

early thirty years ago – 1995 I think – I went with a friend to an Oasis concert at Earls Court in London. They were a massive fan, I was kind of carried along. I remember it being a great experience, but I have to confess that I enjoyed the opening band more than I enjoyed Oasis! As a nod to the criticism they were getting. Oasis had brought along the Bootleg Beatles as their support act. I knew more of their songs than the main set!

You don't have to have attended the recent Nostalgia Nights at the Linford to know that there's a bigger market for familiar music than there is for new material. Over in Glenfield, a local venue has booked a series of tribute acts, selling out each gig. Which makes me wonder, why are 'bootleg' acts so popular?

I guess part of it is accessibility. Take Taylor Swift for example. A ticket to her Eras tour was almost impossible to get hold of, and hugely expensive. A ticket to a tribute act is just over a tenner, and just down the road. But then so may be a ticket to an original act doing a local gig. So it must be the familiarity - just as with the Bootleg Beatles, I knew most of their songs; at the Nostalgia nights, I'm sure everyone ends up singing along.

Paul writes this in one of his letters: 'imitate me, as I imitate Christ'. Now, on one level, no-one can match Jesus. Yet Paul seems to suggest that he aims to be a tribute act - to base his life firmly on the example of Jesus. And invites us to do the same. So that everyone is able to meet Jesus, and everyone is able to learn how to live his life, 'sing his song'. If you're a Christian, I don't know if you've ever considered yourself in that way, as a Jesus tribute act? And if not, you don't have to go far to hear and enjoy his good news, we're just down the road.

Take a reflective walk

All Saints' are joining with three neighbouring churches and a number of local schools, including Newtown Linford Primary, to offer a chance to reflect on the original events of Easter.

In each of the churchyards in the run-up to Easter itself there will be some images created by children at the schools showing events from Jesus' last few hours before he died on the cross. Accompanying them will be a series of audio reflections, accessible via a QR code at each scene.

Each church will host part of the story, but you'll have to visit all four – including Glenfield, Anstey and Thurcaston – to get the whole picture. [Images are from the first time we did this, back in 2021, but with bought images rather than child-produced ones].

On Good Friday, 29th March at 2pm, there will an Hour at the Cross, bringing all those events together as we think about not just the events, but the difference they made and make to reality itself.

On Easter Day, 31st March at 10am, we celebrate that the cross was not the end of the story—Jesus is risen! Everyone is welcome—there may even be an egg hunt!!!



Village Archive

This month more about what was happening in the Village in 1965.

The Church Services on Sundays were attended by an average of between 70 and 80 people and many newcomers to the village had become active members. There was a thriving Choir, Sunday School, Women's Fellowship and there were also Scouts, Cubs and a Brownie Pack.

The WI started the year with 115 members, the average attendance at meetings being 64, when they had varied talks and demonstrations, to say nothing of their famous annual Party - always a sellout. When a country dancing competition was to be held at Thrussington Village Hall a team was formed, and under the leadership of Mrs Marion Smith practices were held in the Sunday School Room. There was also Armchair Keep fit, Painting Class, Sewing Club, Tennis Club, Cricket Club, Drama Society, Good Neighbour scheme and a well-attended Parish Party (I don't doubt there were other groups too that I haven't yet come across).

The Linford Club then known as "The Ex Service Social Club and Institute" had a very large Committee and appears to have been thriving.

The Quorn Hunt met at Benscliffe Hey and In July Mr James Gilbert, the owner of Beaumanor Riding School in the village held a Horse show and Gymkhana. Rain, sleet, hail and high winds made it a stay at home holiday over the Easter weekend. It appears to have been rather a wet year with 33.65 inches (854.71mm) of rain, the average annual rainfall being 24.2 inches (609.60mm).

Following a Public Inquiry, an attempt to develop a large estate off Markfield Lane was defeated. It was described as a perfect example of what can be achieved by local opinion when adequately expressed through our elected representatives. Long may that continue!

Correction. Last month, I said that the dendrochronology (timber dating) took place at Vine Cottage, in fact, it was next door at Rose Cottage (many thanks, Brian).

The Gentlemen's Dinner/Sportsman's Dinner.

Newtown Linford is one of the very few cricket clubs in Leicestershire to maintain what was originally entitled the 'Gentlemen's Dinner', latterly renamed the 'Sportsman's Dinner'. This event was inaugurated in 1950 and was held in the Village Hall. In the succeeding seventythree years, with the exception of Covid, various venues have been the hosts, predominately the Bracken Hill between the years 1968 and 1987 and latterly Lingdale Golf Club.

The list of auest speakers over the vears reads like a 'Who's Who' of English cricket. The likes of David 'Bumble' Lloyd, Mike Gatting. Graham Gooch. Geoff Miller. Derek

Randall, Basil D'Oliveira, Jonathan Agnew and many more have graced us with their presence. While all of these names are synonymous with the game in this country, perhaps the greatest of all was Jim Laker. For our younger readers, Jim Laker was a right arm off spinner who played for Surrey and England, who took a world test record of 19 wickets for 90 runs (9 for 37 in the first innings and 10 for 53 in the second) at the Oval versus Australia in 1956. In his speech he didn't tell one joke but just related cricket stories which held the audience spellbound for the whole of the time that he was on his feet. For those lucky enough to have been in attendance, a night to remember.

The 'Sportsman's Dinner' is an event well worth preserving and although its decline at the majority of clubs is sad to note, it is to be hoped that at Newtown Linford Cricket Club it will continue for years to come. Chris Scrine

Our wildlife walk this month will be on 30th March (Easter Saturday), when we plan to visit Sheet Hedges Wood to look for early woodland flowers. Meet outside the Village Hall at 2pm. Wildlife to look out for during March

- March shows the transition from Winter to Spring: Winter migrants such as Redwings and Fieldfares are still around before they return to Scandinavia for the summer; you may also be lucky enough to see Waxwings, of which there has been an influx this year. Meanwhile summer migrants, such as House Martins and Swallows, are starting to arrive.
- Amphibians are stirring: look out for frogs and toads looking to mate. If you have a pond, go out at night and listen to see if you can hear signs of activity. Frogspawn comes in the familiar clumps. Toads lay their spawn in long "ropes", while Newt spawn is laid individually, each egg being wrapped in a pond plant leaf.
- Hibernating butterflies will now be appearing. Although most butterflies spend the winter as an egg, a caterpillar or a chrysalis, a few hibernate as the mature butterfly, and these will be the first to appear. Look out for Brimstones (a pale yellow), Peacocks with their large circular eye-spots and Small





Tortoiseshells (black and orange, with a thin black and yellow "tiger stripe" along the front of the wing).

Information from David Snartt. Borough Councillor for Forest Bradgate.

Former Lady Jane Mobile Home Park.

I was so disappointed with the outcome of the decision to allow the planning application for the former mobile homes site on Bradgate Road at the Charnwood Borough Council's Plans Committee on Thursday 25th January. This in contrast to the representations supplied at the meeting by two residents, Parish Councillors and myself, who put evidence forward for this proposal to be refused.

You may recall the developer had secured planning permission to build 2/3 bedroom bungalows which were a good replacement for the mobile homes. This latest planning application will now see 4/5 bedroom dwellings on this site. I stated at the meeting this would not help people who wanted to stay in the village to downsize to a smaller property. I also noted evidence shows that Newtown Linford already has 86% of houses which have three or more bedrooms against 69% across the Charnwood Borough. Therefore, I did ask the question, are we building homes that are needed by the Parish community or solely for commercial gain of the developer.

This latest application, in my view, was not in line with a policy within the Local Plan, which states: Based on the projections for our population and household types, our evidence suggests that we need to increase the number of two-bedroom homes, to do this 30-35% of all homes delivered should be smaller two bedroom homes. I believe there will be many residents who will be sad to hear the outcome that sees the change of 2/3 bedroom bungalows to 4/5 bedroom properties.

Former Grey Lady Restaurant.

I have been sent e-mails and asked about what is happening on the site of the former Grey Lady Restaurant. I believe people are aware planning permission was granted with conditions to demolish the existing building and a replacement dwelling built.

Due to the commencement of works to demolish the vacant building, the demolition works started without the successful discharge of a predemolition condition attached to planning application P/23/0316/2. This condition related to bat safety and mitigation. Bats are a protected species, it is a legal requirement to report any instances of unlawful disturbance (such as this) to the Police.

The failure to successfully discharge the pre-demolition condition in time

has meant that the applicants have to submit a new, full, planning application in order to regularise works and obtain a lawful planning permission for the site. I will keep you informed about a new planning application when it is submitted to Charnwood Borough Council.

Council Homes Improvements.

A new firm has been awarded a two-year contract to deliver improvements to Council homes in Charnwood. Jeakins Weir, an independent construction company has been awarded the contract by Charnwood Borough Council to deliver scheduled improvements to Council-owned homes in the Borough.

The contract will involve full and partial bathroom and kitchen replacements as part of the Council's programme of planned improvements to its housing stock. It will also include external and internal structural works and refurbishments to empty properties. The new contract came into place last year following a strict procurement process. Voting by Post.

If you know that you will not be able to get to the polling station on polling day, you can vote by post. You can apply for a postal vote if you are away on holiday or because your work schedule means you can't get to the polling station. You can also choose to vote by post simply because it would be more convenient for you.

You can apply to vote by post for a particular election, for a set time or a maximum of up to three years. You can apply for a postal vote in a number of ways: On line via <u>www.gov.uk/apply-postal-vote</u>: Download, print and complete a postal vote application form from the Electoral Commission: Contact Electoral Services at Charnwood Borough Council <u>elections@charnwood.gov,uk</u> or call 01509 634546. They will send you a postal vote application form to complete. Remember you can choose to vote by post simply because it would be more convenient to do so.

This month's NHW report comes from our Local Police Beat Officers:

Speeding survey in Newtown Linford 26/1/24.

We wanted to share the results of a covert speeding survey conducted vesterday on Bradgate Road, Newtown Linford. This is specifically the part of the road that comes into the village from Anstey and goes from a 40mph speed limit to a 30mph speed limit at the top of the hill.

We're aware that this particular bit of road often suffers with speeding issues and enforcement vehicles do visit there from time to time, but as a beat team we like to witness these issues ourselves, hence our survey vesterdav.

These are the results -

30mph and under - 33%

31mph to 35 mph - 36%

36mph to 40 mph - 21%

41mph and over - 10 %

The fastest vehicle was travelling at 51mph!

It is incredibly disappointing to see that 67% of people driving into the village from the direction of Anstey are exceeding the speed limit. This is of course completely unacceptable. In 2022, excessive speed killed 303 people in the UK and seriously injured 2180 others. Next time you're speeding through Newtown Linford, please have a think about how you'd cope with being jailed/losing your job/losing your house should be involved in one of these types of collisions.

Enforcement will follow in due course.

Theft from work vans

Over recent months, we have seen a rise in offences relating to thefts whereby entry is gained into work-vans overnight and tools taken. We are currently investigating a number of these offences and during the investigation, we have often found that owners do not regularly record information such as the make and model of their tools/serial numbers/ photographs of their tools/unique identifying features that could assist in identifying them when seized by police.

It may sound simple and obvious, but we are finding that when we recover tools, we sometimes struggle to find their rightful owners as identifying serial numbers/marks are not recorded on our system. Information like this helps us to reunite tools with their owners as well as prosecuting offenders.

Please consider recording the above information when purchasing your tools. If you are keeping tools in your vans overnight, please consider removing them, keeping them secure and always remember to use any security measures such as Alarms / CCTV that you have.
