#### Pastoral Letter from Reader David Collins

I learned a new word the other day, well it was for me anyway. It was *e-rumour*. Apparently you only get it through your electronic post (e-mail) and it is a statement made either intentionally or unintentionally which does not stand up to scrutiny. This was all to do with something I had received through my e-mail concerning an interesting slant on the Easter story. Although it seemed to give hope about the resurrection, a little research showed it was total fiction.

In the days when I used to deal with witnesses at court, I would advise them to do just what it said in the oath, to tell 'the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth'. I encouraged them not to elaborate on what they knew but to stick to the facts as they knew them, not to include any 'might have happened, could or should have happened'.

I'm reminded of a story in the Bible of the blind man questioned by those in authority trying to trip him up and obtain evidence against Jesus. You can check it out by turning to John's Gospel, Chapter 9. It is the account of Jesus healing a man born blind. The Pharisees wanted him to give evidence against Jesus who had healed on the Sabbath.

> So for the second time they called in the man who had been blind and told him, "Give glory to God by telling the truth, because we know Jesus is a sinner." "I don't know whether he is a sinner," the man replied. "But I know this: I was blind, and now I can see!"

All of us, as Christians, have had a life changing experience of God, Jesus or the Holy Spirit which has given us a new purpose in life. However, my experience is different from yours, and yours is different from everyone else. What we can do, though, is simply to stick to what we know when we talk to anyone about our faith and what it means to us. As we celebrate Easter we do have one thing in common. It is a statement of fact which outlines what we know and believe to be true. It is no rumour and stands up to scrutiny. So, with confidence and united we can state.

He is Risen ! He is Risen indeed !!



St. Bernard Abbey past the beautiful little Blackbrook Reservoir eventually reaching the Poachers Corner and the Swanimote Rock. This is where, in Saxon times, forest courts were held to pass judgement on law-breakers and miscreants who poached or took wood. We passed the spectacular rocks of High Cademan and High Sharpley, rocks formed 700 million years ago when a volcano erupted into what was then sea.

This is the best geography field trip we've had. The party were able to leave Iceland before the airports closed and got back safely.

Nr Woodhouse Eaves: - a mains storm and water cover 4 feet by 3 feet disappeared. This left a very dangerous 6 foot deep hole. Although on the verge horses, walkers, cyclists or vehicle could have had a very serious accident.

In the opposite direction in Stadon Road Anstey a distraction burglary took place on a Thursday afternoon. A man posing as a workman, distracted the victim and stole cash from a purse. He was white, aged about 30, 5'4" to 5'6" in height, medium build with dark hair and a round face. He was wearing black or navy trousers and waistcoat and a long sleeved dark green or blue shirt.

There have been several reports of the travellers with, and without, their children kerb crawling and walking about. Several times vans have backed into driveways and only left when they know they have been seen by the occupants of the house. Descriptions include blue Bedford size vans or white escort vans and a red lorry with an unpainted plywood rear section.

On one occasion on the Main Street someone blocked their exit with a vehicle only to have it rammed out of the way. So please approach these people with care.

As the travellers are obviously taking anything metal for scrap, it was assumed that when one of the Parish Council green waste bins from the Main Street disappeared that it had been taken for scrap. After a search of the area and further investigation it turned out that the missing bin was a new plastic one and had been taken away to be repainted! I think in future they will all be plastic as they are less expensive and I think look just as good.

The new speed restrictions signs have now been erected on the Roecliffe Road and the 20 mph speed signs with flashing lights will soon be installed by the County Council along by the village school.

According to a recent survey 19,400 cars were stolen last year by the taking of keys from the house. So please do not leave your keys on view or in any downstairs room where entry could be gained.

purporting to be from BT offering a life time chance to stop cold calling for £19.00 He asked for card details and when this was refused he terminated the call. The advice from BT on their site says they do not withhold their number if they call you. So if you get a dodgy call and dial 1471 if it was an 0800 number it could have been genuine but if withheld definitely not. I know this call has been received from several other residents in the village over the last few weeks. So this area is currently being targeted.

Finally our NHW mailing system came in useful on a more friendly matter. A new resident was looking for a dog sitter and after emailing nearly 100 people we had 12 replies with helpful information that we were able to pass on. #### **Newtown Linford Parish Council**

**Progress report**: Lydia continues to make good progress and is taking regular light exercise. Hopefully she will be able to resume her normal duties as our Parish Clerk in May. Many thanks to all those who have shared her duties in her absence.

Extracts from the minutes of the meeting held on 22nd March 2010 <u>Police matters and Neighbourhood Watch</u> - Mrs McMorran reported that a man had been arrested in Cropston with stolen property in his possession and three men had been arrested with stolen property in the Birstall area. The amalgamation of the beats, reported last month, is taking time to organise. The new village CPSO is beginning to work with PC Steve Rhodes. Our village store was broken into once more and items taken. The Police responded quickly when the alarm went off, but did not catch the intruders. A valuable dog was thought to have been stolen from a house on Main Street this week.

**Bob Bown Memorial Field -** Mrs Toon presented her report. Everything is fine with the field except that the mole infestation continues. The new mole controller will be using humane traps in order to try and alleviate the problem. The Chairman is preparing a tender document for the extension of the fenced play area to accommodate the 'Springers' (new equipment for younger children). A new resident to the village who now resides at 51 Main Street, Mr Carl Lee has offered to supply items of additional metal work to support the goal post nets. These will be fitted as soon as they are available.

**Planning Issues** - A letter had been received from Charnwood B.C. Planning Dept. concerning the tree felling on Markfield Lane, in response to a letter written by our Chairman. Mr Buckingham will monitor the situation relating to the re planting and report to the Parish Council.. Planning application ref P10/0292/2 to erect new fencing around the perimeter of the village school, has been withdrawn by Leicestershire County Council and repairs will be carried out to the existing railings. Lewis Roberts, Charnwood B.C. Planning Officer, objected on three points.

A planning application, refused by the Borough Council, to remove two Scots Pine trees with Tree Preservation Orders, on Groby Lane, will be appealed against. A date for the hearing is to be notified shortly. An application for a Certificate of Lawfulness has been approved in respect of building work to a property in Roecliffe Road.

A Secondary application for the removal of trees has been made by Mr <sup>35</sup> Lee of 51 Main Street. The meeting discussed the planning rules

concerning hedges and walls and agreed that the chairman will ask Mr Buckingham to give the Parish Council notice of any such applications so that we may make suggestions in consideration of our Village Design Statement.

**Parish Council website -** The Chairman thanked Mrs McMorran, on behalf of the Parish Council and the Clerk, for maintaining our website to such a high standard

<u>Highways, Traffic, Footpaths -</u> The Chairman wrote to the Charnwood LPU Commander, Inspector Duncan Southall, at the end of February to enquire what he considers might be the effect, if any, on crime in the village it the street lighting was turned off at 00.30 hours to 05.30 hours, and the Council is waiting a response. The cost savings have already been seen in other parishes and represent a significant amount of money.

A resident on Markfield Lane had complained that they were unable to access the pavement due to vehicles being parked while building work was being carried out on a nearby property. This will be investigated together with damage to the verge near 225 Markfield Lane.

A concern had been raised with Charnwood Borough Council about their arrangements for collecting large electrical items from residential properties. Cllr David Snartt said he thought that the designated collection day was Monday, but he would check and report back.

It was agreed that the County Council had done a good job in repairing all the potholes in the village caused by the bad weather over the winter. The Chairman will chase up the Borough Council to clear various gulley pots in the North end of the village and in front of the village store and Church.

A letter had been received from L.C.C. Highways Dept. regarding new 20mph speed signs with flashing lights which are to be erected close to the School using the existing posts. As an extension to this scheme, the Chairman will ask for this to include the Nursery School which operates in the Village Hall. Cllr Snartt will support our proposal. This may not be possible as the Nursery only operates in the mornings.

The Chairman has contacted LCC Public Rights of Way Officer, to ask that the stile adjacent to the Village Restaurant be altered to make it safer. An additional step and handle post are required

<u>**Churchyard and cemetery**</u> - The Chairman thanked Nigel and Betty Blythe for making such an excellent job of re planting the tubs throughout the village. Mrs McMorran had replaced a shrub in the cemetery as one had gone missing .

#### From the Records

"What shall we do? Lets go to Bradgate!"

A question on a spring or autumn day when the hours of daylight are short. On a nice day the easiest place to go to enjoy the sunshine are our Charnwood Forest beauty spots. Bradgate Park, Swithland Woods and the Beacon.

Saturday 10th April (and 24th!) was such a day and we had gridlock in the middle of Newtown Linford. The car parks were full and the roadside parking was solid. I did not check but I am sure that others areas were solid with cars. The village records have many articles and letters about the problems of cars and a full selection of answers to the problem.

In the early 1970's visitors came by the excellent Midland Red bus service 70 plus per bus. The passengers were dropped off to be collected later by bus. Today think how many cars we have instead all taking up parking spaces.

The changes came about when the Emergency Services said we had to have double yellow lines so that they could get their vehicles through the village if there was an emergency.

The Parish Council has always been concerned with the traffic problems. In June 1967 to remove the bottle neck at the Park Gates they suggested the introduction of a second exit and a one way system. It was quite a big job because a new bridge had to be built over the River Lyn this was eventually completed. In August 1971 the Bradgate Park Trustees requested the public's views about cars and the park. They listened to the comments and then drew up a few suggestions.

They decided that the car parks should be enlarged. There were to be new car parks at Swithland Woods to stop people parking on the grass verges. They hoped the honesty boxes would provide enough cash but as we all know – parking charges were later introduced.

Vehicles through the park produced many letters in the paper. People were concerned about the damage. On one day the following went through the park:- 11 coaches who were now including the trip as part of a mystery trip and 521 cars. All which lead to more noise and fumes

both removing the quiet enjoyment of the countryside which Charles Bennion wanted us all to enjoy.

Our problem is patchy 3 hours here, 2 hours there and very dependent

on the weather. At the moment I think we have to live with it but be assured the Parish Council will monitor the situation.
