

romises are powerful things.

I remember a few years ago, I was helping out with a children's camp, taking my turn on the stall selling t-shirts in the different team colours. A little girl came along wanting a green one. Unfortunately we'd sold out of this year's green that morning, and the look of disappointment on her face was devastating. To cheer her up, I said that she could have one of the leftover stock from last year and promised to get it signed by all the members of the resident band to make it special. It took me a day to get them all to sign, but then I handed it over and forgot all about it. At the end of the week her mother came to find me when collecting her and made a point of saying thank you, not for the t-shirt, but for keeping the promise. So often, she said, people say things and then forget to follow through. Thank you for keeping your word and giving my little girl a reason to trust people.

I then went home, got caught up in the arrangements for my sister's wedding and forgot to let a friend know that I wouldn't be able to go to a rugby match with them that weekend until the last minute. This time, I rightly got taken to task over a broken promise.

It's left me a little wary of making too many promises. I don't want to let people down and I feel the pressure of fulfilling the ones I make. It still makes me feel bad if I forget to send a document I've promised or to pass on a message (and with a memory like mine, it happens too often). Promises are powerful.

The Bible is full of promises, promises made by people and promises made by God. Sometimes we may feel that God has not fulfilled something he has said, but Paul pointed out something profound, reminding us we can trust God: 'no matter how many promises God has made. they are 'Yes' in Christ.'

More about hedgehogs

Autumn is approaching and this is the time that hedgehogs will be preparing to hibernate. Hibernation is a natural physical response (of so much of our wildlife) to a decrease in the supply of natural food during the cold winter months of November through to about mid-March. During hibernation, the hedgehog becomes immobile, body temperature drops, heart rate decreases and respiration almost stops.

To prepare for hibernation, hedgehogs build a nest of leaves, twigs and other garden material. The nest insulates them from the worst weather extremes and protects them from disturbance and predators. Favourite sites for the nest are under hedges, piles of brushwood, inside compost heaps etc.

Hedgehogs must be of a certain weight with enough body fat to last them through the winter months. They need to weigh about 600g (1lb 6oz) in order to hibernate successfully and be in good condition, post hibernation. So, as a general rule, hedgehogs which are still outside in the open



from October onwards and are small - under 450 g (1lb) – should be rescued.

You can help hedgehogs during this period by doing the following:

When tidying the garden, take care when removing piles of leaves and other garden materials as these are ideal for a hedgehog to make its nest.

Be vigilant with your bonfire. Ideally, move it before you light it, or lift up the base with poles or broom handles to look inside before lighting.

If you see a hedgehog out during the day that looks small and/or sickly, especially during the winter months, it is in trouble. This month we continue text from a lecture "The Greys of Groby" by W. J Waldron, November 1919. Although in a different century, it is remarkable to think that two famous future Queens of England - Elizabeth Wood-ville, and Lady Jane Grey - lived in such close proximity to present day Newtown Linford.

"Sir Edward Grey, the first of the Greys to reside at Groby, had a son John, who married the celebrated Elizabeth Woodville, and no period of her chequered life was perhaps so free from care as the few years she passed at Groby with the husband of her choice, who was killed at the battle of St Albans in 1461. According to the law, and custom of the time, as Sir John Grey had been guilty of rebellion against his Sovereign, his estate was forfeit to the King, and his widow, with her sons suddenly found themselves ejected from their home and penniless. She was staying with her parents at Grafton, in Northamptonshire, when Edward IV hunting in that neighbourhood chanced to pay the Duchess of Bedford, his mother a visit; and the opportunity of presenting herself before the King, and entreating his pity for her impoverished and fatherless boys



Groby Old Hall. From a drawing in the British Museum. seem too good to lose. He, in turn, became the suppliant and she became Queen of Edward IV. and the mother of the two unfortunate princes who were murdered in the Tower of London by the command of their uncle. Richard III. who was slain at the Battle of Bosworth in 1485. By the marriage of her daughter, Elizabeth,

with Henry VII the War of the Roses came to an end".

Camera Trial.

A camera which uses artificial intelligence to capture people littering from vehicles is to be trialled by Charnwood Borough Council. The Council will be piloting the Litter Cam technology over a 12-week period in Loughborough.

Vehicle owners could be fined \pounds 150 if the cameras catch litter being thrown from the vehicle. New laws introduced means registered keepers are held responsible and may be fined or prosecuted.

The camera will automatically detect rubbish being thrown from a vehicle and could include litter such as cigarette ends, coffee cups, drinks cans and food packaging. If the offence is caught on camera, an automatic number plate recognition (ANPR) camera will record the vehicle's number plate.

Mid Leicestershire Constituency.

Now that political party candidates are being selected before the next General Election, residents have been asking me about the changes which have recently taken place to the local parliamentary constituencies. I understand the main reason for the changes is for each constituency to have around 75,000 electors.

This will see a significant change to the current Charnwood constituency boundaries, with a split between two new constituencies, Melton and Syston and the one Newtown Linford Parish will be in, Mid Leicestershire. The remaining areas from the Charnwood constituency will be joined by villages currently in the Bosworth and South Leicestershire constituencies to form the new Mid Leicestershire constituency.

Recently I have been involved in selecting the Conservative Party Parliamentary Candidate for the new Mid Leicestershire constituency. I thought you would be interested to know that Peter Bedford has now been selected to be the Conservative Party candidate for the new Mid Leicestershire constituency.

Peter first moved to the County in 2004 where he studied law at the University of Leicester, before going on to qualify as a chartered accountant with PricewaterhouseCoopers. He has worked for some recognisable Leicestershire firms, including Aggregate Industries and Next plc. In 2017 Peter was elected as a County Councillor for the Markfield, Des-

ford and Thornton Division of Leicestershire County Council, where he continues to champion local issues such as, the preservation of rural bus services, support for community libraries and opposing speculative housing development.

Until the next general election, Rt Hon. Edward Argar MP will continue to represent residents in the current Charnwood constituency.

October 2023

I'm sure all of us were both saddened and shocked by the recent events in the Groby Pool area, resulting in a road closure along Newtown Linford Lane during September. Thank you to all the residents who contacted Police with information and assisted with their enquiries.

At the time of print, Police continue to appeal for information as follows:

Officers searching for a missing Leicester woman, recovered a body in some woodland in the Groby Pool area. The body was recovered on Wednesday 6th September, believed to be that of Gabriela Kosilko – who was reported missing on Friday 1st September.

Detective Chief Inspector Mark Sinski from East Midlands Special Operations Unit Murder Investigation Team, said: "Our enquiries into the circumstances surrounding Gabriela's death continue and anyone who may have any information is asked to get in touch.

"If you were driving along Newtown Linford Lane around 2.20pm on Friday (1st September), please check your dashcam footage and get in touch if you captured a red Audi A1 parked on the side of the road or saw anyone driving it or sitting in the vehicle. Equally, if you were in Ratby Lane area during Friday afternoon please get in touch if you saw the vehicle or anything which seemed unusual or caused you concern.

"We would also like to reassure the local community who have been affected by the events of the last few days that officers will remain in the area while further enquiries are conducted. If you have any concerns please contact us via 101 or www.leics.police.uk."

Anyone who can assist with enquiries is asked to contact 101, quoting incident 484 of 1st September or alternatively use Public Portal (mipp.police.uk)

Our thoughts are with Gabriela's family and friends at this sad time.

Greetings!

Speeding

Newtown Linford Parish Council remain very concerned by continued speeding issues throughout the Parish, particularly along Main Street, Bradgate Road, Markfield Lane and Roecliffe Road. Chairman, Sue Pritchard regularly downloads and analyses the data from all three VAS units, which has been previously shared through the Village Magazine.

Leicestershire Police conducted a covert speeding operation on Main Street back in 2021 and found 18% of vehicles were found to be exceeding the National Police Chief Council enforcement threshold of 10% +2mph.

This represents poor compliance with the limit and as such the Police Traffic Management Department were asked to coordinate some enforcement utilising Officers from the Local beat team and/or the Safer Roads Team. I am pleased to report that Main Street has now been added to a new list of Community Concern Site Locations and mobile speed enforcement will start imminently in Newtown Linford. The camera vans will be visible from both directions on Main Street and will remind drivers to slow down.

As is the case with all community concern sites, speed camera vans will make regular visits for a period of 18 months and then the Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland Road Safety Partnership will carry out a site review to ascertain if driver behaviour has been modified.

However, prior to this, NLPC signed up to the Leicestershire Police Bin Sticker Initiative (you may have seen some residents' bins labelled with 30/40mph signs, as a reminder to motorists to slow down) and a supply of these remain available for anyone wanting to display one.

The Parish Council also requested 30mph repeater signs along the highway. However, Direction 11 of the Traffic Signs Regulations and General Directions 2002 (TSRGD 2002), as amended, defines the requirements for the placing of speed-limit repeater signs, which states that speedlimit repeater signs cannot be placed along a road on which there is carriageway lighting not more than 183 metres apart and which is subject to a 30-mph speed limit.

In addition, Main Street, between the junctions with Markfield Lane and Ulverscroft Lane, were also registered with the LCC Community Speed Management Initiative upon the Parish Council's request and lastly, we attempted to get the Community Speedwatch initiative resurrected but following numerous attempts to get resident volunteers to sign up to help, we had no-one come forward.

With the exception of re-siting the intermittent Bradgate Road VAS to a more suitable location (or replacing it with a mobile device), the Parish Council feel they have done everything within their power to try and resolve the problem and the matter now lies with Leicestershire Police and LCC Highways.

However, NLPC's longer term plan is to look at obtaining funding, perhaps through a Section 106 agreement, to have average speed cameras installed along Bradgate Road and Main Street, similar to those installed in recent years in Woodhouse and which have proved very effective. Unfortunately, the cost of these is £100,000 and is not something the Parish Council can budget for immediately or without external funding.

We will continue to liaise with partner agencies and report our concerns.



Drains and Gullies

Thank you to those who have reported blocked drains in the Parish. All issues have been reported to LCC Highways and works have either been completed or are scheduled to take place over the coming weeks.

Please continue to report any problems with blocked roadside drains and gullies.

Village Hall Bookings

Recently, I have seen a big increase in the number of enquiries and bookings for the Village Hall which is great news. I believe this is due to other Village Halls close by making changes to their services. Jubilee Hall in Anstey is also due to close on 18th December for a period of 6 to 7 months for building works. If you are thinking of holding a party



or event at the Village Hall, please book early to avoid disappointment. I am currently booking dates well into 2024.

Bob Bown Memorial Field

As stated in last month's Magazine, I will be looking at possible further equipment installations for the next financial year, to fill the gaps where the timber trail was previously sited. If you have any requests or suggestions, please contact me as soon as possible to have your say. So far, I have not received any suggestions.

Cemetery and Churchyard

Back in August, our wonderful maintenance contractor, Michael, attended the Churchyard and found a number of slow worms in residence! Slow worms are protected by law in the UK and therefore, maintenance work ceased whilst we consulted with an Ecologist and considered our options to ensure they were not harmed. Since then, Michael has resumed visits which are now taking longer than before, as any strimming or mowing cannot take place until checks have been carried out for Slow Worm presence. Prior to mowing, walking through areas of long grass should disturb any creatures and encourage them to temporarily move elsewhere and working slowly with machinery allows time for animals present to escape. Reptiles are usually active between late March and the end of October and the rest of the year, they hibernate below ground.
