From The Park

After a rather unusual 2020 to say the least, 2021 has seen a return to a more normal year on the park. Visitor numbers have been consistently steady, even without the usual busy programme of events and activities that have been seen in previous years.



Following a comprehensive review, the Interim Director, Steve Palethorpe, left in June this year and thanks go to him for steering the Trust towards a very positive future. The office team now includes vital new posts including a Grants and Fundraising Manager, Learning and Engagement Manager and Volunteer Administrator. These are all helping us to put the Trust on a sustainable footing and ensure it meets the needs of all its visitors as well as the wildlife that call it home. The Ranger and Warden teams continue to be the backbone of keeping the estate well managed and safe.

Walks and talks, led by Rangers, Wardens and volunteers have been popular as ever this year and give people a real insight into the park's amazing history and ecology. The ruins and Old John have re-opened for tours and visits and school groups have returned with visits led by our amazing education volunteers. It's also been great to see the Visitor Centre back open at weekends and school holidays and the tea room back open for indoor seating.

As always, huge thanks go to our volunteers. I am astounded by the sheer number of individuals that give their time to the park and woods and their amazing enthusiasm – from July to September alone, over 5,000 hours of volunteer time was gifted to the site. If you're interested in helping out, be it dry-stone walling, litter picking or something in between, volunteer recruitment will begin again in Spring 2022!

Looking ahead to 2022, we hope to re-establish our full educational visits, resume a modest events programme and will also be submitting funding bids for a number of works to help maintain and improve the estate – ranging from path repairs through to new woodland planting for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. We're grateful for funding opportunities from the Charnwood Landscape Partnership Lottery bid and National Forest that we hope will allow these projects to go ahead. Early 2022 will also see a full refurbishment of the Deer Barns tea room – keep an eye on our social media channels for details.

Finally, after 13 years of managing a whole City's worth of parks in Nottingham, I am delighted to be focussing on Bradgate Park and Swithland Woods and am constantly learning what a special place it is! Thank you to the groups and organisations I have already met and who have been

so welcoming. If anyone reading this wants to know more about anything above or get involved with the Park, please do get in touch with us at estate-office@bradgatepark.org Enjoy your winter on the Park – we hope to have the Deer Barns café open every day except Christmas Day this year.

From the Records

Editors note—this month we are starting something slightly different as David Snartt recently found a stapled A4 Document that had been produced by **A.J. Harrison FRICS in October 1994**. At the time he was 92 years old and typed up notes **Life in Rural England before and during the War (1914–1918)**. We cannot reproduce everything in one Magazine so will start below and continue in our February magazine. (Editors note).

I was born in 1902 in Newtown Linford, a small village, part of the Bradgate Estate, adjoining Bradgate Park in Charnwood Forest about 7 miles from Leicester. Lady Jane Grey (the nine days Queen) lived at the house in the Park (now a ruin) in about 1500's—the oak trees in the Park were beheaded when she was beheaded.

The village was a closely knit community (almost like a tribe). Everyone helped everyone, with harvest, getting in the crops, potatoes, hay, bracken from the Park for Winter bedding, acorns for pig food. There were about 30 cottages, several farms in the village and several, outlying farms; "All Saints' Church, adjoining the Park gates; 'Bradgate Arms' public house rented by Everards' Brewery; the Vicarage; Estate House and office. One cottage opposite the Church had one room used as a shop for sweets, cigarettes, etc and a recently built school of two rooms, which replaced the old school adjoining the park gates, which became the Sunday School. The school teacher in my early days (1907-1909) was Miss Williams, a very stern lady, who had a local girl as assistant.

There was no water carriage drainage system, gas or electricity. Heating was by wood (mostly) or coal, if one could get a miners ticket. Lighting was by paraffin lamps and candles. There were no street lights in the villages, no public transport, some farmers had a pony and trap, or rode horseback, but most always walked. Until the new school was built, boys always walked to school at Groby about two miles away. All the cottages and farms were rented from the Estate until it was split up and sold by auction in Lots about 1925. Toilets were pan closets, generally in the yard or down the garden, which the night soil men emptied after

dark, about twice a month, accompanied by every barking dog in the village.

There were very few foot pavements, one walked on the roads, which were granite, when the first motor vehicles came after the War, the road-side hedges were covered in dust until tar—macadam was invented to spray on the roads. There were gas street lights in Leicester. Men went round morning and evening with a long pole to turn the lights on or off. There were electric trams with open tops and wood seats from the Clock Tower to several terminals, charging one penny each way with children half fare with a driver and a conductor to collect the fares. I remember until about 1910 there was one horse drawn tram from the Clock Tower along Churchgate, Sanveygate, Northgates to Fosse Road corner until an electric tram track by the new Great Central Railway Station was built.

There was no radio or television and no telephone in the village. The nearest phone was at Groby Post Office. Mr Georges Spencer the postman brought the letters each morning from Groby and on Saturday mornigns three or four copies of the Leicester Advertiser for the vicar, Estate Agent (Mr C. T. Garrett), the public house and my Uncle Jim Crooks who had a large farm—they were passed around the village and farms. The children from the outlying farms walked to school (anything up to 2 miles) and brought a packed lunch and their parents arranged for them to have hot drinks in the Winter at 'Z' Cottage. About once a year, we had a Missionary with a magic lantern and slides (lighted by oil lamp or candle) in the old school, where we also had Christmas School parties and on Boxing Night a Whist Drive and Dance in the old wooden restaurant (now a Village Hall) proceeds for the Royal Infirmary. There was no Welfare State or pensions. Some of the men and boys leaving school worked at the Groby Granite Works or Ellistown or South Leicester Coal Mines, near Coalville.

Miners were paid four to six shillings per shift (10 hours, 7 to 5) if not on the last cage going down just before 7 he lost a day's pay. If the loud steam siren at the pit sounded at 5 o'clock there was no work next day and miners tried to get some work - anything to earn a shilling. If the quarry men could not work because of frost, they ground skates for skaters on the pool, provided hot drinks and had a long ladder to rescue those falling in. A few men and several girls and women worked at Palmer's - a boot and shoe factory in Anstey. They worked on piece rates per dozen (the faster they worked the more they earned (there was a lot of short time).

Loughborough Business to run Outwoods Café.

A Loughborough business will be the operator for the new café at the Outwoods which is being created as part of the new Visitor Centre. Charnwood Borough Council can reveal that Olivia's Coffee and Bakery will be running the café in the Outwoods Visitor Centre. Work to convert the former ranger's cottage started earlier this year and following a rigorous contract tendering process, the Council has chosen Olivia's Coffee and Bakery.

The artisan bakery and eatery which is owned by Jose Diaz opened in Market Street, Loughborough in 2018 and will be known to many residents and visitors to the town. I understand it is hoped to open the café at the Outwoods during November.

I know many local residents visit the Outwoods especially at the time when the bluebells are in full bloom. The Outwoods is 110 acres of ancient woodland and is one of the oldest surviving woodland sites in Charnwood. It is designated a Site of Special Scientific Interest by Natural England, which means it is protected by law to conserve its wildlife and geology.



Remembrance Sunday

This year Remembrance Sunday was held on 14th November when we remembered the fallen by observing a two minutes silence. Have you ever stopped to think who originated this moving ceremony and where did it come from?

In January 2020 I was on holiday in South Africa staying at the Elephant Hotel, Addo, with friends from our village. Clive Rowe and Chris Scrine had decided to spend an extra day at the Port Elizabeth Test Match so Ann, Sue and myself had a free day. The owner of the Hotel, who also owned an extensive citrus farm, offered to take us for a visit to the local township where most of his employees lived. We climbed into a very well used and battered land rover and en route he took us through his orange groves to an isolated spot where we got out. He set off through some overgrown scrub with the three of us struggling to keep up. The purpose of this walk was to show us the graves of James Percy Fitzpatrick and

that of his wife, buried in this now neglected spot.

"I bet you are not aware that James Fitzpatrick was the originator of your two minutes silence" he boldly stated as we looked down on the gravestones. We had to admit that we did not, but as I now know he was absolutely correct. So how did this South African be-



come responsible for the two minute silence on Armistice Day?

The practice of a Two Minute Silence pause of Remembrance originated in Cape Town in May 1918 with the daily firing of the noon day gun on Signal Hill. The first minute was time for thanksgiving for those who survived, and the second minute to remember those who had fallen. As the city fell silent a bugler sounded the Last Post and the Reveille played at the end.

Percy Fitzpatrick had a personal interest in the observance of a silence, as his son had died in action in France in 1917. Through his contacts he

initially proposed to Lord Northcliffe, founder of the Daily Mail and Mirror, to campaign for this to be observed annually throughout the Empire. The idea did not find favour, so he persisted with his idea by contacting the Colonial Secretary, Lord Milner, who in turn raised the idea with King George V.

The King was enthusiastic and sought approval from the War Cabinet. His letter dated 5th November 1919 was immediately accepted on 7th November and on the next Tuesday 11th November 1919 at the 11th hour Remembrance Day two minute silence began.

To Fitzpatrick's great delight he read "The whole world stands to attention. Cables from every part of the world show how the King's message had been accepted and interpreted. From Indian jungles to Alaska, on the trains, and the ships at sea, in every port of the globe where British are gathered together the two minute silence was observed."

We were glad to have been shown his grave and to reflect on the influence that he has had to never forget those who have died in defence of our Country.

The Holly and the lvy

Following on from last year's Magazine article about helping wildlife in gardens over the winter, I thought I'd explore the biodiversity benefits of those festive British natives, the holly and the ivy.

Holly

- Berries are a vital food source for birds and small mammals.
- Flowers provide nectar and pollen for bees and other pollinating insects.
- Food plant for the Holly Blue butterfly and several moths.
- Leaf litter is often used by hedgehogs and small mammals for hibernation.
- Provides shelter during the winter months for invertebrates such as ladybirds.
- Provides good nesting opportunities for birds.


lvy

- Berries are a nutritious food for birds, including winter migrants, such as the Redwing.
- Many insects, including hoverflies and bees, rely on the sugar-rich nectar of its flowers.
- Food plant for butterfly and moth caterpillars, including the Holly Blue butterfly (again).
- Provides shelter for insects, birds, bats and other small mammals.
- Provides good nesting opportunities for birds.
- + Supports at least 50 species of wildlife.



REINDEER

because I am one". It doesn't matter what you call me as Reindeer and Caribou are the same animal (species).

Reindeer is derived from the Norwegian word, reinsdyr. Caribou, which is used in North America, comes from the French meaning snow shoveller. Reindeer use their large hooves to scrape away snow to search for their favourite food, lichen as well as grasses, fungi and mosses.

Uniquely both male and female reindeer have antlers and shed them annually. The males shed theirs after rutting and the females after



fawning. They are the only female deer to have antlers. Their antlers are the largest, relative to body size, of any deer.

Reindeer are one of the only mammals to have survived the last Ice Age, but also adapted to a warming climate. So how do they survive extreme cold? You can think of them as a very inefficient hot water bottle, no heat gets out. They have a dense inner woolly coat covered with a long haired overcoat which is so thermally efficient they hardly lose a calorie. Their hollow air filled hairs keep them so warm they can sit out a week long blizzard. Thermal imaging can only detect one feature the reindeer's nose. This may have led to saying "red nose reindeer".

Life in the Arctic has extreme seasons from total inky darkness in winter, to 24 hours of daylight in summer. So reindeer's eyes have evolved to have a wider wavelength than ours to include ultra violet. This enables them to see in the dark and avoid wolves, and gives them

greater sensitivity and contrast in snowy landscapes when searching for food.

Everything in a reindeer's life is to conserve energy. Their hooves are very large so they compact the snow when walking, and if you look carefully you will notice that the rear feet step into the footprint created by the front feet. They do not communicate verbally, again to conserve energy, but by clicking their knees as they walk.

For arctic dwellers, such as the Sami, the reindeer has become domesticated. They rely on them for meat, milk, hides, clothing and transport. No other species of deer have been domesticated. The vast majority of reindeer live in the wild, but numbers in North America are declining from hunting.

In 1823 the story of Father Christmas's sleigh pulled by eight reindeer became established. Their names are Dasher, Dancer, Prancer, Vixen, Comet, Cupid, Donner and Blitzen. They still manage to get around the world on Christmas Eve and visit all the children.



Carbon Reduction Course

I have been running a Carbon Reduction Course for 5 weeks from the end of August and through November. This was timed to coincide with the COP26 Conference in Glasgow.



It is easier to change our habits if we are supported by others who are doing the same thing. The topics we have looked at include:

- 1. What causes **climate change**, and why does more CO_2 in the atmosphere cause global temperatures to increase. We also had to find out what our current carbon footprint is.
- 2. **Home energy** use. Over 27% of the UK's CO₂ emissions come from the residential sector so the course looked at ways to reduce our home energy footprint now and in the future.
- 3. **Water and Waste.** We discussed how water can be used more sparingly as surprisingly on a global scale the UK is at a level of fresh water vulnerability. For waste we considered the 5 R's: Refuse, Reuse, Repair and Recycle. Although we are familiar with recycling in the UK recycles only about 45% of waste.
- 4. **Food.** All food has a carbon footprint from production, processing packaging and Transport. To reduce this we need to choose to buy locally produced food, eating less processed foods, cutting down on food with a high carbon footprint red meat, cheese, butter, fish and reducing food waste.
- 5. **Consumerism**. Every object we buy took energy to make so the more we buy the higher our carbon footprint. This session looks at practical ways to reduce our consumption footprint and shared ideas of how this could be done.

After Christmas the group will return to complete session 6 (transport) and session 7 (reflections and moving forward).

23m People Used 123456 AS A Password

Whether it's your Facebook, Amazon, or Netflix account, the explosion in popularity of online apps and services means more and more of us have to remember an increasingly long list of passwords.

Unfortunately, some of us cope with this challenge by resorting to practices that leave our data, devices and money at risk - by using the same password across multiple accounts, or by creating simple passwords that could easily be guessed by hackers. Bad password practice is more prevalent than you might think - the UK's National Cyber Security Centre carried out analysis of passwords leaked in data breaches and found that more than 23 million users worldwide used 123456 as a password. Here are some top tips that will make your life easier and your online accounts more secure:

1: Creating memorable passwords

A good way to create strong, memorable passwords is by using 3 random words. But remember, don't use words that can be guessed (like your pet's name). You can include numbers and symbols if you need to. For example, "RedPantsTree4!"

2: Saving passwords in your browser

Saving your password in your browser means letting your web browser (such as Chrome, Safari or Edge) remember your password for you.

This can help:

- make sure you do not lose or forget your passwords
- protect you against some cybercrime, such as fake websites It is safer than using weak passwords, or using the same password in more than one place.

Here are some useful links on how you can start saving passwords in your browser: Google Chrome, Microsoft Edge, Firefox, Safari.

3: Email account passwords

If a hacker gets into your email account, they could:

- reset your other online account passwords
- access personal information you have saved about yourself or your business

Your email password should be strong and different to all your other passwords. This will make it harder to crack or guess.

In other news there has been a rise in burglaries across Charnwood recently, including one burglary to a business reported in Newtown Linford during October. Charnwood West Police Beat Team continue to investigate this and Sgt. Chris Wharton sends the following message:

"Across Leicestershire and indeed Charnwood, we are seeing an increase in house burglaries. The modus operandi is to either access the property via an insecure ground floor window or by smashing a window to be able to open the door. The most common time for these burglaries is between 2200hrs and 0300hrs.

High value jewellery items have been stolen at locations in Barrow, Quorn, Mountsorrel and Loughborough town centre.

The local beat teams are working with CID colleagues to develop intelligence subjects.

Please could I ask that if you see any suspicious activity you call us so we can send officers to check the area and conduct appropriate stop checks of the individuals?

Please use available security devices such as timer lights, security lights, set alarms and remain vigilant.

Also ensure that properties are secure now the nights are drawing in.

I have been enjoying attending the Thursday Coffee and Cake meetings once again. It has been lovely to see so many familiar faces I've not seen since the first Covid lockdown when the weekly in person get together was paused. The cakes are as delicious as ever and I would encourage anyone who might be feeling isolated to attend. Mums and tots, families and residents of all ages are very welcome. Coffee and Cake is held in the Village Hall every Thursday morning from 11.15am. Thank you to Carol Ann and all the volunteers who make it happen.

At our last meeting, a number of residents attended to speak with Councillors regarding the impact the speed hump by Tyburn footpath and speeding vehicles are having on both properties and homeowners and we continue to investigate possible solutions to the problems experienced with the support of County Councillor Deborah Taylor.

We have yet to hear a further update following the most recent traffic management consultation carried out on Main Street, between the junctions with Markfield Lane and Ulverscroft Lane, to address the issues raised by residents who have limited off road parking and hope to hear more soon.

Bob Bown Memorial Field

We hope our younger park users are enjoying the new equipment installed earlier in the Summer, funded by the National Lottery Community Fund: Awards for All.

We will continue to look at further improvements to the play area when funds allow and are currently addressing the issue of the wet pour surface shrinkage.

Following our Duty of Care Tree Inspection carried out earlier this year, I am pleased to report that all issues raised across the three Parish Council maintained sites, have now been attended to. The total cost of all tree works was £1950 plus VAT. A further interim tree inspection will be carried out in another 18 months' time.

Cemetery and Churchyard

As previously reported, Chairman, Sue Pritchard and I met with sculptor, Peter Leadbeater, regarding the multi stemmed poplar tree at the Cemetery, which has now been felled due to health and safety concerns. Peter has been provisionally booked to attend in March 2022 to carve the remains of the tree stump into an appropriate abstract art form resembling an eternal flame. The total cost of the sculpture will be £1,025 and we continue to appeal for donations towards the cost of the sculpture. Councillors have approved the expenditure for 50% of the total cost and so far, donations have been pledged to the value of £150. We would be very grateful if there are any residents who would like to make a donation towards the £500 we need to raise for the work to go ahead. Please contact me via the usual channels if you would like to make a donation.

The grass cutting schedule for all three sites has now ended for 2021 and our current arrangement is under review to ensure best value.

Chairman, Sue Pritchard, will be planting the parish troughs for winter about the same time this Magazine Issue will be delivered to households. Thank you, Sue for all your efforts.

Our sincere thanks also go to Steve and Gill who have adopted a trough on Main Street, close to the Groby Lane junction. All the troughs have looked a picture over the Summer months and we are grateful for the time and care that goes into them.
