




To explore how creativity works, some employees of Kreativ Magazin went out and found some of the world's most creative people. They were asked to complete this drawing in just ten sec-

onds:

So the class of ten year olds set to work and added to this starter drawing some numbers (no higher than 12), an outline shape around it all, and one or two even had accessories such as an alarm or some pencil shading. None reached for the crayons. The limited time was only enough for the first idea, and everyone had the same first idea.



However when given ten minutes with the same instruction to complete the drawing above, these ten year olds produced a colourful gallery of pictures which included a cat, a kite, a tessellating pattern across the page, the face of an old man with a child giving him a hug, a plate of food, a butterfly, a flower, a cheeping bird. One person in the class did draw a clock, but it was now a very elaborate cuckoo clock.

The light-hearted experiment illustrated some valuable truths, not least that creativity works best in playful environments without immediate deadlines. For you, quick to move on to the next page, it may also have illustrated that you are in danger of assuming only the conventional solution when reading the Church Magazine!

Advent can be a creative season, but it needs a bit of space. It's not just about preparing for Christmas; it's about looking again at what happens

when Christ comes into our lives. We consider this through the experience of Mary, Joseph and others in those first century days;

We also consider it through the promise of Christ's second coming when his Kingdom of justice and peace is established in all its fullness. Lives are turned upside down and the right way up by the advent of this Jesus and the Church will take four Sundays to explore these things, looking for the ten minutes rather than the ten second approach. And the more creative and playful we are, the more we may be able to colour in God in <u>our</u> lives this Advent.





Our walk in November was from the village past John's Lea Wood, Sandwells Lodge and over the new National Forest woodland past Lea Wood to emerge on to Ulverscroft Lane, finally arriving at Jan's house for a welcome cuppa tea. The views from high above Lea Wood were lovely in the Autumn sunshine.

Last summer I noticed a problem with many young Oak trees on the plantation. Unfortunately we noticed the trees are now much worse, with leaves covered in powdery mildew typical of the disease described below.

Powdery mildew of oak is caused by the fungus *Erysiphe alphitoides* (also known as *Microsphaera alphitoides*) and it is a common foliar pathogen of oak trees across Europe. First found in England in 1908, it is thought to have been a factor in an oak dieback episode in the 1920s. Scientists today believe that it may one of the factors that is contributing to the decline of our oak trees.



The mildew attacks young leaves and soft shoots of oaks, covering them with a felty-white mycelium (fine white threads). It causes eventually the leaves to shrivel and dry out or turn brown.

It seems that the disease thrives when we have mild overcast weather, which usually appears in summer during warmer conditions.



Christingle

The Children's Society first introduced Christingle to The Church of England in 1968, and it has since become one of the most popular events for families and communities in the Church Calendar.

Christingle means 'Christ's Light' and it is a symbol of the Christian Faith. Lots of Churches hold Christingle services around Christmas time. The custom of giving out lighted candles in these services originates from the Moravian Church in Germany in 1747 but they weren't introduced to the Anglican Church in England until 1968.



In Newtown Linford we will be celebrating our Christingle and Crib Service on the 24th December at 5.30pm

It is a perfect opportunity for you and your family to share in a unique festive occasion. Sharing the candlelit celebration is an ideal way to share the key messages of the Christian faith, while helping to raise vital funds to help vulnerable children across the country.

The Children's Society relies on the vital funds raised through Christingle celebrations to fund their work with vulnerable children and young people in the community and across the country.

Symbolism of the Christingle Orange

- The orange represents the world
- The red ribbon indicates the love and blood of Christ
- The dried fruits and sweets symbols of God's creations
- The lit candle symbolises Jesus, the light of the world

You can collect a christingle collection candle from the church from the beginning of December and bring it along to the service or just donate to the Children's Society on the day.

From the Records

A message to walkers - Leicestershire now a County not to be ignored.

I found this article in the Records for August 1993.

It stated that it was not before time, because hill and country walking was a force to be reckoned with and we should redress the fact that many travel writers gave Leicestershire a miss.

Back in the 1940's Charnwood Forest was originally scheduled as one of the first official Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty to be designated in England although in the event this claim was rejected.

Today things are very different, people from outside the County come along, tempted by various walkers guides and the internet to acquaint themselves with its unique hills and valleys which boast amongst other features some of the oldest rock formations known to man.

For city folk it is Bradgate Park whose ruined mansion was the childhood home of Lady Jane Grey and the quiet waters of Groby Pool. Others venture beyond to the secluded valley of Ulverscroft Priory or up to the bracken covered slopes of Beacon Hill and the neighbouring Outwoods, both of which provide marvellous views of Loughborough.

The woodlands of the Forest nestle cheek by jowl with dramatic hilltops and unusual buildings, which include the strange hunting lodge at St Bernard's Abbey and the remains of the centuries old nunnery of Grace Dieu beside the main Loughborough to Ashby Road.

The villages of Charnwood, besides offering sustenance to the walker, are varied in layout and rich in domestic and cottage architecture. Each reader will have their own personal memories of this beautiful part of Leicestershire but living in one of the villages do we take it all for granted? We should treasure it.

Another article two pages away gave some interesting facts about Bradgate Park which you might like to think about next time you are there.

Mr Charles Bennion in 1928 bought the 828 acres and presented it to the County of Leicestershire to be administered by Trustees for the purpose of public access for recreational purposes. In 1970 the Park was approved as a Country Park by the Countryside Commission. In

1976, Marion's Cottage was converted into a Visitor Centre. The article states that 3 good car parks were provided. However the large numbers of visitors, due to the result of publicity and visitor mobility, have had a negative effect on the footpaths and plant life, which have to be monitored closely for erosion. The house was built in 1510 for the Grey Family who moved from Groby Hall. Bradgate House was one of the first unfortified country houses in England and unusually was built of brick made from local clay. Near the house is the walled pheasantry and another walled area that could have been the kitchen garden. The lake at the back of the house supplied water for the fish ponds, washing tanks and for flushing sewage away from the house. There was also a water mill. Where the water was taken away from the river Lyn and the channel can still be seen today, as well as the outlet from the mill. Look next time you are there.

If Charles Bennion was alive today I think he would be interested to see how his gift helps to refresh us all in our busy lives.

Newtown Linford Neighbourhood Watch A member of the Parish Council



The only crime reported is the theft of front and back number plates from a car on Bradgate Road.

A new card scam, in which people are tricked into handing over their bank card details and pin numbers, has seen customers duped out of £1.5 million since the beginning of 2011.

The scam works by the victim being telephoned by the fraudster to renew their debit or credit card owing to a fraud on the account. The owner is told to key in their pin number on the phone and a courier is sent out to collect the card. The card is then sent direct to the criminal who also has the pin number.

The majority of victims are older adults and the scammers often give an alternative number for people to call back on to ensure the call is genuine. But instead of hanging up many people are tricked into thinking the call is from their bank and stay on the line.

£1.5 million has been lost to this type of crime and £750,000 of this was taken in the first four months of the year - the same as the whole of 2011. The UK Payments Council has urged people never to hand over their card to anyone who has come to the door, never to enter their pin number over the telephone and to always speak to their bank securely by making sure there is a dial tone when calling and only ever using the bank's advertised number.

Community Speedwatch has now finished and the results are set out below. Elsewhere in the Magazine you can read a report from the Roecliffe Road co-ordinator. I would like to thank Councillors Sue Pritchard, Virginia Toon and Phil Baker along with Peter Rose, Michael Upstone, Maurice McMorran, Jeni McMorran, Paul Toon, Felicity Manning, Dave Clifford and Vicky Lightfoot for turning out in cold weather to man the gun.

SPEEDWATCH

Residents on Roecliffe Road have long been concerned about the speed of traffic along their stretch of the road; three years ago, a limit of 40mph was set from just after the golf course to just before the Waterworks. However, accidents continue to occur at the Roecliffe crossroads, with alarming regularity; a significant number of vehicles appeared to be travelling well in excess of the 40mph limit making it dangerous for residents to pull out of their drives and for pedestrians along the narrow pathways.

SpeedWatch has evidenced our concerns. In all, we manned the speedgun for some 40 hours, over a four week period. Rush hour was relatively steady, with the traffic self regulating by and large, but during the day, when the roads were less busy, it was clear that a large number of drivers either did not know the speed limit or plainly ignored it.

Our results have been processed by the 'SpeedWatch' Team at County Hall, and have come back to us as follows: 46 to 49mph - 324 vehicles; 50 to 59mph - 298; 60 to 69mph - 20; 70mph - 2. Two were recorded at 72 mph.

This gave a total of 644 vehicles, which is an average of 15 per hour. Anecdotally, a tremendous number also slowed down as they approached and before they were 'caught', there were also a significant number of cars which are not included in the data because they were travelling too fast for us to be able to observe their make and registration number accurately.

All things considered, our concerns that traffic continues to travel at dangerous speeds along Roecliffe Road are clearly justified.

NEWTOWN LINFORD PARISH COUNCIL

Our November Parish Council meeting was attended by Richard Bennett. the Head of Planning & Development at Charnwood Borough Council. We had asked him to come to clarify Neighbourhood Planning for us. It is an exciting (their word) but complex initiative, which was introduced by the Localism Act in November 2011. A Neighbourhood Plan would be formulated by the Parish Council with the help of residents, and under the umbrella of the Borough Council. Without wanting to pre-empt such a plan. I would say that it concentrates on communities, who actively seek more development of housing and/or businesses for their village. Luckily, as housing requirements stand at the moment, additional housing is not planned in our Parish by Charnwood Borough Council. Therefore, the Parish Council does not have to make a decision regarding a Neighbourhood Plan, but discussions will be kept in abevance. The Parish Council's main concern at the moment is the status of our Village Design Statement. It had been adopted as a bona fide Planning Document by the Borough Council a few years ago, equal to their own statutory Documents. This is no longer the case, but Mr. Bennett assured us that our Village Design Statement, which is our vision of Newtown Linford, now and in the future, is still being consulted when planning applications are considered. If you are interested I would be happy to let you have a copy of the details of Neighbourhood Planning as explained by the Rural Community Council.

<u>Playing Field:</u> The goalmouths of the football pitch have taken a bit of a bashing over the last few months. One reason is the enthusiastic use by our youngsters, which is great; the other is the weather. New turf and seed will be placed on the worst affected areas soon but that means that the pitch will have to be closed for a time.

Flooding: I am writing this after yesterday's horrendous rainfall. I just want to remind you that I have a number of 'sandbags', should you need any.

Next 2 Parish Council meetings: Tuesday 11th December 2012 and Tuesday 8th January 2013, both at 7 pm in the small hall of the Village Hall. Visitors are most welcome.


