But we look forward with assured hope to an Easter Sunday of our own.

Village Archive: Extract from White's Directory of Leicestershire 1863

I recently found this in the archive, it is a beautifully handwritten copy of the extract:-

Newtown Linford: - 5.2 miles North West of Leicester is a pleasant village picturesquely seated at the South Eastern side of Charnwood Forest on the banks of a forest rivulet and near the entrance of Bradgate Park. This is often visited by the lovers of wild romantic scenery. The Parish contains 502 inhabitants and 3911 acres of land including Holgate, High Lees and Roecliffe and other scattered farms around Bradgate Park and among the rocky hills of Charnwood Forest. The soil is generally peat but has been greatly improved by draining and is the property of the Earl of Harrington and Stamford who is the Lord of the Manor formerly held by the Hastings family by grant of Edward 1Vth. Roecliffe Hall, a handsome mansion, which was enlarged in 1841, occupies a bold acclivity on the East side of Charnwood 2 miles N by E of Newtown Linford and 6 miles NW of Leicester. It is one of the seats of Sir Frederick William Heygate Bart MP for Londonderry, but is generally occupied by his brother Hon Unwin Heygate Esquire MP for Leicester. Its pleasant grounds are thickly wooded and command highly picturesque views. The Heygate family is descended from Thomas Heygate whose grandson recorded his pedigree visitation of London in 1634. The first baronet was Lord Mayor of London in 1822 and was Chamberlain of the City in 1843. He died in 1844 and was succeeded by his son the present baronet.

The Church (All Saints) is a small ancient structure with a tower and four bells. It was repaired and had a new South porch added at a cost of £120 in 1860. The West window is a good example of the decorated style. At the entrance to the Churchyard is a stone *(now in the Church)* on which are cut the capital and small letters of the alphabet and also the numeral figures This one had long been used as a sort of textbook by a mason when it was purchased by a poor illiterate man to be fixed over his grave. The benefice is a Rectory valued at £100. The Earl of Harrington and Stamford is the patron and the Rev Robert Martin M A of Ashby Pastures is the incumbent for whom the Rev Joseph Allen of Groby officiates. An infant school (*Sunday School Rooms*) was built by the late Earl in 1822 and is supported by the present Earl and the Rector.

In 1800, Mary Heard left £600 for the poor of Newtown Linford, Anstey and Illston on the Hill and it was invested in the purchase of £1042.5s 3% Consols. The yearly dividends £31.5.10 are divided in equal portions in the three Parishes and given away in underclothing for the poor.

Nationwide Building Society.

Along with my councillor colleagues Deborah Taylor and Paul Baines, I have been corresponding with the decision makers at the Nationwide Building Society about their decision to close Anstey branch. I was grateful to the Daily Mail for raising this issue in the national press (photograph courtesy of Money Mail). I am also pleased that Deborah started a petition which has shown the strength of feeling by local residents against this closure decision.



I am still in the process of trying to reverse this decision. In my view, they have not grasped the detrimental effect this closure will have on local communities, not just Anstey but the smaller surrounding villages. I believe this will hit the elderly and disabled who rely on public transport. It is unreasonable to say they can access other branches, especially the poor links with the current bus timetables which exist today. In my opinion, it is not good enough for them to suggest 'the impact assessment provides a map to the next nearest branch to Anstey, as well as links to the County Council, so members can plan their own trip. Although we are unable to provide transport services for disabled members to access other local branches, if these members do need to come into branch the investment we are spending on the surrounding branches will make them



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much easier to use'. I believe this shows how out of touch Nationwide are with this closure.

It was interesting when this matter was printed in the Daily Mail there was also an article from an ex-bank manager about bank closures, who stated 'despite their glossy advertising, banks no longer care'. This seems to be the case with Nationwide, who in their December newsletter to members stated 'Our promise to you. We passionately believe in communities, that's why we've made a promise to keep a branch in every town and city we currently serve until at least 2023. We hope this brings some reassurance to our members when the last thing any of us need is more uncertainty'. In my opinion, Nationwide are doing just that with the Anstey branch closure.

Council Tax.

Charnwood Borough Council are proposing to raise its share of Council Tax by less than 9p a week for a Band D property. The proposed increase would see the annual charge for an average Band D property rise by $\pounds4.45p$ (3.60%) to $\pounds131.08p$ from 1st April.

The Council's Cabinet will consider the proposed budget plans with its recommendations due to go before Full Council on Monday 22nd February. The proposed final budget for 2021/22 is around £19 million. The Covid-19 pandemic has added significant costs and a reduced income from various areas, including car parks, leisure centres and Loughborough Town Hall.

Charnwood Borough Council has the 23rd lowest Council Tax charge out of 188 District Councils in the country.

Government Grants to Businesses.

Around £43 million in government grants has been paid to businesses in Charnwood to support them during the pandemic. Charnwood Borough Council has been responsible for distributing the grants since the start of the national crisis last year. Whilst the grants have proved a lifeline to many businesses, the work is far from done and the Council says it will continue to get funding to eligible businesses as swiftly and securely as possible. It recently paid the first wave of new lockdown grants to 900 local companies totalling over £6 million. May I encourage all businesses to check for which funding they may be eligible. Lateral Flow Testing.

Rapid community testing for Covid-19 is now available in Loughborough,

for key workers and those who cannot work from home. A testing site has been set up at Gorse Covert in Maxwell Drive, Loughborough. One in three people who have coronavirus show no symptoms. Rapid lateral flow testing, led by Leicestershire County Council public health team, can quickly identify individuals and stop the spread of infection. Rapid testing is only for those who are eligible, who don't have symptoms and are already isolating. If you do have symptoms, or have been told to selfisolate, then you should not attend. It is open to key workers and anyone else in the County who currently cannot work from home.

lagers we are responsible citizens following government guidelines and if we have not had our vaccination yet are ready and hopeful for the day to come.


As of the 17th February it was reported by Press release from the University Hospitals of Leicester that they can confirm that 1,241 patients being cared for at our hospitals, and who had tested positive for COVID-19, have died. 89 of those deaths have been announced since last Wednesday (10 February). The ages of the patients ranged between those in their 30s to those in their 90s., and who had tested positive for Covid-19, have died.



Wildflower Meadows

A century ago, animal husbandry was simple. Farmers had fields which grew grass during the summer; then, at the end of the season, the grass was cut, dried and stored as hay to feed sheep and cattle over the winter. Although the main crop was grass, many wildflowers such as buttercups and yellow rattle also grew. The cropping regime permitted the wildflowers to flower and set seed before harvesting.

The development of chemicals has changed all this; fields are now planted with rye grass and fertilised, allowing several crops of grass to be cut during the summer. The grass is also fermented and made into silage, rather than stored as hay.

While this change has increased agricultural efficiency, it has had a significant side-effect: the rye grass out-competes the wildflowers which also cannot survive regular cutting, and as a result our fields now look green rather than being multi-coloured. And because there are few wildflowers, there are few insects which rely on their nectar for food, neither habitat nor food for ground-nesting birds such as skylarks and a general reduction in biodiversity. As a result the number of wildflower meadows has drastically reduced; Plantlife estimates that 97% of meadows have been lost in the last century.

We are lucky in this area: the Ulverscroft valley is an area where wildflower meadows still exist. Leicestershire and Rutland Wildlife Trust owns Lea Meadows and Herbert's Meadow, both with a good variety of wildflowers including orchids, while other sympathetic landowners have eschewed the high intensity cultivation route. The photograph shows buttercups, spotted orchids and stitchwort at Lea Meadows. The field beside the footpath up towards Tyburn from the Village (starting opposite the village pump), and owned by Bradgate Park Trust, is another good example.

With the recent removal of large amounts of bracken, Bradgate Park would also be a good site for wildflowers were it not for the grazing pressure from the deer. One cannot have everything.

We cannot turn back the clock. Like the rest of us, farmers need to make a living. But we can all do our bit, and the Newtown Linford Biodiversity Group, in collaboration with the Parish Council, are exploring the creation of wildflower meadows within the Parish.

The first area has been in existence for several years, on the verge in Markfield Lane. This area is managed in the old-fashioned way: with a single cut of grass towards the end of the summer. While as a result the area looks "untidy" it is also colourful and beneficial, in a small way, to our wildlife.

Part of the churchyard is being turned into a wildflower meadow, and we are exploring making the triangular area of land at the Anstey end of the village, next to the corner of Bradgate Park, another wildflower meadow, although this

will involve discussions with Bradgate Park, the landowner. And finally, we can all make a difference. We made our lawn more sympathetic to wildflowers by the simple expedient of avoiding chemicals.



both weed killers and fertilisers, and initially regular mowing, with the clippings removed to take away the fertility. Now the mowing is more sympathetic and occasional, to allow the wildflowers to grow and flower without letting the lawn get out of hand.

Scam alert - Fake Covid19 Vaccine Invitation Email

There have been numerous vaccine scams recently. The latest email vaccine scam is where the link will connect you to a fake NHS webpage. Remember, the NHS will contact you when it is your time for a vaccine. The vaccine is free of charge on the NHS and the NHS will never ask for:

Your bank account or card details

Your pin or banking password

Copies of personal documents to provide your identity such as your passport, driving licence, bills or pay slips

If you think you have been a victim of fraud or identity theft, report it to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040 #ThinkQuickNeverClick #ScamAware

Courier Fraud

Leicestershire Police have received reports of a courier scam happening around the North West Leicestershire area.

Button Cell Batteries

A BBC article reports on the dangers of button cell batteries after an 11month-old girl had one lodged in her throat for four months.

Button cell batteries are used in everyday electrical items from watches to remote controls, key fobs, toys and novelty gifts. In the most extreme cases ingesting these batteries can cause death.

Here are some key messages:

- Store spare batteries securely
- Know which devices use button batteries and ensure they're properly secured
- Keep unsecured batteries or devices away from children
- Ensure children are aware of the dangers
- Safely dispose of dead button batteries immediately
- If you suspect your child has swallowed a battery, take them straight to A&E #StaySafe
- There are battery disposal boxes at all supermarkets please dispose safely

e-Cigarettes

During recent examinations at East Midlands Airport, Leicestershire Trading Standards officers detained several consignments that contain ecigarettes, which appears to be a new product that hasn't been authorised for sale in the UK. These products have insufficient labelling and they contain an unknown amount of nicotine. These could be extremely harmful. Always buy from a reputable business.

Food, Feed and Animal Health and Welfare, Avian Influenza

All poultry and captive birds must now be housed to help prevent the spread of Avian Influenza. 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News from Newtown Linford Parish Council

We might still be under restrictions of a national lockdown but for the Parish Council, business continues as normal, albeit through virtual meetings via Zoom.

As it stands, the legislation which allows us to hold virtual meetings during the pandemic, will end on 7th May 2021. It is assumed this will be extended and perhaps to allow hybrid meetings for those who might still be shielding. Regardless, Newtown Linford Parish Council, continues to hold eleven Parish Council meetings per year, including the Annual Parish Council Meeting in May, as well as hosting the Annual Parish Meeting

Any member of the public can attend a meeting. These are advertised on the homepage of our website, along with the agendas and minutes. Zoom meeting IDs and passwords are included on all agendas, so please feel free to join us if you wish. However, if you are expecting some drama similar to the 'viral' Handforth saga, you might be disappointed! Newtown Linford Parish Council pride ourselves on how our meetings and business are conducted (and we have all read and understood our Standing Orders!).

Following on from last month's article, a small group of residents have come together to form a Biodiversity Group, focussing on nature and wildlife in the Parish, and led by Community Biodiversity Champion, Claire Costello. So far, three meetings have been held on Zoom to share thoughts, experience and ideas.

Group members are in the process of collecting data on wildlife recorded in the Parish, to help plan where bat, bird and owl boxes and hedgehog hotels might be best placed. If you recall, the Parish Council voted in favour of applying for a SHIRE Environment Grant for the installation of the boxes and hotels, however, as the data collection is more involved than first anticipated, it has been decided to postpone applying until later in the year, when all information has been received. The scheme reopens to new applications again from 1st April 2021 and as soon as we have a clear plan, we will submit our bid.

If you are interested in nature and wildlife and would like to join the group, please do get in touch with Claire or myself. We would also like to hear from families and it is hoped a survey will be delivered to

households in the near future, so you can record your own sightings in gardens and around the Parish.

Staying on the biodiversity theme, you may have noticed the blue hearts displayed at the wildflower area on Markfield Lane. The BLUE Campaign started in 2014 in response to a report on the State of Nature published that year, which highlighted the dramatic decline in biodiversity and biomass across the UK.

The campaign promotes the rewilding of gardens, parks, roadside verges and school grounds. It suggests that part of this ground is set aside and left to grow through the Summer.

A blue heart symbol, made out of recycled materials, is staked in the ground over the area being rewilded. This communicates to neighbours and friends that rewilding is in process and that it is not just the owner or council being lazy!

Interestingly, I was recently informed that Claire's own blue hearts on Markfield Lane, instigated LCC signing up to the BLUE Campaign after a colleague in the Environmental and Preventative Maintenance team at LCC, spotted the hearts whilst out jogging and investigated them. This in turn, will now see wildflower areas and 100 blue hearts extend across 40 parishes in Leicestershire during 2021! Well done, Claire. This is super news!

The area identified for the Wildflower Verge Scheme on Bradgate Road is still under consideration. There was some uncertainty over land ownership, however, we now know the land is part of the Bradgate Park Estate and we are in contact with them to see if they are in support of the project. If all goes to plan, further blue hearts will appear in this location.

Thank you to everyone who alerted me to the recent Big Elm Giveaway offered by East Goscote Nurseries. I'm pleased to report we have been gifted an Elm tree and I will be speaking to Tree Warden, Brian Anderson, to identify a suitable location for its planting.

LCC Highways continue to work through over 200 comments submitted in response to the Traffic Management Consultation.

It is now expected final restrictions will be implemented sometime during April or May when the weather has improved and conditions are better for lining work.

Although the Village currently remains quieter, we have requested a Temporary Traffic Regulation Order be considered for hotspot areas, in time for Easter, particularly if lockdown restrictions are eased before then. We will keep you updated as things progress. A long awaited dog waste bin has been installed on Main Street to try and tackle issues with dog fouling and resident's personal wheelie bins being used for dog waste. I am now organising signage to further highlight the new addition which has been funded by the Parish Council.

Resident, Jessica Rigg, recently presented Newtown Linford Primary School with a cheque to the value of £325. This generous donation had been in a dormant bank account belonging to the disbanded Newtown Linford Youth Club. It was decided as most of the children who attended the youth club when it was operational, also attended the primary school, current pupils should benefit from the remaining proceeds. Thank you, Jessica and to everyone involved.

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Bob Bown Memorial Field

A tree survey will be carried out sometime in March across all Parish Council maintained sites, including the Bob Bown Memorial Field. The purpose of the tree survey is to identify any issues with the trees at the three sites and associated works required.

Cemetery and Churchyard

At the end of March, Registrar of Burials, Pam McMorran, will be retiring from the role. We'd like to thank Pam for all her hard work at the Cemetery and for transferring Cemetery records to electronic format, which has been quite a time consuming task.

My hours will be increasing from 1st April as I take on the role of Registrar.

As a reminder, due to rising maintenance costs of the Cemetery, it has been necessary to review our fees for the 2021/2022 and 2022/2023 financial years. The increase in charges will be effective from 1st April 2021 and further fee reviews will be carried out bi-annually. The fees remain unchanged between now and April.
