I used to share an office with a colleague. We worked together well but were very different in style, these differences being blatantly obvious to anyone who walked through the door. One desk would be completely clear other than the monitor, mouse and keyboard. The other would have drifts of paper, mugs, post-it notes, coins, pens and books liberally distributed across it. I will leave it to you to work out which was mine...

It's a personality thing mainly, I think, though sometimes training comes into it: neatness. Some of us can't cope with anything out of place and like everything organised 'just so' – I have one friend who puts labels on every plug so that he can immediately tell which belongs to which device. Some of you are thinking 'How OTT!', others, 'Why have I never thought of that? Where's the labelmaker?'. And you actually already own a labelmaker.

Most of us would like life to be neater and tidier in some respects: we'd like fewer loose ends, fewer nasty unpredictable surprises, less heartache. But life isn't like that. However neat and tied down we'd like it to be, all of us live with situations which are messy and mixed up. Whether they're relationships or regrets, things aren't always neat.

That's been true for most people for most of human history and it's one of the reasons why the Bible, despite telling us about events thousands of years ago, is still fascinating: it shows us that even people who experience amazing things and blessings, still have messy lives. David, king and conqueror, who had messed-up relationships with his sons; Peter, the great apostle, who wimped out at key moments.

People who belong to Church aren't people who have sorted their lives out and got everything neat and tidy, they're people who rely on Jesus to help sort out their mess and keep going when things are tough. Even when they're as messy as me!

From The Park

As I look out of my office window this morning, I can see two of our 'Monday Clean-up Squad' of volunteer litter pickers hard at work to clear away the aftermath of the weekend. People often compliment us on how tidy and free of litter the Park is and I always tell them that, sadly, this is because we are very good at picking it up



and not that nobody ever drops it. If golf is "a good walk spoiled" then litter picking is "a good walk enhanced" by the knowledge that you are putting something back into this place that we all love. It is also amazing how much wildlife you can spot when your focus is on the ground looking for discarded rubbish.

The summer of 2018 will be remembered for the heatwave and the fact that, for the very first time, we instituted a 'Fire Watch' system with volunteers watching out with binoculars for the slightest sign of smoke. If the latest predictions about the effects of climate change are accurate, this may become a regular feature of future summers at Bradgate and we are extremely grateful to all the volunteers who answered the call for help to keep the Park's wildlife safe when destructive fires were breaking out in numerous other areas both locally and further afield.

I am writing this the day after what I have taken to referring to as "Bradstock" – our weekend of music featuring the Bradgate Proms with the Bardi Wind Orchestra on Saturday evening and the Acoustic & Folk Music Picnic on Sunday afternoon, which this year featured some nationally well-known names in addition to the best talent from the vibrant local folk scene. The weekend was better than ever, in terms of performance, logistics and ticket sales and staff and volunteers worked incredibly hard to support the artists and technical crew in providing a truly memorable experience for the audience on both days. There are some tired bodies this morning among those who worked both days and do not have daysoff until later in the week.

Keen-eyed visitors may have noticed the new fence that has been gradually working its way across the far end of the Deer Meadow, dividing the Park from Dimmingsdale, and those who use the Cropston footpath cannot possibly have missed it. This is the only part of the deer park that is bounded by a fence rather than a stone wall and the Rangers have been working hard to replace the original fence that we believe was erected in the late 19th century and which, despite regular patching, had come to the end of its life. We are really pleased to have been able to construct a replica of the original fence from oak from Swithland Wood, milled on site and fabricated by our own staff to include mortice and tenon joints to fix



Newtown Linford Cricket Club will welcome a Lashings World XI to Main Street next year to help mark their spectacular Centenary celebrations.

The show-stopper is scheduled for 30th June 2019, in conjunction with the Club's annual President's Day, and is expected to generate substantial interest from the Leicestershire community and beyond.



Household names such as Sachin Tendulkar, Brian Lara, Jimmy Adams, Muttiah Muralitharan, Rashid Latif, Wasim Akram, Allan Donald and Sir Viv Richards have all worn the Lashings kit. Currently the Lashings squad includes Monty Panesar, Devon Malcolm, Wasim Jaffer, Charl Willoughby, John Emburey, Nick Compton, Usman Afzaal, Fidel Edwards and Tino Best.

Legendary radio broadcaster Henry 'Blowers' Blofeld OBE will also be present and will commentate on the T20 match's first innings. Last year. Blofeld announced his retirement as a BBC Test Match Special commentator with his last test commentary being when England played West In-



dies at Lord's on 9th September 2017.

The day will also comprise some junior coaching, a corporate lunch for guests as well as an auction, Q & A and raffle. Club Chairman Jon Dale believes the spectacle will be a fitting way to celebrate 100 years of action at one of the most picturesque grounds in the country. He said: "I have been associated with our great Club for over 30 years and it is testament to the hard work of Committees past and present that we continue to flourish as a local Cricket Club during difficult economic times. "Club members, Life Members, Vice Presidents, Patrons and Sponsors have been, and continue to be, extremely supportive and proud of their association with NLCC and I'd like to think that welcoming a side the calibre of the Lashings is a way of saying thank you. Almost 1,000 people packed into the ground that day and the Club is hoping for similar numbers next June.

Dave Fitzgerald, Lashings Company Director, added: "We are delighted to be bringing Lashings World XI, packed with top international cricketers, to Newtown Linford. My fellow director, Scott Charlton and I visited the club recently and met some wonderful people in a very picturesque setting. "We have huge confidence that together we will host an excellent event. We are excited about being part of the Centenary celebrations and I, for one, am looking forward to a Newtown Linford cricket tea!"



Butterflies in Swithland Wood





Last year, for the first time, I saw a few Silver-Washed Fritillaries in various parts of the wood. They are rarely recorded in Leicestershire but were having a very good year further south. This year I have seen them most days when walking in Swithland wood.

One patch of bramble near the stream hosted three females and two days later the same patch had two males. it is possible that a colony is being established - probably due to climate change which is causing many butterflies to spread to the north and the excellent coppicing of the woods which encourage their breeding-plant - dog violets and other related viola.

It has also been a good year for the beautiful little Purple Hairstreak which is easily seen on low-lying oaks near the main quarry and which seem to be laying their eggs in

many parts of the wood






Village Ramblers Walk ..

The Friends of Charnwood Forest NEW ARCHAEOLOGICAL DISCOVERIES IN BRADGATE PARK TALK by RICHARD THOMAS

Monday 17TH September 2018 Woodhouse Eaves Village Hall at 7.30pm

Frequent visitors to Bradgate Park may well have observed, over the past four years, field schools excavating various sites. These range from Stone Age remains around Little Matlock, to the Deer Keeper's House, various sites within and around Bradgate House and in this last year the possible stable block. These excavations have been organised by the School of Archaeology and Ancient History at the University of Leicester. In this talk, Richard Thomas, one of the project co-directors, will summarise what has been learnt so far, and present the results of this year's excavations which focussed on finding the stable block to the south of Bradgate House, just over the bridge.

Richard Thomas is a reader in Archaeology at Leicester University where he has been based for 15 years. He is co-director of the Bradgate Park Fieldschool so who better to explain what we can find of interest and to answer all your questions. **Visitors welcome £3 on the door.**

Parking In Newtown Linford By Visitors To Bradgate Park.

Following on from the section "From The Park" about on street parking in the village by visitors to Bradgate Park in the July/August edition of the magazine.

I'm sure the short stay parking tariff debate will continue and yes, some people will park inconsiderately "because they can".

However one of the underlying reasons why they do in the first place is the fact that they struggle to find somewhere to park in the winter and spring months because the Trust doesn't always open the overflow car parks, as they are not truly "all weather".

I've witnessed the car park gates being closed at Newtown on several occasions in January, February, March and April as early as 11.15am on a fine Sunday whatever the temperature, as the overflows aren't open.

Surely the Council and the Trust need to develop special solutions to the parking problems considering that probably no other visitor attraction in Leicestershire and beyond has to close their car park gates due to full capacity late morning on an average Sunday - let alone Christmas/ New Year, Easter and Bank holiday weekends? I guess the Park is unique in its combination of a relatively small natural landscape and its close proximity to a small village and major city.

It's understandable that on certain busy days and holidays even with the overflows open the car park won't be able to accommodate all visitors but it would certainly alleviate some of the inconsiderate parking and driving up and down residential roads if the overflows were available to use all year round when required.

Considering the Trust has said in the past that too many visitors to the park when it is too wet can damage the ground, it's probably not suitable to increase capacity beyond the overflows when it is wet.

The lack of parking in the winter and spring when the overflows aren't open is evident by the three days so far this year when the parking in the village was out of control, admittedly not always helped by the lack of adequate restrictions and enforcement by the Council.

The closing of the car park gates is also evident when we witness an annoyingly regular flow of cars driving up and down Bracken Hill, a small cul de sac, looking for somewhere to park and turn around.

I agree that smarter restrictions and enforcement is required and I believe that message is getting through to the Council.

The new brown tourist signs highlighting Hunts Hill car park are a step in the right direction, however why did the trust remove the mention of the other car park on its A Board which says "car park full" that it puts out when it closes the gate? Not everyone will look up and back to see the brown signs.

Surely for the consideration of the residents of the village and for its own visitors the Trust should ensure someone is constantly in front of the gate advising and perhaps directing visitors if they have to close due to full capacity, not just closing the gate and walking away as does happen.

It's easy to just say visitors can go somewhere else, but in reality once visitors have arrived they probably won't go elsewhere.

More work needs to be done by the Trust and Council to find solutions and to manage the situation, especially with all the extra housing being built nearby in the county and city.
