Why is it important for us to outreach?

Here we are in the month of June and our thoughts turn to the annual summer fete at Ratby and then, before we know it, their fun run will be upon us. I have been asked by some people why do we as a Church get involved in these ventures? Shouldn't these type of ventures be left to other groups/organisations?

How we understand and perceive the Church is quite important in determining why we get involved in community type initiatives such as fetes, fun runs, lunch clubs cinema clubs etc

What is the Church? Is the Church a building? Is it the place where believers gather to worship? Or is the Church the people? The believers who follow Christ?

We, God's people, are the Church. The purpose of the Church is twofold. The church comes together for the purpose of worship. The Church reaches out to spread the love of Christ and the gospel message to unbelievers in the world (Matthew 28:18-20). William Temple, an Archbishop of Canterbury in the 1940s, put it really well when he said, "The Church is the only organisation that exists for its non-members." This sums up the reason why we need to outreach in whatever way possible. Church is not a club for Christians.

Outreach was commanded by Christ. Before His ascension, Jesus told the disciples that their impact on the world should start in their city and expand its influence into the entire world (<u>Matthew 28.19</u>; <u>Acts 1:8</u>; <u>2 Peter 3:9</u>).

Outreach is important to our Church because it is important to God and that makes it important to every Christian for the following reasons: 3

Out reach activities give the Church the opportunity to attract many more families and such activities lead to "pleasant dialogue" with people in our community and then evangelistic opportunities. It is such a great opportunity to be a positive force in our community both as individuals and collectively as a Church. We want to share our faith with everyone but unfortunately for one reason or another many people think of the Church as boring and irrelevant.

As a Church, we continue to try all sorts of means to communicate our faith. We believe that a message of love needs to be spread with love. Love is best seen when it's sincere and demonstrated. We take our start from Jesus' words, "let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven." (Matthew 5:16)

A great way to demonstrate God's love is to help people to experience something of Church life without having to come to a church and its best seen demonstrated by people whose life is being changed by God, These type of events absolutely do have a positive effect on people's perception of Church and gives us a brilliant opportunity to communicate our faith.

Visit 3/13 – Saturday 8 June 2013 – St Peter's, Tickencote

Our first two walks of the 2013 season of visits and walks by the Cathedral Walking Group have been superb but if you are thinking that you might like to join us then our next visit is one not to be missed.

On Saturday 8th June 2013 we will be visiting St Peter's Church at Tickencote in Rutland. St Peter's is one of the jewels in the Church's crown. It is said to have the greatest 'Wow' factor of any Church in Britain, and it is small but beautiful! Don't forget your camera!!!

The visit will follow our established pattern of lunch at the Stamford Garden Centre, Casterton Road, Stamford. PE9 4BB at 12. noon, a visit to St Peter's Church at 1.30pm followed by a short walk lasting ₈ about 1½ hours through the surrounding countryside.

Car Parks, Compost and Carriages

Keen-eyed residents may have spotted what looks like an enormous outdoor carpet-fitting operation taking place on one of our overflow car parks recently. In fact, we have been laying plastic mesh in order to increase our ability to



use the grass parking areas in wet weather. Whilst it looks quite intrusive at first, the mesh quickly disappears from view as the grass grows through it and provides a firm base for car tyres to grip in wet conditions. We hope that this will enable us to open the overflow car parks at times such as the Christmas holidays and Spring and Autumn half-terms when we would not normally be able to let cars park on the grass and that this will reduce some of the pressure on parking in the village at these times.

On the subject of parking, I have agreed with Newtown Linford Primary School to trial a concessionary parking scheme that will allow parents doing the School run free use of our car park in order to reduce congestion outside the School at the beginning and end of the day. The School will be giving details to parents and issuing permits.

Given that we are a charity, with an objective to 'advance the education of the public in the care and appreciation of the environment', I am always on the lookout for ways in which we can reduce the environmental impact of our activities. Sometimes inspiration strikes at the strangest times and on this latest occasion it was while looking in the bin in one of the kitchens. We already separate recyclable waste from our general rubbish and, in so doing, have reduced the amount that is sent to landfill by several tonnes annually. While gazing absentmindedly at the rubbish it occurred to me that we get through a lot of teabags in the course of a week and that these were all going into the general rubbish bin: not anymore! Each kitchen now contains an additional bin into which all the used teabags and coffee grounds are emptied along with any vegetable waste. These are then emptied into one of our new composters to rot down and be used instead of having to buy in compost for borders and bedding plants. I hope that the high caffeine content will not have an adverse effect on the plants.

As well as horticulture, we have been experimenting with "horsey-culture" with horse and carriage rides through the Park on one day a month through the Summer. We hope that this will provide our visitors with an opportunity to take a trip back in time as the coachman drives them along the carriageway towards Bradgate House. The money raised from the carriage rides will subsidise the cost of our other venture involving horse 10^{-10} power, which is the use of a heavy horse to perform some of the

tasks around the estate that are usually carried out with a tractor, such as bracken rolling and timber extraction. We hope that this will give members of the public an insight into the way of life on an estate, such as Bradgate, in a bygone age, as well as being more environmentally friendly than the modern diesel-powered approach.

Over the past few weeks, we have hosted a number of events that, whilst they are not Bradgate Park Trust events as such, have a long tradition that we are very pleased to be able to continue. The last Sunday in April saw the traditional Bluebell Service in Swithland Wood, although the late arrival of Spring this year meant that the bluebells themselves were conspicuous by their absence. The annual Leicestershire Yeomanry Memorial Service takes place on the nearest available Sunday to the anniversary of the 1915 Battle of Frezenberg on the 13th May. This year the sun fortunately shone on the soldiers, veterans and cadets who were on parade for the ceremony at the Memorial. In between these two events, the Leicester Morris Men marked May Day in traditional fashion by dancing at Old John early in the morning on the 1st May. They were joined for the final dance by a rank amateur but fortunately I do not think anyone managed to get a photograph.

Newtown Linford Gardening Club

Our April visit to Woodland Nurserv was truly awe-inspiring. The enormous greenhouses, which all can see when arriving at the Garden Centre, a few miles north of Hinckley, but cannot visit, were opened to a large party from our Club and we were given a guided tour. Some four million bedding plants are raised in these greenhouses and then sent out to the many garden centres in the Wyevale Group. It was eye-opening to see the huge array of plants. We learned of the ways in which the 30 gardeners, employed on the site, ensured that all the plants were kept healthy and made to grow well enough to be sold to the public. Imagine pinching out over 20,000 fuchsia cuttings, or regulating the temperature in the greenhouse, sometimes on an hourly basis, or watering twice a day, or protecting the plants from pests and diseases and it will give an insight into the methods used to maintain the quality of the plants they sell. We were all greatly impressed.

On 25th June our speaker is Colin Olle who is talking to us about the National Garden Scheme which encourages people to open their garden to the public and raise money for charity. This event is timely because one of our members will be doing just that towards the end of July.

The visit of Christine Walkden on 22nd October continues to cause a lot of interest. Tickets are being ordered at a steady rate and we have had a lot of interest both from our members and from people who are members of other Clubs but wish, on this occasion, to join us for this memorable evening. In the meantime, I want to help you all stay as healthy as possible and here are a few nutrition and exercise tips.

BEST SPICE

Cinnamon not only tastes DELICIOUS but it is an absolutely amazing spice for your health. Many studies



have shown it to assist in the regulation of blood sugar. Therefore, add it to your porridge in the morning and put it on top of your cappuccino instead of cocoa powder. Anything that helps to prevent a spike in your blood sugar is worth its weight in gold, particularly if it assists in keeping Type II Diabetes at bay.

HYDRATE

If we are fortunate enough to enjoy sunny days, it's very important to stay hydrated and that means LOTS of water. Everyone should try to drink at least 2 litres a day. Keep a glass on your desk at all times. Buy a water carrier from a camping store and carry it around with you, filling it up as you need. Please try your hardest to drink it as it comes (i.e. without the addition of cordials)! Even at the gym, for most of us, water is adequate hydration. Sports drinks and coconut water are only necessary means of hydration for serious athletes, otherwise they contain too much sugar. If you're heading to the gym for your usual cardio / weight workout, all you really need is plain, simple water. Just make sure you keep drinking it throughout your workout.

EXERCISE OF THE MONTH – THE GLUTE BRIDGE

The Glute Bridge is important for improving core stabilization. This is important in the prevention of lower back pain, because the lumbar spine must be stabilized during lower body extension to reduce strain on the lower back. Lie on your back on an exercise mat or the floor in a bentknee position with your feet flat on the floor. Place your feet hip-width apart. Contract your abdominal muscles to flatten your low back into the floor. Attempt to maintain this gentle muscle contraction throughout the exercise. Gently exhale. Keep the abdominals engaged and lift your hips up off the floor. Avoid pushing your hips too high, which can cause hyperextension (arching) in your low back. Inhale and slowly lower yourself back to your starting position.

A DAY OUT TO BURGHLEY HOUSE

Reputed to be the largest and grandest house of the Elizabethan age, Burghley House and Gardens is a superb venue to consider seeing when planning a day's visit to the Stamford area.



Built between 1555 and 1587 by William Cecil, the Lord High Treasurer to Queen Elizabeth I, this magnificent building boasts eighteen staterooms. Over the centuries Burghley has undergone several restoration and modernisation programmes and many works of art, including a vast array of pictures, are there to be admired. The ceilings are something else! Truly amazing!! With finance playing a very important role in the history of Burghley House (yes, it was a problem in those days it seems, as it is now), it was in the 'better' times that the services of Capability Brown were employed and unfinished rooms could be completed and work concentrated on the park and gardens.

Many noble visitors of the realm have crossed the threshold over the years and one of the most notable is probably the visit of Queen Victoria in 1844. Her Majesty must have been very much impressed by the magnificent Great Hall.

The Gardens of Surprise are an absolute delight with mazes, water and mirrors. This area is an achievement of which Burghley can be justifiably proud. With sculptures, and some surprises, this is a most relaxing area, which I found delightful.

If you need some interactivity then the Brewhouse is the place to go. With an audio-visual programme, this will keep various ages interested for some time. The learning spaces in the Brewhouse can actually be pre-booked by schools and organisations, so increasing the knowledge of various aspects can be undertaken.

The Orangery Restaurant provides welcome foods and beverages when a break is required. With a Gift Shop, Garden Shop and Garden Café there is plenty to do for everyone, in addition to the main house's admirations.

With many events taking place throughout the year, a visit can be timed to coincide with perhaps a craft fair, game fair, food event, concert, or the Land Rover Burghley Horse Trials, to name just some of the items on the programme of events taking place at Burghley.

From the Records LEST WE FORGET

The Bradgate Team Sunday Services for May, which were printed in the Village Magazine, stated that on Sunday 5th May at 11am the Service was the Yeomanry Special and would be taken by the Team Rector Revd. Peter Hooper.



How many of you know the his-

tory of the service? It is a service for the Leicestershire Yeomanry, but why that date? It is held annually on the Sunday morning closest to the date of the Battle of Frezenberg which took place on 13th May 1915 near Ypres in France. The battle is of significance to the Yeomanry who suffered very heavy losses during the six days fighting.

The Yeomanry Service takes place in Newtown Linford Church at 11am on the Sunday Morning and is followed by a service in Bradgate Park at the Leicestershire Yeomanry War Memorial, which stands close to the Old John Tower. It records information from the Boer War through the First and Second World Wars.

The Memorial is a 10 metre tall concrete and granite obelisk with attached metal plates standing on a square of consecrated ground. It was unveiled on 3rd July 1927 by Lt Gen Sir Charles Kavanagh and is a landmark that can be seen right across the County.

So what happens at the Church Service? Two soldiers guard the Lychgate and two soldiers guard the Church Entrance through which the congregation pass. The service members include retired soldiers, members of the TA and cadets.

Two flags are carried into Church one being the Yeomanry flag. They are both laid on the altar. The service begins with the National Anthem and ends with a trumpeter playing the last post. The colonel reads the lesson and a minutes silence is held for the fallen. The flags are paraded out with due solemnity which ends the service in the Church. The Revd. Peter Hooper then travelled to the War Memorial with the army personnel where an act of remembrance and the laying of a wreath takes place. The booklet at the Church War Memorial contains two photographs

I received a telephone call from an Oriental sounding lady who informed me that my Windows operating system on my computer was transmitting faults. Now I know her next stage would be to offer to rectify it by entering a code to allow them access to my computer then presumably they would look for bank account details and passwords etc. Those of you who work in companies with computers will know this is how their IT departments fix their machines for them. A quick code and away they go but in the wrong hands this is lethal. This scam has been going awhile but can be convincing so please stop and think and never allow anyone access to your computer.

A house on Main Street reported intruders in the back garden on the night of 4th May. Their fencing had been badly damaged and footsteps were found. No attempt had been made to gain entry to the house. About three weeks previously a house on Bradgate Road reported footprints all along the bottom of the garden. I guess the same culprits.

It would be good to have it go to all the Senior Schools that our children attend in this area.

Diane Tillotson, the Anstey NHW co-ordinator has asked whether Newtown Linford is interested in joining with them for their next Cycle Hub. I guess it will be next year. It is a two hour event when Beat Police and Traffic Management attend. In April, free back packs were given to the first fifty people to arrive on their bikes. Lights, locks and other accessories are on sale with free MOT's for the bikes. Security marking is probably available as well. I am not sure whether we have many cyclists in the village. Please let me have your comments on this.

I am writing this on Bank Holiday Monday. The village is gridlocked. I called the Police at 1.15pm and they had already received another call. They said if it was just too much traffic on a sunny day there was nothing they could do. I explained that the verges all the way to Anstey were littered with cars in front of and behind yellow lines and hanging over people's driveways. I said there was no way an emergency vehicle could get through. The traffic lights were not helping as they were only letting two cars through at a time heading towards Leicester. Obviously they did do something because the Charnwood traffic wardens came and put tickets on many cars. I personally think the way forward is to publicise that the wardens do come out and ticket on bank holidays and indeed arrange for them to do so beforehand. Watch this space!!!!

Be an Egg-cellent Gardener

Gardeners are being urged to take extra care this spring. The promise of warmer weather gets many of us thinking about trimming or removing garden greenery, but at the same time our feathered friends are busy building their nests, laying their eggs and munching their way through caterpillars and other pests.

Although all nesting birds have legal protection under the Wildlife and Countryside Act from the moment they start building the nest until the young have fledged, it only takes a moment for a nest to be accidentally destroyed. Birds such as robins, sparrows and blackbirds are in decline and need all the help they can get, especially after a harsh winter.

Neil Pilcher from the Leicestershire and Rutland Wildlife Trust said "We ask everyone to be careful as dense hedges such as Leylandii are good nesting sites, but any hedge, tree, shrub or ivy should be quickly checked just before starting work. If not doing the work themselves, householders should ask their contractor to check for nests too. If in doubt, the work should be postponed until the end of August when the breeding season is over ".


