

## It seems to me...

That we need to be ready for Christmas

guess that there are some people who do manage to get super organised for almost everything to do with Christmas. Their cards out in time, presents despatched in the most economical way, meal menus prepared, everything bought in good time, no last minute rushing, etc, etc. But for others, that last minute rush, that burst of adrenalin as the panic sets in, is just another part of the Christmas period and perhaps even contributing to the general excitement of the season as a whole.

Of course there are several other ways of making sure that we are ready for the festival and which having nothing to do with turkey, tinsel or trees.

There is that sense of religious preparation, for example taking the time to pay due attention to the themes of Advent (by definition, a time of preparation) which can heighten the spiritual experience of Christmas itself: John the Baptist and the call to repentance, the Blessed Virgin Mary and the call to obedience, the Shepherds and the Kings and their call to worship, and so on.

And there are indeed other spiritual preparations for Christmas as well: for example, finding some space, peace and time for yourself and God amid all the busyness and pressure. Also, carving out time for those who are dear to us, and what about allocating time too for those who are in need? Perhaps these sorts of preparations are actually a more important part of Christmas than anything else?

There are all sorts of ways to try and be ready for Christmas, but to be brutally honest we can never be truly ready in every respect and detail. This should not be alarming or surprising for those who pride themselves on their organisational prowess because, in reality. Christmas is actually about the unexpected: the unplanned for surprises of God's work in people's lives. Almost everything about the first Christmas story was unexpected. Mary as a pregnant unmarried young women, Elizabeth being seen to be to old to have a child, Joseph and his unexpected family, the Shepherds having their quiet night disturbed, the

Kings following a distant star without knowledge of their destination.

Nobody was truly ready; no one had spent weeks getting prepared. Everyone was surprised.

Despite this sense of being unprepared, God still called each and everyone to play their own particular part. And they responded to a God of surprises. And love was revealed as never seen or experienced before. And the world was changed for ever.

Of course we will all do our best to get prepared and to be ready for Christmas in a variety of ways. But let's not forget the surprising, the unexpected, the new life of the Kingdom that lies at the heart of the Gospel, and the surprises that lie ready for all of us to receive. So at this festive season, what will you be ready for and are you prepared to be surprised?

Wishing you a very peaceful, happy and surprising Christmas.





#### News from the Park

#### Hibernate? Not us!





The river is rising, the trees are clad in autumnal colours that are being progressively stripped by the wind and the days are getting shorter. The migratory birds have departed for warmer climes and many of us wish we could either do the same or at least follow the example of many other species and settle down to sleep until spring.

However for us, as I mentioned in last month's article, winter is the time when much of the work of looking after the Park gets done although, as Robert Burns said, "The best laid schemes o' Mice an' Men. Gang aft agley". Bradgate offers a wide range of habitats for a vast array of creatures and this includes some excellent bat habitat. Being mindful of this. we commissioned a bat survey of all the trees that are scheduled for work this winter and also arranged for our consultant ecologist to be on site on the day we were due to fell the only tree scheduled to come down this year, in order to talk the Rangers though the procedure for checking for bats. Everyone was feeling quite relaxed and convinced that this would be a "dummy run" as the tree was an old Norway Spruce in which no self-respecting bat would be seen when there were dozens of ancient oak trees offering prime bat residences a short distance away. The chainsaw operator stood ready as the climber went aloft to "go through the motions" and check the empty holes in the tree for non-existent bats. He looked in the first hole – bat droppings. He looked in the second hole - a bat! There was obviously no way that the tree could be felled with bats living in it but it had been earmarked for felling as it was rotten in the base and potentially dangerous. What to do? In the end it was decided to cut the top out of the tree to reduce the weight and also the propensity of the upper branches to act as a sail in windy conditions, which would make it less likely to blow down. This would kill the tree, as conifers do not re-grow when cut as broadleaved trees do, but avoid the bats being made homeless. To further complicate matters, the time taken on this tree meant that we had missed the "window" for working on trees containing bats and would not be able to do any more until March.

While we are waiting for the "bat window" to open again in the spring, the Rangers have started pollarding some of the younger oak and sweet chestnut trees that were planted 30-40 years ago as replacements for some of the old veterans. This looks brutal when first carried out but pollarding is a traditional form of management in deer parks as it allowed a regular supply of small diameter timber to be harvested from above the point where the deer could reach and eat the new growth. Research has shown that pollarded trees live longer as regular pollarding helps maintain their vigour and so we are hopefully setting our younger trees up to still be here in 500 years' time.

Having increased the number of Rangers, we are able to get through a lot more work than was previously the case. At the same time that one team are carrying out tree work, another are busy with the deer. Now that the rut is over, culling has started again and will continue until the end of the season in April. We aim to cull steadily over an extended period of time as it minimises the stress on the herd as well as accommodating the extra time required to process the carcasses ready for sale.

We have been very pleased with the way in which Bradgate Park Venison has taken off and are very grateful to all the local residents, butchers and food businesses who have supported us in our new venture.

In between doing all this, we have found time to organise our Christmas Fair, which is taking place on the weekend of 6<sup>th</sup>/7<sup>th</sup> December.

With the festive season fast approaching, I would like to wish everyone a Happy Christmas and I hope to see you on the Park in the New Year.



#### TIS' THE SEASON – of over indulgence

Hello everyone! As we gear up for the festive season, the foods filling up the supermarket shelves are filled with sugar and fat. Selection boxes, giant tins of sweets, biscuits and other such items that have, somewhere along the line, come



to define Christmas. Now I'm not going to be a stick in the mud, Christmas Day is Christmas Day after all and I want you to enjoy that beautiful dinner with friends and family. However, I'd like to offer some nutrition and fitness tips to help you deal with, and stave off, the excess.

Stay Hydrated with 2-3 litres of water per day. Try to avoid fruit juices, sugar laden sodas, anything with the word 'frappe' in the title. J Water, Green Tea, Tea

and Coffee are fine.

Eat little and Often – your metabolism works the same way a fire does, the more you feed it with the right foods, the harder it works. Do not over feed yourself the wrong foods, and try to stick to 3 meals and 2 healthy snacks per day so you don't find yourself going hungry.

- The lit candle symbolises Jesus. the light of the world, who brings hope to people living in darkness



This was one of Sharon's final wishes and wouldn't of been possible without the support of staff and a volunteer nurse from the Loros Hospice who helped make this special day possible.

We all lived in hope that Sharon might make Christmas, from leaving the Hospital Sharon looked as if she might not make another day, but the treatment and care given by the Loros Team gave Sharon more time with her Family and friends - a further fourteen days.

Sharon sadly succumbed to this awful disease and passed away peacefully and with dignity with her family and friends by her side on November 7th 2012, aged just 37.

If it wasn't for the Loros Hospice we wouldn't have managed to share private moments together at the Hospice, special memories of her final days that we all look back on with a heavy heart.

Sadly this won't be a similar story you will probably never hear again, so please lets have a half on Sharon and help us celebrate Sharon's 40th year and raise some much needed funds for the Loros.

#### From The Records

Last month I gave you the progression since 1928 of visiting Bradgate Park and the parking problems as car ownership grew and bus usage went down.

This time it is a method of transport not mentioned. There was an article in the press in December 2000 about electric trams (no reference as to where the information came from).

"Travel plans which might have been are always fascinating to contemplate whatever their probable success"

Certainly a great boon to tourism, would have been two local railway lines, if they had got past the planning stage.

The Leicestershire, Groby and Bradgate Park Railway, a scheme proposed 101 years ago, a railway which would have been a branch line of the Great Central, running from the main line at Rothley (now part of the preserved Great Central of course) to Newtown Linford and Groby Pool.

"Bradgate Park has been a popular destination for centuries so it is not surprising that it was also a planned terminus for an electric tramway known by its title and planned routes - the Leicester, Anstey, Groby and Newtown Light Railway". Such plans came to nothing. They were just too late to cash in the development of railways.

I heard a tale that this railway would run parallel to the road from Anstey to Newtown Linford and finish at the top of Groby Lane Hill.
