

Balancing the Books

The end of March represents the end of the financial year for the Bradgate Park Trust, as it does for Local Councils and the Public Sector in general. The movable nature of the date of Easter means that having two Easters in one financial year and none in the next is uncommon



but not impossible and this year the 31st March fell on Easter Sunday itself and I had to explain to the auditors that we were not going to down tools and do a stock take halfway through one of the busiest weekends of the year.

The original Trust Deed of 1928 stipulated that the County Council and City Corporation would between them be responsible for "defraying the expenses of management, maintenance and upkeep of Bradgate Park" up to a maximum of £1,000 each in any one year.

For many years, the two Local Authorities, who are the Trust's "Holding Trustees" (the Trust's property is held in their names) and who provide six of the nine Trustees of the Bradgate Park Trust, provided the lion's share of the funds needed to manage and maintain the Park. My predecessor, Michael Harrison, foresaw the day the Councils would no longer be able to afford to bankroll an independent Charity when he set the Trust on the road to greater self-sufficiency. Today, funding from the City and County represents around 6% of the Trust's total income and has been declining in accordance with a schedule agreed between the Trust and the Councils. Given the financial pressures on Local Authorities, it is almost certain that, if this managed reduction in funding had not been agreed, they would have been forced to cut the support they give to the Trust in order to pay for essential services. Michael's foresight, and the support of our Local Authority partners, has given us the time to put our house in order financially and plan for a future with minimal Council funding.

As a Registered Charity, the Bradgate Park Trust's accounts are available for anyone to download from the Charity Commission website. Anyone who does so will see that, in very broad terms, 40% of our income comes from car parking and 40% from refreshments and retail sales with the remaining 20% consisting of the Council funding referred to earlier,

agricultural and environmental grants and rents from cottages and farmland.

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Mobile 077 6933 1419 Tel 01530 242 958 Over an extended period, the Trust breaks even with a small surplus in good years and a small deficit in poor ones. The biggest impact on our income is the weather and, following the wettest year on record in England in 2012, it is fair to say that the year just ended will not turn out to be one of our better ones.

It is this vulnerability to the vagaries of the weather that makes it important for the Trust to control its costs and to explore opportunities to diversify its income, both of which ensure that more money is available for delivering our charitable work of managing the Park for the benefit of visitors and providing environmental education. The beauty of being constituted as a Charity is that any money we make is ploughed back into the Park rather than being paid out to shareholders as it would be if we were a private Company, or appropriated to make up a shortfall elsewhere, as might be the case if we were a part of a large public sector organisation. Developing the type of facilities that visitors expect and value, such as the tearooms and shop, reduces our reliance on income from car parking and provides additional resources for our charitable work. For 2012-13 this has meant that the Trustees have been able to defer a planned increase in car parking charges and to remove the charge for admission to the Visitor Centre. I do have some sympathy for those who would prefer to see the Park remain entirely as it was in 1928 but we now live in a very different world and, in the absence of a substantial endowment that would fund the management of the Park in perpetuity, the Trust needs to generate income in order to pay the bills. What is of vital importance is that we allow the more remote parts of the Park to retain their unique feeling of peace and tranquillity and ensure that any income-generating activities are contained within the existing developed areas as well as being appropriate in both scope and scale.

Sustainable development has been defined as "development that meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs" and that is not a bad principle for us to keep in mind with regard to Bradgate Park. We need to be able to manage the Park in a way that pays for itself today and ensures that its special qualities remain to be enjoyed by future generations.

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From The Records

Twenty Years Ago

Two adjacent pages in the Village Records for March 1993 contained items I would like to share with you this month.

The first entitled "A listed building in need of complete renovation". John German, the estate agent, was offering for sale the Grade II listed country residence Pool House, Groby. The house is surrounded by 5 acres and was built over 200 years ago. It is a brick building with a Swithland slate roof and additions in granite and brick.

It was stated that a complete renovation was necessary and that a change of use permission for a variety of uses eg hotel, restaurant, offices might be the order of the day.

Pool House is approached from the A50 via long drive flanked by paddocks and woodlands which leads to a cobbled courtyard and brick and slate stabling, tack rooms, stores and garaging. There are also gardens near the house which borders Groby Pool.

The accommodation comprised 3 reception rooms and a billiard room, ground floor reception hall which led to the servants quarters and kitchen, housekeepers room and a vaulted cellar, with 4 bedrooms on the first floor and attic rooms. Guide price £300,000

We, in the Village, see the new entrance from Groby Lane which has recently (2012) had a new pillared gateway announcing the house. The distant house can be seen from the Pool edge. Can anyone tell me about the later years?

The second item was also in the local newspaper "Bradgate Saviour" about Charles Bennion.

His motive for protecting the historic beauty spot Bradgate Park from possible housing development was simple and unselfish. He wanted to preserve the 850 acre tract of land - uncultivated since the Doomsday Book - for the use and enjoyment of the people of Leicestershire. The Park had been offered to the City by the Grey family but it was difficult to raise the money until Charles Bennion stepped in and the Park was handed over to the people of Leicestershire on 28th December 1928. Charles Bennion was the son of a Cheshire farmer and was born in 1857. He became an apprentice at Crewe Railway Works and then moved on to be a Ships Engineer. He became a partner in a shoe machinery business when he returned to Cheshire. He moved to Leicestershire in the 1880's and soon formed a new company with a Leeds man, Marshall Pearson. In 1898 their firm merged with the American based

United Shoe Machinery to form the British United Shoe Machine Com-

pany BUSM.

I smiled at the next line "BUSM has enjoyed continued success since his day as has Bradgate Park". Twenty years since this was written - all is very different on Belgrave Road.

It is important what was said by the Lord Mayor Councillor Arthur Hawkes when the memorial to Charles Bennion was unveiled in the Park in 1933. He paid tribute to the benefactor's "Splendid generosity and public generosity". He also urged us all to pledge ourselves to do all in our power to maintain these gifts in their natural beauty and hand them unimpaired to those who come after"

I wonder how Councillor Hawkes would face our latest planning laws?

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
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Village Children's' Playing Field

On 17th April I took my grand-daughter along to the playing field. To my surprise there was a large amount of dog mess, left by a large dog. I used my dog bag and removed it (not a pleasant thing to do). There has recently been a variety of dog mess on Grey Crescent . If you are a dog owner, I suggest that you read the following.

Dog Fouling

Aimee Langdon slipped off the slide and danced merrily toward the playground gate. Then the two-year-old tripped and fell to the ground beside some dog poop. Moments later she wiped her left eye with her hand, transferring some of the faeces to her face.

Mum Suzanne was just yards away but too late to stop her child catching an infection which has now claimed most of the sight in that left eye. Aimee had been playing last month in a fenced-off, supposedly dog-free area of her local Manchester park, Platt Fields, when she had her fateful fall.

What is toxocariasis?

IT is a disease caused by the parasites commonly known as roundworm which are found in the digestive systems of dogs and foxes.

Parasite eggs leave the host animal's body in faeces and can survive up to five years in the soil.

They usually get into a person's system when that person has got the eggs on their hands from the soil, then touched their face or mouth. In the body the eggs hatch, releasing larvae.

The condition can just cause a headache and a cough but Aimee had the most severe infection, ocular larva migrans, which can cause total blindness.

Dog mess is an eyesore and a health hazard. If you are a dog owner, you have a legal duty to clean up every time your dog messes in a public place.e scoops: ask your council's animal warden unit.

Look out for bins marked as dog bins to dispose of your dog bag. If you cannot find a dog bin, then double wrap the dog bag and place it in

a normal litter bin.

If your street is littered with dog mess, you can ask your local council to clean it. Councils now have more power to tackle public dog mess under the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005.

Legal measures to prevent dog mess are contained in the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act, which repeals Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996, and allows local councils and communities to create byelaws relating to dog mess. Visit the Law Search page for full details.

Councils can also issue dog control orders against individual dog owners for offences including allowing a dog to foul a public space. Councils can issue fixed penalty orders in relation to dog control orders. Where there is no local rate, the fixed penalty is $\mathfrak{L}75$. In very serious cases, magistrates can issue a maximum penalty of $\mathfrak{L}1,000$

A reminder of how to contact the Police in non-emergencies.

Dial 101. The Voice message will tell you they are connecting you to Leicestershire Police unless you press 1. Wait and the next set of options are:-

1 – to speak to an operator and report your matter.

2. – this is to leave a message with our beat team. Tap in their collar number and speak when asked to. For our area contact either P.C. Richard Carruthers 2139 or PCSO Laura Grimbley 6197.

The Police report sent by P.C. Caruthers only has one crime listed for the village for March and that is a little uncertain. A resident reported that some slabs on his driveway had been cracked and he

thought an unauthorized lorry had been on his premises. However neighbours in the vicinity could recall authorized work vans visiting that property at the appropriate time.

Beat Officer P.C. Ed Stephenson who has been with us since the retirement of P.C. Steve Rhodes is no longer our first port of call. It should be Beacon Officer P.C. Caruthers.

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- A car on Main Street, near to the Linford, had both back windows neatly smashed out all the way round to the frame. Nothing had been on view and obviously nothing taken. There appears to have been no motive for this callous damage.
- Two men have been seen acting suspiciously at a house on the forest. They visit at night after dark and go round the house looking in the windows.
- Two men have visited a house on Main Street claiming to be from Zenith saying they were working in the area. They gained entry by putting their hands over the electronic intercom causing interference and making the owner open the gates. Their description is: Male 1 early thirties, approx. 5'10, normal weight, local accent, dark brown wavy hair, did the speaking. Male 2 late twenties, approx. 5'9, slight build, dark brown hair, remained silent.
- A resident on Groby Lane had a similar visit. In this case the younger person was said to have a moustache. No work was seen to be carried out at the time they said they would be in the area. I have no idea who Zenith is. I can see no likely companies when doing a search of the Internet.

Incident reports direct from residents prove to be the best way of getting out information to warn people so please keep it coming.
