About 10 years ago I ran a 10km with Haile Gebrselassie, at that time the world record holder. Well, I say I ran it with him, he'd actually finished about 20 minutes before I even got near the start line. I also used to play football with Gary Breen, who scored for the Republic of Ireland team at the 2002 World Cup, but we were both schoolbovs at the time. The other month I was on a plane with Mister Maker, of CBeebies fame. Well, he was sat right in front of me, to be honest I didn't know who he was until I got off the plane and someone else told me.

At various stages in my life I've technically run with, or played with, people who are at the top of their sport. But I've normally been a long way behind or at completely the wrong stage of their career and not really benefited from it. In other words, I'm an also-ran, one of the crowd, never hitting the heights or playing amongst the big boys.

Except in life itself, where, despite being to all extents and purposes an also-ran, I don't just run with but get personal help and support from the world's greatest expert. Where I am not left in the slipstream by a famous face, but accompanied, encouraged and sometimes even carried.

The world's greatest expert at life was a man who managed to live it without ever screwing up; who never put a foot wrong, who demonstrated such strength of purpose, such sense of values and such quality of love that even those who disagreed with his core message have had to respect him. He wasn't a teacher, but he spent time with children; he wasn't a doctor, but he healed the sick; he wasn't a politician, but he knew how to improve society; he wasn't a soldier, but he sacrificed himself for the good of others.

And unlike Haile Gebrselassie, if you get the chance to follow him you won't do it from far behind, anonymously, because he promises to walk alongside all of us, to never be far from us, to give us the chance to demonstrate that no-one is an also-ran, because Jesus gives each of us meaning and significance beyond our own capacities. Want to run with **Richard Trethewey** him?



News from the Park

And We're Off

After many years as a pipe dream, several years as a plan and just under two years since we launched the fundraising campaign, work has started on our new Visitor Centre. The project is an all-Leicestershire affair with builders Tan-



wood Construction from Blaby carrying out the necessary alterations and preparatory work to the building to make it ready for the exhibition installers, Antomic Woodworking of Wigston. The exhibition has been designed and the installation is being overseen by award-winning designers Creative Good of Oadby.

The builders started work on 29th February and anticipate having the building ready for the exhibition fit-out to begin in mid-May. Much of the fabrication of this is being carried out off-site so installation should be completed in 3 to 4 weeks, meaning that we should be ready to open to the public in early July.

As part of this project, the old entrance lobby is being converted to a kiosk serving takeaway drinks, confectionery and ice-creams, which will hopefully in the short-term take some of the pressure off the queue for the tearoom until we are in a position to carry out a reorganisation to improve the flow and increase the speed of throughput on busy days.

The over-riding purpose of the Visitor Centre is to encourage our visitors to find out about the Park and to realise that there is more to Bradgate than somewhere to walk the dog and bring the kids to let off steam. Admission to the exhibition will be free of charge and its purpose is to help deliver our second charitable purpose to "advance the education of the public in the appreciation and care of the environment" rather than being a commercial undertaking.

In addition to a small team of paid staff, we will be seeking to recruit a pool of volunteers to help us welcome visitors and to share some of their knowledge and love of the Park. If you would like to volunteer with us but feel that planting trees and building walls is not your cup of tea, then this could be the opportunity you have been waiting for.

Email rangers@bradgatepark.org to register an interest.

Elsewhere on the Park, we have reached that time of year when things are thinking about growing. The grass has turned that brighter shade of green that gives all the signs of being alive but growth is, as yet, imperceptible. It is at this time of year that we start thinking about the areas for bracken management in the coming summer. We traditionally start

rolling in early July after the end of the ground-nesting bird season with weed-wiping being most effective if carried out a few weeks later. This new technique has been a revelation with dozens of acres of the Park being transformed from barren bracken to diverse acid grassland plant communities. I recently received the report of last year's species recording that was carried out for us by Loughborough Naturalists' Club. One particular highlight was the fact that the Heath Spotted Orchid has gone from being a rarity to an almost regular occurrence, one of a number of plants to benefit from our habitat restoration work.

As we anticipate a busy summer of events, I would particularly mention our **Proms Concert on Saturday 16**th **July** with the Bardi Wind Orchestra. Tickets are now on sale at the Conservatory Tearoom & Shop on online at www.seetickets.com I recently had a meeting with the orchestra to agree the programme and it is going to be a memorable evening of music finishing with all the Last Night of the Proms favourites: Rule Britannia, Jerusalem and Land of Hope and Glory accompanied by a light show to illuminate the dramatic backdrop of the ruins of Bradgate House.

As well as the concert, we are staging two theatre productions: Wuthering Heights on Sunday 26th June and Sherlock Holmes & the Hound of the Baskervilles on Sunday 14th August both with a slightly earlier start time of 5pm. With the Summer Fair on the weekend of 4th/5th June and the Living History Weekend on 10th & 11th September, there is something for everyone at Bradgate this summer.

See you on the Park.

Annual General Meeting and talk 14/3/2016

There was a large turnout last night for the Annual General Meeting. This marks the completion of 30 years of the society. There were over 60 members present together with 31 visitors.

Mrs Janie Martin, President, presided with Councillor Paul Day, Chairman. His annual report showed a very good year, with over 200 members and a healthy financial position. There had been a very successful programme of talks and walks and there was a full calendar of events for 2016. The Committee and Officers were re-elected unanimously, with the addition of Mrs Marilyn Palmer M.B.E. who was warmly welcomed

After the AGM there was a most interesting talk by Matt Beamish. He is a Project Officer for University of Leicester Archaeological Services. He has worked as an archaeologist in Leicestershire since 1990.

From Ice Age to war games Recent archaeological survey and excavation in Bradgate Park

Mr Beamish explained that there had been a recent LIDAR (Light Detection and Ranging) aerial survey of Bradgate Park. This had revealed fantastic detail of the landscape which had not been visible from the surface. It had shown medieval field patterns and probable sites for stone age man. They had discovered many tools from the end of the ice-age. This site is of international importance. The survey had led to excavation of many pits where digging had proved extremely fruitful. As well as tools, pottery and other artefacts they had found the foundations of a number of buildings. These had led to many further studies of the park and its history since the twelfth century. Armed with the new data the University has embarked on a series of excavations with the hope of discovering more about this wonderful and perhaps unique land-scape.

Fracking, our new neighbour? Talk by David Bridge Monday 25th April at 7.30pm, Woodhouse Eaves Village Hall David Bridge qualified as a geologist in 1968 and has spent his entire life in the field. He spent many years with the British Geological Survey, at home and abroad. He retired in 2007.

Fracking, the extraction of natural gas from deep in the ground, by various means is a highly topical subject. It is widespread in the United States and is making a major contribution to energy supplies there. The British Government is very supportive of projects here. A licence for prospecting North of Loughborough has already been granted.


The subject has provoked major controversy. Our speaker will give the facts and explain doubts by various groups.

Exhibition 2nd May Sunday School Rooms Worlds Apart'

In today's world of digital images it's so easy to come back from anywhere with hundreds of photographs. So what do you do with all these images that clutter up your computer? Well, local artist, Mike Pratt from Groby, has come up with a rather unusual answer which combines as many as one hundred photos to create one final image.

His 'Worlds Apart' pictures are a result of many hours' work, carefully cutting out and artistically placing the photos before giving them a 360 degree wrap. Look out for Real Eggs this Easter

The Leicestershire and Rutland Wildlife Trust is asking you to be on the look out for real 'Easter' Eggs this coming Easter. Traditionally, this is a time when people give their garden a spring clean. However, this is also often the time that many garden birds start to lay their first clutch of eggs.

Neil Pilcher, Senior Conservation Officer, said "Easter is early this year and the winter weather has been remarkably mild which means that birds will also be nesting early. I would urge people to be careful. The Trust has already had reports of blackbirds building nests in gardens. It only takes a moment for a nest to be accidentally destroyed or exposed to predators."

The Leicestershire and Rutland Wildlife Trust recommends that you check your garden before starting work. Hedges are the most likely places to find nests, especially dense evergreen hedges such as Leylandii. However, working in the same area for long periods can also cause birds to abandon their nests. People should spend just a few minutes looking through their hedges and shrubs for signs of nests before starting work.

Under the Wildlife and Countryside Act all birds are protected whilst nesting. This protection starts from the moment they start building the nest until the young have fledged. The Trust recommends that if there is any doubt then the work should be postponed until the nesting season is over, which is generally accepted as 31st July.






Newtown Linford Neighbourhood Watch - A member of the Parish Council



We recently had a number of power cuts during the wet weather. One or more phases goes off at a time. The phase you are in will not necessarily be the same as your neighbour. It could be alternate or opposite. Contrary to popular believe Western Power does not know about these phases going off without someone telling them. They only know about the main trunk lines. So if you find your power off please call them on **0800 678 3105** and inform them. The men can only start coming after the first call.

Western Power have been very good with letting me know details once reported and they tell me once the men are on their way and an estimate of how long it will take and in each case they have dealt with it sooner. The engineers have shown us how they have to insert a new giant fuse in each phase that has gone. Apparently they cannot permanently fix it until the whole wire goes. The water gets into a pinhole, heats up and swells to block the hole before it blows the fuse.

When the power is off only your main telephone will ring so allow more time for anyone to answer their phone.

No crimes have been reported this month.

This was received by the Bradgate Park Trust and forwarded to me......

To whom this may concern, Today while myself and my 2 year old daughter were walking through your park we were approached by 3 Indian race young men with a small child. 1 asked me where the deer were, another of the 3 men who was holding hands with the small child held his finger out and ask my daughter if she wanted to go with him. Luckily I was standing with her and told him I don't think so. As they walked away I then heard 1 of the men say she's cute to my daughter. So my advice is keep an eye on young children and do not let them in the park on their own.

Peter Tyldesley from the Trust has also shown me emails from his Wardens fearing for their lives because of abuse and threats from the public recently. Either directly on themselves or when they have gone to protect other members of the public. The situation is getting quite bad since it is no longer an isolated incident but every week to the extent the Wardens may need body cameras etc.

As I write this on Sunday 13th, the first weekend of the sun coming out, I notice virtually every car parked outside the village shop had a yellow parking ticket on it.

A resident passed me a booklet on scams from Sussex Police which I circulated to those on mailing and have also posted it on the website. Please remember to read the website regularly for updates on all that is going on in the village.



The River Lin

The River Lin flows through Newtown Linford, through Bradgate Park then feeds Cropston Reservoir, then Swithland Reservoir and flows

away to join the River Soar at Quorn. Although normally only inches deep, during wet weather the river can become a raging torrent and flood. The area at risk of flood is shown on the Environment Agency flood map, available through their website.



The measurement is by radar, situated at 521
Bradgate Road and provided and maintained by the Environment Agency. This has only become possible through new technology; the non-contact radar takes a measurement every 15 minutes and this is stored for a daily wireless trans-



mission over the internet – this infrequent transmission is to conserve the battery

when the river level is low - however at times of high river level the frequency of data transfer is automatically increased. Clever stuff.

This does provide the opportunity for anyone to register with the Environment Agency's 'Floodline Warnings Direct' service. As I understand it, the system will call the specified 'phone number when triggered by the river reaching a certain height.

River measurement in mAOD???

The river level shown on the webpage is not the river depth but the height of the water **A**bove **O**rdnance **D**atum (AOD), measured in metres. In our case the datum is 103.78 mAOD (Ordnance datum Newlyn). If you want the river level relative to sea level then add the gauge datum to the gauge reading. Typically when the river is at low level the gauge reads, say, 1.0m. Therefore the river may only be inches deep but the water surface is 103.78m + 1.0m = 104.78 meters above sea level. For those of my age; this is nearly 344 feet above sea level. The webpage 'highest level' is shown at 2.48 metres AOD 25 November 2012. The depth of the river would have been about 1.5 meters however in 2007 (as the photo) the level was somewhat higher than that!

Just to put water power in perspective; when in flood the river speeds along at about running pace. In reality, near the banks the flow will be slower but let us estimate the average flow speed is 20 metres per minute. Where the water is 1.5 metres deep (as 25 November 2012) and the width of the river is, say 2.5 meters. The rate of water flow is therefore $20\text{m/min} \times 1.5\text{m} \times 2.5\text{m} = 75$ cubic meters per minute. Equivalent to two articulated lorries going down the river each minute.

At the risk of stating the obvious... but lets do that anyway... when the river is in flood it is deep, fast, dangerous and destructive. Technological progress now means we can now see how the river level changes from the comfort of our PC; and get automatic flood warnings direct to our 'phone.
