Pastoral Letter from Revd. Louise Corke

When was the last time you received encouragement from someone which you valued hearing? You may want to think about that for a moment. That question, and your answer, begs another question: when did you last give someone encouragement which they would value receiving?

And is it important anyway? Well, maybe we could start to answer that by looking at what encouragement, or the lack of it, can do. There are quite a few of us who were told by teachers that we were no good at music or sport or art, for example, and as a result we still feel we are useless at it. Many of us who think we really can't do things could, actually, if we had been encouraged. We do have the aptitude, but we lacked the courage and we were not encouraged when we needed it.

A friend of mine recently asked some of his friends and colleagues to give him some feedback on his strengths and weaknesses; one of the weaknesses which emerged was that he was not a great encourager. Since he is a vicar, this wasn't particularly good news and he thought long and hard about why he didn't encourage others. He realised that in his head, he was thinking that anybody can do anything if they put their mind to it; they just need to have a go and the worst thing that could happen is that they fail. Then a friend pointed out to him that most people not only feel that there are some things they couldn't possibly do, but also the prospect of failing is a really fearful one. So they need others to come alongside them and encourage them.

Good encouragement is far from a fluffy hug once in a while, nor is it just about telling people about how great they are. Encouragement comes when we are included in a project which succeeds, or when someone tells us that we are appreciated, or when we are given the courage to do something valuable which may indeed fail but was still worth trying. Good, regular encouragement stops negativity, and a lot of us know how we can hold quite negative internal beliefs about ourselves. Really good encouragement will also challenge us and change us.

Encouragement has such positive outcomes, it is valuable in every place of life and work, and certainly it ought to be part of the culture of each of our churches. So I wonder: when did you last receive encouragement, and when did you last give it?



Confirmation is open to both adults and young people, and we will be running separate sessions for each group.




Celebrating Helen's Ordination as Deacon



Residents of Lady Jane Park wish to thank the residents of Newtown Linford for their response in signing the petition against a proposal by the Site Licence Holder to change the status of Lady Jane Park from a permanent residential site to a caravan letting park.

This was to be put before Charnwood Borough Council but already two caravans have appeared one of which has already been let. They are unsightly to the park.

Two and a half years ago the Site Owners removed three caravans,

the reason being that they were not in keeping with the park. These were then replaced by holiday home caravans seven weeks ago.

County War Memorial Project

Janet Neaverson is hoping for some assistance from villagers on the County War Memorial Project. At the moment Gwen Wakefield and Janet are working on the project but would welcome assistance from anyone who might have a few hours or more to spare.

They are trying to find out

- Who died
- Who went to war
- Which rRgiments they were in
- Where the soldiers/airmen/sailors lived

This probably involves work on the computer using the internet to look at war records and the 1911 Census.

They thought this might appeal to villagers of all ages and may be something that school age children/teenagers would be interested in either as a piece of independant work or as part of a Project.

If you are interested contact either Janet direct or the Editor who will pass your details on to Janet.

The Imperial War Museum (IWM) began an extensive project to record

information countrywide about War Memorials, including basic data about their condition and they have collected around 900 Leicestershire records.

At present, their database, the UK National Inventory of War Memorials, does not make photographs, names or biographical information available online.

A particular emphasis of our project will be on finding out information about individuals who have died in conflicts, and are commemorated (or not), since WWII.

This is an opportunity to involve people in all local communities in a project of considerable his torical significance which

Furthermore, the condition of war memorials in some communities is giving cause for concern – indeed, a pilot survey of Croft's memorials revealed that all that remains of one particular memorial is a photograph at the <u>Record Office</u>.

This Project will record the condition of local memorials before it is too late to do anything about their preservation.

Project Priorities

The Priorities for the project are:

Priority 1: Recording existing and 'lost' war memorials across the coun-

ties of Leicestershire and Rutland and the details of local individuals killed as a result of armed conflicts since 1945.

Priority 2: Extending the data with gravestone information and/or personal detail about those persons recorded as desired by the volunteer participants.

The project will be open to any local person but is aimed primarily at heritage and archaeological wardens and will be formally closed only when the primary recording is complete

Changes to Local Bus Services. Withdrawal of Sunday Services

Residents may be aware that the County Council needs to achieve savings of around £66 million over the next four years and is therefore faced with some very difficult choices. As a result the Council has looked at delivering efficiency savings with regard to evening, Sunday and school bus services, with a view to withdrawing services in areas which cause the least impact.

The changes have been designed so they don't affect daytime Monday to Saturday services which provide important links to work, training, education, health and shopping in the County.

The service to be withdrawn that affects Newtown Linford is the Sunday Centrebus 121 service between Leicester and Loughborough.

This service will be withdrawn in mid/late July. I understand that this service raises revenue of just over £3,000 pounds per annum, with a subsidy of nearly £15,000 from the County Council.

Just to keep you informed, the other service that will be withdrawn locally is the evening Arriva 123 service, between Leicester and Loughborough via Anstey and Swithland. There will also be changes to the evening service First Leicester 74, between Anstey and Leicester, which will run commercially up to 9pm.

Hopefully, together with Woodhouse Eaves, we may be able to look at options. One possible option is that John Storer House has a community bus scheme that may be of assis ²⁴ tance

Village Records 1968

I arrived in Newtown Linford 14 days before Christmas 1967 and I would like to share with you what I have discovered from the 1968 Village Records, my first year here.

Firstly where was I going to walk my dog, Bradgate Park, The Beacon and Swithland Woods were all closed due to the Foot and Mouth outbreak. Only the Outwoods was open and my salvation for that time. All were opened in March after being closed for 15 weeks.

The newspaper pictures showed snow that January. There was a comment about the cold when the W.I. met. 26 members and 3 visitors braved the elements to listen to a talk about Vegetarian Cookery. That month, the Women's Fellowship had a talk about the Salvation Army. The Drama Society organised a dance and later in the year they produced "Someone Waiting" by Emlyn Williams. John Nixon, Lydia Knott, Jack Ayling, Marion Richardson were in the cast. This was excellent because they had pleaded for actors in the December 1967 Church Magazine.

We often have items about the Park and 1968 was no exception. Firstly a Second World War smoke bomb was found and made safe.

There was a Times newspaper article about the first Ranger Mr Haslegrave who was connected with the Park from 1915. His influence spread into the village. He was determined that Newtown Linford, after the sale of the Grey Estate, should not undergo the drastic and incongruous modernisation which was suffered by many "Old World" villages. In a consultative capacity, he was empowered (under the terms of the sale of Bradgate Park) to advise on styles, nature and colour of materials and sites of any new buildings and projects. He must have been a nightmare to builders and architects who came along with other ideas but in spite of frustrations he encountered the village still retains some of the old charm. I am sure he would have been very pleased that we followed his ideals and now have our own DESIGN STATEMENT.

During 1968 there was a notice about land tenancy near Cropston and Roecliffe Cross Roads. On the other side of the Park, the Highways Department forbade the cutting down of any roadside trees. 87 Acres of pasture and arable land between Ulverscroft Lane and Markfield Lane was put up for sale.

Mothers and Toddlers met at Mrs Coleman's, 6 Main Street through the year. There was an Open Air Art Exhibition at Beech Farm, a display of night school work. During 1968, the Church Sewing Group made £66 out of items made.

The Crusaders held a coffee evening and showed a film about their activities for the young in the village. It is good that we once again

have a Youth Group.

"vulnerable residents".

The Seniors were not left out. The Ex Servicemen's Social Club organised an outing and tea. The 25th year of the event was celebrated when 3 coaches left the Club. The mystery trip took them as far as Trent Bridge and they returned to the Club for their tea.

The WI had a Produce Show when Mrs C Buthaway won the President's Cup, 2nd Mrs Florrie Anderson, 3rd Mrs M Foulds. The Thompson Cup was won by Miss Mitchell, 2nd Mrs Hewitt, 3rd Mrs D Freer.

The County WI did well winning the Denman Cup at the Royal Dairy Show. The team included our Lucille Thompson and Mrs Gibson. The Church celebrated the installation of a new treble bell on 11th March, and later in the year a 14 peal was rung at the induction of the new Vicar. The Rev HP Hargreaves MC MA had been the Vicar since 1949, retiring in July. Canon Harris Evans was appointed and inducted in September. The village relaunched their Good Neighbour Scheme which had been started in 1965. Help, regular visitors and car lifts were being sought for the house bound. Our Neighbourhood Watch still keeps a list of

Through the year there were mentioned births, weddings and deaths as well as academic achievements. At the time there were 66 children on the Sunday School List.

The Parish Council was not idle. They had to deal with a farmer who ploughed up a footpath between Anstey and Newtown. They wrote to the Bradgate Park Trustees asking them to provide more parking to help the village. That was before we had double yellow lines. The park was having problems with litter. The wardens collected 17 cwt after the Whitsuntide bank holiday.

The Parish Council reported that the drainage in the cemetery had been completed and they were going to plant more shrubs.

8 people attended the Annual Parish Meeting when they were informed that the Precept was equivalent to a 3d rate and was the same as the previous year. Early morning lighting had been refused by the planning department. They had talked to the Midland Red Bus Company to ask them to move the bus turn round from Markfield Lane corner to Ulverscroft Lane corner. The present corner was very busy since the opening of the M1.

By the time you read this the new Chief Constable for Leicestershire will have taken up the reins at Force Headquarters. We wish Simon Cole all the best and hope he does not find it necessary to make too many stringent cuts to affect our neighbourhood policing. Also, our new CPSO Alex Ritchie has taken up his position.

Here are a few matters to be aware of: -

Copper is popular with the thieves at the moment so do not leave that odd roll of copper wiring about. Some went missing from a farm on the Main Street recently.

We are experiencing too many break-ins at the moment. The glass in a front door on a house on Bradgate Road was broken leaving behind a trainer. The noise disturbed the occupants so nothing taken.

A resident returned from holiday on Grey Crescent to find the rear kitchen window forced open and cash and jewellery taken. They had closed the window again after them and although they left drawers open they did not make a mess.

A huge concrete planter was taken from outside the village shop.

Three hooded men seen on the roof of a Church in the County.

If you leave charity bags of clothes or have a skip outside your premises, they may be taken away or emptied by people other than the correct people. This is a theft or a crime but cannot always be deterred by the Police.

74,474 criminals arrested and charged. £17,907,824 worth of illegal drugs recovered £6,028,880 worth of stolen goods seized 89.683 calls received with useful information.

Charnwood LPU has had good success in apprehending criminals in April. Five burglars were arrested within 24 hours 3 in the Cotes area, another in Thurmaston and one in Sileby. One of those will also be charged with other burglaries but no details of which area.

THINGS YOU PROBABLY NEVER KNEW YOUR MOBILE PHONE COULD DO

EMERGENCY

The emergency number worldwide for a mobile is 112. If you find your-self out of the coverage area of your mobile, network and there is an emergency, dial 112 and the mobile will search any existing network to establish the emergency number for you. This number 112 can be dialled even if the keypad is locked.

HAVE YOU LOCKED YOUR KEYS IN THE CAR

Does your car have remote keyless entry? This information may come in handy someday. If you lock your keys in the car and the spare keys are at home just call someone at home and ask them to get your spare key and their mobile phone. Then hold your cell phone about a foot from your car door and have the person at home press the unlock button on the spare key, holding it near their mobile phone. Your car will unlock and saves someone from having to drive your keys to you. Distance is no object. You could be hundreds of miles away but if you can reach someone who has the other '[remote' key for your car, you can unlock the doors (or the trunk).

HOW TO DISABLE A STOLEN MOBILE PHONE

To check your mobile phone's IMEI, key in the following digits on your phone *#06# (this works—Editors note)

A 15+ digit code will appear on the screen. This number is unique to your handset. Write it down and keep it somewhere safe. If your phone gets stolen you can phone your service provider and give them this code. They will then be able to block your handset so even if the thief changes the SIM card your phone will be totally useless. You probably won't get your phone back, but at least you know that whoever stole it can't use it or sell it either. If everyone did this, there would be no point in people stealing mobile phones.

ATM PIN NUMBER REVERSAL - GOOD TO KNOW

If you should ever be forced by a robber to withdraw money from a ATM machine, you can notify the police by entering your PIN number in reverse. For example if your pin number is 1234 then you would put in 4321. the ATM system recognizes that your PIN number is backwards from the ATM card you placed in the machine. The machine will still give you the money you requested but unknown to the robber, the police will be immediately dispatched to the location.

These were the Annual Meeting of the Parish and the Annual Parish Council Meeting on Tuesday 18th May 2010. The Annual Meeting of the Parish only happens once a year. The other Parish Councillors remain the same: Mr. Philip Baker, Mr. Nigel Blythe, Dr. Richard Lowe, Mrs. Pam McMorran, who is also our Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator, and Mrs. Virginia Toon. The Agenda contained the usual items: Police and Neighbourhood Watch, Planning, Highways, Bradgate Park Trust, Cemetery and Churchyard, Playing Field, Correspondence and Finance, which is split into a report on balances held by the Parish Council and signing of cheques approved by the Council.
