This morning I sat in a Diocesan Meeting which began with a reading from the Bible and time to talk about it. It was Matthew 21. 33-46, where Jesus uses a parable about a vineyard owner to illustrate how people reject God. The owner sends his representatives to the tenants on his vineyard when it is harvest time, but rather than give the owner his cut of the profits, the tenants beat, stoned and killed the reps. Even when the owner sent his son, the tenants killed him. You may want to look it up for a more complete version!

When we came to discuss what we particularly noticed in the reading, the man sitting next to me quietly said, 'Sometimes you are persecuted for going in God's name'. I don't know the name of this man sitting next to me, so I'm going to call him Jameel. Jameel is a member of the new C of E Church, All Saints, in Belgrave: a multi-lingual, multi-cultural congregation drawn principally from the local Indian and Pakistani communities. He went on, 'We have people worshipping with us who are Sikh converts and some are Muslim converts. Their families hurt them because they are Christian. And many of us have relatives in Pakistan where the houses of Christians are burned and Churches have been bombed. Like the men the vineyard owner sent, going in God's name brings our friends persecution'. Those of us who heard Jameel had no heart to make our own comments on what the parable was about. Instead we asked him to tell us more about the cost that his people bear as a consequence of their Christian faith.

Hearing people's stories is powerful; it is inspiring and challenging. Personal stories linger in our thinking and our emotions and hopefully sometimes provoke us to action, that is to charity.

Some of you were brought up on the King James version of the Bible, and you will be aware that where modern versions of the New Testament use the word 'love', the King James version used 'charity'. I suppose the most well known is in 1Corinthians 13:

¹³ And now abideth faith, hope, charity, these three; but the greatest of these is charity (KJV)

Which in a modern translation is:

¹³ And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love. (NIV)

I'm glad of the two translations, because it reminds me that I am called to

a love which takes action: a charity in its best, old fashioned sense. Sometimes, when we feel overwhelmed by the story of another, 'charity' can be a more helpful word to describe our response than 'love'.

So my charity today, having heard Jameel, might be to pray; or to look up the Barnabus Fund or some other organisation working to support persecuted Christians; or to send a card; or to send a donation. The love, or charity, that we are called to offer is practical, tangible and real. And as Paul said in 1 Corinthians 13, it's the greatest.



News from the Park

Looking Forward to a Busy Year

After a busy and successful 2013 we are busy planning for the coming season. Last year finished on a high note with the Christmas Fair over the weekend of 7th & 8th December. We are most grateful to everyone in the Village who turned out to support the event and to the local businesses who took stalls for the weekend. We had an arrangement with Santa that we would donate half the proceeds from his grotto to Action for Children and were really pleased to raise over £200 for this very deserving Charity.

The Walks & Events programme for 2014 will be published before Easter but there are one or two events coming up before then. On Wednesday 26th February, the first 'Bradgate Lecture' will be held in the Village Hall when Dr Phil Wilby of the British Geological Survey will give a talk on 'The Geology of Bradgate Park'. Admission will cost £2 for adults and £1 for children, students and OAPs.

I am always on the lookout for new ways in which the Trust can fulfil its charitable purpose of advancing the education of the public in the care and appreciation of the environment. Some readers may have come across the film 'Project Wild Thing' and the associated movement that it seeks to build. The film addresses the increasing disconnection of children from the natural world and, although very entertaining, carries a hard-hitting message. Having initially intended to organise a community screening of the film in association with Leicester Friends of the Earth, I was delighted when the Phoenix Arts Centre agreed to include it in their programme on the 19th and 20th February. The screening on the 19th will be followed by a panel discussion of the issues raised. Further details and timings can be found on the Phoenix website: www.phoenix.org.uk

Having completed all our paperwork for the Environmental Health Officer, we began retail sales of venison in November. The venison boxes have proved extremely popular and Bradgate venison also now appears on the menu of a number of local establishments including The Grey Lady and our own Conservatory Tearoom. Anyone visiting Swithland Wood recently will have seen our Rangers carrying out coppicing work in an area near the north car park. Much of the wood was historically managed in this way to give a constant supply of small diameter timber for a range of purposes. As well as the wildlife benefits that coppicing brings by providing a wide variety of habitats, we are pleased to be able to recreate the practical and economic benefits of managing the wood in this way. For example, in the current coppice area we are producing Ash rails that will be used for

fencing and Hazel stakes and binders that are used in laying hedges, either on the Bradgate estate or elsewhere. Other small lengths of Ash and Silver Birch will go into the kiln and be sold as barbecue charcoal. The Bradgate Park Trust has joined the newly formed National Coppice Federation, which aims to raise awareness of the benefits of coppicing and to stimulate demand for its sustainably produced products.

Also on the theme of woodland management, over the next few months the first comprehensive survey of the Park's veteran trees will be carried out. The information gathered will enable us to better care for these incredible specimens, some of which are 800 years old and are real pieces of living history.

We are also investigating the Park's archaeology. We know that there is evidence of human occupation here going back to the end of the last Ice Age but to date only a very incomplete picture of the intervening 12,000 years has been assembled. Volunteers from the Charnwood Roots project have been carrying out field walking in the arable fields around the edge of the Park and specialists from the University of Leicester Archaeological Service are evaluating the archaeological resource that exists on the Park itself. I expect to have more to report in future columns. From the distant past to the present day: the Bradgate Park Trust is now on Twitter.
