One of the TV shows I follow just got cancelled. Sadly, it was canned between series, so there'll never be the chance to find out what should have happened to finish the story lines that were running. It's not unusual – they never finished the original Michael Keaton Batman trilogy for example, nor the series 'Firefly' – but it's always frustrating, particularly if you really want to find out how things end. Do the sparring couple ever get together? Do they survive the looming disaster?

Of course, you also get the opposite problem, remember 'Lost'? It went on for several series too long, completely lost everyone with the plot twists and complications until no-one cared any more where they were or whether they ever got off the island. Then there's 'Game of Thrones', like 'Lost' a programme I never really watched. That finished all right, but to howls of protest – how could they end it like that! What happened at the end disappointed and enraged fans.

These problems mirror life: sometimes things are cut short, we're left wondering what might have been. Some things just meander on, until we're weary and fed up. And some things leave us angry and deflated. That's life. We don't always get neat happy endings. Things don't always make sense. Often they're disappointing. So how do we make sense of them, make sense of life itself?

One of the best explanations I've found came from a survivor of a Nazi concentration camp. She said life is like looking at the back of a tapestry. It seems to be a mess, threads going everywhere, cut off short, going on too long, making confusing patterns, the wrong colours in the wrong places. But you know that on the other side there's a beautiful design. It's just that we can't see it. God is the master-weaver, the wise showrunner. He knows how to take all the things that go wrong, that leave us dissatisfied, and make of them something beautiful and wonderful. Just look at what he did with Jesus' life.

#### **Markfield Lane Conservation Area**

The Markfield Lane roadside verge conservation area is mown just once a year, usually in early autumn, instead of being cut every few weeks during the growing season. It's only when you get up close to it that you can really appreciate the extent of the flora which has appeared, now that plants are allowed to flower and seed throughout the summer months. Toby and Felicity Man-



ning and I carried out a botanical survey in July and found over 40 different species, including several different varieties of grass. Next year, I'm planning to survey throughout the year, so that spring and late summer flowers are included, to give us a fuller picture. Meadow Cranesbill, one of the loveliest British wild flowers with its violet-blue petals, is unfortunately not currently found in the conservation area, and has struggled to establish itself at the sunnier, still frequently-mown lower end of the verge. This year, I decided to take direct action and put a notice and a garden cane next to one of the plants. I crossed my fingers that the grass-cutters would spare it. They did!

As well as the wild flowers, I've seen many butterflies in the conservation area, including the Ringlet, which, according to my butterfly book, needs "sunny spaces, damp and over-

grown with tall grass." And I've seen (and heard) many other insects there too, including grasshoppers. When they are allowed to grow long and to flower, grasses, as well as being beautiful, provide a valuable habitat for other creatures too, including small mammals and amphibians - we inadvertently



disturbed a few frogs when we cut the grass last year.

You may recall that some wild flower 'Plugs for Bugs' were planted by the village Brownies a few years ago in this section of the verge. I've sown a few wild flower seeds over the last year or so, including Yellow Rattle (which helps keep the grass in check). However, after consulting with conservationists, and doing research of my own, the message is clear: let the native plants take over. Sowing wild flower



seed mixes can result in eye-catching swathes of bright and colourful

flowers, and is good for pollinating insects, and certainly better than mown grass. But it's best for wildlife and biodiversity to go with whatever is growing there naturally. There's much welcome focus these days on pollinators, but the larval form of insects differ

widely in their requirements. Butterfly and moth larvae, for example, have evolved to be inconspicuous; in order to survive they need to be overlooked. The caterpillars often feed on just one or two plant species, which in many cases don't have particularly appealing flowers and are often treated as weeds - nettles, for instance.

### Native wild flowers and rewilding

Organisations which promote native wild plants seem to be gaining ground (pun intended!), including **Plantlife** ( <u>www.plantlife.org.uk</u>); also the **blue campaign** (<u>www.bluecampaignhub.com</u>) which promotes the 'rewilding' of our gardens, parks, roadside verges and school grounds. It was conceived in 2014 in response to a State of Nature report highlighting the dramatic and alarming decline in biodiversity and biomass across the U.K. A blue heart made out of recycled materials can be staked to the ground, indicating to neighbours/passers-by that part of this area has been set aside and left to grow over the summer. In Markfield Lane, we already have '*Please do not mow – conservation area*' signs supplied by the Parish Council, but don't be surprised if a blue heart pops up there as well!

Perhaps there are other areas in our Parish which could be similarly 'rewilded'?



This month's report from the Parish Council is being written by myself (Sue Pritchard) as I would like to pay tribute to Pam McMorran, as she relinquishes the Parish Clerk duties, and to welcome our new Parish Clerk, Hannah Shaw.

Pam is currently our Parish Clerk, Responsible Financial Officer and Registrar for Burials. She was previously on the Parish Council and had assisted Lydia with her duties during times of illness. Pam also set up and maintained our Village Website- a substantial task! Upon the retirement of our previous Clerk (Lydia Knott) Pam provided the continuity that was needed. As a serving Parish Councillor the rules required her to step down from the PC and she worked without pay for a year before being recruited to her current post. During this time PC business and finances were migrated to electronic operation and a member's area set up on the website for the Councillors to access, to facilitate such tasks as reviewing planning applications etc. We are extremely grateful for all the hard work that Pam has put in over the last three years, during which time the PC has extended our cemetery, upgraded equipment on the playing field and installed three VAS signs to attempt to reduce the speed of traffic in the Village. During this time the PC have also had to deal with the issues (and increased correspondence!) raised by the increased traffic and parking within the Parish due to the commercialisation of the Parks activities, as they sought to replace lost council funding. Pam – you will be hard act to follow!

Pam is remaining as our RFO and Registrar for Burials and will be working with Hannah Shaw who commences as Parish Clerk on 2<sup>nd</sup> September. Hannah is active in Village life as the current Chair of Governors at the School and has previously been involved in PTA and 'Scarecrow' activities. Her previous experience in working for local government, and obvious enthusiasm will, I hope, lead to a successful and rewarding role in the Parish.

And so to news :-

Bradgate Park Trust: As I think we are all aware there have been changes in staffing at the Trust after the recent Elections of the Trustees. We are determined that the PC will continue to have an input to Trust policy as it has the potential to radically affect Newtown Linford and are waiting to hear who will represent the Trust at our PC meetings. We also await the detailed results of the Traffic Survey carried out by Leicestershire County Council during the Easter holiday period. In the meantime we would be extremely grateful if we can obtain as much response as possible to the Traffic Survey recently delivered to every house in the Parish (and published on our website and through our facebook page). If we are to work towards a 'whole village solution' to traffic issues we need to have the feedback from the whole Parish.

**Churchyard:** The frequency of cutting has been increased and additional weed control and trimming was provided via our contractors following discussions with the Church. We look forward to the development of the wildflower area where the Copper Beech was removed.

**Cemetery:-** The wetter weather this summer has been good for our newly planted trees. The meadow area has been recently cut for the hay and additional grass cuts in the extension area (where growth is more vigorous) have been carried out.

And finally congratulations to David Snartt (our borough councillor) as he has been elected Deputy Mayor of Charnwood.
