In 300 words I cannot solve these problems. I regret that I am returning to them again, but with yet another deadline looming on 31st October, it is hard to ignore. What I can say is that if we believe in these values then we need to play our part in retaining them. Just because, around us, people are reverting to insults and intolerance, doesn't mean we should. We may not be able to change the entire culture, but we should go against the flow ourselves if we want to see these values persist.

As a Christian I believe in these 'British values' not as an absolute standard nor because they are perfection themselves – I think God's values of faith, hope, and love are more important and Jesus alone is perfect – but because they give us space and safety to work out what is important to us, and the right to hold onto those opinions without being bullied or forced into a particular view. As Voltaire never actually said: 'I may disapprove of what you say, but I will defend to the death your right to say it.'




COACH TRIP TO LINCOLN

The first meeting of the Friends this season took place on Thursday 26th September at the Woodhouse Eaves Village Hall, where we were to have heard a talk on 'Visitors to Charnwood forest' by David Robinson. Unfortunately this talk had to be postponed for medical reasons, so Marilyn Palmer gave a talk on 'The Making of the Industrial Landscape in Leicestershire'.

'Landscape' is perhaps best connected with Leicestershire through the work of W G Hoskins, late professor of local history at Leicester University. What people may not realise is that he came to dislike Leicestershire, and particularly its industrial landscape, and he retreated to Devon as soon as he was able. So what were the industries that contributed to this landscape? The talk covered the rise, and in some cases the fall, of these industries, from knitting and the boot and shoe industry to iron founding and engineering, and the bricks which made St Pancras station.

Weaving was, of course, a very ancient occupation. At first sheep were shorn, the wool either combed or carded, then spun and knitted, all by hand. The first knitting machines may well have orginated in Nottinghamshire, and certainly by the mid 18th century the highest concentrations were in the Nottingham, Leicester and Derby shires. These evolved into power-driven machines which by the 1870's formed the basis for a factory culture. Here the talk touched on the subject of the role of women in the growth of this industry. Meanwhile boots and shoes were being manufactured chiefly in Northamptonshire, but the industry spread north in the 1860's, examples being the Wheatsheaf Works and the British United Shoe Machinery Co, both in Leicester city. Charles Bennion, the CEO of British United, was responsible for the presentation of Bradgate Park to the people of Leicester and its shire. Iron works arose at this time; Gimson's works being a very good example. Its products may still be viewed at the Abbey Pumping station, which originally was designed to pump sewage to Beaumont Leys but is now a museum.

To make things involves a source of energy, anything from man or horse power to the introduction of steam, the product of heating water using a coal fire. The next topic in the talk was, logically, about the coal industry. In the north western part of the county the coal measures have a fairly thin overburden and are easily mined. Unfortunately, between them and their city lies the Charnwood Forest, which makes transport both difficult and expensive.

This led on to transport, which is necessary for industrial growth in any case – the bigger the market, the more prosperous the industry. The coming of the canalisation of the river Soar between the Trent and Leicester allowed cheap coal from Derbyshire to flood into Leicester, depriving the Leicestershire coalfield of its market. Its first attempt at retrieving the situation was the Charnwood Forest canal – a disaster in the making. Then came the Leicester and Swannington Railway, well known as the Stephenson line that had to create both the steam whistle and the Glenfield tunnel.

The age of steam has come to an end. Factories which once produced enough to give Leicester the title of the richest city in Europe are now blocks of flats, either by conversion or destruction. Smoke no longer hangs over the city. Would Hoskins have approved? We shall never know...




Stags Head

Bus Services 120 & 155 COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT MEETING

Passenger transport is changing in Leicestershire and, at the same time as the county council is facing significant financial challenges, we are also trying to offer a better service to residents. The county council has developed a new Passenger Transport Policy and Strategy (PTPS) to ensure its passenger transport provision is fit for purpose and cost-effective.

We are reviewing all contracted services across the county. The review of services 120 (Coalville to Leicester) & 155 (Coalville to Castle Donington) is now complete and the intended course of action is to integrate the two services and operate to a reduced frequency, with East Midlands Airport no longer being served.

The council would like to engage with affected communities on the outcome of the review and the intended course of action.

As well as the Parish Clerk role, I will also be acting as your village Neighbourhood Watch Coordinator.

Over the coming weeks, I intend to contact many of the Parish Council's partners, including our Neighbourhood Policing Team.

As we are nearing the darker nights, when the clocks turn back towards the end of the month, it is important for residents not to let burglars and thieves take advantage of poor crime prevention and use the cover of darkness to commit their crimes.

There is often an increase in burglaries and valuables stolen from cars at this time of year but there is plenty residents can do to help prevent themselves from being targeted. Residents should take time to consider both home and car security.

Some simple measures include the use of light timers that switch on when you're out, having outside security lighting installed and by parking your car in well-lit areas when away from the home.

However, the simplest of them all - and this applies all year round - is to ensure your front and back doors are locked, even when you are in, and to keep valuables out of sight.

Halloween will soon be upon us too, and I'm sure many of our younger villagers are looking forward to some trick or treat fun.

I know everyone in our Village will continue to be considerate and caring towards our more vulnerable residents, who may feel intimidated or alarmed when hearing a knock at the door on a dark October evening. I would, however, like to suggest, if you don't already, observing the 'Pumpkin Rule', whereby if a household is decorated for Halloween and/ or has a pumpkin lit on display, it is seen as an open invitation for Trick or Treaters to call and to avoid those homes that are not decorated. I am hoping that Leicestershire Police will again be producing Trick or Treat Welcome and Not Welcome posters, which people can display if they wish to. I will endeavour to obtain a supply, so please email me at the Clerk address below, if you would like one.

Finally, I'd be interested to hear if any of you have any current concerns

regarding crime and anti-social behaviour within our community. It would also be appreciated if residents could inform me if they sadly fall victim to crime.
