It seems to me...... we mustn't lose sight of how we live our lives

am not too sure how much time you have spent recently watching the Olympics, but if you are anything like me, most likely too much! To say that it was compulsive viewing would perhaps be an overstatement, but quite clearly, it was a very special occasion that was brought right into our living rooms thanks to the means of modern communication.

But what was so compelling to watch? Certainly as a fan of most sports, I thoroughly enjoyed seeing the various Olympians demonstrating their expertise and as leaders in their chosen fields this was clearly to a high standard. However, there was another side to the games that I found almost as fascinating to observe, and that was the various reactions exhibited by the medal winners

Standing on the podium, there have been expressions of joy alongside tears of sadness and in some cases anger and frustration in the colour of the medal being presented. Perhaps the most diverse was that seen after the 10m diving competition.

Going into the sixth and last dive, there were three leaders virtually equal on points and all would be decided on the last performance. A closer competition had never been seen before in the Olympics. When all had been completed, there was an American with the gold and a look of smug satisfaction on his face. A Chinese diver with the silver and tears of disappointment running down his face, and a British teenager with a bronze medal around his neck laughing with uncontrollable joy.

It had been an incredible competition, all three were worthy winners but yet their reactions divulged more

about them than anything that could be spoken in a press conference. The American diver quite clearly had an expectation that he would win and as such was not surprised to be wearing the gold. The Chinese was in his mind certain to win and what disappointment was felt when those expectations were not met. The British teenager however was just simply enjoying being there and the fact that he had won a medal was superb, regardless of its colour.

And why did I find this so interesting? Because it reminded me so much of how we ourselves travel through our own life and how we handle the twists and turns, ups and downs of daily living.

When things go well and life provides what we expect, we too can develop a certain smugness in what we can achieve through our own endeavours and resources, congratulating ourselves on how well life can feel.

The opposite is of course true, that when, despite our own best efforts, things don't work out as we wanted, then great disappointment is felt and often doubts creep into our

lives as to our abilities.

But the British teenager perhaps is the model for us to follow. Delighting in just being part of this world, taking each day as it comes and laughing with joy when special things happen.

Living for the moment in God's world requires us to open our lives totally to him, trusting in his great love for us and feeling the certainty that through his love he will always have our best interests in his hands. When we rely on our own abilities to shape our lives, we will always have disappointments. When we are in step with God's purposes for us, joy is inherent in simply knowing that we are where we are called to be regardless of what is happening around us.

And as Christians, I wonder what others see in us. A certain smugness in our own abilities, tears of frustration in not being able to accomplish what we want or a happiness in knowing that we are loved. I wonder what would encourage others to follow God?


Summer Shadows

Get ready for the Festival 29th/30th September How to make your scarecrow

Going for Gold?

Steps

- Cut a 10 foot bamboo pole into two pieces, one 4 feet long and the other 6 feet long
- 2. Place the 4 foot section across the 6 foot piece, 1 foot down from the top
- 3. Wire the two pieces together with floral wire, twine or raffia
- 4. Place an old shirt on the short cross piece of the frame and button the shirt in front
- 5. Stuff the shirt loosely with straw, dry leaves or rags
- 6. Places gloves at the end of the "arms" and secure them with rubber bands
- 7. Pull one leg of a pair of trousers onto the long bamboo pole. The other leg will hang freely.
- 8. Tuck the stuffed shirt into the waist of the trousers
- Secure the waist of the trousers to the pole with a rope or belt, tying the belt or rope to the cross-piece if necessary to keep the pants from falling down
- 10. Stuff the pants with the stuffing material of your choice
- 11. Make a head for your scarecrow by stuffing straw into a pillowcase. Tie the pillowcase opening onto the top of the long stake with rope
- 12. Draw a face with felt tip pens or glue on buttons for eyes and yarn for a mouth
- 13. Stick the scarecrow in the ground or tie it securely in another location

TIPS

- Be creative. Scarecrows can be male or female
- Dress up your scarecrow according to the occasion
- If you decide not to make a scarecrow head, simply place a hat on the top of the long pole, stapling it to the bamboo so it stays in place
- Another way to avoid the trousers falling off is to use overalls and secure them over the cross piece



From the Records

Bits from the Past

I thought I would look in the Records to see what was happening about 20 years ago.

September 1992 was the licensing of the Rt Revd Dr G W Ashby, Assistant Bishop of Leicester as our Vicar following the long period of the Interregnum which followed Harry Fletcher's death.

ARC were submitting plans to quarry at Groby for another 20 years.

The WI visited the new Severn Trent visitor Centre at Cropston. Their "come and see" programme was aimed to give a picture of the work of the Company.

Very hard frosts in December ad January 1993 brought out the skaters on Groby Pool.

In 1993 there were several articles on different topics about Bradgate Park. Charles Bennion's purchase from the Grey Estate to preserve it for future generations was one.

We were coping with the construction of the Western Bypass.

It poured on Easter Day for the service in Bradgate Park but the sun shone on the Bluebell Service in Swithland Woods in May.

In June more rain and floods affected the village, they also upset the work on the Western Bypass construction added to this, the construction

companies had to obtain planning permission before disposing of the waste, this was to protect historical sites along its route.

August brought a Flower Festival into the Church to raise money for the Church.

September - The Bradgate Park Trust opened the Country Park Visitors Centre which in 2012 - the aim is for it to be refurbished as soon as the funds are avail-

At the time of writing at the very beginning of August we have 144 signatures to the pledge for the speedwatch with only 31 to go. We have lots of volunteers to hold the gun and hope that by the time this edition comes out we will have all the signatures and organized the training. Roecliffe Road has an admirable number of signatures and volunteers thanks to the hard work of Councillor Phil Baker.

There were complaints of noisy men on the Main Street in the early hours of the morning.

Several people have pointed out that the Orange Mobile signal is poor since the tornado and one resident says she was informed that the mast that is down will not be replaced. I have noticed the signal is bad all the way to Nanpantan which cannot be just one mast so perhaps all those on Orange should be contacting them about it.

We have to be extra cautious. This week (19.8.12) a house on Bradgate Road had a serious attempt at a break in – burglar alarm removed, windows broken etc. but entry not gained. Yesterday a house on Main Street near to Groby Lane had an actual break in. I also received a call from a resident near to the Bradgate Road break in saying he had received a visit from the 'ex offender' brigade selling goods. Whilst we do not want these people I think they are genuinely licensed and therefore doubt whether they have anything to do with the crimes. P.C. Ed. asks that we all pay special attention to our neighbours houses particularly if we know they are away on holiday.


