Being 'at home'

"How are you settling in?"

The five words I've heard, I think, more than any other since moving to this area. Do I feel at home yet? That's one question; the other I get is "Where is home for you?" Short answer: here; long answer: nowhere really - I was born in London, parents are now in France and I've spent all of my adult life bouncing around from North to South Midlands, and now come East!

As a Vicar, and growing up as a Vicar's son, I'm used to moving house fairly regularly - some 14 or 15 times in all so far. For some people this is nothing - I spoke to the wife of an RAF officer recently who had lived in 4 houses in less than 3 years - for others, who have lived in the same neighbourhood if not the same house, all their lives, the thought of such change all the time can be faintly frightening.

Having a home is a human necessity - it's practically enshrined as a right in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. The need to have somewhere to belong, in which to rest and feel secure, and out of which we can begin to make friends is fundamental to our wellbeing. Lack of a place to call home leaves us feeling out of place, isolated, rootless and insecure. It's one of the reasons being a refugee is such a souldestroying experience: my home is gone, where can I settle now?

So why does Peter say in his first letter in the Bible: "live your lives as strangers here"? Does he mean people who follow Jesus to feel permanently temporary (if that makes sense) and friendless? Is settling in a bad thing?

I guess the point he's trying to make is that a home – the house, the community - can become the main source of our sense of security, when we should be relying primarily on God. It's not that settling down or building a home, is wrong, but that it comes second to drawing confidence 3 from God and his dependable offer of a place to live with him.

Humans are created, I believe, to find their most important place of security and confidence in God, not in their house, no matter how wonderful, nor even in their community. Only God is utterly reliable, unchangeable and a permanent presence on which to rest.

News from the Park

ENOUGH IS ENOUGH

Many of you will have seen the reports in the media of the Trust's decision to impose new restrictions on dogs in the Park following a number of widely-reported incidents. We have tried education and appealing to reason but sadly

this has not worked. Following the loss of two thirds of two years' cohorts of Red Deer calves and incidents of deer chasing, attacks on other wildlife and complaints of out of control dogs bothering people all occurring on a weekly basis, the Trust has had to take action.

We have listened to public opinion and I hope local residents will agree that our proposed measures succeed in balancing the interests of the wildlife, responsible dog owners and or non-dog-owning visitors and will support us in our efforts to safeguard the deer. That we have had to do this is a sad reflection on the way that society has changed since the Trust was established in 1928 and the lack of respect of other people and animals and the more selfish attitudes that are sadly more commonplace among the general public.

I have reproduced in full the text of our press statement and I hope to have happier news to share next month.

BRADGATE PARK TAKING ACTION TO PROTECT WILDLIFE

Bradgate Park, Leicestershire's last medieval deer park is addressing recent concerns and publicity following incidents with dogs worrying

the deer herds and other wildlife the site supports, alongside the increasing issues of dog fouling and littering of "poo bags".







A Term

Despite extensive press and social media coverage in recent months about impacts and concerns incidents have continued to escalate.

Incidents have included parents filming children chasing the deer, dogs chasing the deer, fights between dogs, dogs bothering people, mountain bikers riding off permitted paths, as well as dogs killing wild birds. In addition dog poo bags have been left hanging in trees and vandalism recently occurred over night in areas where the Trust's rangers have been improving habitats and facilities.

Peter Tyldesley, Director of the Bradgate Park Trust said, "The Trust will be introducing a seasonal dogs on lead restriction zone in the busiest areas of the Park. Dogs will still be allowed off lead (if under effective control) in around three quarters of the site."

The restriction will come into force from 1st June.

"The Trust is now working with Charnwood Borough Council and other agencies with regard to updating our existing bylaws into a Public Spaces Protection Order."

"Currently the bylaws cover all aspects of behaviour that is causing us and our visitors concern, with the potential of a £200 fine on conviction. Despite requests to visitors to work with us and keep pets under control, bike riders to adhere to designated paths and all visitors and pets to not disturb wildlife, increasing issues are meaning we are now having to look at new restrictions and means of enforcement. This is alongside the addition of new signage, at a significant cost to the Trust."

A consultation exercise will be launched in coming weeks with regard to introducing a Public Spaces Protection Order and the Trust will continue to work with the appropriate authorities to take this forward. This would see regulations updated with the potential for on the spot fines being enforced.

Bradgate's parkland is exceptional with internationally important, geology, archaeological heritage, listed buildings, monuments and ruins, protected wildlife-rich habitats and an outstanding natural landscape. Much of the park is designated as a Site of Special Scientific Interest, with a management plan approved by Natural England that is seeing habitat restoration and areas maintained to protect and conserve the wildlife and heritage features. Bradgate Park is also home to a mixed herd of red and fallow deer. These can be enjoyed by visitors in their natural habitat all year round. The site is maintained for public access and is free to visit (although car parking charges apply). Charles Bennion, Chairman of the Trustees and great-grandson of the Park's original benefactor said, "Bradgate Park is home to a 400-strong wild deer herd who roam the 800 acres of parkland year-round. They are descendants of those known by the Earls of Stamford and visiting Kings and Queens. Currently the Charity established by my great-grandfather has used a 'light touch' policy with regard to enforcing the bylaws associated with the site, but the Trust has a duty to protect the deer and the landscape and to ensure the site is maintained for the people of Leicestershire and further afield to visit. We are proud of the work the Trust does in ever-challenging circumstances, but recent changes in visitor behaviour have caused us concern and required a review to address more contemporary issues."

Matt Smith, Head Ranger said, "The Bradgate Park Trust believes that everyone should be able to enjoy this special place. Dog walkers are frequent visitors to the site and we welcome them. We do ask that dogs are kept under effective control so as not to interfere with other users or the deer. 'Effective control' means the dog is kept in sight at all times, the owner is aware of what it's doing, and is confident it will return promptly on command even if it surprises a deer which then runs away. If the owner is not sure that it will do this, the dog should be kept on a lead. If an area is designated for dogs on a lead only at busy times of the year, or crucial periods for deer welfare, we will be enforcing this under the current byelaws and subsequent processes the Trust may adopt."



After he died we had the "interregnum" and two priests in charge, Revd Jo Hart followed by Rt Revd Godfrey Ashby. We then moved into a Team Ministry (Bradgate Team) Ratby cum Groby with Newtown Linford. In the records we have the Commissioning



and Licensing of the Team Rector 1998 Revd Tony Leighton based at Groby, and the Hon Peter Sheridan Team Vicar.

Rector Tony Leighton moved away and in 2001 Revd Richard Worsfold became Team Rector based at Ratby, followed by Dr Peter Hooper in 2010.

2016 finds us with another change. We are no longer joined with Ratby and Groby. We have moved to be with Glenfield, due to the Deanery having been divided into Group Ministries and the Benefice of Glenfield and Newtown Linford created which is also paired with the Benefice of Anstey and Thurcaston with Cropston which is now called the Bradgate Group.


friend, either running through, or along the boundary.

Newtown Linford Neighbourhood Watch -A member of the Parish Council



The Police have apologized for the April Council meeting but have given me the following Report:- Field Gate lock damaged on Groby Lane; Unoccupied premises, copper pipes and sink removed on Groby Lane; Attempt to force garage door, no entry gained on Ulverscroft Lane and Window broken on a car whilst at a beauty spot car park on Bradgate Road.

I recently met our new P.C.S.O. Fiona Lacey. My how they say the Police look younger as you get older. She was not aware that she had access to the Sunday School for meetings and surgeries and had been trying to decide what to do. She is going to look for the key back at the Police Station – I hope they have not lost it. Anyway watch this space for dates of her beat surgeries and please go along and say hello. We must give her some encouragement.

I have appointed Councillor Holly Cross as NHW Co-ordinator for Roecliffe since she has been working very hard on behalf of her fellow residents and their issues are slightly different to the village. Her report follows mine.

Don't forget to vote for your new County Police and Crime Commissioner on 5^{th} May.

Finally a reminder that the Speedwatch dates for both the Village and Roecliffe are the 30th May and the 29th August each for two weeks. Volunteers still required.

Roecliffe report from Councillor Holly Cross.

The residents of the Roecliffe Road side of the Parish continue to voice concern about motorists failing to adhere to speed restrictions along the road. Speedwatch enables the community to be proactive in measuring the speed of motorists, obtaining evidence, and raising the awareness of conscientious motorists regarding speed limits. During the 2015 Speedwatch approximately 16 hours of volunteer time resulted in numerous vehicles being reported to the Speedwatch Team for driving in excess of the 46mph that Speedwatch volunteers are asked to record. The fastest recorded speed was 67 mph. An example of the results of one hour of Speedwatch between 8.20am to 9.20am on a weekday was 24 cars being driven in excess of 46mph (25% of whom were driving at speeds between 50 and 60mph) and 13% driving at more than 60mph.

questionnaires following the 2015 Speedwatch questionnaires were sent to the houses on Roecliffe Road and 70% responded.

The responses indicated that the residents of Roecliffe Road use the footpaths but in some circumstances (such as rush hours, at the bend of the bottom of the hill, when walking with children or in groups, or when the hedgerows are overgrown) do not feel safe when doing so. However the main reason cited for not feeling safe was the speed of the motorists. Many residents would support further decreases to the speed limits along the entire stretch of the road from Lingdale Golf Course to the Parish

Boundary along the Cropston Reservoir.

In terms of enforcement. or management of speed, most respondents are in favour of the use of Speed indicator signs, half would be in favour of speed cameras, more than two thirds would be in favour of occasional visit of Police speed cameras and a minority would be in favour of the use of sleeping policemen.

The Parish Council has been asked to consider once again purchasing a Speed Indicator Sign. In neighbouring Parishes these are being used to positive effect, enhancing the lives of parishioners and visitors using the paths or roads to walk, run, cycle or ride horses.

The Parish Council has repeatedly raised this issue with the Police during Parish Council meetings and has sent a written request for support be given by occasional Police presence to enforce the speed limit. We have also requested that the relevant County Council Senior Engineer meets with us to walk the stretch of road to re-evaluate the road safety issues raised.

GUTTED.

This post is about sleeping in hospital. I was prompted to write this after reading the late Professor David Mackay's blog. David was Physicist and Chief Scientific advisor.

For me, sleep is so crucial for health, but in our surgical ward of about 20 women, everyone has to be checked in the night for blood pressure, oxygen saturation and pulse, so I never had a nights sleep in the last four and a half weeks in hospital. It is not just the personal checks that wake one up. The ward is always full of lights going on and off, doors opening, beds that make noises and machines each with their own bleeps, pings, and even the photo-copier. One night, my neighbour's mouth was full of "thrush", but at 3am she managed to describe the bleep situation as "Chinese torture".

So, this is about coping with the sleep deficit. Basically, I didn't cope, and I often spent minutes, just crying with the cumulative sadness of being stuck in a sweaty bed and unable to sleep. Have you ever had to sleep with one sheet on a plastic mattress and a plastic covered pillow? Unless incontinent, a protective pad under the sheet was "not allowed". I was not "allowed".

Even with eye shields and ear plugs the bleeps and lights could not be extinguished. I declined to stay for a further four weeks and "understandably" have temporarily returned home. I am enjoying the luxury of, not having to share a bedroom and toilet facilities with so many other rather ill patients.

Thank-you to my family, friends and neighbours who have given me much support .

Newtown Linford Parish Council Serving the people of Newtown Linford

At the March meeting it was decided to write about the increase in the Precept this year. The Councillors are aware that it was perhaps not best practice to retain the Precept at the same rate for so many years. This created a precedent without taking into consideration the way the economic climate was going. For this error of judgement they apologize.

In the late 1950s the burial ground at the Church was closed. The Parish Council then became liable for the maintenance and upkeep. i.e. no longer the Church. In 1955 the land for the cemetery on Groby had been purchased by the Parish Council in readiness for a new Parish Cemetery. In 1961 burials began on part of the land. Most of the spaces you can see have been sold. The remaining piece of land left as field will now be developed. On the 28th January 2015 Planning Permission was granted to carry out the work on the extension. This work has to be commenced within three years or will have to be reapplied for. In order to obtain Planning Permission we had to comply with the Leicestershire County Council's requirements. This calls for In and Out gates and a small number of parking spaces within the grounds. This will enable the hearse and following cars to be all off the road. This additional work had not been expected and it had always been thought that Grants would be available for most of the work. Sadly this is no longer the case, although Councillor Dr. Sue Pritchard is going to explore what possibilities are still available We are currently going out to tender and then Councillor Pritchard will deal

So to recap in addition to the preparation of the new cemetery the expenses for maintenance for the Bob Bown Memorial closed Field. the Church cemetery and the Groby Lane Cemetery have all risen tremendously. The expenses for checking and repair-



ing the climbing and play area on the Bob Bown remain quite high. Some years back the Parish Council provided additional street lighting for which the charges have steadily increased each year to now being well over £4,000. The old gravestones in the Churchyard often require maintenance and at the very least annual inspection by the Stonemason in order to comply with the Churches Insurance Policy.

Finally it is hoped to proceed with the purchase of up to three speed signs but definitely one for Roecliffe Road. This proposal was put hold in 2010 but hopefully we will now have enough funds to on implement.
