I follow Jesus, who said that change in our lives is not just to be desired but essential so that we could experience life at its best. All of us have things in us, in our experience and in our own habits, which could do with transformation. Sometimes changes are instant, but more often there's a longer process to work with, as he helps us change. That can be frustrating – none of us like waiting! – but is worthwhile, as the best results, the best life we can have, comes from that patient 'brewing' of a perfect blend at the hands of the perfect guide.

This year the Christmas Extravaganza was host to none other than the famed Emmanuel Apostolic Gospel Academy Choir, as featured on BBC 2's The Choir. This exciting appearance, follow-

ing their success earlier that week as runners up of the televised competition, filled the room with the Christmas spirit as everyone joined in with classics such as the 12 Days of Christmas.

Special thanks for this tremendous evening go to the village members who, despite preferring not to be in the spotlight, should none-the-less be thanked for all


their hard work and dedication to make this evening such a marvellous success to be enjoyed by all.

From the Park Mission Accomplished

When I wrote my column in February last year, we were just getting ready to start work on the new Visitor Centre with the builder being due on site at the end of the month. Since then, we have opened to the public (in July) and held the official opening, which was performed by Sir David Attenborough in September.

Because the new Visitor Centre was to be such an improvement on the old one and would be open every day, we really did not know how many people to expect in its first season of opening. I set the rather arbitrary target of attracting 10% of a typical year's total visitors: 50,000 people, which I felt would be quite a challenge to achieve. Such has been the popularity of the new Exhibition that we achieved the first year's target in less than seven full months of opening: on Saturday 21st January. As well as representing 10% of a typical year's visitor numbers at Bradgate Park, the figure of 50,000 is also significant because it represents the number above which Visit England classify a property as falling into the category of Large Visitor Attraction.





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Mon - Sat Eve 6pm-9pm

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As well as counting the number of visitors, we have also been surveying them to find out what they think of the Visitor Centre. A staggering 96% rated the overall experience as either Excellent or Very Good and 72% said they had "learned a lot". A typical comment either in the Visitors' Book or via the feedback terminal goes something like: "I have been coming here for over 40 years and I never knew there was so much history here." In fact, I challenge anyone not to learn something new from a trip around the Visitor Centre.

We are building on the great work that is done in the Visitor Centre by our volunteers by recruiting and training volunteers to act as tour guides for the Ruins and also for Old John, which will be open to the public on Easter Monday and then hopefully on every weekend until October. We are making a few changes to the format of our events and guided walk programmes this year and they will be going to print shortly. In the meantime, tickets for this summer's theatre performances, Wind in the Willows and Pride and Prejudice, are available to buy online at www.seetickets.com as are tickets for the Bradgate Proms on Saturday 19th August, for which we are offering an Early Bird Discount of 20% for tickets purchased before the end of March.

As usual, the Bradgate Lecture will be held in the Village Hall. This year, Steve Woodward of Loughborough Naturalists' Club will talk about The Ecology of Bradgate Park. The lecture will be held on Wednesday 24th February starting at 7.30pm and admission costs £2 for adults and £1 for children, students and OAPs.

Out on the Park, it has been a busy winter and the steady flow of visitors has never really stopped. The wet weather has slowed the woodland work and we are in need of some good, hard frosts to enable us to extract timber without causing damage to the ground.

Sadly, the Red Bus Café at Hunts Hill has suffered a spate of vandalism. If anybody has any information relating to this, please report it to the police by dialling 101. We were delighted to get our stolen Land Rover back thanks to the power of social media and it would be good if we could put a stop to this antisocial behaviour as well.

As the days slowly lengthen, I look forward to seeing you on the Park.

Village Hall News

The AGM of the Village Hall Charitable Trust was predictably unexciting; the existing Members were all re-elected/re-appointed. The Committee therefore consists of elected members Toby Manning (Chairman), Janet Brunton (Secretary), Peter Rose (Treasurer), Vicki Lightfoot, John Nixon, Wes Raynor, together with appointed members Pat Wood (Choir), Sue Pritchard (Gardening Club and Parish Council), Peter Upton (Drama) and Caroline Brewster (Playgroup).

The Financial Report showed a loss of £1,015 (after spending £2,073 on renovating the floor) on a turnover of £15,588, and as a consequence the Committee reported that it had instituted an increase in fees of approximately 5% - the first increase since 2009.

The Christmas Evening meal was considered a success, with 97 tickets being sold. I know that some Villagers regretted the change from a lunch, but attendance at this had been steadily reducing (it was 57 in 2015) and of course the regular coffee mornings are available for those in the Village during the day. Our thanks to Carol Anne Sugden, Vicki Lightfoot and her team for organising it.

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From the Records

The Leicester Advertiser of 1961 did an interview with Newtown Linford Author Mrs Marjorie G Lowe. Mrs Lowe had been writing since she was a child but it was only when her family had grown up that she could get down to serious writing. She had already produced some short stories that were printed in Women's Magazines but over two years wrote her first novel which was set in Charnwood Forest and about a Victorian gypsy.



It also ran as a serial in a Women's Magazine and Mrs Lowe's family also read it - week by week. Mrs Lowe researched local history for the novel and wrote it around her housework - spreading out her papers after she had cleared the breakfast table and fitting her writing around housework.

At the time of being interviewed she was already on her second book which was based close to Thurmaston - the village where she was born but this time it was an imaginary location.

Moving forward to 1963, the paper again caught up with Marjorie - when her historical romance "Raking for the Moon" was published by Macdonald (16s). She was complimented for the great deal of research she did to get the historical background of the early 19th century right. The hosiery trade was in trouble because of the slump caused by the Napoleonic Wars and the "stockingers" who had been made redundant by the new -fangled mills.

It also mentioned that Mrs Lowe was the daughter of a former director of the Leicester Museum, Libraries and Art Gallery.

A bit of research on the internet by the editor revealed the Mrs Lowe continued to write and publish, with several books still to be found on Amazon (but it looks like there are two authors called Marjorie G Lowe - one born in California)

Jess (1963 published by Pan) advertises on the front cover - that it is "a fiery historical romance that kept 5 million women in suspense for 9 weeks" when it was serialised in Woman magazine as Romany Gold

Markfield Lane roadside verge

Three years ago, I was concerned that the wide area of verge towards the bottom end of Markfield Lane was being mown too frequently during the growing season. Native wild flowers were being cut down before they even had a chance to seed. I felt that it could instead be a conservation area - roadside verges being one of the few places left where wild flowers, and their associated wildlife, including bees, whose numbers have declined massively in recent years. could thrive. It seemed a pity that our wild flowers, especially summer ones such as White Campion and Field Scabious, were never allowed to colonise the area.





As there are no road safety issues which need the grass to be kept short along

this stretch of road, I suggested to the Parish Council that the verge need not be cut so often. The Parish Council agreed and the County Council was informed that their contractors no longer needed to mow the wide area of verge between Markfield Lane and the service road, apart from either side of the footpath and a metre-wide strip next to the road. Arrangements were then made locally for mowing the verge in late sum-

mer, and removing the cuttings (taking away the cuttings reduces the fertility of the soil and restricts the growth of the grass which tends to choke out many flowers).

Dedicating the area for wildlife has met with difficulties along the way:

sometimes the



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grass-cutting team didn't cut the margins on either side of the footpath, and the path subsequently became overgrown; and once in error they mowed the whole area at the height of the growing season.

Another issue has been that some of the residents in Markfield Lane prefer the whole area to be cut on a regular basis, to keep it neat and tidy.

In the light of these difficulties, a different arrangement is now in place, which was agreed by the Parish Council at their December 2016 meeting. This is that the verge will revert to being cut according to the normal County Council grass-cutting schedule, apart from a section of it planted by the village Brownies some time ago

with a selection of wild flowers (*Plugs for Bugs* as part of the *Stepping Stones Project*). This section will be marked out, as it was originally, and, as a much smaller area, will be easier to manage on a community basis. It will be mown in late summer and the cuttings taken away.

The Parish Council has agreed for me to continue to liaise with the County Council over grass-cutting in this part of Markfield Lane, and to arrange for the management for wildlife of this now much smaller conservation area. I have suggested that some extra wild flower seeds are set, and perhaps some more plug plants, to enhance the amenity value for local residents and passers-by.

For anyone interested, the organisation *Plantlife* (www.plantlife.org.uk) has a Road Verge campaign, supported by Alan Titchmarsh. They want to reduce the unnecessary, routine mowing of verges by Local Authorities. Britain has lost over 97% of its meadows since the 1930s, they say, and roadside verges can supply vital food and shelter for Britain's declining wildlife.

Crime Prevention

Please can we take this opportunity to remind residents of the following advice:

- Leave it on show then expect it to go Always remove valuables from your vehicle
- Remove satellite navigation systems including the cradle and cables and wipe the windscreen where the cradle sits. Many people leave their satnav under the seat or in the glove compartment, and an empty cradle is still an invite to break into a vehicle
- Don't leave tools in a van overnight
- Please make sure that doors and windows are closed and keys removed when you leave your vehicle even if it's for only a moment
- Park your vehicle in a well-lit spot that is visible to others or covered by CCTV
- If you have a garage, lock your vehicle inside it and lock the garage.
- On icy mornings never leave your vehicle unattended whilst the engine is running. Not only is this an invitation to take the vehicle but often insurance companies won't pay out if the keys are left in the vehicle.

Home security is the best way to reduce your chances of being burgled. A lot of burglars are opportunist, they see an open window or other easy point of entry and take their chance.

Things to consider

Securely lock all doors and windows before leaving

31 the house. It's easy to forget when you're in a hurry,

- but it's the simplest way for a burglar to enter your home
- Never leave keys anywhere near the front door, including your letterbox; burglars know where to look
- A home that looks empty is far more likely to be targeted by a burglar, so it's worth making sure your home looks occupied
- Use automatic timer-switches to turn on a light and perhaps a radio when it goes dark, even if you are just out for a couple of hours
- If you're away for a longer period of time, cancel any newspapers or milk deliveries
- Why not ask a neighbour or relative for help? Could they clear the post away from the door mat and open and close the curtains?
- Visible burglar alarms are a deterrent
- Visibly and permanently marking your belongings helps you and the Police identify them if they are stolen. It can also make it more difficult for the thief to dispose of the property
- Prevent easy access to the back and sides of your home by installing locked gates, 2 metre minimum fencing or walls. Trellis topping also makes climbing difficult
- Security lighting can be used to make offenders feel vulnerable and observed. Consider using dusk to dawn lighting
- · Fit strong padlocks to shed and garage doors
- Make sure that passers-by can see the front of your home. Remove and secure items that may be used to break in or climb up such as ladders and garden tools
- Beware of bogus callers; use your spy hole and a door chain until you have seen their ID and are satisfied you want to let them in
- Never discuss your security requirements or existing arrangements with a doorstep caller or salesperson
- Work with your neighbours to keep an eye on each other's security.

Firstly the Parish Council would like to wish you all a Happy and Prosperous New Year.

This year the Parish Council bought new lights for the Christmas Tree and a number of compliments were received from residents. Thanks go to Malcolm Brewin for installing the tree and lights. His hard work is much appreciated.

Cemetery: - The new fencing has been installed delineating the boundaries of the entire cemetery. The tree planting scheme for the new entrance has been submitted to Charnwood B.C. and once the ok is received the entrance will be put in place. The replacement hedging matches what is being removed but we have still had to pay the fee for approval! This work has to be carried out by the end of February when the nesting season commences. We cannot use the second gateway until we have paid for white 'slow' signs on the road and various signage in both gateways. Two residents have promised three trees between them in memory of loved ones. We would still like a few more. An application has been made to the Woodland Trust to see if we are eligible for young hedging plants in 2017. New contractors have levelled a number of graves and returfed them and it is hoped this work will continue over the coming months.

Bob Bown Playing Field: - The fencing round the five aside football pitch has been repaired. The Dog Bin has been resited and once again good comments have been received from residents. Thanks for this goes to dog walker Rhona who suggested its resiting. The tail has been broken off the green springer in the children's playground. The tail can be replaced and we presently await quotes to place before the Insurance Company.

Bradgate Park Trust: - Peter Tyldesley will have attended the January Parish Council meeting to give an update on proposals for dealing with the serious parking problems experienced in the Village. More on this in the March issue of the magazine.

Troughs in the centre of the village :- Following the retirement of Nigel and Betty Blythe who have looked after the five troughs for nearly 20 years – with many thanks for all your hard work- we have been look ing for volunteers to take on this task. The Chairman and the

Clerk are each growing plants (that do not need too much water) which will be planted by the Chairman in the Spring. We appeal once again for assistance with the watering. We think they will only need watering once a week and perhaps a resident could adopt one near to them....

Planters on the lamp posts:- The Council intends to use the same or similar company to supply and maintain these as last year. The display was slow to get going in 2016 but that may have been due to the weather conditions because later in the season they were extremely good.

Wild Flower Area on Markfield Lane: - Following last years' problems this area will be repegged and Highways have been asked to not cut it at all. Resident Claire Costello has agreed to organize a group of people to cut it appropriately. Thanks to them and hopefully it will look better and be to everyone's satisfaction.

Dark skies at night?

Did you know that, according to the report 'England's Light pollution and dark skies' Charnwood is ranked 152 in the scale dark to light of 326 districts (and that is including the bright lights of Loughborough!).. Local Councils are being encouraged to reduce the amount of light pollution which frequently prevents the appreciation of the night sky in all its astronomical glory. Energy saving measures such as switching off street lighting after midnight and the use of LED street lights (which are far more directional than the incandescent variety) also serve to reduce the light spilling into the skies. In Newtown Linford we are fortunate that the expanse of countryside and dark parkland adjacent to our village enables us to enjoy the night sky more than our more 'built up' local towns and cities

However the cheap running costs of LED lighting do seem to be encouraging the use of more expansive domestic outdoor lighting schemes, whether for security or aesthetic effect. Although, if security is your concern, then motion activated security lighting is, apparently, more effective at deterring crime than a constant illumination.


