Interesting connection between Stoneywell, The National Trust and Alls Saints Church Newtown Linford

The Carving behind the Altar and back of All Saint's Church was done by Joseph Armitage, (who was a tutor at Leicester Arts School between 1906 & 1914) and his younger brother Edgar. They were involved in the Arts and Crafts Movement - and The School of Art played a major role in nurturing the movement in Leicester. The carvings behind the Altar were in memory of Lady Jane Grey and are mostly trees and plants she would have known. The letter confirming this was sent from his granddaughter to Sheila Langton, Church Warden (who had made enquiries) and is displayed in the Church.

The National Trust symbol came about as a result of a competition announced by the National Trust in 1935. 109 designs were submitted - none of which were deemed suitable. The Trust then limited it to six designers, the winning design was by artist Joseph Armitage (1880-1945). Other works he has done include carvings on St George's Chapel, Windsor Castle and the Bank of England. An architectural carver and modeller he also worked on some of the most important American style buildings in Glasgow during the inter-war years

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BRADGATE PARK – MAKING THE CONNECTIONS PETER TYLDESLEY

On 1st October I took over as Land Agent & Surveyor at Bradgate Park, following the retirement of Michael Harrison, Given that Michael was Land Agent here for over 20 years and involved in the management of the Park for over 50, it is fair to say that change has not been a common occurrence. The fact that Michael left everything running so smoothly has meant that I have had the luxury of being able to take stock and plan for the future without the pressures associated with having to sort out immediate crises and urgent problems.

If I had to sum up my approach in one word it would be "connection". Bradgate Park is unique in that it offers a taste of wild countryside on the very edge of a city of over 300,000 inhabitants. We are therefore uniquely placed to help a vast number of people re-discover the natural world and the benefits that contact with nature brings to body. mind and spirit. The Park contains geology, history and wildlife of national significance and I want us to be better at using these wonderful assets to inform, inspire and perhaps challenge people to make changes to their lifestyles so that they take better care of both themselves and their environment. Bradgate Park was first enclosed as

a deer park (for hunting) as

far back as the 13th Century

and subsequently passed into the hands of the Grey family and was the childhood home of Lady Jane Grey, Queen of England for nine days in 1553 and probably Bradgate's most famous resident.

When the estate was broken up in the early 20th Century, local businessman and philanthropist Charles Bennion purchased the Park and gave it in trust for the benefit of the people of Leicestershire and visitors to the County. The Bradgate Park Trust still manages the Park to this day and is a registered charity with the twin objects of running the Park and "advancing the education of the public in the appreciation and care of the environment". It is this latter object that, I feel, imposes on us a greater duty than simply providing a wonderful setting for an enjoyable day out.

My vision for the Trust's future is that we combine the facilitation of high quality science and primary research into the various important aspects of the Park's environment with an offer of formal and informal education that really engages and enthuses people of all ages and levels of interest. We have recently become a member of the Council for Learning Outside the Classroom and I hope to forge links with local Schools and Colleges so that we become recognised as a fantastic,

safe and accessible venue for teachers to deliver their fieldwork and outdoor learning. The next step will be to develop our own programmes and resources and to deliver these to a wide range of learners in a way that inspires both children and adults to engage further with the wonders of both Bradgate Park and the wider natural world.

And, of course, I fully intend that we remain the obvious destination for an enjoyable and invigorating trip out into the wonderful Leicestershire countryside.

What I hope to do in this column is to explore and explain some of the features of the Park that people may not be so familiar with, to keep the local community informed about what is going on and to answer any questions that are raised regarding the management of the Park. 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A Midsummer Nights Dream - Bradgate Park Sunday 14th July

Changes in Bradgate Park

Any frequent or even infrequent visitor to Bradgate Park will have noticed changes over the years. Change is inevitable. However, a few weeks ago, having been passed by six vehicles within the space of twenty minutes I felt prompted to contact Councillor David Snartt who kindly referred me to the new land agent for Bradgate Park, Mr Peter Tyldesley. I raised concerns about the volume of road traffic, increased mechanisation, the cutting of the bracken and other changes to the landscape. I thought readers might be interested in some of the responses.

With regards to the volume of road traffic Mr Tyldesley says that this basically reflects workload. However, there may be alternatives to using diesel Land Rovers for shuttling back and forth along the tarmac carriageway. He would be interested in using electric carts to reduce emissions if concerns over pedestrian safety due to these vehicles being silent can be overcome. In the meantime, the Trust are planning to purchase a small van to replace one of the older Land Rovers for this coming season. I also questioned the need for two rangers to use petrol strimmers to cut back small patches of marsh cotton grass.

The cutting of the bracken, which seems to have accelerated in recent years, is undertaken for a variety of reasons: to restore the unimproved acid grassland, to reduce the grazing pressure on other plants such as bilberry. There is no intention to eradicate the bracken. In fact, the bracken is not cut but rolled. "However, unchecked bracken growth has been shown to reduce bio-diversity." The management of the Park, which is a Site of Special Scientific Interest, is answerable to Natural England.

My own observation is that with the rolling of the bracken there seems to have been a rapid expansion of bluebells, especially on the far side of the park. A reply from Natural England asserts that bluebells have always been there but unseen under the bracken cover. Their reply goes on to say that the bluebell population is there because the site generally was once ancient woodland. The rolling of bracken may lead to a short-term increase in bluebells but as the bracken areas get colonised by grasses and the bracken disappears it is likely that the bluebells will decline. I was also reassured that the bluebells in the park are not of the invasive Spanish species.

Managing Bradgate Park must bring considerable challenge in balancing the need to preserve its unique feeling of being quite wild and untamed along with the need to cater for the large number of visitors who enjoy what it has to offer. We are so fortunate to have Bradgate Park on our doorstep. It is important that we maintain an active interest in it and I am grateful for the dialogue that Mr Tyldesley has entered into.

From the Records

Their Memorial Lives

Do you ever look at the gravestones that line the path to the Church. There are several belonging to members of the Matts family. If you look more closely you will note that three died within fourteen days of each other. Why??

This set my mind working and through the help of a friend investigating, quite a lot was discovered. This friend spends quite a lot of time at the Family History record office. Many thanks to him for all his hard work in unravelling their family history. There are many similar names - it is only when you take second Christian names and ages, do you begin to sort it all out.

He did not have the death certificates so we cannot state that they died from smallpox but there was an epidemic in Leicester in 1902 and those concerned were all connected with licensed properties. Did somebody bring the disease from Leicester?

Hannah Matts who died in 1918, the year of the Influenza epidemic was connected with the Reservoir Hotel Cropston (now The Badgers Sett) and sister of Richard S Matts the licensee.

Richard Shipley Matts Licensed Victualler and Grazier living at the Reservoir Inn Cropston died on the 29th May 1902. His effects were £335.

Louisa Adams Matts, spinster and sister of Richard died on 7th June 1902, probate was granted to George Matts Pettifor, Brewers Agent, another name associated with Newtown. She left £185.

Hannah Matts a second sister of Richard Shipley Matts and also a spinster died on 30th October 1918 at 65 Kirby Road, Leicester. Her Probate application stated she was of the White House Farm, Diseworth. Her effects were £2,842 (2012 = £155,116).

Thomas Shipley Matts from the Crown Inn Bradgate Road, Anstey died on 2nd June 1902. He left £1067. his wife Sarah P Matts was born in Diseworth.

I have much more information if anyone would like to read it and there are a lot more of the Matts family buried in our Churchyard.

A caravan was stolen from a house on Bradgate Road yesterday. I am told that it had a tow bar lock on it and was behind padlocked gates that were cut.

This morning Maurice saw a car in the drive on the Main Street with the engine running, no sign of anyone and the house door shut. Not a good idea even if you think you are watching and can get out there quickly. It does not work like that I am afraid.

There have been three burglaries close to each other just into Cropston this week so obviously we must be extra vigilant.

Speedwatch has been booked for 13th May and 2nd September, on each occasion for two weeks. If you would like to volunteer please contact me if you live in the village or Jan Stewart if you live on Roecliffe Road. Jan is keen to have three people on each session to monitor the number of cars, whether speeding or not. 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A Healthy New Year Leads to A Happy New Year

Every year we start off with an abundance of resolutions to get healthy - a great resolution to have. With gusto, we jump into crash diets and extreme exercise routines only to fail a few weeks later.

Working as a Personal Trainer and Nutrition Coach since 2005, I have realised that 'Diet' is a dirty word Often, 'going on a diet' has the reverse effect. After a couple of days with food deprivation and the con-



sequent bad mood that accompanies it, people often give up. What really needs to happen is to re-think the way we are eating and be a lot more proactive in our exercise regimen. I'd like to suggest some very simple changes which will help you live a healthier lifestyle.

Many of us have a sweet tooth (me included) but processed sugar is bad for you – bottom line. As a nation, the average person consumes approximately 140 teaspoons of sugar A WEEK which is contributing towards the rapidly growing obesity and type 2 diabetes epidemics. Those festive flavoured drinks you love at coffee shops have as much sugar as a can of regular cola (around 8 teaspoons) because they contain about 4 shots of syrup. If you must drink these calorie laden concoctions, the next time you order a cup just ask for 1 shot of syrup. Your drink will still be delicious, trust me!

Instead of eating milk or white chocolate, go for dark – at least 65% cocoa and above. Dark chocolate contains antioxidants, almost 8 times as many as strawberries, which help protect our bodies from damaging free radicals. Don't forget though, dark chocolate is still a high calorie, high fat food so make sure you just eat the appropriate portion size and not the whole bar.

Try freezing some fruit. Peel a small banana, place in a freezer bag and pop into the freezer for a few hours. A message from Leicestershire County Council Trading Standards Service

Say NO to Doorstep Criminals.

This Service is committed to protecting our residents, particularly those who are vulnerable, from unscrupulous doorstep criminals offering 'home improvement' services, such as paving, landscaping and roofing work. This often results in residents being pressured or intimidated into accepting a poor standard of work for an extortionate cost. Work carried out is often unnecessary and in some cases money is paid for work that hasn't actually even been done. Rogue traders are criminals but they pretend to be professional tradesmen.

One way to protect our residents is to inform them as soon as we can when we become aware that there are suspicious traders cold-calling or going door-to-door in their area. We recognise that one really good way of doing this is to add messages and alerts to the Leicestershire Villages website.

We will issue alert messages on this website when we have serious concerns that residents are at risk of becoming victims of crimes or being exploited by unscrupulous traders. Please display the alerts where residents can see them by using town halls and village message boards.

Our advice to all residents is always:

- Do not open the door to unexpected callers.
- Do not let strangers into your home.
- Do not be pressured into buying goods and services on the doorstep.
- Remember, rogue traders use glossy printed leaflets and wear smart clothes.

You will all remember the tragedy in Newtown, Connecticut on the 14th December 2012: Adam Peter Lanza, 20, shot and killed his Mother, then went to Sandy Hook Elementary School and shot and killed 20 children and 6 teachers and staff members and then himself. His Mother was a gun enthusiast and owned at least a dozen firearms. Our two communities sharing the same name made this horrendous deed even more poignant, and the following message from all of us seemed appropriate: "I am writing on behalf of the people of NEWTOWN LIN-FORD, a small community with a population of around 1200, in Leicestershire. England. (Our village became a 'Newtown' in the 15th Century!) Each one of us sends you condolences and sympathy. Our heart goes out to you in your very sad loss of the little children and the brave teachers. We can see from the images on TV that you are a strong and loving community. We know that you will help each other to cope with this heartbreaking tragedy. We are thinking of you all and praying for you. Kindest regards, Lydia Knott, Clerk of Newtown Linford Parish Council." Just after Christmas we received a short acknowledgment from their First Selectman, Patricia Llodra saying: "Thank you to our 'sister' city of Newtown Linford. Your sympathy and caring reaches across the globe to us." It was kind of them to reply. They must have had thousands of messages.

Bradgate Park: We were delighted to welcome Peter Tyldesley, the recently appointed Land Agent for the Bradgate Park Trust, at our January meeting.
