

Shaped By God: Deanery changes and a Pastoral Measure

For the last ten years, the Church at national and local levels has been changing ways of working which take seriously the changes in our society and how the Church reaches out in mission in the 21st century. There is also a decrease in the number of stipendiary clergy available to Churches; many are reaching retirement age and fewer are training for ordination as full time stipendiary priests. By 2020, the number of *stipendiary* clergy in our deanery of Sparkenhoe East will go from nine to six and this has implications on how best to organise our 16 Churches. Clergy, Deanery representatives, PCCs and DCCs have all been involved at some level in thinking this through and making decisions about how to group our Churches and deploy clergy. Census data and the character of our parishes have been considered along with identifying the similar types of ministry the Churches have in each place.

The proposals for the Bradgate Team are as follows: Ratby and Groby will be grouped with Desford and Kirby Muxloe; Newtown Linford will be grouped with Anstey, Thurcaston and Glenfield. Each group of four Churches will have two stipendiary clergy. Creating these groups will happen slowly as clergy move/retire and new ways of working are established. There is also a legal process to be completed of undoing Team Parishes, establishing new boundaries and setting up new governance within each group.

There will be a meeting in Newtown Linford Church after the main morning service on Sunday 16th November (also on the 16th at Groby and on the 23rd at Ratby) for anyone who would like to know more about this process and the implications.

If you cannot make that occasion, then please feel free to contact Revd Louise or Revd Peter and they will be happy to meet with you at another time.


You really could help save a life.

Newtown Linford Gardening Club

We had a fascinating evening listening to Peter Tyldesley, the Land Agent and Surveyor at Bradgate Park. His enthusiasm was clearly evident but what many of us did not know was the vast number of activities which are undertaken by the staff. An aerial mapping has revealed a wide range of archaeological possibilities, including revelations about human habitation in its earliest years, and a programme of determining the age of the trees in the park has revealed just how many centuries some of them have been there.

The staff have improved the access of many areas of the park to visitors by reducing the acreage of bracken and posting maps to show all the pathways we can use. In addition we learned of the ways in which the deer population is managed; the expansion of items available in the park shop (including venison when in season); the development of the deer barn and the increase in special attractions like the open air plays and the Sealed Knot event.

We also learned how important to the finances of Bradgate Park was the income from the tea rooms and the car parks, which accounted for around two thirds of the annual budget. Quite clearly, without that income, the Park would be unable to operate, so the need to control visitor parking around our streets is not just for the benefit of Newtown Linford residents.

After our celebrity evening with Adam Frost on 4th November (tickets available at the door), we conclude with the annual Christmas party on 2nd December, bringing to an end another very successful year with our largest ever membership and our most attended meetings of all time. Our numbers have increased so much that, from the New Year, our meetings will be held in the large hall.

We have welcomed a large number of new members this year and will be pleased if others want to join us. 

 $\mathfrak L4$ at weekends and Bank Holidays: a reduction of $\mathfrak L1$ from current levels. To avoid disadvantaging our regular visitors who only come to walk the dog, we are also reducing the cost of season tickets. An annual season ticket will now cost $\mathfrak L90$ instead of $\mathfrak L115$ with OAPs and Blue Badge holders paying $\mathfrak L50$.

The number of people parking without payment in Swithland Wood continues to be an issue. The Leicestershire Advice Service for Social Care

The Leicestershire Advice Service for Social Care is a new service commissioned by Leicestershire County Council. LCPT (formerly Leicestershire Community Projects Trust), in partnership with The Carers Centre, is delivering the service.

The service which is free, independent and confidential is for adults of all ages who are residents of Leicestershire and are in need of information and advice relating to social care. The request for information can be for yourself, a relative, friend or neighbour or if you are a professional the request for information can be for someone you are supporting. The service consists of two teams, one for people who identify themselves to be of working age and one for people who identify themselves as an older adult. When you contact the service you will be put through to the team best suited to deal with your enquiry.

The need to access social care services is often something very new to families and it can be a daunting prospect trying to find out what help, support, activities, etc. are available and how to access these. The Leicestershire Advice Service team can take the pressure off you by carrying out any research relating to what is available to you and how to access whatever is available. This can include things like how to get a Community Care Assessment, how to get an Impact of Caring Assessment, and finding out about the different services and activities offered by the local authority, voluntary organisations and businesses. If we don't have the answer immediately available we will investigate for you.

Advice is normally offered by telephone; however, the team recognise that this isn't always the best approach and alternative arrangements will be made when the telephone is not a suitable option.

History of The Linford Club

The Linford, known in the village of Newtown Linford as 'The Club', was originally attached to the British Legion and even now the 'official' title is The Newtown Linford Ex-Services Club, but it is no longer affiliated to the Legion. It has been part of village life since 1926 when the men of the village, mostly ex-servicemen, decided that they would build their own 'local' where they could gather and socialise amongst friends. Apparently this decision was prompted by the difficulties they were ex-



periencing in getting a drink at the only other hostelry in the village due to the many friends of the then landlord crowding the bar.

The original building was an old wooden tearoom transported from Beech Farm in the village to the Club's present location, the land being bought previously from the owner of the thatched cottages which back onto it. One of the conditions of sale being that he would be the first Steward! In 1928 a brick frontage, including a bar and billiard room was added and the wooden but at the back became the function room.

During World War 2 the backroom, which functioned as a skittle alley, became a factory used by Dunlop for the assembly of aircraft parts. It was staffed by approximately thirty local ladies who worked in two shifts, morning and afternoon. The hut lasted until about 1960 when it was rebuilt in brick and promoted as a venue for weddings, birthday parties, anniversaries, bingo, table tennis, pool competitions, arts and crafts fairs and even a dog breeders meeting. It is now used throughout the week by such groups as the Choral Society, Line Dancers, Rock 'n' Rollers and the weekly Wednesday quiz which offers prizes up to £150.00.

The Linford is a private members club which is owned equally by all members who have paid their due subscriptions and is administered by a hard working volunteer Committee and three trustees. Presently there are between 250 and 300 members. The current membership is a modest £8 for the year. Recently, it has shed its working men's club image and the décor is more in keeping with a local pub! In fact, the Club was recently awarded the 5 star hygiene certificate by Charnwood Borough Council, the highest ranking available.

Last year the back function room was completely refurbished including a new bar and it looks amazing and has been used for weddings, funerals, anniversaries & birthday parties. It has been a policy to offer this free to the villagers whether members or not, just call in to book the room through Stuart Hardie our new manager.

The Club relies on the village to support it and needs visitors not only to the frequent functions (70's Night 15th November) but to call in for a drink. Also it features all the main sports events on big TV screens through SKY & BT Open sports.

As with all drinking hostelries times are hard and we welcome your support to keep the club flourishing.

Living together with traffic

Since we are now into more changes to parking in the Village, and I have discovered several newspaper articles about car parking and the Park in the Village Records, I thought it would be a good idea to give you an outline of what has happened in the Village since I came in 1967.

There were far fewer cars in 1967 and people came to the Village on the bus (once an hour). The bus turned round at the Ulverscroft Lane corner. Sunday was the day we had most visitors, people were still working on Saturday mornings. There was half day closing for shops in Loughborough on a Wednesday and Thursday for Leicester when we had a few more visitors.

We had introduced a single yellow line for Sunday afternoon, the emergency services said we had to keep Main Street clear so if necessary they could get fire engines etc through.

The Park tried to help by having an honesty box but many did not want to give 50p, "The Park was given to the people of Leicester and Leicestershire", unfortunately no money for its upkeep was provided. To start with, Leicester City and Leicestershire County Councils gave money annually towards the upkeep of the Park. Over the years the amount got less and less but the upkeep of the Park increased. The car parks are not on land given in the bequest so a fee can be charged.

Initially the Parish Council opposed the charging stating that it would send the cars onto the surrounding roads.

The planning application to install machines to collect money for car parking was turned down by Charnwood in May 1996 but it went to appeal and was passed in June 1997.

In the Village, since the original single yellow line for no parking on Main Street on Sunday afternoons was introduced, double yellow lines have been placed on one side permanently, and gradually other restrictions have been added to keep the traffic moving. We have reached another set of changes. There are just too many people and cars in this "honey pot site". One double decker bus would bring over 70 people - to bring them in cars it is an average of 35 cars -think of the area needed.

Bradgate Parking

Thank you to Janet Neaverson for a very interesting 'potted history' of car parking at Bradgate Park.

Janet mentions half-day closing in Loughborough on a Wednesday and in Leicester on a Thursday. This is the reason why the Ruins are open on Wednesday and Thursday afternoons in summer. Despite the original reason having ceased to be relevant many years ago, the practice has continued to this day.

The original Trust Deed of 1928 stated that the City and County Councils would be responsible for meeting the costs of managing the Park – up to a maximum of £1,000 each per year. Despite this, the two Authorities continued with their financial support and in 1995 they contributed a total of over £250,000, which was around half the Trust's total budget. Over the past 20 years, that support has declined, hastened by cuts in Local Government budgets, and our funding from the Councils now represents around 5% of the Trust's total income. The income we receive from parking is therefore vital to our continued survival.

In 2013/14 we welcomed just over 170,000 cars, which was 15,000 more than the previous year but 5,000 fewer than in 2011/12. Just under 60% of visits were at weekends with around two-thirds of visitors parking in the Newtown Linford car park. The busiest month of the year is usually August, although in 2014 July saw more cars coming than in what was the 8th wettest August on record. Conversely, November is usually the least busy month but the rain sodden summer of 2012 saw June as the quietest month of the entire year.

The Bradgate Park Trust fully supports the moves to increase the parking restrictions in the village. We have increased the capacity of our car parks and it is a very rare day that they are full to capacity. Inconsiderate motorists parking on the streets have not been driven there by full car parks but by a desire to avoid paying to park. If the new restrictions are approved - and then enforced – there

is no reason why traffic congestion caused by visitors to the Park should not be a thing of the past.

We were pleased to see Councillor David Snartt who is a great support to us and always seems to have an answer to any of our questions regarding Charnwood and County Council matters.

Councillor Snartt informed the meeting about the new Community Trigger implemented by Charnwood Borough Council to combat Anti-social behaviour. Fortunately we have very little of this in our village. Basically if someone has reported incidents to the Police such as three for one person or five for similar incidents over a six month period and nothing has been done then the Council can intervene.

Bob Bown Memorial Field: Councillor David Snartt is to chase up Charnwood Borough Council on our behalf to come and tidy up the left verge of the driveway to the playing field. The rail on the five aside fence is wearing away and will soon be replaced.

<u>Highways, footpaths and traffic:</u> Councillors expressed their concerns over the amount of leaves on the footpaths all over the village and I will contact Charnwood Borough Council to ensure that they have the village high on their priority for clearance.

<u>Planning:</u> Application Granted Conditionally for two storey extensions to side and rear of 472 Bradgate Road. Application for non-material amendment Agreed Unconditionally for changes to buttress to side of North wall, coping, corbel and minor internal layout changes to All Saints Church. Two Self-Assessment Forms have been published by village residents which can be viewed on line. I hope to write more next month about Self-Assessment Forms.

The November Parish Council Meeting will be on Monday 3rd November and the December meeting will be on Monday 8th December. Both meetings at 7 p.m. in the small room of the Village Hall. Everyone welcome.
