





News from the Park

Will The Rain Ever Stop?

It now seems to have been raining constantly since Christmas. Parts of Leicestershire experienced their wettest January since records began and the amount of rainfall expected in an average February fell on the County in the first six days of the month. The Park is sodden and we are extremely glad of the second all-terrain buggy that we purchased as it is virtually impossible to go anywhere in a Land Rover without severely rutting the wet ground. Fortunately the rain has generally come as a steady flow rather than in sudden downpours and the River Lin has not burst its banks this winter, which it did on several occasions last year. Despite the conditions, there is still plenty of work that needs to be done. We have been delighted with the way in which sales of venison have taken off. As well as the venison box sales to the public, we now supply a number of local butchers and Bradgate Park Venison is beginning to appear on the menus of a range of local restaurants and gastro pubs. Venison burgers, sausages and casserole feature from time to time as 'Specials' at the Conservatory Tearoom so there are lots of opportunities to sample this most local of foods.

Winter is also the time of year when the bulk of the woodland management work gets done. We have been continuing with the programme of coppicing in Swithland Wood and all the timber produced that is surplus to our own requirements has been sold as hedge laying materials or put aside to season before being sold as firewood or barbecue charcoal next year. I am keen that our woodlands become self-sustaining financially as this will ensure that the management we carry out, such as coppicing, which is so beneficial for wildlife, can continue into the future without the need to rely on Government grants.

On the subject of Swithland Wood, I am pleased to be able to announce that we have acquired the two areas of woodland to the east – known as White's Wood and Stocking Wood. This purchase has been made possible with the support of Leicestershire County Council, Leicester City Council, the National Forest Company and the Helen Jean Cope Trust. The Bradgate Park Trust is very grateful to all of them and to the Charnwood Trust for giving us the opportunity to acquire these woodlands and the time to put the funding together. These additional areas will be made available for public access once initial surveys and safety checks have been completed, although we shall probably ask visitors to keep to the

paths in order to protect the varied plant life as well as the groundnesting birds. Staying with the subject of trees but now turning to the Park itself, many people will have heard the story of how, when Lady Jane Grey was executed in 1554, the Bradgate woodsmen symbolically 'beheaded' many of the trees in commemoration. The 12th of February this year marked the 460th anniversary of this sad occasion and we have re-commenced the practice of pollarding on the Park. We have been cutting back a number of the younger trees (mainly Sweet Chestnut but some Oak) that are threatening to crowd out some of the veteran Oaks. Although the result looks drastic, the trees soon spring back with renewed vigour. Indeed, one of the reasons that Bradgate has so many ancient trees is that they have been regularly pollarded over the centuries.

Winter is traditionally a time for taking stock and planning for the year ahead. Two significant pieces of work are currently underway as part of the preparation of our Parkland Plan. Firstly, the Environment Agency recently carried out an aerial 'LiDAR' survey, which is a remote sensing technique designed to give a finely detailed picture of the Park's topography with a view to identifying the extent of the buried archaeological resource. The data is now being analysed by the University of Leicester Archaeological Service and we hope to have the results by the beginning of May. Secondly, a survey is being carried out of all the trees in the Park with a view to giving us the information we need to better care for them. Each tree will be fitted with a numbered tag that corresponds to its entry in the database.

Loughborough Naturalists' Club recorded over 500 different plant and animal species in the Park in 2013 and we were really pleased to be able to facilitate their work. Our Rangers have recently helped Leicestershire & Rutland Wildlife Trust set up their equipment for monitoring reptile and amphibian populations. This equipment consists of lengths of corrugated iron sheeting that attract these cold-blooded creatures as they heat up in the sunshine. Should you come across a piece of 'wriggly tin' on the Park, please do not move it: it is meant to be there! We are also looking to set up a permanent moth trap around the Deer Barns.

Bradgate Park Trust Application for a Premises Licence – The Ruins of Bradgate House

Residents may have seen the pale blue notices at the entrances to the Park concerning the Trust's application to Charnwood Borough Council for the grant of a Premises Licence for the Ruins.

The law allows the staging of theatrical productions to an audience of up to 500 people without the need for a licence. We had 500 people to see 'A Midsummer Night's Dream' last year and the venue could easily have accommodated 7-800. We would like to be able to have an audience of this size in future.

The law regarding music has changed so that no licence is needed for acoustic performances of any size. On the contrary any performance of amplified music, however small, is licensable. To have a licence would give us the flexibility to amplify performers if necessary. We are NOT planning to hold rock concerts or festivals in the Park!

A number of venues, such as Calke Abbey, stage very successful and popular outdoor cinema evenings. We have no firm plans to do this at present but have included showing films in the licence application as it is possible that we may decide to try this in the future.

So far as recorded music is concerned, this is included so that we are covered for any music that may be played incidentally to any of the above activities and this is the only way in which we envisage recorded music being used.

We are asking the Borough Council to license us to carry out these activities within the Ruins enclosure on weekends and Bank Holiday Mondays between Easter and October. The hours of operation would be between 2pm and 10pm. This means that any activity would only take place on those days and between those times, not that activities would take place for 8 hours per day, 3 days per week. The maximum number of days on which any licensable activity would take place would be 28 days in any year. This figure has been used as this is the maximum number of days that any activity can be carried out without requiring planning permission. Please note that we have no plans to carry out licensable activities on anything like that number of days.

Computer Tips

Computer tip for Spring 2014

I know I am not alone in getting annoyed with the number of updates, upgrades, service packs, and revisions continually interrupting my computer activity. Especially infuriating is not being allowed to switch off my computer last thing at night because Windows requires an unspecified period of time to update itself. Just pulling the plug here can have serious consequences as I know to my cost; here's a better way to avoid them. Click the Start button bottom left and type in the box immediately above the words "automatic update". Access to this part of windows is different for XP, Vista, W7 and W8; but typing in the box will always bring up the option, "Turn automatic updating on or off". Left click here will take you to a dialogue box entitled, "Choose how windows can install updates". Click the drop down menu arrow to the right of the green tick and choose "never" "not recommended". That's Windows updates eliminated, but remember, once or twice a year, when you don't need your computer for a few hours you had better reverse this and let the computer catch up. For all the rest, go to the search box again and type MSCONFIG. Click on the option that appears; then scroll through everything that is listed under the "services" and "startup" tabs, untick anything with the word "update". You may need to widen the first column so you can read the full description. Do this by clicking and dragging to the right the line just left of "M" in "Manufacturer". Again you may want to reverse this once or twice a year when you've nothing else to do. Finally remember when downloading or installing any new product or programme to decline the offer of automatic updates. It's probably wise just to decline all offers.

The object of all these programme additions is, in part at least, to keep their product and company name on your desktop and therefore gain product recognition and familiarity. Also people in these companies inhabit a world where computers are left on 24/7 and updates are set to 23

install automatically at 3 in the morning. To anyone born in the last century leaving anything on unnecessarily is anathema.

In truth we will probably never know why our web cams need updating every two weeks, or why our printer has to check with head office every time we boot up; and who knows what information is downloaded (or uploaded?) every time Windows needs a tweak.

Alan Turing, the inventor of the computer, was recently honoured. His statue in Manchester shows him seated, holding an apple, perhaps the same one he injected with poison for his suicide. Is it serendipity or something more sinister that the largest computer manufacturer in the world has as its logo an apple, with a bite missing?

It was reported in the Loughborough Echo (7.2.14) that disgruntled residents in Diseworth got fed up with their poor download speeds and are applying for two pots of funding in order to improve their Broadband speed. They held a public meeting to gauge interest and confirm they are in a hard to reach area for superfast broadband. This means it is not cost effective to reach without outside sources of funding. They need 200 emails and will then submit a funding application to the Rural Community Broadband Fund (RCBF) and Broadband Delivery UK (BDUK). They have speeds of between 0 and 4Mb (mine is 4Mb). NEWTOWN LINFORD PARISH COUNCIL

I am covering items from the January and the February Parish Council meetings:

Planning issues: Mr. Richard Bennett, Head of Planning and Regeneration Services for Charnwood Borough Council attended the January meeting, as promised. He explained that our Village Design Statement could only be modified by going through the formal process again following legal rules. This is essential if Charnwood Borough Council is to adopt it as a Supplementary Planning Document (which essentially means that only then would it be taken into account when planning decisions are made by them). The modification would have to be completed with the assistance of their Conservation Officer, and not until the Charnwood Core Strategy has been adopted in October 2014 at the earliest. The matter is in abeyance until all the legal rules have been considered by the Parish Council. I will keep you up to date with progress.

Still on Planning, but a different issue. People, not just residents, sometimes say: "Why on earth did you allow that to be built?" The answer is that we as a Parish Council do not make the final decision on any application, small or large. We are consulted and asked for comments, which we pass on to the Planning Authority i.e. Charnwood B.C. It is their prerogative to act on them or not. When they do not agree with our objections, it is usually because existing plan regulations make it practically impossible for them to refuse an application. Sometimes Charnwood would like to refuse an application but because they know that the applicant will go to Appeal, HM Inspector may uphold the appeal, and the application is then allowed to go ahead anyway. In a case like that the cost to the Planning Authority is substantial.

Finance: You will be pleased to know that the Parish Council decided to keep the Precept at £38,000 for the eighth financial year. So, if the Council Tax demand increases this year, it will not be because the Parish requirement has been increased.

Highways: We have had complaints from several residents on Bradgate Road about inconsiderate parking on the Park side of the road. Parking partly on the pavement means people have to go onto the road in order to get around the cars, thereby endangering their safety, particularly if there are children or babies/toddlers in pushchairs. Other drivers are even more irresponsible by driving on the pavement on the

houses side, and driving too fast. The Parish Council has asked for a 30 mph limit in the past for all of Bradgate Road, but been informed by the County Council that because of Department of Transport rules, 40 mph at the top end of the road and 30 mph towards the lower part of the road is correct. To overcome parking on the pavement we need enforcement by the Street Wardens. To stop dangerous driving on the pavement we need the Police and to change speed limits we need the co-operation of the County Council. The Parish Council will do its utmost to bring this about.
